

45th Annual Report and Financial Statement

Gentlemen,

Your Committee have much pleasure in presenting for your adoption the 45th Annual Report and Financial Statement which covers the Season, 1922-23.

On reviewing the past Season your Committee feel that cricket at last has come in for a little of its own at the Village. With the formation of the Manly District Junior Association, it is hoped that many players will be unearthed, who will not only assist this Club in grade matches, but find places in the Interstate Elevens. The interest shown by residents in Manly last season was most marked, as from three to four hundred people, each Saturday witnessed the 1st. Grade matches played at the local Oval, with the result that the N.S.W. Cricket Association alloted the Club 6 matches at home, in order to foster this local support. The Club looks for and requests a further continuance of this interest from lovers of the game. The first trouble the General Committee had to face was the bad state of the Oval. After many conferences with the Council, and through their courtesy a new Caretaker in C. Basford was given charge of the Oval, and there is good reason to hope that the condition of the ground will show continued improvement.

The keenness and interest shown by members was most gratifying. With a number of our young players coming to the fore, it is hoped that the interest will increase, and thus lay the foundation for a good season next year. As the Oval was not available until the Saturday before the start of the Competition, several practice matches were played against local teams and the Waverley District Club. These matches were very useful in giving the Selectors an opportunity of seeing new members perform under match conditions.

It is expected that arrangements will be made whereby the oval will be available for practice early in the coming season so that members will have an opportunity of working up form before the grade matches are commenced.

During the season £5 was presented to Dad Broughton by the members of the Club. Dad has worked the scoring board for many a season now, and as he was ill at the time, the members felt they would like to show their appreciation of his services in a practical way. Mr. R. A. Oxlade presented a ball, used in one of the test matches, and Mr. C. C. Campbell a bat, which were disposed of to the members to swell the subscription list.

To new members the following Club History may prove interesting:—The Club was originally formed in about the year 1878, and was known as the Manly Cricket Club until 1903, when it became the Middle Harbour District Cricket Club, and in 1921 the name was again altered to the Manly District Cricket Club, which still applies.

Three teams were placed in the field during the past season as usual. As we had no Oval available to hand over to the City and Suburban Association we were unable to enter a fourth team to play in their competition, but next season we hope to have a team representing the Club in the Manly Junior Competition.

Your Club finished 7th in the Club Championship with 83 points.
Your Committee extends its hearty congratulations to the Waverley (First Grade), Marrickville (Second Grade), and Waverley (Third Grade) teams upon winning the respective Premierships and to the Marrickville and Waverley Clubs upon tieing for the Club Championship Title, also to the Brookvale Club upon winning the Premiership of the Manly Junior Association.

JUNIOR AND SCHOOL CRICKET.

As in former seasons, your Club placed its wickets and nets at the disposal of all local schools and Junior Association Members, free of charge.

DELEGATES.

Messrs. R. A. Oxlade, and C. B. Cochrane, your Delegates to the NS.W. Cricket Association were regular in their attendance. Mr. Oxlade was again elected to the Executive of the Association as well as to the Board of Control, whilst Mr. Cochrane was reelected Chairman of the Grade Committee.

FINANCE.

The Club finished the season with a credit balance of £3/0/11 which is considered very satisfactory in face of the continued high cost of material, and other expenses. The Club's subscription is the lowest amongst the Metropolitan Clubs, and the Committee hope to be able to carry on at the present fee, but members must realise that they must take the greatest of care with material, and thus assist the Hon. Treasurer in his efforts to live within our means. The Club is very fortunate in having in our Treasurer, Mr. Cochrane, one who is so interested in his work, and has been able to keep the Club in credit each year, supply the necessary material, and yet only have subscriptions to rely on. The Manly Council have been approached with a view of granting the Club a percentage of the takings at the gate of matches played on the local oval, which will provide us with additional revenue, to "carry on" at the present Membership Fee.

AFTERNOON TEA.

The supplying of afternoon tea was again resorted to, and was much appreciated by our own and visiting teams respectively. To Mrs. Bubb, who on numerous occasions officiated, we are very much indebted and also to Mrs. Cohen, Mrs. Walton, Miss Williams, and the Misses C. and V. McMahon.

