

The Management Committee has pleasure in submitting for your consideration the 127th Annual report and Financial Statement.

The Club entered teams in the five Sydney Cricket Association Grade competitions, as well as the Limited Overs Competition, the Poidevin Gray, Green Shield Competitions and the Sydney Masters Competition.

This was a heartening season to report on and this report is complemented by vital and comprehensive reports from our president, director of coaching, club coach and captains. They have captured the true essence of who we are and what we achieved, telling how our courageous cricketers played successfully with honour and how our highly respected volunteers gave their all to our club's purpose. We achieved laudable competition results and were placed fourth in the SCA Spirit of Cricket award and were runners up in a monthly Cricket Australia Spirit of Cricket award.

Sadly we entered the season without: Michael Bevan, who moved to Tasmania and enjoyed a stellar season; Jamie Heath to Perth; Jamie Pipe and Matthew Wood back to the UK; Brian Clemow, Ryan Bonnor, Simon Couch, Luke Edgell, Mick Gray, John Griffiths, Luke Hammond, Joel Mason, Nick Mercer and Dean Steingold all had a year off or moved on to other endeavours. We thank them all for their dedicated service and friendship. We were fortunate to welcome: Stuart Clark, Gary Geise, Joe Price, Joe Sayers (UK), Jackson Bird (for his first full senior season), Mark McInnes (as returning player and associate club coach), Danny Redrup, Jamie Turmanis, Paul Carter (UK), Andrew Hurley, Ben Fisher, Ron Lim, Tom Cledwyn(UK) John Semaan and Adam Nayel who all made valuable contributions on and off the field.

Administrative changes saw a new, optimistic era ushered in with the election of our stalwart, dynamic Andrew Fraser as president. The club is on a crest and Andrew is the right man to lead us through the next decade. Our icon Tim Farriss assumed his new role of patron along with the new Mayor of Manly Peter Macdonald. We welcomed Tim Bailey as our vigorous and creative deputy president, and Phil Munting and Wayne Lightfoot to the committee. Tim provided a new club song to accompany our new waratah emblem to signal the new era. The committee, with assistance from a strong band of other volunteers, wisely guided and thoroughly backed the efforts of our captains, players, coaching staff, managers and scorers. Ours was a cohesive season's campaign. And to prove our optimism and innovation we responded to Andrew's urging and delivered the SCA's first, fabulous limited overs Day /Night game at Manly Oval! I refer you to Andrew's President's Report for greater detail but I must emphasise the community service that our special game of cricket delivered to the people of the peninsula area. Besides the great match, we donated around \$10,000 gate takings to the Mayor's Tsunami Appeal and cricket and MWDCC assumed, deservedly, the top spot in the respect and regard of our community.

We thank all of our captains who served the club so well and gave excellent direction and encouragement to their players on and off the field. Newly appointed first grade captain Shawn Bradstreet demonstrated the breadth of his experience and the quality of his skills in taking the firsts to the quarter finals and laying a very firm foundation for next season. His leadership in the heartstopper quarter final brought every ounce of energy from our lads into play. Shawn had an excellent Blues season and was voted Players' Player of the Season by colleagues. In his report Shawn outlines very clearly the qualities and contributions of the core players of the 20 who were part of the season. Vice Captain Jamie Sullivan's sterling contribution during Shawn's Blues absence must be acknowledged. Stuart Clark's 23 wickets from 68 overs at 7.69 and his partner-in-speed Mark Cameron's 55 wickets off 291 at 15.43 etched them as possibly the most lethal attack ever for the club, while Mark Atkinson, 649 runs, average 40, and Tim Cruickshank, 631, 39.43 both excelled with the willow. But you don't get a more valuable performance than Shawn's 8/40 when it really counted in the quarter final against the eventual premiers SU.

Congratulations to first graders Stuart Clark (member of the victorious Blues PURA Cup winning team), Shawn Bradstreet, Mark Cameron, Tim Cruickshank, Mitchell Cleary and Gary Geise on their representative selections. Congratulations also to Jackson Bird and Mitchell Cleary on their victorious Blues U19 campaign and to Jackson on selection in the Australian merit team; also to promising juniors Jack Ritchie, Murray Ferguson, Jarrod Walters.

Our director of coaching, benefactor, special human being and guru Mike Pawley, completed his fourth year of devoted service. Thankfully he felt that he had recovered sufficiently from his cancer condition to take the future in his usual robust manner, but in slightly smaller doses. With the appointment of Craig Glassock as club coach, assisted by Mark McInnes, Mike didn't in fact slow down so much but Craig and Mark enabled Mike to spend more time on what he values so much, junior development; everything Mike does is an investment for the future of his beloved club. His leadership of the special junior development committee resulted in further valuable gains while committee member Grahame Thomas continued to direct the winter SCG junior nets. We all know that we should never take for granted the huge generosity and brilliance of Mike's contribution to the club. We were very fortunate and pleased that Craig returned to the club fold after making progress from his prolonged debilitating CFS illness. He made an immediate impact with his personal style and dedicated approach and he was backed up strongly by Mark's coaching contribution. There is no doubt that the total coaching approach from Mike, Craig and Mark was a grade hallmark and major factor in our fruitful season; we thank them for going that extra mile. They rejoiced with the 28 players who produced the 20 centuries and 17 "five fors" that underlined our aggressive, adventurous and entertaining style of play.

Matthew Cranney's seconds, 22 players across the season, demonstrated great potential at times and overall had some big highlights with a number of the developing players stepping up successfully to firsts. Some inconsistency crept in but the competition only got away from them right at the end. Thanks to Rowan Hamman as stand in captain and to our staunch Warren Evans who achieved 514 club wickets, 207 in firsts, to become the fifth highest wicket taker in the club's history. Only a few more years and the ever-green may topple Jim Randell's 857.

Our magnificient captain of the year John Warn has documented thoroughly our third's triumphant march to the premiership after the yips to round five. Thanks to Scott Fitzsimmons as stand in captain and for the 621 glorious runs at 47.7 average. The strength was their ability to tear attacks apart, without caffeine. Players like Andrew Lindsay, who came back from injury to lead the club's batting average and be second in the bowling, wore their big hearts on their sleeves into the fray. Congratulations to the 25 contributing players over the season and to the premiership side on one of the most absorbing finals possible. Their glorious march to victory shows us the way to the future.

Fourth's captain Simon Waddington led his men firmly to the quarter final for the second year. They played strongly but, again, went down to the ultimate premiers. Scott Patterson showed his potential with a commanding 95 in the match while Simon led from the front with his season 561, average 43.15, and Paul Brenner had a double in notching his club 5000 runs and his season 572 being the highest of all SCA clubs in the fourth's competition. Congratulations to the 24 season players who contributed to the team's success.

Danny Reynolds worked hard in leading our young fifths through a tough season, coming up against a number of older base teams, but he continued to give everyone their fair share of opportunities and they all enjoyed their cricket. As a result they continued to be competitive while the development went on among the 35 players moving through the team over the season. Aiden Baker, Andrew Hurley and Lucas Fraser showed promise with the bat while Murray Ferguson, Danny Reynolds and Ronnie Lim were the most successful bowlers.

Our PGs had a stellar season, led by Mark Faraday for the second year, and just missed the ultimate honour. The team was characteristically one that never said die. Their semi final victory against Sutherland was a highlight of the club's season and the final against St George was an absorbing match that saw an explosive opening stand by Mitch Cleary and Cam Merchant that could have been the clincher but the Saints proved their quality by grinding us down. Congratulations on a great campaign.

Again our Green Shield team found the going pretty tough against more experienced players but they were always strongly competitive. Scott Paterson provided determined leadership and the lads enjoyed a vigorous season. They responded well to coach Nathan Dodd and Director of Coaching Mike Pawley. Tony Sullivan provided his usual professional management, with assistance from Chris Paterson and Don Sellin who carried out the scoring duties for a record number of years. Congratulations to Jack Ritchie on selection in the GS Number One Rep team, continuing a unique family tradition as both Jack's father and grand father represented in their days. Thanks to all the parents who supported so strongly; great barbecues from the Fergusons.

Club Captain Cameron Lawes completed his second year of excellent leadership and has now moved to Newcastle with wife Keren. Congratulations to them on the birth of daughter Jaz and best wishes for life in their new home and community. We thank Cam as he has given special service as player, Green Shield coach and committee member, always first to put up his hand to get things done. And thanks to Keren for the design of our new waratah emblem,

The Clubman of The Year award went for the first time to a very deserving family partnership. Congratulations to committee member Steve and Lee Cleary whose completely dedicated service made them the most popular of choices. They were always willing volunteers to carry out a range of tasks across the club' enterprise. We thank Steve particularly for taking over the provision of statistics for this report after David Patterson had to pass on the job he had done so well for many years; sincere thanks also, David. The club appreciates the sacrifices made by a whole range of volunteers like Steve and Lee who work so hard to support our players.

Sadly we report the death of our former great player and captain Keith Miller. Mike Pawley represented our club at his funeral in Melbourne. Thanks to our Life Member Peter Philpott for his good friend and cricket colleague's obituary. We also report the death of our former scorer John Skiller and record the soliloquy given by me on behalf of our club.

