Annual Report and Financial Statement

To be submitted for adoption at the Annual Meeting, to be held at Sporting Union Rooms, The Oval, Manly, Thursday, 10th July, 1930, at 8 p.m.

GENTLEMEN,-

Your Committee presents for your adoption the 52nd Annual Report and Financial Statement.

It is noted with pleasure that your Club showed an improvement on the previous season, and also that many young players made their presence felt in the various sides.

Your Committee extends its congratulations to Mosman on winning the Club Championship and 1st Grade Premiership; St. George, 2nd Grade Premiership; Waverley, 3rd Grade Premiership; Ryde "A" Grade Shire, and Waverley "B" Grade Shire.

The First Eleven played 15 matches, winning 4, losing 9, drawing 2, and occupied 13th position in the Competition table. 3059 runs were scored at an average of 19.11, as against 3522 by opponents at an average of 27.09.

J. Gordon won the batting average with 327 runs at an average of 46.71; F. Cummins was runnerup with an average of 30.63, and also secured the highest aggregate, viz., 491 runs. T. Parsonage and C. Cant were 3rd and 4th, with averages of 29.89 and 26.40 respectively. Centuries were scored by J. Gordon 157, and F. Cummins 109 n.o. Other scores of 50 and over were: F. Cummins 93 n.o., 74, 61, and 52; T. Parsonage, 89 and 51; C. Cant, 66, 54, and 53. L. Gwynne, 61, 52, and 51 n.o.; G. Austin, 61 n.o. and 52; J. Gordon, 57; N. Sneddon, 54; A. Payne, 52; C. Diamond, 51.

The bowling average was won by J. Betts, who also secured the greatest number of wickets, viz., 38, at an average of 22.82. T. Parsonage was runner-up with 11 wickets, average 23.91, and was followed by W. Gagie, 36 wickets, average 24.22.

The greatest number of catches were taken by L. Gwynne and C. Harris, 8 each; G. Austin 7, W. Gagie and F. Cummins 6 each; C. Harris also stumped 5 batsmen.

The Second Eleven played 15 matches, winning 3, losing 9, drawing 3, and occupied 15th position in the Competition table. The batting average was won by A. Little with 339 runs, at an average of 30.8. G. Austin was runner-up, with an average of 30.6, followed by J. Gordon and H. Esdaile with averages of 29.7 and 24.6 respectively. R. Freeman secured the highest aggregate with 361 runs. Centuries were scored by A. Little 151, and C. Searle 110. Other scores of 50 and over were: J. Gordon, 79 and 61; R. Freeman, 72 and 61; G. Austin, 62 and 51; A. Little, 57; G. Dunlop, 55; H. Esdaile, 50.

The bowling average goes to N. Cohen with five wickets, average 15.6, followed by H. Esdaile and W. Hoy, with averages of 19.7 and 19.9 respectively. W. Hoy, with 26, secured the greatest number of wickets.

The runs scored were 3056, average 14.90, as against 3564, average 24.50, by opponents. The greatest number of catches were taken by W. Hoy and W. Reynolds, 7 each, and C. Searle, 6.

The Third Eleven played 15 matches, winning 8, losing 6, drawing 1, and occupied 7th position in the Competition table.

Runs scored were 3674, average 19.86, against 3565, average 17.14, by opponents.

The batting average was won by P. Lowe with 371 runs, at an average of 53. He also obtained the highest aggregate. N. Sneddon was runner-up with 248 runs, average 49.6, and was followed by C. Diamond and L. Byrne, with averages of 30.0 and 26.75 respectively. No century was scored, but scores of 50 and over were made by P. Lowe, 85, 85, 72 and 52; G. Rosa, 80 and 55; E. Hartley, 79; K. Collins, 71; H. Woolcott, 70; C. Diamond, 55; W. Wallach, 55; N. Sneddon, 52 and 50 n.o.; W. Reynolds, 50 n.o. The bowling average was won by N. Sneddon, with 30 wickets, at an average of 9.96. L. Byrne was runner-up with 30 wickets, average 12.43, followed by C. Diamond, 11 wickets, average 12.81. H. P. Woolcott obtained the highest number of wickets, viz., 42.

The greatest number of catches were taken by K. Collins and P. Lowe, 8 each; S. Wallace and N. Widerberg, 7 each; A. Little, J. Hartley and G. Rosa, 6 each.

The Municipal and Shire XI. played 14 matches, winning 3, losing 10, drawing 1, and occupied 11th position in the "B" Grade Competition. The batting average was won by G. M. Dunlop, with 265 runs, at an average of 29.44. He also secured the highest aggregate. G. Spencer was runner-up with 108 runs, average 18.00, followed by W. Wallach and R. Sneddon with averages of 14.27 and 13.87 respectively. No century was scored, but scores of 50 and over were made by G. Dunlop, 75 and 68; R. Sneddon, 65; J. Watson, 61 n.o.; W. Wallach, 58.

