

FIETY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT AND FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

To the Members of the Manly District Cricket Club.

Gentlemen,-

Your Committee of Management desire to submit for your consideration and adoption, the 57th Annual Report and Financial Statement.

Your club was represented by four teams; one in each of the respective grades. The actual playing result achieved was disappointing. The first eleven dropping from tenth to sixteenth position, the second eleven improving from sixteenth to fourteenth, the third eleven slightly improving from sixteenth to fifteenth, the fourth eleven finishing fifteenth, whilst the club was sixteenth in the Club Championship.

The chief weakness in the respective teams was the failure of the batting. Your Committee understand that the curator will make a special effort in the coming season to bring the practice wickets up to match standard, so that batsmen will have every assistance to show improvement.

SHORTAGE OF PLAYING AREAS.

The shortage of playing areas is another definite cause that is retarding the progress of cricket in this district. Your Club is now fifty-seven years old, and a search through its records show that as far back as 1907 the management committee made representations for further playing areas. The present Council has received a special committee as a deputation on this matter, and was informed of the difficulties under which your club is laboring, but at this juncture its intentions cannot be ascertained.

Last season your third and fourth team played at Manly Oval only six and four times respectively out of twenty-five playing dates. The position is serious, and your Club will continue to fight to improve its standard of cricket till another turf wicket is made available to its members.

CONGRATULATIONS.

Your Committee extend hearty congratulations to Paddington, winners first grade, Western Suburbs second grade, Glebe third grade, Waverley fourth grade; Western Suburbs, club champions, Ryde "A" shires, Northern Districts "B" shires, Glebe Poidevin-Gray competition. Congratulations, also, are offered to the winners of the respective divisions in the local junior association, viz.: North Manly "A," Narrabeen "B," and French's Forest "C" team.

FIRST GRADE REVIEW.

At the conclusion of the 1933-34 season, an examination of performances gave hope that an improvement would be shown last season. This hope was not fulfilled. As a team it did not play the cricket expected of it, and the players did not show that form of which they were capable. Perhaps if some of the earlier games had been won the morale of the side would not have been lost.

Congratulations to S. Coltman, who secured the batting average and the aggregate. As an opening batsman, he was a success. His innings of 40 not out (batting through the innings) against Northern Districts was a performance full of merit. He also scored 71 against Mosman and 74 against Waverley.

L. Byrne justified the confidence the selectors placed in him. His innings of 69 against Waverley and 44 against Randwick, was the result of solid and intelligent batting. The experience he has gained should assist him considerably next season.

A. Ross, the Captain, displayed solid batting and splendid fielding. His catch that dismissed A. Marks, the Randwick player, was a gem.

L Gwynne scored a fighting innings of 79 against Marrickville.

L. Wood, after scoring a century in the Poidevin-Gray Competition, was promoted and did reasonably well. At the latter half of the season he opened the innings, and his 52 not out against Waverley was a good effort. Possessing keeness and determination, he is ever ready to listen and learn to improve his cricket.

W. Bassett secured the bowling average. His efforts against Gordon

and Northern Districts on fast wickets were very good.

W. Gagie obtained the greatest number of wickets and bowled the most overs. He was the stock bowler of the side, and displayed best form against Waverley and Northern Districts.

Although the figures of V. Trumper are not impressive, there is no doubt of his ability to bowl, and with the experience already gained

his bowling should improve next season.

The fielding generally was sound enough, but never brilliant. What a glorious sight to watch smart fielding—and how often does a fine catch or a brilliant run-out alter completely the whole state of the game!

SECOND GRADE REVIEW.

The second eleven improved from sixteenth to fourteenth position. The runs for totalled 2517 for 173 wickets, average 14.54, as against 2558 runs for 100 wickets, average 25.50.

The result obtained was disappointing. It, however, retrieved itself later by winning the last three games against strong teams. Doubtless had this team struck a winning vein earlier in the season it would have been much higher in the competition.

