SIXTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT AND FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

Gentlemen,—

The Committee of Management has great pleasure in presenting the Sixty-eighth Annual Report and Financial Statement for consideration and adoption.

The War is over and the game of Cricket, which requires a peaceful atmosphere, will again be played on Ovals and Village Greens throughout the English speaking countries. Victory has been won and it is right that we should rejoice and acclaim the valour of our fighting men who, by their unselfish efforts and the wise leadership of Statesmen, have made it possible for us to continue playing our great game. Yet our rejoicings have been saddened by the knowledge of the gaps in the ranks of some of our finest young men. Our records show that there were one hundred and fifteen enlistments, six of whom have given their lives.

We honour them all, especially do we think of those who will return no more. They will be remembered by us and their names will be placed on the records of the Club for all time.

It is also pleasing to welcome back members from Active Service more matured and seasoned, to take their places in the respective teams. Before next season commences the rest of them should be back with us.

This is the second occasion in a generation that a call has been made on the young manhood to fight for freedom and Australia, and they have not failed us. It should now be the duty of each of us to realise that wars do not pay, and to strive and work for a permanent peace, eliminating the causes of wars. No better foundation for such a task could be introduced to the economic life of the world than the basic fundamentals of the game of cricket—"Team Spirit and Team Work."

The season completed six years of the most difficult period in the history of the Club.

There is no intention of dwelling too much on these difficulties; suffice it to say that the game of Cricket requires much preparation, and the difficulties of obtaining equipment such as cricket balls, bats, etc., and finding players to fill teams, were genuine. The Committee therefore thanks members, supporters of the game in Manly, for help, co-operation and patient support, during those six troublesome years.

Six teams were placed in the field, and they finished in the following positions:—1st Grade, 15th; 2nd Grade, 13th; 3rd Grade, 15th; Shires XI, 8th; Club Championship, 14th; A. W. Green Shield, 1st in Division; Junior XI, 5th. This is not satisfactory, and despite the return from the services of some promising young players, much more effort and work is necessary to increase the standard of play.

The Committee therefore desires to draw attention to some of the cardinal features that are retarding the progress of the Club. Firstly, the

general field play, which includes outcricket and running between wickets needs considerable improvement. This can be done if each player will make an effort to become physically fit by taking a course of exercises and by constant attention to advice and regular attendance at the practice nets. Secondly, it is a considered opinion that excessive surf bathing prior to playing a match impairs the efficiency of the player, and is not in the best interest of the Club. Next season it is suggested that each player enter with keenness and enthusiasm into a hard competitive year of cricket, which should bring success to himself and credit to the Club.

FIRST GRADE.

The first team won three matches on the first innings, lost eight on the first, lost one outright, and two matches were drawn. Runs scored were 2590 for 157 wickets, average 16.49, while runs scored against were 2976 for 130 wickets, average 22.89.

BATTING.

The batting of the team revealed a weakness. Too many players would fail after getting a start, resulting in poor partnerships, the bright exceptions being V. Brown and N. Thomas, who figured in the following opening partnerships: 40 against Randwick, 53 v. Petersham, 115 v. Wests, and 51 v. Paddington.

Individual performances are worthy of special mention. B. Cook won the average and aggregate. He scored a splendid century of 120 against Northern Districts, 55 n.o. against Gordon, and 53 against Central Cumberland.

V. Brown showed a welcome return to form, and in the matches against Western Suburbs and Paddington he played two brilliant innings of 85 and 83 respectively. This player delights with his aggressiveness against fast and medium paced bowling.

B. Adrian, who captained the team at the latter part of the season, scored a bright innings of 96 against Paddington and 50 against Marrick-ville.

A. Walker did not do himself justice with the bat. He has developed an impetuosity of playing at the pitch of the ball too early in his innings. His best was a score of 60 against Paddington.

J. Gwynne compiled an innings of 64 against Marrickville, figuring in a partnership with B. Adrian of 90 runs.

R. Jones scored 50 against North Sydney.

E. Little made double figure scores between 11 and 35 on 13 occasions.

BOWLING.

The bowling strength on paper appeared formidable, but only one few occasions was it successful. It is true that the fieldsmen dropped many catches, but the bowling was not always used to the best advantage, and consequently did not function as a combination.

A. Walker secured the best average; he secured in the last six matches 25 of 32 wickets taken, including a magnificent performance of 8 for 68 against Western Suburbs. He also bowled well against Gordon, securing 5 for 20. By constant attention to practice this player has a bright future as a bowler.

F. Ring, who obtained the most wickets, was used as the stock bowler of the team. He bowled 182 overs and was rightly called the unlucky bowler. Many chances were missed off his bowling, and many batsmen

were beaten by the ball only to miss the stumps by the narrowest of margins. Ring was the essence of accuracy, averaging 4.14 runs per over throughout the season. He did a grand job for his team in this, his first season with the Club. His best figures were 5 for 39 against Northern Districts, and 6 for 47 against Glebe.