We sincerely thank Manly Council and our patrons Mayor Peter Macdonald and David Barr MP for their continued support for the provision of excellent facilities at Manly Oval and Graham Reserve. We appreciate the quality work of our curators Paul Chalmers, and Green Options, at Manly Oval and Jim Cameron and his team at Graham Reserve and thank them all for their dedicated efforts that are underlie our success.

MWDCC - 2004/05 PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It is with great pleasure and pride that I write my first President's Report in this, our 127th year.

Wow! What an amazing season. I write this report one very, very proud President!

There is so much to say and so many people to thank.

PRESIDENCY:

So what's it like to be the President of Manly I have been asked many times in recent months? Well I'd like to take this opportunity to share some of the past 12 months with you.

Since joining the committee in 1989, I always aspired to one day be President of this great Club. When Tim Farriss stood down and the time arrived last year, (albeit about 5 years earlier then I had envisaged), I thought I was ready.

But despite having played for the Club for 23 years and serving on the committee for 15, nothing could have prepared me for the enormity of the first year of this role. It was taking up 30 to 40 hours per week, EVERY week.

Not much you say? Well try fitting that in between a hectic career week of 50 hours, plus an additional six summer weekends away from home with work, trying to manage family life with a wife that hardly ever saw me from Monday to Friday and three demanding young kids!

To be brutally honest, it totally consumed me for the first six months. The average Presidential reign is over 10 years. Yet after only 10 weeks, I was having hardly any sleep and was already having second thoughts about the role!

Playing-wise, we had just experienced our worst season since 1999, so it was clear how much immediate effort was required. We basically had to start afresh and put in place some new structures that would enable us to maximize the chances of the Club being successful on the field.

So at our first meeting, the committee unanimously endorsed a new vision paper which outlined both short-term and longer-term objectives. We then set about implementing the list of key short-term objectives.

Holistically though, we were all viewing the season as part of a re-building phase for the Club.

However, in regards to on-field targets, we did set three major goals for the season - they being:

■ A top 5 position in the Club Championship (finished 12th previous season)

Get three teams into the finals (only 4th grade did it the previous season)

■ Last but not least we wanted to win a grade premiership (our last one was way back in 1990)

We also had families who had never been able to afford day/night tickets to the SCG, thank us for allowing them to witness day/night cricket for the first time. It was truly one of the greatest days in our Club's history.

It was also one of the most difficult, stressful projects I have ever worked on and it would never have been possible without the enormous contributions by everyone involved, but there are a select group of people whom deserve special mention and I would like to acknowledge:

Allight: Our match day sponsor. To **Russell Wilson**, thanks mate. You shared our vision and without your support, this would never have happened. You are a big part of history now!

Brian Adams: Brain was our licensee for the match. He spent countless hours setting up the license and co-ordinating incredibly difficult role of beverage sales on the night. His wife and daughter worked behind the bar for the entire duration of the match for free. We are greatly indebted to the Adams family!

KEITH ROSS MILLER, VALE

The 1947-48 season at Manly began with exciting news. Keith Miller, with a war over, had married, left his native Victoria, and decided to settle in Dee Why (later Newport). Miller had previously played 18 matches with Victoria between 1938 and 1947, but the war had interrupted his Sheffield Shield career, and he was better known for his brilliant performances with the Australian Services team which played the Victory Tests throughout a delighted cricket starved England immediately following World War Two.

Miller was the dynamic hero of those Tests, which Australian cricket lovers followed carefully from afar, and they flocked to see him play when that same Services team cane home and played around the Australian States. He retained that same crowd-pulling charisma wherever he played until his eventual retirement in 1956.

It is significant that only two Australians have their portraits mounted in the Long Bar at Lords, Bradman and Miller. It is fascinating that the Lords Taverners Club in 1946 gave Miller an open invitation to return to the Lords Test Match at their expense whenever he wished as long as he wished, and that he accepted that invitation every year until 2003. Such was the esteem in which Keith Miller was held, and still is held, by English cricket.

In Australia, those who played with or against him would nominate him amongst the very greatest players ever produced in this country. Personally, I would rate him as the greatest all-round cricketer, with Gary Sobers, that I have ever seen. Yet sceptics might dispute such claims by producing statistics:-

- 1. With Manly (1947/48 1955/56)
- 2. With NSW (1947/48 1955/56)
- 3. In all first class cricket
- 4. In all Test matches

35 matches 1290 runs at 46.07 and 69 wickets at 16.00 50 matches 3583 runs at 57.06 and 119 wickets at 25.36 226 matches 14183 runs at 48.9 and 497 wickets at 22.3 55 matches 2958 runs at 36.97 and 170 wickets at 22.97

Such a challenge, however, would entirely misunderstand the magic of Miller. Having played cricket and Australian Rules for Victoria by the age of 19, he volunteered for active service in 1939. Most of the war, he piloted Mosquito fighter-bombers surviving three crash-landings, and watching many a comrade die in a war where life expectance for a pilot was measured in months. Keith survived those six years, and, like most pilots, he lived life to its fullest whilst he could.

Little wonder, that after such experiences, cricket could only be treated as a game, a game to be enjoyed. Keith enjoyed it to the full – few more. Once questioned by a journalist about how he coped with the stress of Test cricket, he laughingly replied, "You must be joking! Stress in cricket? Stress is a Messerschmitt up your arse." A very Milleresque comment!

I was fortunate to play my first first grade match with Manly as a little 15 year old boy under the captaincy of Miller, and watched him and marvelled till his retirement. Similarly, my first season with NSW as a 19 year old was with Miller as captain. I came to know, admire and love the man, not just as an exciting innovative captain, not just as a classical attacking batsman, a terrifying fast bowler when he wanted to be, and a brilliant slip fieldsman at any time - but as a fine human being.

Stories of Miller's cricketing life are legendary. Bowling to Jimmy Burke (who at that time had deserted to Northern Districts) one day at Manly Oval, Keith became frustrated with Jim's dogged patience. Jim poked, nudged, jabbed and missed till Miller threw the ball down and laughed, "Christ, Burkey, you couldn't hit my old Aunt Fanny off her piss-pot!". All of us, including Jim, collapsed to the ground laughing.

Or, at Maitland, on tour with NSW, his reaction when Jim De Courcy quietly reported that we had 12 men on the field, "Oh, have we? Then someone had better piss off!". And Alan Davidson won the race and was declared 12th man.

Or, his normal careful instructions regarding field placements - "Scatter!".

Or his reaction to Australia's' annihilation of Essex on the 1948 tour of England. Australia eventually made 700 odd in the day's play, but, when Miller had been sent tin to bat at something like 2 for 450, he had calmly knocked off his own bails rather than be part of what he saw as a needless massacre.

Or, perhaps the best known story of all, that surrounding his late arrival at the Sydney Cricket Ground in November 1955, when he took 7-12 in dismissing South Australia for 27.

It is not unusual in cricket that stories are told, retold and exaggerated and that legends become myths. But I can vouch for the authenticity of most of the above because I was there and that's how they were. And to them, another hundred could be added.

Keith Miller then was a flamboyant character, a magnificent looking man, a wonderfully talented natural sportsman, a great all-round cricketer, and a memorable human being. John Arlott once said of him, "if I had my choice of a player to win a match off the last ball, whether it required a catch, a six, or a wicket, I would pick only one player, Keith Ross Miller." And the late Jack Pollard's words on Miller are worth reading – " his fame will endure as long as cricket, for, when he took the field, boundary fences or ropes disappeared and spectators virtually became part of the match, reacting to every switch of his mane of black hair. He was aggressive yet casual, combining the aesthetic with red-blooded pleasure, proud of all the runs, wickets and catches he took, but disinterested in his averages or aggregates."

Manly, NSW, Australia – we were lucky to have such a player. He was a better batsman than lan Botham; at times, a more lethal fast bowler than Dennis Lillee; as good a slip fielder as Mark Waugh, Greg Chappell, or even, Bob Simpson; and Richie Benaud rates him as the most inspirational captain he ever played under. Those who saw him play as a team mate, an opponent or a spectator will never forget him.

JOHN SKILLER, VALE

John was one of life's envied fortunates: he loved cricket passionately and being a bachelor he was able to devote the time needed to fulfil that love.

His passion for the great game flowered when his nephew John Rodgers played cricket with St George and NSW representative teams. John became involved with that great club, became a Vice President and supported the club until the end.

It is gratifying to note that Jon Jobson, St George CEO and CRICKET NSW board member is here today representing those two organisations. Geoff Lawson is representing NSW Uni and some of his long standing scorer associates are here today. And of course his final club, Manly, are well represented also. That is a register of the great respect that the cricketing world holds for this grand old man of cricket.

John followed his nephew John across to the University of NSW in the mid seventies and later made his reputation as a doyen of grade scorers with our club Manly in the eighties and early nineties. This final move was most appropriate as John lived at Harbord, surrounded by his beautiful birds, garden, piano and huge collection of musical records. Our current scorer Geoff Rogers was recruited by John and succeeded John in 1994. Geoff is now one of the current eminent scorers and he acknowledges a debt to John in his scorer's education and the deep friendship they developed. Geoff and Mary's unheralded support of John through days of poor health is acknowledged.

Too many uninitiateds have too simple a view of the refined art of scoring. John made it a fine art skill, you might say Skiller by name and highly skilled by nature, and was a model first grade scorer for our Manly Club. But John went further than keeping the accurate score book, to include reams of statistical detail on all first grade players. Cricket NSW officials made constant inquiries to John knowing that the feedback would be instant and accurate. He had one of the sharpest statistical minds of anyone in cricket and there were rare disputes with his books.

