## FIFTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT AND FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

Gentlemen,—

Your Committee has much pleasure in presenting for adoption the 58th Annual Report and Financial Statement.

First and foremost the most gratifying feature of the season's operations was the distinct advance shown on the previous season's form by all four teams, the Club advancing from 16th position to 13th in the Club Championship. Undoubtedly, more keenness was shown by the players and the will to win was shown right to the end of the season, when, with the winter sports rapidly approaching, and players consequently being unavailable owing to this factor, full teams were fielded and three out of four teams were successful in the last round. The Committee adopted a policy of fostering as much enthusiasm as possible and was rewarded by the players co-operating in every way. Young players were given every encouragement, and this policy is expected to bear fruit in the near future, whilst special mention must be made of the improvement of several members who graduated from the Sun-Palmer Cricket Coaching School.

### CONGRATULATIONS.

Hearty congratulations are extended to our neighbours, Mosman District C.C., upon securing the 1st Grade and "B" Shire Premierships. Western Suburbs 2nd and 4th Grade Premierships, Randwick 3rd Grade and Club Championship, Marrickville "A" Grade Shire, and Gordon Poidevin-Gray Shield. Congratulations are also extended to the winners of the various competitions conducted by the Manly and Warringah Junior Cricket Association, viz.: "A" Grade, Queenscliff; "B" Grade, Balgowlah Footballers; "C" Grade, Mona Vale.

Reviewing the activities of the 1st XI, the most noticeable feature is the improved position in the Competition Table of this team. Definite team work was noted and this to a certain extent off-set some weakness in the batting which, though improving, is still not up to the standard hoped for. However, it was much better than in the previous season. The fielding on the whole was excellent, and it is pleasing to note that the keenness shown in this respect was the subject of favourable comment on many occasions.

To W. Gagie, our congratulations are offered on his magnificent form with the ball throughout the season, at all times his length and direction was all that could be desired. His feat of obtaining 60 wickets at an average of 14.9 runs per wicket was the outstanding performance in this Club's cricket for the season, and these figures gained the average and aggregate honours for him. V. Trumper bowled very well, but unfortunately, for an



injury sustained in the middle of the season, would have in all probability considerably improved his figures. He must be classed as a fast bowler of promise. Only two other bowlers comprised the main attack, viz.: G. Austin and B. Adrian. The former proved a useful opening bowler on occasions, and could always be depended upon to trouble the batsmen. It is pleasing to note that Bruce Adrian showed signs of reproducing his old form.

B. Cook, L. Byrne, and C. Harris were the most consistent batsmen, the big hitting of the first named being seen to advantage on many occasions. Byrne, an opening batsmen, is still improving, and big things are expected of this player in the future. C. Harris reproduced his old form, and his ability to score at a fast rate was of great value. Mention must be made of the great century innings of L. W. Gwynne against Gordon, and of the many big scores to his credit, this must rank with the best. The club possesses a very promising colt in Neville Hemsworth, who is expected to develop into a wicketkeeper of more than ordinary ability. This, together with his batting, which is rapidly improving, should put him in the front rank of players before very long.

Three outstanding performances by this team were the outright wins over University and North Sydney respectively, and the win on the first innings against Gordon. In the first case, University secured a lead of 11 runs on the first innings, and totalled 149 in their second attempt, leaving 160 runs to be made in 114 minutes. These were compiled in 94 minutes for the loss of three wickets. In the match with North Sydney, the wicket on the first day was affected by rain, and, thanks to some excellent bowling by W. Gagie, supported by G. Austin, a first innings lead was obtained. Gagie again bowled well in the second innings, and an outright win was secured. In the match against Gordon, the team was set a score of 336, and, thanks to the aforementioned knock of L. Gwynne of 100, Austin 55, Harris 47, valuable assistance by Byrne and Cook, and a stand at the critical moment by Adrian and Tompson, the runs were obtained. It is worthy of mention that W. Gagie secured 13 wickets against North Sydney. There were a number of fine partnerships during the season, the best being 132, by Austin and Gwynne, against Gordon, and 105 by Coltman and Cook, versus St. George.