T. Brooks bowled well against Mosman and Paddington, while E. Robinson, who returned to the side in the last match, secured 4 for 28 against University. N. McGilvray obtained 4 for 39 against Randwick. C. Hayman retired after the sixth round; up till then he captured 13 wickets; 3 for 22 against Glebe, and 3 for 29 against Marrickville were his best efforts.

FIELDING.

There were some bright spots in fielding, but generally it was below First Grade standard. Out cricket, particularly catching and ground fielding, is so vital to the success of a team that more attention should be paid to it. Captains and Selectors responsible for the success of the teams should consider in future those cricketers with fielding ability if this Club is to progress. B. Cook, F. Ring, and N. Thomas made 7 catches each, A. Walker 5, N. McGilvray and B. Adrian 4 each, while V. Brown was the outstanding outfieldsman in the team.

The team had three Captains, N. McGilvray led for the first six matches, B. Cook for two matches, and B. Adrian for the last six matches. N. McGilvray relinquished the position under medical advice, and B. Cook for private reasons.

SECOND GRADE.

This team won six matches, including two outright, and lost eight matches, including four outright, winning more matches than any other team. The four outright losses, however, were a contributing cause to its lowly position on the competition table.

BATTING.

The batting of the team was not solid, and, like the First XI, its batsmen would get a start only to break down on reaching double figures. J. Crawford scored the highest score of 50 against Central Cumberland. E. Drew scored the greatest number of runs, while J. Crawford (325 runs) and W. Davey (203 runs) were other batsmen to consistently support him.

BOWLING.

The team was strong in bowling, with K. Magor and R. Bennett (fast), M. Davis (slow leg break), R. Jones (medium pace), N. Dunsford (off break), and J. Erickson (left hander) producing plenty of variety. D. Hanlin played only three matches, and he, too, displayed ability as a bowler.

K. Magor, in taking 31 wickets, won the aggregate, being followed by R. Bennett 24, N. Davis, with 21 wickets for a fine average, 9.76 runs a wicket.

D. Hanlin won the average with 7 wickets at 9.71 runs a wicket.

Best bowling performanes were R. Jones, 5 wickets for 43 against Balmain and 4 for 21 against Mosman; M. Davis, 7 wickets for 42 against Gordon and 5 wickets for 59 against Northern Districts; K. Magor, 4 for 12 against Gordon, 4 for 9 against Glebe; R. Bennett, 4 for 33 against Randwick and 5 for 50 against Petersham; N. Dunsford, 3 for 19 against Paddington; J. Erickson, 3 for 19 against N. Sydney; D. Hanlin, 3 for 15 against Paddington.

FIELDING.

The fielding and catching was not up to standard, one exception being M. Davis, whose ground work and returns from the field were outstanding.

THIRD GRADE.

This team, comprised chiefly of young players, finished fifteenth, winning five matches (one outright), drawing two, and losing seven, including five outright. It is of interest to note that in three of the five outright defeats, the team lead on the first innnigs.

BATTING.

- F. W. OBrien, who returned to the Club after an absence of a few years with the Armed Forces, secured the aggregate. He was unfortunate in the last match against Glebe to miss a century by two runs.
- J. Muncke won the batting average, and made some nice scores, including 80 against Western Suburbs.
- D. Martin, another member to return after service with the Armed Forces, scored 59 against Petersham. D. James scored 55 n.o. against Randwick, and A. Wilkins scored 49 against Mosman.

BOWLING.

I. Wheeler, who captained the team throughout, secured the greatest number of wickets, while G. Ball, who won the average, including two splendid bowling performances of 9 for 19 against N. Sydney and 7 for 18 against Glebe. A. Martin, in securing 23 wickets, bowled very well, and should be an asset to the Club in the future. He secured a "Hat Trick" against Glebe.

FIELDING.

The fielding was not up to standard. Too many catches were not taken and some of the fieldsmen developed the bad habit of wandering out of their positions in the field. D. James kept wickets and caught 9 and stumped 4, totalling 13—a good performance.

SHIRES XI.

In the early part of the season this team, weakened by many changes, performed rather poorly, but after Xmas became a more settled team, which won the last four matches, two of which were won outright, improving its position on the table, and finishing in eighth place.

The team created a record score of 9 for 392 against Ryde, at Brookvale, in 3½ hours.

BATTING.

Centuries were scored by K. Brown 121, R. Johnson 110 not out, whilst scores of 50 and over were made by W. Morgan 94 and 66, W. Hoy 50, A. Evans 81, J. Noblett 56.

The batting average and aggregate was won by W. Morgan, with 344 runs, at an average of 43.00.

BOWLING.

W. Hoy, who captained the side, obtained the most wickets and bowling average with 31 wickets, at 15.87 per wicket.

FIELDING.

The fielding improved as the side settled down, whilst enthusiasm and keenness were maintained until the final match.

Some of the players played so well that they are worthy of advancement next season.

Your Committee welcomes the return of old members to the team, and the new members, including W. Morgan, K. Brown, J. Horlock, N. Johnstone, and J. Noblett, all of whom performed so well in this, their first season with the Club.