John spent countless hours caressing his equivalent of a beautiful T Model Ford typewriter producing the lists of stats that he shared with grateful players and administrators. His donated scrapbooks are now priceless resources in Cricket NSW's library archives and are in constant use by researchers.

John was an acute judge of players and he had an opinion on the playing standards and the sportsmanship of first graders across all clubs. With the razor sharp mind he possessed he would not suffer fools gladly, but he did so with decorum. He was well credentialed to make those judgements because he was a splendid human being: a thorough gentleman, a kind, unassuming and decent man of the top shelf.

It was wonderful that John's friend Tony was able to bring John from the War Veterans Village to Manly Oval to enjoy matches almost to John's end of play. We will miss John and his dedicated service, strength of intellect and warmth of friendship. Our five teams wore black arm bands and first grade observed silence in memory of John at last Saturday's matches. Manly Club express sympathy to John's family and we are honoured to be included in the celebration of his life today.



LUKE CAMERON belting them all over the park and sometimes not belting them so far. You will be truly blessed, Luke, if you have another summer like this. Grand final win with lifetime mates, match winning PG partnership with Scott Patterson against the odds, biggest 6 ever on Bankstown oval in the PG grand final against Saints at Hurstville when you holed out for the last time off the pull shot, so many memories to make you smile. So much pleasure to have watched your development. I will be at the ground when your time comes to step up to first grade, with your mum and dad of course.

MARK CAMERON a panther, a lynx, an antelope. Poetry in motion, heart as big as a lion and a very passionate Manly contributor. The strike bowler of the attack. Nearly a first class cricketer at a time when NSW has its best fast bowling attack in memory. Here's hoping for the best next season. By the way, the next time you get a chance to bat 3 you will be ready?

CAMERON MERCHANT. 4th of the Camerons, all blue blood Manly boys. No one worked harder on his game than you did. First grade debut, bat through the innings as opener against the UNSW grand final attack. That shows courage and determination are your calling cards. Get rid of that nasty little sweep shot that brought about your downfall when some big scores were on the cards. Alternatively make your weakness your strength and master the sweep, the reverse sweep and the cut. It's been a pleasure Cameron.

There were 3 amazing events in PG that point to successful years ahead.

MITCH CLEARY. The Adam Gilchrist of the north shore opened the batting in 2 remarkable innings against Balmain, a rapid fire 91, and 61 off only 45 balls in the final against St George [9 runs off balls] and Sts in the final. Both Bradmanesque innings that are sure to bring the crowds flocking back to Manly oval. Mitch's batting skills were languishing at the bottom of the batting order before the chance came to open in PG. The message to everyone in this club is go out there and back yourself and dare to be great. We might even get to a semi final in 1 dayers if we change our attitude to one of self-belief and run the risk of losing, daring and fearless, opening the door to more glorious victories and premierships. Mitch's cover drives went to the boundary as fast as Lee and Steve finished off a cigarette.

Rent a crowd was into their 6th VB under the southern light pole, lamenting another Manly loss, but Jack and James are part of the new way of thinking, they don't think we are going to finish 2nd, they are the new generation and they are winners, and they do and the spectators are flushed with delirium at victory against the odds. The war cry nearly brought the grandstand down. What about SCOTT PATTERSON scoring 95 in the 4th grade semi against the ultimate premiers, Gordon? Loss of form is temporary when you have class, so whilst I was disappointed for Scott when he did not show his true colours in Green Shield, everyone in the club was ecstatic with this gem of an innings to finish the season off.

BEN KING worked as hard as anyone to develop his technique and was rewarded with a stylish last round ton against Parramatta. Ben is one of several middle order batsmen at Manly who is severely challenged by lack of opportunity. Unless the batting order is flexible, how can we give our future stars the encouragement they need to blossom?

To every one of you, from number 11 to no. 5, if your captain ever says we need someone to open, shout me, me, me, me, and give yourself the chance that MITCH CLEARY took so brilliantly this year. Talk about taking a chance, Sully and Cleary blazing away in one dayers, that's taking the sort of chance we might have to if we are to get as far as the semis of the 50 over comp. As long as we play like a team that is frightened of losing we will do just that. In my four seasons on the coaching staff we have not made a 50 over semi in firsts and our highly thought of 2nds have been found wanting in one dayers. DARE TO WIN. IF NOT NOW WHEN?

JAMIE SULLIVAN. Greatest moment could have been overcoming adversity with a glorious first grade century after suffering the humiliation of being dropped when firsts acting captain. But for me his magic moment was the running, diving, sliding catch at fine leg in front of thousands of Manly supporters during the day night match against North Sydney. For all of us we could well adopt the mantra, the best is yet to come, and you are at an age, Sully where that could well be true. You have given a lot of pleasure to the players and the coaching staff, Jamie. Thank you for just being yourself.

SHAWN BRADSTREET'S magic moment was certainly the magnificent bowling effort, eight wickets against Syd Uni in the qualifying final. The ten odd manly supporters at the ground, including Greg Matthews fans, ANDREW FRASER and TIM BAILLEY, rose to their feet as the impossible became probable and Shawn led another triumphant appeal for LBW, but with S.U. eight down and three runs to get, an over zealous appeal against Matthews led to an overthrow that marked the end of our brave charge. JOE PRICE: dear Joe, there is a long journey ahead of you if you are prepared to fight the battle that will make you a first grade batsman and there will be many obstacles in your path. You will need great courage and an iron will, a cheerful smile and a sense of humour if you are to prevail. You will need to ask for help along your path and be alert to the positive markers that will direct you through the gateway to success. Good luck.

GARY GEISE had the formidable task of travelling from Newcastle to train and play. That in itself is a challenge, let alone playing your first season of first grade. Let's see what comes of your experiences next summer Gary.

SHANE CLEARY worked his way into firsts. The best is yet to come Shane, even though you had a good season. I would like to see you capable of bowling 25 overs at top speed in one spell. Now there's a challenge.

ALEX MAIDMENT scored his annual ton after the selection panel [that you John] manoeuvred him into the fabulous 3rd grade win against Bankstown. If you had the time, Alex, you could be a top order batsman with any club. You have the best square cut, always played like the true gentleman you are.

MY FINAL REFLECTIONS relate to the joyful and emotional moments, two hours of them, shared in the 3rd grade premiership dressing room after the grand final victory. John Warn had led his team brilliantly throughout the campaign, and he led them even better in those final two hours when each player and supporter had a chance to share the deep seated feelings that went with the victory and get a mature perspective on the event. Mutual respect whilst honouring each other for what this meant in his life. It was a great time when we all had a chance to see each other being real. There was humility in a job well done. One of my hopes is that every team that plays for Manly Warringah masters the sensitive art of group sharing at the end of each match. It is a great way to get closer to your teammates and to empower every one as an equal. It also helps avoid dissention and any form of unpleasantness.

To the victors the spoils and their legacy a newfound 'YES, I CAN" that will permeate all grades for years to come.

RUSSELL PARKER. Never thought I could see so much Exhilaration radiate from your persona. Happy days in NZ. Always to be remembered by your teammates. Fantastic last innings, match winning catch at fine leg.

CRAIG LITTLE. You beauty Craig. You deserved to be part of that lifetime memory. A local junior. Why not do it in first grade one day? There are only a few cm's to go for you to make the transition to top grade. Keep up the YES; I CAN DO THAT mind chatter.

DANNY REDRUP. Was that worthwhile? Did you think your topsy turfy season would finish like that? You were a great member of the team Danny, brought a beautiful energy to Manly.

CLUB COACH REPORT



It was an honor and a thrill when I was asked to be club coach this year. Having been involved in the club formally for more than half my life it meant a lot to me to be given this opportunity. From the outset I have to say that I enjoyed the opportunity of being involved in your lives, a responsibility which I didn't take lightly.

The club can be happy with the progress we made this year. Off the field, Andrew Fraser, Bob Brenner and the committee have done a terrific job to have the club positioned in a healthy state. On the field, the tireless efforts of Mick Pawley over the last few years in conjunction with the Captains and players had laid a good platform for the improvement we saw this year. Each grade went forward or held ground. Four teams made the semi's and of course, a PG's final and a 3rd Grade Premiership were a good reward for the club.

From a personal perspective I found the role of club coach demanding but rewarding. I wrestled with how to help each player and give you all my personal attention. Obviously, with 55 players to tend to it is not possible to help everyone to the degree that one would like. I hope that none of you felt neglected but if so please forgive me.

Another struggle was working out how to structure practice in a way that allowed everyone to prepare sufficiently. It's no secret that the introduction of the ball machines over the last few years have seen the club score more centuries and more runs in general than ever before. Having access to them is a key ingredient in the club's success and I see it as crucial that we have them running on one of our training nights. On the down side of course are that the bowling facilities at Grahams are poor and don't allow anyone to get a decent bowl. We will look to counter this by improving the run up's if feasible. If not we will have to continue to seek the right balance so the bowlers can be adequately catered for.