The bowling average was won by T. McDonagh with 5 wickets, average 9.80, followed by R. Cavan with 45 wickets, average 10.51. R. Cavan also obtained the greatest number of wickets.

The runs scored were 2370, average 10.68, as against 2687, average 13.23, by opponents.

The greatest number of catches were taken by W. Wallach 7, S. Gunson 6.

POIDEVIN GRAY COMPETITION.—Your Club entered a team in the Poidevin Gray Competition, and performed creditably in the earlier matches. Unfortunately, owing to the later games being played after the close of the season, full representative teams could not be fielded, owing to the call of football.

REPRESENTATIVE HONOURS.—Your Committee congratulates W. Gagie on being selected to represent New South Wales 2nd XI. against Victoria, and F. Cummins against Tasmania.

JUNIOR AND SCHOOL CRICKET.—Invitations were again extended to the Manly and District Junior Cricket Association, and various Manly Schools, both Public and Private, to practice at the Club nets under the supervision of Mr. George Lowe.

JUNIOR CRICKET.—Your Committee extends its congratulations to Deewhy "A" Cricket Club on again winning the Manly and District Junior C.A. "A" Grade Premiership, and Brookvale Cricket Club the "B" Grade. The Juniors again availed themselves of the privilege of practising at the nets afforded them by your Club.

PRACTICE.—Your Club is again indebted to Mr. Geo. Lowe for the efficient way he controlled the practices during the season. It is regretted that a large number of members cannot avail themselves of the opportunity to practice under Mr. Lowe's supervision owing to the lateness of their arrival at Manly from work. Practice wickets centrally situated in Sydney for players of distant clubs who have to work until 5 p.m. are a necessity of the near future.

During the season a number of Country cricketers from various centres availed themselves of our Club's invitation to practice at the nets, and several matches were arranged for their benefit, and proved most enjoyable.

HONORARY SECRETARY.—Your Committee desires to place on record its appreciation of the services renderd by Mr. Dunlop, who has been zealous and tactful in carrying out his duties since taking office in 1924.

DELEGATES.—Your Delegates, Messrs. R. A. Oxlade and C. B. Cochrane, were regular in their attendances, and were again elected Chairmen of their respective Committees. Mr. Oxlade was again elected to the Australian Board of Control, and also Chairman of the Board for the third successive year.

FINANCE.—The finances of the Club have, as usual, received the careful attention of your Hon. Treasurer, and as will be seen from the Financial Statement, a credit balance of $\pounds 61/19/6$ is being carried forward to next season.

SOCIAL.—A Social Committee, of which Mr. Arthur Little was Hon. Secretary, was formed during the season. Several interesting functions were held, notably a lecture by Don Bradman; a demonstration of the captive ball by Mr. J. Searle; and an enjoyable dinner and smoke social by the members of the various teams at the conclusion of the season.

AFTERNOON TEA.—Afternoon tea during the games at Manly was kindly provided by Mrs. Harold Austin and Mrs. George Austin, and was much appreciated. Your Committee extends its sincerest thanks to these ladies for their kindness and attention. COMMITTEE.—Your Committee held ten meetings during the season, and the attendances were: R. A. Oxlade 6, C. B. Cochrane 8, G. M. Dunlop 10, R. Freeman 8, W. L. Berry (resigned March, 1930) 3, J. Randell 6, C. Harris 10, C. Searle 10, A. Little 6, L. W. Gwynne 7, K. Walton 8, A. Kildea 2, G. Lowe 9, J. Gordon (elected April, 1930) 1, C. S. Watson (Manly and District Junior Cricket Association) 10.

OVAL.—It is pleasing to notice that your ground compares favourably with other grounds, and congratulations are extended to the Caretaker, C. Basford, for his care and attention to the oval.

(THANKS.—The thanks of the Club are due to Manly Council, Hon. Auditors, Caretaker, Scorers (E. Williams, 1st XI., B. Eller, 2nd XI., A. Flaherty, 3rd XI., and A. Thompson, Shire XI.), Miss Mac-Kenzie, Manly Daily Ltd., "Manly Times," Mesda mes Dunlop, Freeman and Randell (for services in connection with annual reunion), and Mrs. H. and G. Austin for providing afternoon tea each Saturday.

MATERIAL.—Your teams were again supplied with the best of material, which gave general satisfaction. Material to the value of £56 is available for the coming season.

NEW GROUNDS.—Manly during the past few years has grown considerably, and an additional playing area for grade cricket and football is an urgent necessity. Your Committee has been in communication with Manly Council on the question of converting Balgowlah Park into a turf wicket, and trust that Council will treat this matter as one of urgency.