A. W. GREEN SHIELD.

It is with regret that your Committee reports the loss in its division in the A. W. Green Shield Competition after leading by ten points in front of Gordon. A protest was lodged by another club against playing R. Watson, which was upheld by the N.S.W. Cricket Association on the grounds of residential qualification.

This lad, who is 14 years of age, like all other members of the A. W. Green Shield team, was selected from the Coaching Class, of which he has been a member since he could handle a bat. The coaches feel that legislation should be provided by the N.S.W.C.A. to meet such cases.

The team played six matches, winning five (two outright) and losing one on the first innings. Runs scored for were 845 for 41 wickets, average 20.6, and runs scored against were 772 for 83 wickets, average 9.3, a high marginal difference of 11.3 runs per wicket. J. Burke was the mainstay of the team, being the best all-rounder. He won the aggregate and the average, and finished second in the bowling. G. Morrow secured the most wickets and won the bowling average. Other players to assist were R. Watson, F. Martin, B. O'Loughlin, J. Muncke, P. Goodall, D. Shenstone, and P. Gwynne.

In the last five years this Club's Green Shield teams lost only four matches. It has won three competitions, was third, and led by ten competition points in its division last season.

JUNIOR XI.

This is the second season that your Committee has entered a team in "B" Grade competition of the Manly-Warringah Junior Association. The team is confined chiefly of young players who are not quite ready for grade cricket. The team was ably captained by C. Hattenfels, a senior member of the Club and a member of the Committe, and while he is in charge of this young team your Committee is confident that the boys will be taught the game in a sportsmanlike manner. We are indeed grateful to Charlie for the sacrifice he is making to carry out this important phase of the Club's activities.

The team finished 5th in the competition, scoring 108 points. We offer congratulations to Manly Catholic "B" team, winning the competition with 168 points.

BATTING.

The batting average went to J. Muncke, with an average of 40.57. His highest score was 77 for the season. B. Watkins made the most runs. He obtained 598, including 96, the highest individual score. F. Martin scored 53, and later in the season played a useful innings for the 2nd XI. He also captained the A. W. Green Shield team, and kept wickets splendidly. This lad has a bright future. B. Bond did not come on as expected. He, however, may have a more successful season next year. J. Ellsmore made a score of 50 on one occasion. He displays keenness to do well, showing the family tradition for the love of cricket. D. Hain did not have sufficient practice at the nets, and hence his failure with the bat.

BOWLING.

J. Weir won the bowling average, while A. Page captured the most wickets. He was ably assisted by P. Goodall and R. Milligan, who bagged 30 wickets each. J. Dower and P. Philpot, two very young members of the team, obtained 13 and 4 wickets respectively. They both bowl leg breaks, and are good fieldsmen, Philpot in particular, and in addition are promising batsmen, with J. Dower more advanced at the moment. These two boys should play for Manly 1st XI in the future. R. Milligan made a "hat trick."

Some of these players should force their way into higher teams next season.

CONGRATULATIONS.

Hearty congratulations are extended to the Gordon D.C.C. on winning

the First Grade Competition and Club Championship.

To Waverley, Western Suburbs, Lane Cove "A", Burwood "A", and Paddington on winning the Second and Third Grade, A and B Shires, and Green Shield respectively.

MANLY COUNCIL.

The Committee desires to express its appreciation to the Manly Council for providing an opportunity for sporting bodies to meet in conference and discuss matters for the general improvements of the Manly Oval area. At that conference your Sub-Committee submitted suggestions for the improvement of the Oval, which met with general satisfaction. We trust therefore that the work, which should be commenced not later than early September next, will be carried out by the Council, as the Club cannot function successfully until the Oval and wickets are placed in good order.

WARRINGAH SHIRE COUNCIL.

It is pleasing to report that the Councillors continue to cater for cricket in the district by making such marked improvements on the playing area at Brookvale Oval. It should not be long before the growing population in the Shire will be fully appreciative of this fine Oval.

COACHING CLASS.

The class completed its fourteenth year of active coaching for boys between the ages of ten and sixteen years. The Coaches have now adopted a policy of concentrating on boys in the age groups between ten and thirteen years, as it is at these ages, boys are receptive to instruction on correct method more quickly. Eighty boys registered, and the average attendance was sixty each Saturday morning.

DELEGATES.

Your Delegates were regular in their attendance at the meetings held by the N.S.W.C.A. Mr. R. A. Oxlade was re-elected Chairman of the Executive Committee and Chairman of the Australian Board of Control. This is the eighth occasion that he has been appointed to the highest administrative office that cricket offers in Australia. A distinguished honour to himself and this Club. Mr. Gwynne attended two Association meetings as proxy, vice Mr. McGilvray.

MANAGER—COMBINED A. W. GREEN SHIELD TEAM.

Mr. G. W. Lowe was appointed by the N.S.W.C.A. to manage a combined team to visit Newcastle. J. Burke was selected as a member of that team. Mr. Lowe also gave invaluable help to the N.S.W.C.A.'s Coaching Scheme, held during the Christmas vacation, and supervised practice for Interstate teams at the Sydney Cricket Ground.

COMMITTEE MEETINGS.

CONCLUSION.