I feel it is appropriate to share a disappointment as well. Players at this club have access to more equipment than any players in Manly's history and I dare say any other club in the competition. I found it disappointing that many players didn't look to use the full range of equipment available. But most disheartening was the player's attitude to balls. The cost of balls is astronomical (\$30-50 per ball). The amount that were lost, stolen or taken for personal use and never given back was extremely upsetting and costly. I appeal to all players to take better care of the gear and to take responsibility for the balls. In the end it only drives your fees up further.

The Captains will adequately cover the performance of each team so as is tradition I would like to give my perspective on each player who played the majority of the season.

SHAWN BRADSTREET- To say that someone didn't have a great year with the bat and still averaged 36 says something about the sort of player they must be. Shawn went through his last 11 innings without a half-century. I can hardly remember more than 3 or 4 innings in the past where this has occurred and I suggest it is unlikely to happen again. Captaincy may have affected his personal focus, which is so renowned, but I can't see it being a problem in the years ahead.

Shawn's performance with the ball in the semi (11-62) was inspirational. It's the reason he'd be first picked in any team I selected. No one loves the battle more than Shawn and it's what has made him one of the all time greats of this club. I think he's really maturing as a leader and he's only going to get better in the years ahead. His passion for this club is also inspirational in an age when so many others go to the highest bidder.

JAMIE SULLIVAN- Sulli too had a stretch with the bat that he's never had before and probably won't again. As he now recognises, getting dropped was a necessary thing for him to evaluate where he was at with his batting. It was such a great moment for everyone to see him 3 weeks later post his maiden 1st grade century. His bowling is underrated and he has a knack of making a crucial breakthrough, particularly in one dayer's. Too improve Sull, I think you need to work hard at not getting squared up on the back foot, keep working out where your stumps are (crucial for any opener) and work hard at sharpening up your footwork. I'm really glad you've decided to make this club your home.

JOE PRICE- There is no question of his ball striking ability. However Pricey would be disappointed with his stats this year. Nine scores between 13 and 31 show that concentration and a desire to tough it out for big scores are areas that need improving. I also think that you could make better use of your net time by having a plan of something your working on and focusing more on keeping the ball on the ground. With some adjustments in the afore mentioned areas, and a few small technique changes, I think that you could make a significant contribution to 1st grade. Pricey's bowling is underrated and a wealth of medium pacers meant he didn't get many opportunities. Part of his temperament is to look to bowl wicket-taking balls and if he can work out the time to build pressure with this attribute, it will really help him.

MARK ATKINSON- I doubt there is anyone in Grade Cricket who knows their game better than Atko. The second half of the year wasn't as successful for a number of reasons but I really hope his teammates were watching how he goes about his batting during the first half of the year. He plays straight and waits for them to bowl to his cut shot, a straight half volley, or work off his pads and hip and the runs start piling up. His keeping too was its usual high standard and a technically perfect, low, left-handed catch in the semi excited this former keeper. Atko, if you are around next year I hope you keep working at teaching your teammates about the game as some guys learn by watching and others by talking. You have so much knowledge and skill that can benefit so many.

TIM CRUIKSHANK- 631 @ 39.43 is a good solid season given the variety of wickets and situations that one faces in 1st grade. There were times when I watched you hit balls in the nets and I wanted to get everyone to stop training and say, "watch this- that's how you do it". But I think that is also partly a weak point. Keep working at toughing it out in the nets or match when conditions aren't to your liking. There are other ways than just having everything hit the middle to feel prepared for a match.

You have the physical ability to play for NSW Tim. Next season you must aim to be a maker of big scores and crack it for a second eleven game. To get that opportunity you should be putting your hand up to bat at 3 or yep, even open.

Tim's catching has just got better and better. However I'd love to see you challenging yourself with your catching at training and do a lot of reflex work.

Finally, after playing 1's for 5 years it's time for you to become a leader at training. Grab a bunch of young guys and teach them about catching or batting. That's my challenge to you.

MARK CAMERON- such a deserving winner of the player of the year award. I am so glad that you play for Manly. Your athleticism and commitment to your team are first rate, and you are increasingly taking the lead with the ball. I really hope you persevere for a bit longer as the NSW attack has 3 guys in their 30's so opportunities will come. Your batting was also inspirational. Keep working hard at it.

Thanks also for being so willing to help the other quicks in the club.

STUART CLARK- Having grown up playing rep cricket with "Saf" I was so thrilled when he decided to play for Manly. He's long been about the best grade bowler going around. I only wish I could have played with you whilst you did. It is a shame to lose you next season but thank you for your contribution to 1st grade this season. For those tall quicks out there, next to Glenn McGrath there is no better example of consistently making the batsmen play good length balls.

JOE SAYERS- Our English import made a lot of starts this season but couldn't go on with it. He worked hard at ironing out a technical fault of having his head on an angle and falling over. Remember Joe; you wouldn't read a book with your head tilted so keep working hard at it.

Being only 21 yourself obviously you came here to get experience and improve your game, however I'd love you to think about making a greater contribution to helping develop other young player whilst at training and leave a lasting legacy. I wish you well with your 1st class career.

GARY GEISE- Making the adjustment to the demands of 1st grade is a difficult thing as many talented country folk have found. I think Geisey will be better off for this season. Though he'd be disappointed with his stats it will hold him in good stead to know what he needs to do. By all accounts he has a good cricket brain and is a good competitor with the ball.

Geisey, a good effort in the off-season to work on shedding a few kilos and improving your fitness will make a big difference to your performance and your enjoyment. I hope you continue to make the trek down to Manly and make your mark in Sydney grade cricket.

SHANE CLEARY- Shane worked on his fitness and core stability this year and it significantly helped his bowling. I was really pleased to see him get into 1's and hold his spot. I sense that he's really starting to believe he can be a success at that level as the 2nd innings 3-20 in the semi testifies. His batting has loads of potential and he is another who struggles for lack of opportunity due to our long tail. Don't let it go Shano.

I would love to see you get stronger still and have a big off-season. With Shawn and Sulli to bowl tight we need you to concentrate on bowling fast out swingers in the first spell and big reverse swing late in the day (at pace). Sure you want to build pressure but get strong and stable and bowl fast Shane. I think you could do more bowling off your long run in the nets. Stuff the batsmen. Let them deal with your pace and a new ball. When you are late 20's you might not need to bowl as much but hone your craft now.

MITCH CLEARY- Mitch would acknowledge that he found himself in 1's by default, but the experience will prove invaluable. Mitch is developing a good cricket brain and could develop into a good skipper in the years ahead. I'm really pleased he got the chance to open in PG's because I think there's a real future in this spot for him, particularly in one dayers. I love the way you approach your batting Mitch.

There's a couple of technical adjustments to make which will make you even more potent and give you a more solid base to launch from.

On the bowling side, not being the tallest bloke around is a disadvantage for a finger spinner. But Greg Matthews is no basketball player and has an amazing record. Matthews in his heyday got loads of overspin that allowed the ball to drop and combined this with beautiful drift. Being similar in height to him that's exactly what you'll need to devote yourself to if you're to make a success of your bowling. I believe you can do it if you're prepared to be a slave to your craft.

CAMERON MERCHANT- I'm really excited and hopeful that we've unearthed someone who can open in 1's for at least 10 years. It's all in front of you Cam. Batting through an innings in your 2nd or 3rd game is a great achievement and shows you are made of the right stuff. Your love of the game can have a really positive affect on your teammates in years ahead. But please head this advice:

1. You need to make sure you face where the ball is coming from. If you don't you can expect to have a career of getting caught behind the wicket and struggling to play the cut shot well.

2. You are Slater like in the speed of your footwork and like him have so many shots. Let go of the need to demonstrate them all when you're on a roll. I'm not saying be defensive but become someone who wants to make 150 in 6 hrs rather than 50 in even time. If you do that I believe you've got the physical ability to play rep cricket in the next few years.

CAMERON LAWES- What a loss for the club to have Lawsey move away from the area. His efforts as Club Captain have been terrific. From a playing perspective he spent about 1/3 of the year in 1's and 2/3 in 2's. Due to the number of bowlers in 1's at the time he struggled to get more than 1 spell. However in 2's he really started to bowl consistently toward the end of the year. As I've mentioned before Cam, it's a shame from a cricketing perspective that your grade career may be finishing because it's like you've really unlocked the key to your bowling in the last game or two of the year and your best performances were ahead.

Cam played some good hard-hitting innings in 2's. You should be satisfied with how your cricket developed over the years Cam and we will really miss your contribution in many areas at the club.

ALEX MAIDMENT- Wasn't it great to see Big AI get a few opportunities batting a bit higher up the order in 1's. His 44 against St George was crucial to the result. One of AI's strengths is that he doesn't appear to get flustered at the crease regardless of the situation. Alex you've been such a great on-field contributor to the club and I hope you can slip in a few more seasons despite work and relationship commitments. I'm told your 171* against Campbelltown in 2's was something else.

Al, I still think you can improve your batting technically, despite being 31. Your bottom hand remands fully on the bat during all your shots, which means that it's hard for you to play with the necessary straight bat against accurate short pitch bowling. If you could find the time to spend a few sessions solely devoted to this then doing well in 1's is not beyond you if that's what you want.

MICHAEL COSENTINO- Seeing Cosa overcome the significant disappointment of being dropped to 3's early in the year and finish with a good 30* in the 1st grade semi was one of my highlights for the season. Cosa worked hard at a technical change and scored half centuries consistently in 2's, 3's and PG's.