SCORE BOOKS.—Your Hon. Treasurer generously donated a prize for the best kept Score Book. The prize was won by A. Thompson.

OBITUARY.—It is with regret that your Committee records the death of Mr. John Woods. He was one of five brothers who played for the Club. The only one now surviving being the famous S. M. J. (Sammy) Woods.

REPORT OF FIRST ELEVEN-BY L. W. Gwynne.

The season 1929-30 closed showing slightly improved form, and a better standard of play of your 1st Eleven, which was one of the features of an interesting season. From last position in the preceding year, it finished 13th on the Competition table.

One of the pleasing matters to record was the opportunity given by your Club Selectors to the younger players. There were no less than seven players strange to first grade conditions, and the average age of the eleven was 22 years. Just how far the experience gained by these young players is going to benefit the Club is hard to estimate, but undoubtedly there are players of promise, and those of them who continue to practice earnestly and keenly will succeed in the game, and become an acquisition to their Club.

The main strength of your 1st Eleven was in bowling, and I say, with little fear of contradiction, that had the fielding been better, your side must have finished higher in the Competition table. Most of the opposing teams were dismissed for moderately low scores, and only on three occasions did sides register more than 300 runs an innings against you. Much of this performance was due to your two stock bowlers, J. Betts and W. Gagie. J. Betts bowled in a magnificent manner against the premiers, Western Suburbs and University, while W. Gagie bowled consistently well, especially in the match agaisnt Central Cumberland. J. Betts' main attribute was his excellent length and ability to vary pace and flight. His bowling should get him representative honours next year.

We congratulate W. Gagie on his bowling and regretted that through business reasons he was unable to finish the season with his team.

Hearty congratulations to J. Gordon on winning the batting averages in this, his first season with the club. His 157 against Randwick, on that very hot day, displayed splendid stamina, but perhaps his best knock was against Paddington, when he scored 57 n.o., and was largely instrumental in the winning of the game.

It is pleasing to report the high batting standard obtained by F. Cummins. His 74 against Paddington, 93 n.o. against Waverley, and 109 n.o. against Glebe were delightful innings. His onside shots compare favourably with those of our best players, and when he can learn to smother the "good-un" early in his innings, it would be safe to say that his success is assured. The colts, T. Parsonage, A. Payne, H. Esdaile, C. Diamond, and G. Austin, showed ability, and with the experience gained should be better players next year. Permit me to say how sorry we are to lose the services of T. Parsonage. It was a pleasure to play with him, and during his short stay with us he won the comradeship and esteem of his teammates.

It is pleasing to report the consistent form shown by your wicketkeeper, C. Harris. Some of his performances were brilliant.

The fielding was at times keen enough, but suffered through lack of experience and an absence of technique, a fault frequently found in a young side. The ground fielding was generally good, but the catching was weak. Players must learn to make as well as take catches. Too much attention cannot be given to this phase of the game.

Running between wickets was only fair—too many run outs were registered against your players. Backing-up, running the first run quickly, and a better understanding between batsmen is an art, and should be studied and developed by the players.

The quality of the material used by the eleven was good, and very much appreciated by the eleven.

We thank the scorer, E. Williams, for his services, and the splendid manner he kept the scoring book.

Your eleven, socially, was very happy, and played all their matches in a sportsmanlike manner. On every occasion the games were fought cleanly, and the loyalty shown their Captain, and to one another, were glorious features of the season's cricket.

REPORT OF THE SECOND ELEVEN-By A. Little.

The Second Eleven, as a team, did not do itself justice, and won only 3 out of 15 matches played. Several close games, and the fact that the team scored 3056 runs, as against 3564 by opponents, points to the fact that the games were keenly contested, and nothing was given away. The team lacked a good fast bowler, and had one been available, it would have been materially strengthened, and possibly have occupied a much higher position in the competition table. It was not until the fifth round, when the strong Mosman eleven was defeated by 90 runs on the first innings, that the team recorded its first win, and incidentally made its first score of over 200. After this match J. Gordon, the consistent opening batsman, who had scored 238 runs for 8 innings, was deservedly promoted to the First Eleven, and, continuing his good form, secured the First Grade batting average for the season.

It was certainly a disappointment that a number of young players did not reveal the form that was expected of them. They are capable of better things, and it is hoped that the club will next year reap the benefit of the experience gained by these juniors in the season just concluded.

In February the side lost the services of a very promising young bowler in W. Hoy, who left Sydney to take up an important position for his firm in Java. Billy had, up to this time, taken 26 wickets, at an average of 19.9 runs. As this was the greatest number of wickets obtained by any Second Grade bowler for the season, it can be realised what his loss meant to the side. Prior to the departure of the vessel, Billy was taken by surprise when the captain and hon. secretary, on behalf of his team mates, presented him with a fountain pen, as a token of esteem, and wished him "bon voyage" and every success in his new sphere.

