FIFTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT AND FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

Gentlemen,—

Your Committee has much pleasure in presenting for adoption, the 59th Annual Report and Financial Statement.

Your Club was again represented by four teams in the competitions conducted by the N.S.W.C.A. and although it is with regret that we have to record a bad falling off in the positions occupied by the 1st and 2nd XI's it is with feelings of pleasure, and a sense of security in the Club's future that we note the great improvement in the strength of our 3rd and 4th Grade teams. These sides were composed of colts and it is indeed heartening to the Club officials to perceive that the policy that has been followed in recent years of building up the playing strength by young players is indeed bearing fruit and it is felt that in a year or two the Club will be in a position to field a first grade side that will test the best in Sydney. Mention of this policy was made in the last year's report, although the result may be slow it is at least sure and it will be seen that the building up of the Club from a playing point of view will only come to fruition by hard work on the part of players and officials 'alike. Players, especially have a duty to perform, and that is the playing of the game in a way which will do honour, firstly to the game itself, secondly to their Club and thirdly to the district they represent. Cricket should not be treated as a means whereby one can merely spend a pleasant afternoon in the sun, but a game in which the player should endeavour to give every ounce of his physical and mental strength from the first ball bowled to stumps. By these two means alone can one expect to become a valuable unit of the side. Surely, this grand old game of ours is worth it.

A regrettable feature of this teams cricket, was the falling away from the standard achieved in the previous year. At the commencement of the season hopes ran high and it was fully expected that at last the Club possessed a 1st Grade XI that would be a force to be reckoned with. After victories in the first two rounds as the result of splendid batting, backed up by sound bowling and fielding the enthusiasm among

members and supporters knew no bounds and possibilities became unlimited. An outright defeat followed, yet in no way dampened the keenness of cricket enthusiasts. The next match showed that although the bowling could be stronger the batting strength showed signs of being the best the Club had produced for many years. At this juncture, however, the fielding for some unaccountable reason, became very bad and had such an adverse effect on the side for the rest of the season, that the team fell away in all departments of the game and ultimately became the "Wooden Spooners." A most unenviable position. To drop from 10th to 16th position in the Competition Table after a promising start is very disappointing, but it is felt that the players comprising the personnel next year will go on to the field with the fixed intention of showing our supporters and indeed all followers of cricket in Sydney, that Manly can be placed at the other end of the Competition Table.

The team was unfortunate in losing the services of B. C. Cook owing to an injury shortly after the commencement of the season but in spite of his limited appearances he again succeeded in winning the batting average. A welcome addition to the batting strength was N. Sneddon who returned to the Club after several years sojourn in the country. His batting was always fairly consistent. The Captain, W. S. Coltman materially improved on last year's display and headed the batting aggregate.

Congratulations are extended to a recruit from the country in the person of J. Lincoln, a left hand medium pace bowler, who secured most wickets and headed the bowling averages. W. Gagie again bowled well, but in common with the other bowlers suffered severely from bad fielding. V. Trumper, again out of action for a while through an old injury and B. Adrian completed the attack.

In reviewing the past season, it is with regret that a disappointing season is again recorded. Although the team was comprised of experienced players, it failed to live up to its paper strength. As in past years, the side would be placed in a fairly strong position, only to see success thrown away at a critical juncture. This should not be so, as the majority of the personnel have been playing Grade Cricket for a number of years. However, few teams enjoyed their cricket more or played the game in a keener spirit than this team. Their keenness was, in fact, deserving of a better fate.

The batting was very weak, only two players having averages over twenty. G. Austin headed the list as well as scoring most runs. He was closely followed by L. Wood. The bowling average was won by H.

Cooke, followed by J. Yeldham, who also secured most wickets. L. Carr-Boyd and G. Austin also bowled consistently and well. In the main the fielding was quite satisfactory, but this, in conjunction with fairly accurate bowling, could not counteract the weak batting. Three promising colts turned out for the side in the latter half of the season, viz., P. J. Minnett, son of the ex-international, Dr. R. B. Minnett; E. A. Little, son of an erstwhile stalwart of the Club, and P. McDonnell, a promising wicket-keeper and batsman. These three players are expected to make their presence felt in the near future.