Cos, in my opinion you have the physical talent to have a good 1st grade career. To do it I think you will have to do the following:

1. Have a good work ethic and hit a lot of balls over the next few years. I know you felt that not training a lot this year worked for you, but to consistently do well in 1's will take some work.

2. Work at speeding up your footwork and making sure you go right back and across to deal with good short pitch bowling.

3. Shorten your backlift a little to deal with genuine pace.

In my opinion making these changes will give you every chance to do well. Aside from that I love the way you looked to relax and enjoy yourself and I think that works well for you.

WARREN EVANS- Another 30 wicket season. That's a bit below normal but a significant part of his year was spent in 1's and was another victim of a team full of medium pacers. In 2nd Grade he took 19 wickets at 15. Not bad at 35. When his wrist stays behind the ball Wazza has a beautiful out swinger that makes the slips cordon salivate.

Wazza also scored a sensational 57 in 2's to rescue his team. This gave further credence to his claim that he should have been batting in the top 5 for NSW for the past 10 years. Still happy to help you with your batting whenever you want Waz.

I hope you stay fit and keep playing as you are one of mine and many others favorite people to play with and have so much to contribute to the club. You're a club legend so whatever it takes to keep you playing well let us know.

BEN KING- 361 runs at 61 in 2's including a maiden grade hundred overshadowed his disappointing few innings in 1's. It is a great reward for a lot of effort over the last few seasons. Ben has gone through a lot of stages with his batting and at 21 is now ahead of most in working out his game. I was so excited for you when you made that hundred in the last round. Keep working on playing straight, cutting well and working off your pads and you could make many runs for this club as a top 3 batsmen. Ben also has a keen interest in the tactics of the game and as he matures will make a good leader in a few years time.

Ben was also a terrific support at training. Always willing to run a fielding drill and help pack away gear. 55 Bens would be a great help to any coach.

MARK McINNES- I'm so pleased Macca came back to play. He made a significant contribution to second grade and, after a few years off and thinking about the game is on a winning formula with his cricket. Relaxing and focusing on enjoyment are important things for you Mac so keep doing it.

I would like to see you not give up any thought of playing 1's again. As I've said before Macca has bowled the best spell of leg spin bowling I've ever kept to. If you can get a little fitter, bowl a bit more in the nets and can keep that focus on enjoying every game you play then I don't think 1st grade and fun are mutually incompatible for you.

Macca also has a good cricket brain and was able to contribute to the development of many guys in the role of assistant coach with his quiet 1 on 1 approach.

MARK FARADAY- although Mark would understandably feel he had his worst year, I think that it was a good thing for him to go through. Mark got on one of those trots where everything deserted him, something I think he probably hasn't been through before. However there were some positive signs towards the end of the season that things were coming back and that he was learning to control his approach to batting. Four of his last five innings read 53, 76, 26*,25*. Mark's rare ball striking ability has never been questioned. But to begin to achieve your potential mark I feel you must do the following.

1. Give away the desire to demonstrate and talk about destroying the bowling. I think it gets in the way of your obvious talent and inhibits you being consistent. Playing extravagant shots looks great and gets the crowd "woohoo-ing" but too often leads to your demise.

2. Replace it with a desire to bat for long periods of time and make tough hundreds instead of flashy 50's.

3. Keep the ball on the ground. I remember when former NSW batsmen Kevin Roberts moved to Bankstown to make the Shield side he (himself a very attacking batsmen) resolved to not hit a ball in the air. He scored hundred after hundred and was in the team in 12 months.

4. Make that slight adjustment to your grip that we talked about.

I think going to England will be a great thing for you and I look forward to seeing you have a great year at Manly next year.

MATT CRANNEY – somewhat reluctantly stepped into the breach to Captain 2nd grade. Loose was unable to train one night due to Tafe commitments and combined with injury and perhaps the captaincy, had a season he would rather forget. Because of the stop start nature he just couldn't get any momentum. Don't worry Loose; most of us have years like that somewhere along the line.

I would like to see you be more intentional about what you are trying to achieve at practice whether it's keeping or batting. You know areas that you can improve so having a plan when you come to training of how to use your time could really help you.

You and your parents have been a valuable part of the club for many years and I hope you keep playing and bounce back next year.

NATHAN DODD- Doddy made some changes to his technique this year that will hold him in good stead over the next few seasons. He would be disappointed with his stats this year scoring a touch under 400 runs @29. One of the good things about Doddy is if he gets a start he tends to go on with it. That's why the technique changes he makes will be so important as they will help him to cope better with the new ball.

Doddy was one of the only players who came to me at the end of the season and said "what do you think I need to improve to make 1's and do well". To me this shows humility and a resolve to really improve. I really hope you do achieve that goal Doddy.

One challenge I would offer you is to try to consciously focus on enjoying your cricket more and also enjoying seeing others do well. Think about what you can do to help others enjoy their Saturday more and I think you'll find playing Cricket more enjoyable.

ROWAN HAMMAN- 426 @ 28 is a disappointing year for Row. He has a lot of ability and like him I'd really love to see him succeed in 1st grade. Rowan is a sweet timer of the ball and makes batting look easy. One of his weaknesses is that he can also make getting out look easy, particularly after he's been on top. To go the next step Row I think you need to do the following.

1. Have a hunger to make big scores and bat for long periods. You can play most shots but think about playing the percentages for the first session.

2. Work hard at being still when you hit the ball.

3. Do lots of throw downs practicing against spin and be positive in your footwork either forward or back.

I hope you stick with Manly Row, as you're a popular member and a valuable contributor on and off the field.

JACKSON BIRD- another big talent in our fast bowling stocks. What a thrill for the Birdman to make the Oz u/19's with another year to go. On the grade scene it was a big adjustment for Birdy to come up against men each week. He struggled for rhythm at times, which resulted in a no ball problem. This can be easily fixed my committing to never overstep the line at practice, which he is focused on for next year. Whilst on bowling no balls at practice, one of the biggest loads of crap that some quicks come out with is that overstepping the mark at practice is no big deal. I'm told the great Dennis Lillee never bowled no balls at practice and never did in the game. Jackson is only going to get better. Getting his hands on a new ball at practice will help him learn to bowl with a new ball. In the last few games he really worked hard at bowling sets of six and especially concentrating on his first and last ball. A good off-season of strength and fitness should see him do well next year.

MORGAN YOUELL- I was so happy that you contributed so heavily to winning a comp. All those hours of effort and sacrifice were rewarded in part by winning the comp.

I could write so much about Raf. He started the year in 2's but sub standard form lead to him being dropped post Christmas when the wickets green up a bit and Raf is at his best. At the back end of the season Raf basically gave a clinic to his teammates about how to bowl sets of six and subsequently took 34 wickets at 10 in 3rd grade. His sensational 11* in the final (no sweeps included) was enough to get us to 300.

I know it's getting harder to devote the time Raf but if you can keep going a few more years it would be awesome for the club. Well-done mate.

RUSTY PARKER- warning bowlers. Don't bowl short. Future grade bowlers would do well to remember this when they charge in at Rusty. He played the much talked about match winning innings to get 3's off to a flyer in the Final. I was so pleased for him that he overcame the psychological hurdle to get through the 20's. You've got the ability Rusty. It's all about your self-talk when you're batting.

His catching was also good. He took a catch at fine leg that had snow on it and turned the final back in our favor. To improve there are a few technical adjustments that will allow you to make more runs against better bowling. Thanks for a great year and please come back soon. Guys like you make the MWDCC what it is.

SCOTT FITZSIMMONS- 621 @ 47.77. That's a good year. I was stoked that Fitzy got a much needed hundred in the last round game. It showed that he was learning to take responsibility for the team's fortunes. His excellent vear could have been much better still if it weren't for scores of 23, 28, 16, 28, 18, 32, 25, 24, 25, 36. That's nine dismissals between 16 and 36. Just imagine if you converted some of those scores.

Fitzy gives his teammates heart failure when he starts his innings with unique shots including the periscope and the forehand. But maybe you're right Fitzy. Maybe that is the way for you to play. He was also solid at 1st slip and a deserving Premiership player.

My challenge for you will be no surprise to you. Convert some of those starts and at practice be a leader by getting fielding drills going rather than lurking around the nets.

Well done on a good year mate.

JOSH PETERSON- what a great effort Josh. You took some really great catches this year which made a big difference. In particular the catch to dismiss Sydney Uni's best bat in the semi was spectacular. To me your keeping is getting better and better and your best keeping years are ahead.

Josh also did a great job keeping 3rd's focused in the field, a vital role of any keeper. I was so pleased for you to have a breakthrough and win a Grand Final and it shows that you really can do it. I know it is hard to race back from the City to train but I hope that you keep playing for a while yet.

To improve will need to spend a bit more time working on your technique up to the stumps and just more of the same in terms of sharpening your reflexes but I think you could do well in second grade as you proved when you got the chance.

LUKE CAMERON- you are a champ Lukey. Among my most enjoyable moments this year was seeing you open the batting and "pulling" bowlers all over the place in your terrific 89 in the Semi. I think you really believe now that you can succeed opening the batting. One of your biggest attributes is your straight drive (it looks a lot like Steve Waugh). If you keep practicing well and hone your back foot defensive technique then you can be knocking on the door of 1st grade next season.