The batting average was won by B. Sutton with 24.20, and R. Byrne secured the aggregate with 254 runs. Two centuries were registered. 116 by S. Coltman against St. George, and 106 not out by G. Lough against Northern Districts.

The most consistent batting in the latter stages was that of H. Tompson, who, coming into the side for the last three matches, scored 6, 27, 46, 31, 45, and 4. A left-hand batsman and a keen club player, he should make many more runs next season.

E. Winter's score of 51 against N. Districts was a match winner. It is also pleasing to report the improved wicketkeeping of this player.

C. Searle compiled 70 against University, while M. Phillipps played his best innings of 53 against Petersham. J. Yeldham batted solidly as an opening batsman in the latter part of the season.

The outstanding bowling performances were recorded by V. Trumper, who secured 9 for 34 and 5 for 32 (14 for 66 in the match) against Waverley. This was indeed a magnificent effort that greatly assisted the side to record its first win of the season.

The greatest number of wickets was shared by H. Cooke and C. Hayman, with 17 each.

THIRD GRADE REVIEW.

Your third team won four matches, losing four outright and

three on the first innings, while three were drawn.

While not a satisfactory performance, it must be taken into consideration that no less than thirty-one members played in this team, brought about by a policy of looking for talent, adopted by the selectors.

R. Wheatley, who captained the side in a majority of matches, made useful scores, while G. Rosa, who in past seasons has given good service to the Club, secured the aggregate. His innings of 75 against St. George and 80 against Northern Districts were fine efforts.

The finest tenth wicket partnership was played by C. Lucas and W. Lynch, of 61 in 21 minutes against Petersham. In this match H.

Tompson also played a nice innings for 68.

D. Fraser, the colt of the team, in his first appearance on turf wickets, had a successful season. He invariably opened the innings and also kept wickets. It is pleasing to report that the club has other young members like D. Fraser.

One of the finest innings of the season was a century scored by G. Lough against Waverley. Going in fourth wicket down, he

carried his bat for a chanceless innings of 101 not out.

C. Lucas was the all-rounder of the side, he made useful scores and also bowled well, especially against Northern Districts and Randwick. H. Cooke, coming into the side late in the season, also bowled well with his left arm slows.

V. Trumper bowled in magnificent fashion against University, taking 8 wickets for 27 runs, and obtaining the "Hat Trick." He also

secured the average and the greatest number of wickets.

Despite defeats. admirable team spirit, worthy of your Club, was sustained by this team throughout the season.

FOURTH GRADE REVIEW.

This team, formerly playing in "B" Shire competition, was not successful, but, considering it was one of the youngest in the compe-

tion, an improvement is expected next season.

L. Bevege, J. Cope-Smith, and P. Trim finished in the first three places on the batting list. Two seasons ago, while still at school, these boys joined the Sun-Palmer Coaching Class. Their cricket improved so rapidly they won places in this eleven. Their entry to District Cricket has indeed been satisfactory.

G. Lewis, another young member, played an excellent innings of against Petersham. This player has good defence. R. Lancaster

also scored 65 in the same match.

The second wicket partnership of 88 against Northern District was made by two colts, L. Bevege and J. Cope-Smith. This was the best of the season.

L. Carr-Boyd bowled well, especially against N. Sydney, and J. Bodimeade bowled his medium pace deliveries accurately. W. Haw-

kins, W. Hoy, and P. Trim bowled well at times.

This eleven played only two matches at home. When the second ground is made available to your Club, care will be taken that more home matches are allotted this eleven.

POIDEVIN-GRAY MATCHES.

This team put up a creditable performance, winning four matches and losing two, finishing third in the division. Its deeds are gratifying and encouraging to your Committee, because of the talent in the district of cricketers under the age of 21 years. Indeed, the win over N. Districts, the side with seven first grade players and last season's winners, was an excellent performance.

L. Wood (Captain), H. Fraser, H. Carruth, and L. Byrne bore the brunt of the batting. L. Wood scored a century against Mosman. The bowlers, J. Creagh, J. Bodimeade, H. Carruth, and W. Lynch bowled well.