Although this team did not improve its position in the Competition Table, it played many closely contested games, and from a team point of view showed it was on the up-grade.



As in the 1st XI, the honours go to a bowler in the person of J. Yeldham, who, however, can be classed as an all-rounder. This player, with his slow bowling, captured 43 wickets at a cost of 14.63 runs per wicket, winning the bowling honours for the aggregate of wickets and averages, and he also scored most runs with 326. In one instance, against Western Suburbs, he batted undefeated throughout the innings. A performance which is worth attention is that by H. McConnell, who, in his first match with the club, scored 105 runs, a very fine feat, and also a very rare one for a new player. A schoolboy in D. Fraser, a product of the Sun-Palmer Coaching School, batted very well, and his future progress will be noted with interest. In the 3rd Grade Match against Gordon, he batted through the innings for a score of 58 n.o., and repeated the effort with 46 n.o., versus Northern Districts. A. Grundie, a slow left-hander from the Juniors, shows promise, and, with further development in his batting, is expected to become an excellent all-rounder. His bowling against Northern Districts was splendid. E. Winter secured most catches with 11, and in the latter half of the season kept wickets and performed brilliantly. A fine last wicket partnership of 56 runs in 20 minutes was recorded by Hayman and McConnell against Gordon.

This team was one of the youngest ever fielded by this club, and, as the majority had little or no experience of turf wickets and grade cricket, success did not often come their way. Nevertheless, they finished well, winning three out of the last four games (one outright) and drawing the other. This augurs well for the coming season. The fielding, however, was bad, and this will need strict attention next season. A praiseworthy feat was achieved in the match with North Sydney, whose first innings closed at 103. With 8-90 in reply, the position became tense. J. Pitt joined W. Hawkins, and this pair, by forceful cricket, carried the score to 204 without being separated. These runs were scored in 62 minutes, Pitt being 67 and Hawkins 50 when the innings was declared closed. Another century partnership was that between Bevege and Lewis in the second innings of the match with Western Suburbs, when 106 runs were added in 52 minutes, Lewis scoring 52 and Bevege 67 n.o. when play ended. It is worthy of note that the above instances were performed by junior members of the club.

G. Lewis scored most runs with 306, and batted very well throughout the season. N. Saville, a left-handed opening batsman, is to be congratulated upon winning the battering average. A most creditable innings was played by W. Wallach of 103 n.o. against St. George. This player was ever ready to step into the breach to render assistance. W. H. Bassett led the side and showed that he is still a wily bowler, and an object lesson to young slow bowlers. He played in only eight matches and captured 44 wickets at a cost of 15.84 runs per wicket. Great advancement as a bowler was shown by P. Trim, a slow left hander, who won the bowling average honours with 13.52 for 23 wickets. J. Pitt, right hand medium pace, secured 35 wickets at 19.22, and should develop into a good all-rounder. He is a product of the M. and W. Junior Cricket Association, representing that body in the "Daily Telegraph" Shield Competition. D. Gowanlock, another left hander, is also a colt who should be encouraged in every way.

According to the Competition Table, this team did not experience a very successful season, but careful study of the figures given above will direct attention to the fact that the matches provided close finishes. B. Cook led the side, and headed the batting aggregate. Against Northern Districts he scored 131 runs, hitting six sixes and twelve fours. He also



scored 62 against Waverley. Other good performances were: G. Lewis, 62 v. Randwick, and N. Hemsworth, 53 v. North Sydney. The bowling was shared by W. Lynch, H. Carruth, J. Coxon, and A. Grundie, and all performed well. The team work was good, and, with the majority of the players available next season, this, together with the experience gained last season, will stand them in good stead for the future.

### **GENERAL.**

Team secretaries were appointed for each team in order to relieve the Captain of many minor duties which debar him from giving his undivided attention to his position. Notices as to selections were also issued by the Team Secretaries to the players chosen in the particular teams. The scheme was very successful, and should be retained in future seasons. To those members who acted in this capacity, the club extends hearty thanks.