The highest score made by the side was 421 for 6 wickets, against University, at the Sydney Cricket Ground No. 2, in the second last round. In this match A. Little and C. Searle put on 192 runs for the third wicket, scoring 151 and 110 respectively, the only centuries scored during the season.

A very pleasing and enjoyable feature of the season's cricket was the excellent spirit in which the matches were played. Until the last ball had been bowled, the players tried their hardest, and whether winning or losing were always cheerful in the dressing-room, and looking forward to the following match. Cricket played in this spirit is always a pleasure, and goes to show that the next best thing to winning a match is to be a good loser.

REPORT OF THIRD ELEVEN-By P. Lowe.

The Third Eleven finished fairly high in the competition, having obtained 65 points, and this would have been greater had the luck been a little more even in several instances. Most of the losses were very narrow, whereas our victories, in the majority of cases, were by large margins. In studying the situation, it appears that where the eleven was able to work up team spirit and understanding—this being during the earlier part of the season, and also at the latter end—success came their way, but in the interim, when this combination inevitably became interfered with through many changes in personnel, balance was missing and co-operation lacking. Towards the end of the season these features were restored, and the team was again in a match winning vein. Only once in the last eight innings did the side fail to total over 200 runs, whereas our opponents only exceeded 150 runs during the last ten innings on one occasion. This augurs well for the coming season. Keenness on and off the field was most pronounced, and I must add it became a pleasure to lead the side.

Owing to removal to the country, the club was unfortunate to lose the services of Roy and Neville Sneddon, especially the latter, as he showed all-round ability, and gave great promise of rising high in the cricket world. His performances of 30 wickets, at an average of 9.96,, with the ball, and 248 runs, at an average of 49.60, with the bat, were the efforts of a very fine junior. L. Byrne and C. Diamond, both young playres, also evidenced all-round capabilities, and should make their mark in the future. K. Collins should develop into a fine opening batsman, as he has the right temperament for this position in the batting order.

E. Hartley bowled very well, and towards the end of the season increased, as well as sustained, his pace for some considerable time. The brunt of the attack was borne by H. P. Woolcott, with the fine aggregate of 42 wickets. He bowled consistently well match after match, and had bad luck not dogged his fine efforts, much improvement would have been shown in his figures of 18.90 per wicket, a notable achievement as it is. His most needed type of bowling should strengthen the attack of the First Eleven in the coming season.

For a great part of the season the team was handicapped behind the wickets. S. Wallace then came to our assistance, and performed most creditably. The ground fielding and catching, on the whole, was satisfactory, and it is in this department of the game that the results of matches are shown.

In conclusion, it gives me pleasure to add that several other juniors, notably H. Jockel and V. Trumper, give promise of talent above the ordinary. With all our young players coming on, the success of the club should be assured for some considerable time.

REPORT OF SHIRE TEAM-By C. S. Watson.

The Shire team was captained for part of the season by G. M. Dunlop. This team was composed principally of young players. Of the fourteen matches played, only 3 were won, 10 being lost and 1 drawn. (The final match was not played, because no ground was available). Manly finished in 11th position in its division.

It will be seen from the attached details of scores that only 317 runs more were made against than for the team during the season, which shows that we did not perform as badly as would appear from the fact that 10 matches were lost. Some of the finishes were close, and all the games were keenly contested. Fielding errors on our side were too frequent, and players generally need to realise that a safe field is quite as useful to a side as the good batsman or bowler. Practice in fielding should be undertaken as part of the regular routine.

Special mention must be made of the bowling of R. Cavan, who secured the honours with 45 wickets, at an average of 10.51 runs. This player has possibilities of success in the higher grades, and deserves promotion. Other bowlers deserving of mention are S. Gunson (18 wickets, avg. 14.06), whose services were unfortunately lost to the club after only 5 matches—G. M. Dunlop (18 wickets, avg 17.17), H. Jockel (17 wickets, avg. 14.29), and V. Trumper (15 wickets, avg. 16.33). The last named (V. Trumper) promises to develop into a very useful club bowler.

The batting honours were won by G. M. Dunlop, with 265 runs, at an average of 29.44 runs, and who also made the highest individual score of 75. Only two other players scored 200 runs, viz., T. McDonagh 203, and W. Wallach 200.

All the Shire matches were played away from home, with the exception of one match at Manly Oval, and in that case there was no play on the second day because of rain. The wickets generally were fair, though in some cases very bad, and it is felt that a better showing would have been made, as far as the batting was concerned, had all the wickets been good. At the same time, the experience gained by the younger members will stand them in good stead when they take their place (as some of them will) in the higher grades next season.