The Third XI showed an advance in the Competition Table, but by far the most interesting fact was the promise shown by the majority of the players. Led by an experienced player in the person of C. Searle, the players were encouraged to give of their best, and with this driving force in evidence, the team always gave their opponents a hard game. For years the 3rd XI has had to bear the brunt of the frequent changes in personnel which District Clubs have to face, but for the past season, efforts were made to place the same team on the field as much as possible. Although perfection in this regard was not nearly reached, the results obtained during the season prove that the policy fought for was as far as possible successful. There is, however, still room for improvement.

The batting showed an improvement over that of last season. G. Christie at last struck form with the bat, and in the latter half of the season became the most consistent batsman in the Club. Although he is to be congratulated upon obtaining the most number of runs for the whole of the Club, it was the manner in which he obtained his runs that brought forth praise. Although his bowling fell away from that of last year, it was good enough to suggest, together with his batting form, that the Club now possesses an all-rounder who shows great promise. N. Saville and W. Hoy also showed good form, while J. Gallagher, in his first year with the Club, proved his worth and the judgment of the Selectors, by giving some splendid batting displays following upon his success with the 4th XI. The brunt of the bowling fell upon F. O'Donnell, a slow-googly bowler who showed considerable improvement. He is to be congratulated upon securing most wickets. W. Hoy, another slow bowler, also bowled well, and these two players could always be depended upon to trouble the opposition. An interesting bowler was N. Colless, who showed distinct promise as a medium-pace bowler. He should be closely watched in the future.

The Fourth XI also advanced in the Competition Table. This team was once again led by W. Bassett and showed itself to be a formidable side. Although like the other teams the batting was inconsistent, several good performances were given. The side, with one or two exceptions, was composed or very young colts, in fact the majority were schoolboys and also still attending the Sun-Palmer Cricket Coaching School. L. Bevege, who secured the batting aggregate batted very confidently throughout the season and should earn promotion during the coming year. J. Gallagher also batted well and was promoted to the third XI where he met with success. J. McCabe, a country player, proved to be a find and shows particular promise. W. Hawkins also batted well and should now have the necessary confidence to enable him to make use of the ability he undoubtedly possesses. E. Smith, up to the time he left the Club to play 1st Grade G.P.S. Cricket, batted with all coolness of a veteran. He is an opening batsman and in one innings for his school, opened and scored 139 runs against Newington College. He shows great promise. W. Bassett covered himself with glory by breaking a Club record and obtaining 97 wickets. The previous best stood to the credit of the late Frank Brand with 79 wickets secured with the 3rd XI of 1922-23. Mr. Bassett was not only distinctly unlucky in failing to obtain the coveted goal of 100 wickets, but should have gained more by reason of the fact that many chances were missed from his bowling. Fielding is where matches are mainly won or lost and we stress particularly to our young players, the necessity for strict attention and furtherance of their ability in this department of the game.

Once again, the Manly Oval was the subject of great praise from visiting teams upon the excellence of the wickets and fielding surface and we congratulate the Manly Council upon its possession of an asset

which is a credit to the Municipality, while our special thanks are extended to the Curator, Mr W. J. Gagie for his efforts in doing everything possible for the convenience of the players. We are indeed proud of our Oval. After many years, efforts to obtain a second ground in the District have at last been successful, and this, we think, is the greatest tonic the Club has had in this generation. A totally enclosed Oval has been obtained at Brookvale, and with the levelling of the ground and construction of turf wickets now completed, the ground will be ready for play at the commencement of the coming season. The Oval is within 15 minutes tram journey from Manly and situated on the main Pittwater Road with the entrance opposite the tram line. To the Warringah Shire Council we offer our heartfelt thanks for the manner in which they have sympathetically viewed our big problem and for so kindly coming to our assistance at a time when it was most needed. It is the firm opinion of this Committee, that our Club will now advance from strength to strength as the influx of new members, especially from the Shire, as the result of the lessening in travelling expense, will mean strong competition for places in next season's team and this, in itself, will provide a higher standard. It is sincerely hoped that a large number of young players from the Manly and Warringah Junior Cricket Association will be assailing the Grade ranks in the coming season.