Just on Luke, one of the reasons people love playing with him so much is because he's so enthusiastic about his team and genuinely loves it when his teammates do well. Don't change that Lukey. ADAM PARKINSON- Parko is another who I really hope keeps playing for a few more years. He is just starting to really work out how to bowl his style of leggies. With the right fields I think you could take stacks of wickets over the next few seasons. His batting was hit and miss but there were occasions where he really got his head down, fought his urges to smash everything and dug his team out of trouble. You underestimate your batting I think Parko. You can make some bigger scores if you pick the right time to play some shots.

Keep using your cricket to have fun and enjoy yourself with your mates and I really hope to see you back again next year.

ANDREW LINDSAY- The end of the year saw Billy show everyone what he's known for a long time- "THE BOY CAN BAT". His end to the season saw him score 151, 47*, 92* in the semi, and 44 in the final. My favorite on field story of the year comes from Billy. I'm told that whilst demolishing UNSW during his 151 in 5's, veteran off spinner and former State Selector Jim Robson accused Billy of picking a ball to slog each over. He's reputed to have said to Billy "that was the 4th ball, isn't that the one your supposed to slog". Billy reputedly said back "Oh, I must have miss counted" and promptly smashed him over his head for 6 next ball. Priceless.

Billy also took 16 wickets @18 in 3rd grade, though it must be said is well below his capability. Injuries affected him this year but it's no secret why. Billy, if you are to get anywhere near your enormous potential you have to get yourself in shape for future seasons. Any team you play in needs you to be able to last more than a few over s in a spell and to come back strong late in the day. If you need any help or advice on how you can do that just ask.

DANNY REDRUP- after one season at the club Danny has established himself as a guy who his teammates love to play with. Humble, committed, supportive and with plenty of talent himself. His personal highlight was his 151* against Blacktown but unfortunately he hit a bit of a rough patch after that. If he works hard at playing straight and makes one or two little technique adjustments then he's the sort of guy a team can build an innings around. His bowling really started to come good in the finals and he picked up some crucial wickets. Getting his momentum going towards the batsmen and staying a bit taller in his delivery will see him take more wickets. Well done on your victory Danny and look forward to seeing you develop.

CRAIG LITTLE- Jeanie's season showed how quickly fortunes can change in Cricket. He decided he wanted to be given an opportunity to bat high up and was picked in 5's before getting a late reprieve and then making 50 odd in 4's. Up to 3's and he scored a hundred batting 3 and a terrific 89 in the Grand Final, which took the game away from Penrith. He's really worked on his technique and is hitting the ball well and playing straight. Higher grades in the top order are a real possibility if he can be a little more consistent.

I'm really pleased that you enjoyed the premiership so much Jeanie. There was hardly a bigger smile than yours in that dressing room and I'm sure it's something you'll never forget.

Make sure you get back to bowling and make those few little changes we've talked about. A number 3 who makes runs and bowls is more chance of going up than one who doesn't.

BEN FISHER- what a whirlwind Benny. Ten games of grade cricket and you've got a premiership to show for it. You lucky bugger.

I sense we've got a real talent on our hands with Ben. What an advantage to be 6 foot 3 and bowl finger spin. Ben bowled beautifully in the final. He bowled to his field and took 3 crucial wickets. Ben just needs to bowl heaps and heaps in the nets and heaps and heaps in the game. Keep working at not bowling across yourself and listen to what Mick has to say to you. In fact, seek him out and pester him to help you and you can go far. Welcome to the club and I hope you stick around for a long time Chipsy.

JOHN WARN- well you've done it mate. I was so happy for you when that last wicket was taken. All that effort, strategizing, encouraging and sacrifice was rewarded with a Premiership.

Warny's contribution was the most important factor in 3rd grades success. Without good leadership nothing works. Given that Warny had a disappointing season with the bat he clearly demonstrated just how important good captaincy is in and of itself. His ability to get the best out of individuals and get the team believing in themselves has been talked about. I thought his tactical awareness also came on this season and it pleased me that he was willing to listen and ask the advice of others with experience in this area.

His batting has declined a bit over the last few years but if he does play again the technical faults that contribute to this are easily fixed with a few hours on a ball machine. If time permits it would be great to have you back again when you can mate. Well done and thanks for your effort and commitment.

PAUL CARTER- another of our English imports. Carts took 15 wickets @ 21 in 3's but I thought he bowled even better than that. He really started to get good drift towards the end of the season and it's a shame for him that he went traveling and missed out on a Premiership.

Carts would be disappointed with his batting efforts though I'm told he really batted well in his 121 in 5's. Carts was a great help in driving the van to and from training and never complained. I hope things go well for you back in the UK.

BEN TAYLOR- Ben had some real highs with his bowling this year including a quality 7 for 21 in 3rds and soon found himself in second grade. Being fit is the key to Ben's bowling and as this fell away in the second half of the season combined with not being able to train much, his bowling suffered. I hope you are able to put some work in during the off -season Ben. Get fitter and stronger and you could really go up the grades quickly.

PAUL BRENNER- another good year for Bender. He just keeps churning out a few big hundreds every year and is up over 5,000 runs now. He yet again featured in a club record partnership (the amount of these he has must be a club record itself) and is just a great guy to have around the club.

Keep playing mate. We need you and you love it. Whatever it takes to keep you involved. I think it helps you when you do get to hit some balls each week but whatever you can manage. I think you can achieve that elusive premiership next year.

SIMON WADDINGTON- Waddo started the year like a man on a mission. 51, 60, 48, 131*, 70, 42 is a start that most of us would take. I'm not sure why his form dropped off after that but he'll be back next year and will do well again. We are so fortunate to have Waddo around. Years of 1st grade experience and some time in the state squad mean he has so much to pass on to guys like Scott and Jack. He was really valuable in his role as skipper this season and no doubt the guys gained a lot. Scott Patterson in particular made his runs when he had Waddo at the other end for much of it. He's still chipping away with a few wickets and will push guys in higher grades next year.

STUEY GRIFFITHS- Isn't this guy a terrific player to have in a team. Always enthusiastic, a good fieldsman, smacks around bowlers in the middle order and good for a laugh. Stuey is a very unselfish player. He could easily get upset about batting lower down but he recognises his role in the team and is happy to oblige. Work commitments may make it hard for him to play next year but if he can it would be great for the lower grades to have him around again- even without the trusty circa 86 "Super Tusker" which has had it's day.

JARROD BAKER- Jarrod only failed five times, which isn't a bad ration considering he faced the new ball each week. He averaged in the high twenties and it could have been a lot more but for scores of 22, 32, 32, 24, 22 and 31. Imagine if you converted some of those scores Jarrod. You'd be looking at almost 600 runs and probably would have won a 3rd grade Premiership.

Jarrod certainly has talent. I'd love to see you train a bit more and be a little more diligent about what you are trying to achieve at practice. Tightening up your technique and being hungrier to make the most of those starts for your team and yourself would be a good move.

Jarrod also has a nice natural out swinger. If you can overcome stopping at the crease as you deliver the ball, which nullifies your run up, you could really trouble batsmen with your good shape. I look forward to seeing you develop next year.

AIDEN BAKER- Aiden showed he is too good for 5th grade with his 170 and 83 to follow it up. He looks a real natural talent. Again, tightening up your technique and adjusting to match and game conditions will help you score more consistently. I'd like to see you make the most of the opportunities there are with the ball machines on Wednesday's. If you apply yourself you'll end up being a higher-grade player.

SCOTT PATTERSON- Scotty overcame a wretched run in the middle of the year after developing some bad habits with his technique. However he finished the year with a terrific 95 against eventual Premiers Gordon. I was so pleased for Scott. He worked hard for a few weeks and it really paid off. Scotty, keep working on your technique. As you mature physically over the next few years you'll find it easier to hit the ball through the field and hit the lose balls for 6 instead of to the field. Try to recognize the opportunity when you get to 20 or 30 and work even harder to turn those into big scores. It was a pleasure to coach you Scott and I'm excited about what you can achieve in the years ahead. JACK RITCHIE- Jack is another who will benefit from the experience he gained this year. After a few good scores to get into 4's he had a horror run in the middle of the season. But he took the confidence he gained from a good Green Shield season and made a few forties after Christmas. His bowling should develop in the years ahead and he should do the same as has been suggested to Mitch and Benny Fisher. Jack's highlight was a very mature innings where he combined with James Munting to put on almost 50 for the last wicket to get Poido's into the semi's.

Jack you've got excellent balance and co-ordination, which shows up, in your fielding. You need to work hard and driving with a straight blade rather than an open one and use the right side of your body when you hit the ball through the off side. Slightly closing your grip from where you have it now will help this.

MICHAEL ASHTON- Mike was unable to train much this year and it affected his performance as his pace dropped significantly. But he's a talented guy and when he's fit and firing has shown glimpses of his potential. He had one game in 3's where he performed well scoring 50 and taking 2 wickets but finished in 5th grade, which is well below where he should be. If you can get to train next year I'd love to see you firing and moving forward. Always a pleasure to have you playing at Manly and popular with his teammates.

JAMIE TURMANIS- what a bonus to have Jamie Turmanis back after a while off. Jamie worked hard to improve his keeping at the start of the season and it really paid off for him. I was really pleased to see him get personal satisfaction from this effort. Jamie's batting proved crucial at times and he averaged 25, which was good for batting 8 and 9.