DR. THOMAS.

The Committee wish to place on record their appreciation of the services rendered to the Club, by our ex-President Dr. D. Thomas, who held the honoured position for a period of 26 years. Dr. Thomas has always been a very solid supporter of the Club, and it was with feelings of regret that we were obliged to accept his resignation at last year's General Meeting. We hope that, although he does not now hold the office, we will have the pleasure of still seeing him at the matches played in Manly for many years to come, and that he will always remain interested in the Club's doings.

WOLLONGONG TRIP.

On the last Anniversary holiday week-end a Club team visited Wollongong and played a match against the South Coast Association, which was lost, the concrete wicket proving the downfall of our batsmen. Although only a short trip, it marked the first occasion for many years that a team from this Club had

toured under the Club's name. Randell's bowling (6 for 78) was most effective, whilst G. Williams (37) scored the most number of runs. The team were welcomed by Mr. Wingrove on behalf of the Association at the Show Ground during the match. Afternoon tea being afterwards provided, Mr. Randell suitably returned thanks on the team's behalf. Those that made the trip will know that an account of same could not be complete without mentioning the name of Tom Waddy (now in Adelaide), who was hailed as the "life" of the party.

YASS TRIP.

Having experienced the pleasure of one trip away, at the request of several members your Committee made arrangements for a four days' tour at Easter time. Eleven members made the trip with the Hon. Secretary acting as Manager. The team left Sydney on the Thursday night and arrived at the Commercial Hotel, Yass, at 5 a.m. the next morning. Tangmangaroo was visited on Good Friday, a car drive of 18 miles out. were successful in beating this Club by 49 runs on the first innings. F. McMahon (5 for 16), and R. Bubb (2 for 3), were the best howlers in the first innings, whilst J. Moore (2 for 18), secured the honours in the 2nd. The following players did well with the bat:—R. Bubb (23), R. Freeman (21), and L. Green (16). Dinner on this occasion was provided by Mr. Glen Best, who left no stones unturned to see that the team did not go away hungry. That night the team was allowed to retire early on account of their "all night sitting" the night before. Saturday the first of the "Ashes" was played on the Yass Oval against the Combined District Team, which match was lost by our representatives by 49 runs. Randell bore the brunt of the bowling and secured 7 for 90, whilst J. Moore (2 for 3), and F. McMahon (1 for 46) also obtained wickets during the day. Our hatting absolutely collapsed, P. Lowe (34), R. Freeman (34), and B. Bubb (16). doing best. Owing to the "heavy atmosphere" (?) as complained of by one of the team, the fielding all round was not good, and bowlers' averages suffered thereby.

The Association provided for dinner and entertained the team at the pictures at night. Whilst on the Sunday the all day motor trip to Burrunjuck was very much appreciated. On the Monday. the 2nd Test was played, but as the "atmosphere" had not changed, this match was also lost by 66 runs. The best batting figures were R. Freeman (33), N. Cohen (14), and J. Randell (14), with J. Randell (4 for 40), J. Moore (2 for 38), and K. 46). doing (2 for well with the item worthy of mention is the number of times that our players were injured during the 4 days, L. Green being the worst victim with 4 different cracks. Batting gloves were naturally well in Again midday dinner was provided, but as the train home did not leave until fairly late that night the team took the opportunity of inviting their opponents together with the President of the Association to dinner, when numerous complimentary

speeches were delivered. To Messrs. Besnard, Best, Bridge, and Ffrench, this Club extends its most grateful thanks for their untiring and successful efforts to entertain our team and it is hoped, that no hitch will prevent a Yass XI visiting our village next season, when we can promise them a right royal welcome.

THEATRE PARTY.

A new club venture last season was the holding of a members' theatre party, which took place at "Sally" on 6th February. Through the courtesy of Mr. Hazlitt of J. C. Williamsons Ltd., 50 seats were reserved at a reduced cost, which were all quickly availed of, in fact fully 40 were disappointed through not applying for tickets earlier. Dr. Arthur, M.L.A., and Messrs. R. A. Oxlade and F. A. Iredale were amongst those present. At the end of the performance Miss Josie Melville was presented with a floral tribute, in the form of a bat, by the cricketers present amid much enthusiasm. The Hon. Secretary duly received a letter of appreciation from this popular star.