### **REPRESENTATIVE HONOURS.**

Representative honours were gained by Bruce Cook, who was selected in the N.S.W. Colts team to play Queensland Colts, and distinguished himself by compiling 94 runs. This was an excellent debut. He also represented N.S.W. 2nd XI against Victoria in Melbourne, and again batted well.

### **SUN-PALMER CRICKET COACHING SCHOOL.**

It is felt that this scheme is of great value to this Club, and already young players who have had the opportunity of receiving coaching at the hands of the competent instructors are making their presence felt in the lower grades. Our thanks are extended to the Coaches and the sponsors of this scheme.

### **GROUNDS.**

The improvement to the Manly Oval mentioned in the last Annual Report has been maintained, and the ground compares more than favourably with other suburban ovals. Thanks are due to the Curator, Mr. W. J. Gagic, for his untiring efforts to make the Oval what it is to-day.

Once again we must report on the shortage of playing areas in this district. For too long has the lack of another ground been, to a certain extent, responsible for the low standard of cricket in this Club, and if we are to learn from the experience of other clubs who at one time suffered under the same disadvantage as ourselves, our cricket will not improve as it should. Clubs fortunate to possess more than one ground are emphatic that their standard of play improved immeasurably as a result of an influx of new members in consequence of the additional ground enabling more games to be played at home, and thereby reducing loss of time and cost to the player. Travelling, when one is a member of a grade club possessing only one ground is a heavy item. Last season our 2nd, 3rd, and 4th Grade teams, in all played six matches on the Manly Oval and THIRTY-THREE away. There is no doubt that the great amount of travelling incurred by



our lower grades is the one reason why more young players will not become members. Without young players coming on each year, no club can progress, and if this Club is to maintain its valued prestige it is imperative that the obstacle confronting these prospective members must be removed. It is to be hoped that our efforts in this regard will be successfully finalised in the near future.

### **PRACTICE.**

Under the supervision of Mr. G. W. Lowe, practice was carried on as usual, but there are still a number of members who do not avail themselves of the facilities provided by the Club. Players are asked to attend more regularly in the coming season. Coaching under Mr. Lowe's tuition was again a feature of the practices, and we are indebted to this gentleman for his untiring and enthusiastic efforts to improve the standard of play in the Club.

### **LECTURES.**

Mr. G. L. Garnsey, Official Coach to the N.S.W. Cricket Association, assisted by Mr. G. Borwick, International Umpire, gave a lantern lecture to a large gathering of members, juniors and supporters, early in the season, and it proved to be instructive and interesting. Mr. Garnsey also attended a meeting of the 1st XI, when various tactics and plans were discussed, and these, it is pleasing to say, were successfully put into operation later on.

A State Selector, Mr. Albert Vincent, also lectured during the season on various aspects of the game, and delighted with some reminiscences.

To these gentlemen we extend our hearty thanks.

### **OTHER MATCHES.**

For the first time for many years, visits were made to various country centres, the first being at Windsor, when a strong team easily defeated the local side. A visit to Wollongong over the Anniversary week-end proved very enjoyable, and although our team was defeated, the trip was an excellent one in every respect. On the day of the match, our team was entertained at lunch by the opposing side, the Wollongong Waratah C.C., who did everything to make our stay enjoyable. A match was also played at Gosford against the Industrial School, and resulted in a draw. The team was entertained at lunch, and formally welcomed by Mr. McGuinness, Deputy Superintendent, supported by Mr. C. Staunton and Mr. MacDougall, and replied to by Messrs. Coltman and Wallach, who expressed the team's thanks for the hospitality extended. The team was again regaled at tea after the match.

Our usual Annual Match against the N.S.W. School Teachers was greatly enjoyed. We also entertained teams from Goulburn and Harden respectively.

Unfortunately, our match against the visiting Victorian School Teachers on the Oval had to be abandoned owing to rain.

A keenly contested game was played against the N.S.W. Coaching Team, who won the match on the first innings.

### **DELEGATES.**

Your Delegates were regular in their attendance at all meetings, and Mr. Oxlade was again elected Chairman of the Executive Committee and a Delegate to the Board of Control. He was also elected Chairman of that body. Mr. L. W. Gwynne, Proxy Delegate, also attended one meeting.