Another older guy who is wholehearted in any team he plays in and has a really positive affect on his team. Welldone Jamie.

VINNIE REEHAAN- I felt for Vinnie all year. Due to family business commitments Vinnie couldn't train much. He also had to work till 6am each Saturday morning and then play Cricket. It never stopped him from giving his all on the field but it's just not possible to perform consistently with that sort of preparation. He did manage to pull off 6-50 in 4's one match. A good off season in England and the chance to train and sleep before matches next year will make a huge difference to his enjoyment and performance in 05/6.

JUSTIN COX- I felt sorry for Coxy this year as he was used as a bit of a stop gap. Keep one week, open the bowling the next, don't do either the next and batting all over the place. It's hard to get any consistency. He had a year he'd rather forget. I think you need to make your mind up what you want to do with your cricket. If you want to bowl then tell them that you won't keep so it can't happen to you again. If you want to keep then you've definitely got natural ability and I'd be more than happy to help you if you want to put in. I think you really need to get fitter and more disciplined in the off-season, both of which you have said you intend to do. You're at risk of wasting the talent you've been given Coxy so make a decision either way and get on with it. A sparkling 85 in 3's was his highlight.

MATTHEW MORRIS- I reckon Matty is a player on the move. The ball leaves his hand in textbook fashion. I reckon he's a smart cricketer and is working out his mental approach well. By all accounts his 5-80 off 40 overs in the semi was outstanding.

Matt, more momentum at the crease will help you to get through the air a bit quicker. Not everyone has shoulders and hands like Warne so I think you might need to jog in a little. I'm really excited about watching you develop next year and I think you could be the surprise packet of 05/6.

DANNY REYNOLDS- Danny reluctantly and unselfishly accepted many roles this year. Captain, wicket keeper, opening bowler (with stress fractures), middle order, high order- there wasn't much he didn't do. It's a credit to him that 5th grade came so close to making the semi's. He would be disappointed with his batting stats and no doubt the responsibility of having to focus on many things other than his batting would have affected this. He bowled well after recovering from stress fractures and picked up 18 wickets after Christmas.

Thanks for all your effort Danny. I think like many others you could benefit from having a plan of what you want to achieve from each practice session. This only takes 5 mins to think about before practice. To go up the grades you will need to get fitter and stronger and convert your starts into big scores.

JASON ALLEN- Jason is always a pleasure to have around. The highlights for Jason were scores of 57 and 62. However not converting those innings plus scores of 14, 17, 19, and 31 were what really affected his aggregate. Looking back over last years report it seemed to me that 2003/4 was a similar story. Jason, to improve as a player you are going to have to recognize the opportunity when it's in front of you. Consistently getting starts lets both your team and yourself down. Challenge yourself to be the one who wins games for your team by converting starts into big scores. If you aren't sure how to go about that, just ask. LUCAS FRASER- Lucas is clearly very talented. A couple of half centuries were the highs but as with Jason too many starts led to him achieving below what he's capable of. You're only young Lucas so you can be forgiven this, but achieving your potential will mean being hungry to make the sort of scores you have made in Saturday morning cricket. I'd also like to see you making the most of practice sessions and doing whatever you can to improve. The coaching staff are more than happy to help you. You only have to ask.

MURRAY FERGUSON- Last year Mick wrote in the annual report-

"Murray, don't bowl bike helmets, bowl Sydney Harbour Bridges". This year I say

"Murray, don't bowl bike helmets, bowl Sydney Harbour Bridges".

The work you did with Macca at the end of the year in regards to getting side on will help you do this. I'm excited about what the future holds for you Muzz. If you give the ball a chance to spin and try to deceive the batsmen in flight it will really help. It will mean getting hit over your head a little bit but the pay off will be worth it. In conjunction with your Captain, let your fields back up what you are trying to achieve with the ball. Let the finger spinners and mediums tie up an end. Bowl attacking and go for wickets.

Keep working on your batting too. The results aren't showing up yet but they will with hard work. Thank you also for your effort each week in setting up the nets. We appreciate it Muzz.

ALEX ROMANIW- Every session in the nets Alex bowled a consistently good line. Even conceding dropped catches I would have expected you to take more wickets, but that can happen. Trying to work on moving the ball a bit through the air will mean that you are more chance on flat Australian wickets.

PETE JACKA- Pete, I'm a firm believer that aside from getting too old you never lose it. It's just a matter of finding it. Besides the slight technical things we talked about it is largely in the mind for you. Committing to the mental skills program we will undertake in pre-season should see you moving back up where you belong.

Although it's a good quality to be able to laugh at yourself, it broke my heart when your mates would have a dig at you about fully's etc, and you'd go along with it. I want you to not let that negativity wash over you and stay determined to improve. I believe you can do it.

With the bat you also proved to yourself that you are capable and much better than you'd allowed others to tell you you were. Your best cricket is still ahead if you want it to be.

DANIEL BEYER- one of our talented Green Shield kids Daniel is one well worth persevering with. It was good to see you crack 79 in one of the last few rounds. Concentration at practice and in the games is going to be vital for your development. It would also help you a lot to make use of your time when doing drills rather than just going through the motions. Every time you practice have something you are trying to achieve. That will help you keep your focus.

Looking forward to seeing you develop over the next few years.

ANDREW HURLEY- It was a strange season for Andrew. The bowling wasn't too flash but not out scores of 25, 37,67 and 66 showed an ability to concentrate and value his wicket. I believe Andrew is a sleeping giant in regards to his bowling. Andrew, make sure you are physically strong and stable by the time the season starts. Work on getting your action consistent before it gets to the trials and I think you could do really well with the ball next year.

RON LIM- Who? Ron didn't make training too often during the season so remains a mystery man to many at the club. I only got to see you bowl on 1 or 2 occasions so it's difficult to comment. Suffice to say, there aren't too many people who cannot train and do well at Grade level so you will have to address that if you want to earn a spot next year.

That's it on the playing front but obviously there are many who I wish to thank off the field.

Firstly and most importantly Mick Pawley without whose encouragement and support I wouldn't have been club coach this year. Mick your passion for the development of young men and for this club are an inspiration to me and many others, and I hope you find a way to continue to be involved in this club (in a way that doesn't kill you). Thank you for your countless hours of effort and enthusiasm.

To the Captains for their effort. In particular Shawn who was always willing to consult with me regarding the running of First grade.

To Frase, Bob and the committee thanks for the opportunity. I am really excited about where you are taking this club.

To Michael Shepheard whose willingness to help and whose insightful comments on all things Manly Cricket are an encouragement to me. I love you being around.

To Don Sellen for a lifetime of commitment to Manly Cricket and for assistance in keeping me in the loop re 4th grade and Green Shield. Finally to my wife Samantha, who listened to me when I would come home frustrated or euphoric. Thanks for encouraging me in my coaching.

So to next season. To steal from Big Kev, "I'm excited". I think we have a great platform from which to launch. Thanks to 3rds we now believe we can win comps. Next season I don't think we should aim for less than Top 2 in the Club Championship and at least 2 grade teams in the Grand Final. More importantly than that is that the club continues to provide an opportunity for each player to improve and most importantly to enjoy your Cricket. It's a long game if you aren't enjoying it.

If re-appointed there will be a heavy emphasis pre-season on developing mental skills. The plan is to run eight 1-hour sessions on this from the last Wednesday night in July.

1st GRADE REPORT 2004/05 SEASON

The season 2004/05 was always going to be an important year for Manly 1st Grade. After finishing 12th the previous year it was crucial the Club bounced back and started to rebuild. To all the parents, partners, wives, girlfriends and supporters, thank you for being part of a memorable season. We as a team would not operate without you.



3rd GRADE REPORT



Anyone who witnessed our Grand Final victory on Sunday 3rd April against Penrith will understand what an amazing feeling it was to finally win a Premiership. Between the team we had lost 14 grade grand finals before this win.

4TH GRADE REPORT



I thoroughly enjoyed my second season as 4th grade captain. We didn't improve on last year's position by again finishing 6th, losing to the minor premiers and eventual champions Gordon in the Qualifying Final. Captaining this season was made much easier for me by the calibre of personnel playing 4th grade and the assistance of DOLLARS as scorer/manager. Dollars took lots of pressure off me in the administration side of the role, which meant I was able to spend more time with the players and more time at practice than last year.

It was very much a mixed season with most players running in and out of form at various stages throughout the year. I think many players will have learnt much from this season in particular the direct correlation between effort and results. The players who improved the most in 4th grade this year were generally those who regularly attended practice and made the most of the expert coaching staff and the knowledge of senior players. Conversely, some players' performances dropped off as they struggled to find time for training due to work and other commitments.

To improve and succeed in grade cricket at one's highest level requires considerable time and effort. It is very difficult to devote that much time to cricket and maintain full-time employment and relationships outside the game. It requires considerable sacrifice, good planning and time management, supportive partners, family and employers and a strong desire to improve and succeed. From my experience, my results always reflected the amount of time I was willing to commit to improving my game and although the rewards were not always instantaneous, they were worth it.

We won all our one-day games but occasionally struggled to bowl teams out on a flat Grahams wicket or struggled to bat the day out on an unfamiliar deck. Interestingly, our batting average as a team at home was 37.6 while our team batting average away from home was only 26.7. We need to be able to adjust our game to play on the different wickets that Sydney has to offer.