FIRST GRADE TEAM.

It is pleasing to report that your First Grade Team finished higher last year in the Grade Competition than they did the season before. The following table clearly sets out the comparison:—

The team's improved position last season was largely due to the consistent good bowling of R. Bubb and J. Randell, who bore the brunt of the attack. Only two centuries (one in the 2nd innings) and 1 score of 300 were registered against the team. The batting, taken all round, was very weak, and will need to be strengthened considerably if success is to come our way. G. Williams and H. Jones were our most consistent batsmen. Williams was very unlucky on two occasions reaching the nineties and not having the honour of scoring the only century for the team. J. Searle, during the last half of the season, was batting well and ought to be a very useful man next season. R. Freewas safe behind the sticks and continues to improve. His doings were as follows:—3 caught, 12 stumped.

The indifferent fielding by the team, as a whole, lost more than one match. G. Williams and A. Mailey were notable ex-Their work in the field sometimes rose to brilliance. H. Jones and J. Searle were safe, but more attention must be paid by the whole team to ground and air work, and thus give our bowlers more assistance. The Club congratulates J. Randell on obtaining the highest number of wickets, i.e., 62 amongst the First Grade Clubs for the season. This is all the more worthy when one takes in the fact that the last time Randell accomplished this feat was in 1909. R. Bubb bowled well throughout, but had to ease up slightly during the last few matches on account of receiving a bad strain. He was unlucky in not capturing 50 wickets for the season. His best performance was 8 for 28, including the hat-trick against University. To commemorate the occasion the Club presented him with the ball used suitably mounted and inscribed. His other performances were 4 for 24 v. Glebe, 4 for 82 v. Mosman, and 7 for 54 v. W. Suburbs.

J. Randell could not have bowled better. He kept a perfect length throughout and had plenty of tricks up his sleeve to puzzle the opposing batsmen. His best achievements were: 4 for 76 v. Petersham, 7 for 59 v. Glebe, 5 for 48 v. University,

5 for 110 v. Randwick, 5 for 70 v. Mosman, 4 for 68 v. North Sydney, 6 for 81 v. St. George, 6 for 86 v. Paddington, and 4 for 90 v. St. George. Other bowling performances worthy of mention are as follows: A. Mailey, 4 for 52 v. Petersham; K. Walton, 3 for 57 v. Randwick; and H. Jones, 2 for 8 v. W. Suburbs.

Congratulations to G. Williams on scoring 500 runs for the season, and also on obtaining the batting average for the team. With more judgment of timing and running between the wickets this player ought to go a long way in cricket. His best scores were:— 98 v. Petersham, 82 v. University, and 93 v. W. Suburbs.

H. Jones was very consistent, but suffered throughout the season from "no luck." His "double" against his old Club, Waverley, was a sterling performance. Good scores coming from his bat were:—41 v. Glebe, 76 and 62x v. Waverley, 68 v. Sydney, and 50 v. Paddington.

The following scored more than 40 runs in an innings during the 13 matches played:—D. Gee, 57 v. Waverley, 57 v. Randwick; R. Bubb, 54 v. Randwick; J. Searle, 51 v. St. George, 67 v. W. Suburbs; T. M. Waddy, 49 v. Waverley; A. Mailey, 59x v. University; N. Cohen, 50 v. Randwick, 53 v. North Sydney; R. G. Friend, 51 v. North Sydney.

The Captaincy during the season fell to A. A. Mailey, J. Randell, and H. Jones on different occasions.

The team worked in perfect harmony and were a very happy family throughout, winning or losing. With this spirit and a little more practice there is no reason why they cannot place the Club in a still higher position during 1924.

Eight of our batsmen were run out against 7 of our opponents.

SECOND GRADE TEAM.