The team work was good and the fielding keen, there being some nice catches made. The catch by wicketkeeper D. Fraser that dismissed the N. District batsman, Miller, and the run-out by P. Trim of Fallowfield in the same match were glorious features of play worthy of mention.

It is pleasing to report that the majority of this team are well under the age of 21 years, and should be available for selection in this competition for many years to come.

JUNIOR AND SCHOOL CRICKET AND COUNTRY VISITORS.

As in former seasons your club placed its wickets and nets at the disposal of all local schools and the Manly and Warringah Junior Cricket Association, free of charge. Country visitors also availed themselves when in Manly of practicing with members.

FINANCE.

Financially the past season has been highly satisfactory, owing to a great extent to the amount of £50 grant received from the N.S.W.C. Association. There is a surplus of receipts over disbursements, amounting to £70/7/7 for the season. Expenditure has been cut to the minimum to allow of this surplus being made, and so carry forward a fairly healthy balance for the coming season.

CLUB STATISTICS AND RECORDS.

For the information of members, records and statistics have been prepared for the last 25 years. Records were made to be broken, and it is thought the publishing of these should be an incentive to members.

SUN-PALMER COACHING SCHEME.

Arrangements were again made with Messrs. F. J. Palmer and Sons, in conjunction with the Manly Council, for the coaching on turf wickets of schoolboys in the district, between the ages of 10 and 16 years. Considerable interest was displayed, and over 100 boys attended the class. Already some of the boys have made a showing in the lower grade. Your Committee desire to register its support and thank Messrs. P. Paul, of F. J. Palmer and Sons, G. Lowe, J. Randell, and L. Gwynne, for the interest and assistance extended the boys

N.S.W. CRICKET ASSOCIATION BY-LAW.

For the information of the members, attention is drawn to an extract of the above by-law, which reads:—Any member of a district club changing his place of residence to within the boundaries of another district club, shall notify the secretary of the association within seven days of so doing, together with his full address and date of taking up residence at that address."

MANLY OVAL.

It is pleasing to report the improved condition of the playing area. Great credit is due to curator W. Gagie, who displays an interest in the work. It is understood that the Council's surveyor will take fresh levels, to discover any depressions in the wicket before next season commences.

PRACTICE.

The practice at the nets was again successfully controlled by Mr. G. Lowe, Assistant Honorary Secretary and Honorary Coach. The thanks of your Club is due to this energetic worker for cricket. It is noted that some members did not practice regularly. Next season it is hoped, with improved facilities, more attention is given to systematic practice by all players.

PORTRAIT—LATE C. B. COCHRANE.

During the year a framed portrait of the late C. B. Cochrane was obtained by the Club to commemorate his memory, and is now on view in the top room in the pavilion. His record was as follows:—Member from 16th August, 1907, Honorary Treasurer from 14th July, 1911, Honorary Iife Member from 3rd July, 1929, Member N.S.W.C. Association from 4th July, 1912, to date of his death, 7th July, 1932.

WELCOME HOME BALL.

A Ball was held under the auspices of the N.S.W. Cricket Association at David Jones Ltd., to welcome this State's members of the successful 18th Australian Eleven. Your Club was well represented at an enjoyable function, with a party of fifty.

DELEGATES.

Messrs. R. A. Oxlade and L. W. Gwynne, your delegates to the N.S.W. Cricket Association, were regular in their attendance at meetings. Mr. Oxlade was again elected chairman of the executive and re-elected chairman of the Australian Board of Control. It is worthy of mention that he has served continuously on the executive committee of the Association since 1913, and on the Australian Board of Control since 1915. This is indeed an excellent record of administration for the game.

Your Committee also desire to congratulate Mr. Gwynne, who was appointed Manager of the successful N.S.W. Colt's Team that toured

Northern New South Wales and Queensland.

It is pleasing to report that the President, A. W. Green, Esq., has now recovered from indifferent health, to take his place on the Association. His presence at the monthly meeting in May last caused enthusiasm among the delegates.