There were a number of highlights. The closest game was against Easts, with one wicket in hand JAMIE TUR-MANIS and MATT MORRIS took a quick single off the last ball of the day to give us a thrilling win. Our other wins were usually pretty convincing but our consistency over the season was lacking. There were also two games that weather played its part. Day 2 was washed out against Blacktown when only one other team in Sydney was washed out and we got caught on a wet wicket against Gordon in round 6 trying to chase an achievable total.

The core players in 4th grade this year were a good mix of youth and experience and it is particularly pleasing to see the improvement that the younger guys have made since this time last year. I know that the future of Manly Cricket will be strong.

There were almost 30 players representing 4th grade this season and I would like to thank all these players for their efforts and contributions to the success of the team. They are all such great blokes that it makes the job of captaining that much easier. The core players were as follows:

PAUL BRENNER: For the third year running Paul came close to the 4th grade batting record. Despite this Paul achieved another milestone in reaching 5000 runs for Manly. Well done Bender! To think I almost dropped Bender midway through the season after a series of ducks. He responded in true warrior style by scoring over 300 runs in the next 3 innings. Paul's main lesson this year would have to be that, changing time zones only hours before a game is a recipe for ducks.

MATT MORRIS: Again Matt made a great improvement this year. We have a wealth of spinners in the lower grades at the moment and otherwise Matt would have been playing higher. A late start to the season didn't help his cause but his control, turn and drop in the air, saw him tie down and deceive many batsmen. He has also added a couple of new deliveries to his repertoire and is a keen thinker about the game.

STUART GRIFFITHS: Stuey's bat, the ancient 'tusker' is a little bit lighter now, after losing a bit out of the toe. It is however, still capable of blasting balls out of the park. Stuey still uses it to demolish 4th grade attacks to all parts and is a great trump card to play late in the day when the opposition bowlers least suspect it. Thank you for patiently accepting your role in the team and relishing any opportunity when others may have whinged about not batting higher. Stuey's bowling was used sparingly this year due to an injured shoulder but was ever reliable. Again nothing got past Stuey at short cover.

JARROD BAKER: Jarrod was rock solid at the top of the order and formed a very successful opening combination with Bender. Jarrod plays very straight and with the full face and in doing so is very hard to get out. Especially after he gave away the cut shot to gully. Even though it took 3 dropped catches and a couple of dismissals, Jarrod often got out between 20-40 and hopefully after his patient 95 he has realised that there is no need to accelerate an innings too early if you have all day to bat. He has enough shots to tick the board over at a good rate.

JAMES MUNTING: James improved immensely this year and would have played much more 3rd grade if they weren't so strong. James has also learnt much this year. He has good control and is getting stronger and faster. He has learnt how to take early wickets with his in-swinger and the value of patience and hard work. He didn't have much luck in 4th grade with the bat but the potential is there as evident in his innings in PGs. I would like to see him work on his bouncer, as he is fast enough to be able to bowl a good bouncer on hard wickets.

SCOTT PATTERSON: Scott may be young but he is improving at a phenomenal rate. Scotty's greatest assets (among the many) are his patience and his willingness to listen and learn. In the first game I batted with Scotty for a while. He was rock solid, I had been in for a while, and with the runs coming freely at my end. I wondered for a moment, where Scott was going to score his runs. Forty three undefeated runs later, in good time, confirmed his ability. This innings was typical of those in which he did well. It involved a patient start, getting used to the bowlers and pace of the wicket and waiting for the opportunities later. He works hard on his game and has made a number of key technical improvements. His 95 in the qualifying final was a truly great innings against a quality attack and his fielding is first class.

JACK RITCHIE: Another of Green Shield age who also made huge improvements this year. Jack started as a batsman who could bowl a bit of spin but while he struggled to find form early in the season he took wickets using the north-easter well to trouble batsman with flight and drift. He later found some batting form in Green Shield and with his confidence restored he began to stroke the ball beautifully in 4th grade too. Like most, Jack has a couple of small technical issues to iron out in time but he has a great eye. Now that he has experienced getting out of a batting slump and has achieved some success in 4th grade, then look out opposition bowlers.

JAMIE TURMANIS: Jamie returned to grade cricket after a long absence and broke his finger in the first game. It healed quickly and he was back behind the stumps in no time. Jamie is a great man to have in the team and has a fast pair of hands. He is also a very handy lower order bat with his 56 against Gordon in Round 8 almost turning the game our way after we got caught on a wet wicket early.

JUSTIN COX: Coxy can do anything and did. Whether it be batting, bowling quick, bowling leggies, keeping or fielding, he is always capable of making an impact on the game. Unfortunately Coxy's pre-match preparations did not put him in the best position to regularly succeed on the paddock. I would really like to see him give himself a better chance next year.

BEN TAYLOR: Ben's journey through summer started and finished in 4th grade but took him as high as 2nd grade in between. When fit and available for training Ben showed he could comfortably hold a 2nd grade spot. When work commitments took over, his fitness and form dropped away. The juggle between cricket and work is a difficult one as Ben is now learning.

VINNIE REHAAN: I always thought of Vinnie as the life and soul of 4th grade. His bowling is reliable and his batting has tremendous potential. It was therefore very difficult to drop Vinnie for the last few rounds but I will repeat the intent of my message from last year in that Vinnie needs to tame his contempt for other bowlers, particularly spinners or at the very least be more selective. I think Vinnie's performances were also affected by his work commitments.

AIDEN BAKER: Aiden stepped back up to fourth grade late in the season after completing his HSC and then scoring some runs in 5th grade. Aiden has plenty of talent too but just needs to work a bit harder and play a bit straighter in order to realise it.

LUKE CAMERON, ANDREW LINDSAY, CRAIG LITTLE & ADAM PARKINSON all made brief appearances in 4th grade and all made a huge impact when they did. None of you are 4th graders and it is a credit to you all that you used the opportunity well to regain form and move on to greater things!

The amount of talent available for selection did make captaining on the field much easier but I had some particularly difficult selection decisions this year and some very good players unfortunately ended up playing 5th grade. Many times I had wished I could play 15. There was plenty of pressure coming from 5th grade which kept everyone on their toes. Other players to represent 4th grade this season were JASON ALLAN, MICHAEL ASHTON, PAUL CARTER, TOM CLEDWYN, MURRAY FERGUSON, BEN FISHER, ANDREW HURLEY, PETE JACKA, ANDREW KEMMIS.

I would like say a special thanks to LANGDON GOULD for his contributions to selections. It is a thankless task especially when all captains are rarely present at once.

On behalf of all those who played fourth grade I would also like to thank ANDREW FRASER, BOB BRENNER and the rest of the committee for doing such a great job in making this a successful and enjoyable season. Thank you also to the many helpers around afternoon tea-time throughout the year your kind help is much appreciated. Special thanks also to CHRIS PATTERSON who, each week, would go out of his way to help out, particularly with the set-up and pack up for each home game.

Our coaching just keeps getting better. We are very fortunate to have a champion such as MIKE PAWLEY in our midst. His contribution to our success is immense. The introduction of CRAIG GLASSOCK and MARK MCINNES to the coaching staff was also pure mastery. Thank you SACK and MACCA for your advice and contributions to the players and myself this year.

Finally I would like to say a huge CONGRATULATIONS to John Warn and all of the 3rd grade premier team. Our club's history tells us that premierships are a rare thing and a tremendous achievement for all involved. They will always be a tremendous achievement but they need not be so rare. I do truly believe it is the start of something great for Manly cricket!

You bowled very well out at Pratten Park and your innings of 40 odd not out to win us the game against Balmain was outstanding! I will follow your progress with great interest.

SCOTT PATTERSON You, like Jack, are lucky to have a mature outlook on life and cricket. Your match-winning innings blew all of us older guys away and I hope it helped you to develop a strong sense of self belief. I would also like to make a special mention about your fielding which was the benchmark in each game you played in. It is such an asset to be able to turn a game with a catch, throw or save and you will do this regularly throughout your career. Well done.

MICHAEL ASHTON This was another season filled with valuable contributions from you Brimmer. You go about your work with a minimum of fuss and you are a great team player. I thought you did us a great job with the new ball throughout the season and your outswinger caused headaches for batsmen, particularly in combination with Shane's attacking bowling from the other end. We all know partnerships are crucial in cricket and you were an equal share in our most valuable new ball pairing. On another note, I would have liked to have heard more of your thoughts on the running of the game throughout the season - you always seemed to be "on the money" with your tactical advice so don't be shy mate. Your batting was solid as usual.

JAMES MUNTING You were the surprise package this year James and you were instrumental in taking us from being average side into a finals contender. It is often in the middle overs of PG games that an experienced first grade batsman gets the chance to dominate an inexperienced lower grade bowler and in that phase of the game it can be exceptionally difficult to restrict scoring. By the end of the season we came to expect you to take us wickets and bowl well in crucial times. Persistent hard work and self improvement will be the key for you Birdman, particularly in terms of developing an effective game plan for using both the new and old ball. Try and use up some of the assets that Manly offers you by talking with Wingy, Scud, Shane, Geisy or Wazza (to name a few) about bowling plans. Your peers will often prove to be great sources of useful information. You were great to play alongside and your happy-go-lucky approach made life fun when you were around.

JARROD BAKER You didn't play much this year mate but what you impressed upon us was your aggressive attitude to cricket with both bat and ball. 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