Having occupied second position in the Competition Table the season before last, the 2nds had a reputation to live up to, but last season found them in 7th position, as the following table shows:—

The first team drew on their forces on numerous occasions which rather unsettled their combination. However, their per-

formances were very creditable, under the circumstances. two, T. Alcock and J. Moore, played with the team continually, without moving to, or coming from a higher or lower grade. Alcock, who led the side at the latter end of the season, secured the bowling average, capturing 33 wickets at a cost of 536 runs. His best performances being 4 for 56 v. W. Suburbs, 5 for 46/v. University, 5 for 33 v. Glebe, and 4 for 39 v. N. Sydney. also attracted his attention, as he secured 45 v. Balmain, 55 v. University, and 88x v. C. Cumberland. J. Ross, who also acted as Captain during the season, registered good figures in obtaining 4 for 81 v. Glebe, 7 for 36 v. University, 4 for 27 v. Mosman, and 5 for 96 v. C. Cumberland, in which match he scored 60x in good F. McMahon bowled well throughout but faulty fielding lost him many a wicket. His 32 wickets were obtained for an average of 19.09. His best performance was against Balmain, when he obtained 6 for 42. Although only playing in 3 matches, K. Walton secured 23 wickets at an average of 6.54. Petersham he proved a "demon," securing 8 for 26 and 8 for 43 in the one match. Previous to this match he got 6 for 33 and 1 for 11 v. Balmain, which made 23 wickets in two successive Had not the firsts required his services, at the rate he was going, somebody's record, for a season, was in grave danger.

J. Moore was another successful bowler, he always got a few wickets in each mase, and finished up with 21 in his bag.

The following also had their days out:—A. Little, 5 for 35 v. Glebe; C. Searle, 3 for 44 v. C. Cumberland; and H. P. Woolcott, 3 for 24 v. Sydney.

In batting nearly every member registered a good score on some occasion or another, A. Little being the only one to score three figures, whilst F. Leak and R. A. Golding went very close to it. Golding obtained the most number of runs—i.e., 340. with C. Searle 331, and T. Alcock 325, close on his heels. F Leak obtained the average.

The following scored more than 50 in an innings:—R. Friend, 91 v. Waverley; W. Rogers, 86 v. University; J. Searle, 58 v. Balmain; F. Munro, 52 v. Sydney; F. Leak, 93 v. Sydney; V. Cohen, 54 v. C. Cumberland; A. Little, 100 v. University; C. Searle, 53 v. Randwick, and 89 v. Waverley; R. A. Golding, 80 v. Mosman, 92 v. Paddington, and 77 v. Sydney. L. Green kept wickets well, stumping 8 and catching 6. R. A. Golding also stumped 1. 12 batsmen were run out, against 10 of our opponents.

It was mainly owing to the fact that the higher grades drew to such an extent on their forces that they did not finish up in a higher position. No less than 25 players at some period or other had a game with the team. Their skipper, C. B. Cochrane, deserves all praise for sticking to and keeping the XI together. F. Brand was the star, capturing 79 wickets for 969 runs, and scoring 470 runs, a creditable double. His bowling lacked none of his old time skill, and it is hoped that he may be in for another boom season next year. R. E. Smith also bowled well throughout, but was late in starting on account of tennis attracting his attention. His 42 wickets were obtained for the cost of 564 runs. C. B. Cochrane acquitted himself well with 28 wickets for 486 runs.

The batting was a strong feature of the team, 200 runs for the innings being topped on 6 occasions. E. Woods was the first member of any of our teams to score a century, and played a great innings in doing so. He also scored 41 against Balmain and University. F. Leak, a batsman of much promise, distinguished himself against University scoring 104 and 50x in the match, and finished up by winning the batting average. W. Driver, although on the sick list, played some nice innings, scoring 79 v. Petersham, and 46 v. University. P. Lowe got amongst them to the tune of 68 v. Mosman, 65 v. North Sydney, and batted like a champion, too.

Other good scores were:—C. B. Cochrane, 40 v. Balmain, 43 v. Waverley, 47 v. Mosman; F. Brand, 80 v. Gordon, 57 v. Mosman, 46x v. Petersham; W. Johnston, 53x v. North Sydney; R. Hawksford, 40x v. W. Suburbs, 56 v. Randwick; H. Walker, 46 v. North Sydney.

S. Exton kept wickets splendidly, some of his feats verging on brilliancy. To catch 13 and stump 12 speaks for itself. 8 batsmen were run out against 10 of our opponents.
