Your Club was represented by a Team in each of the Pirst, Second and Third Grade, "B" Municipal and Shires Poidevin-Gray Competition and A.W. Green Shield Competition. A Team was also entered in the "B" Grade of Manly and Warringah Junior Cricket Association. The Teams finished in the following positions: - the Pirst Eleven finished 8th compared with 15th, the Second Eleven 14th as against 13th, the Third Eleven 16th as against 15th, the Shire's Eleven 10th as against 8th.

It is gratifying to record the improvement of the First The Team showed its best Cricket for years and won some good games. Had the wheel of fortune turned the right way the Team must have finished still higher in the Competition Table. E.Robinson could not play till the eighth round on account of a broken bone in his wrist. This was a great loss to the Club as this player proved the all-rounder of the Team, finishing fourth in the batting and third in the bowling. His batting is aggressive - hence his popularity. His innings of 46 against Northern Districts, of 6 fours and 2 sixes in 29 minutes was a gem.

B.Cook did not play in all matches and consequently broke the continuity of match practice. He scored a useful 90 against Waverley. This player still has years of good cricket in front of him.

B.Adrian, who captained the side, finished sixth in the batting order with an average of 25.36. He scored a dashing century of 123 against Mosman in the record scoring match.

J.Burke, who played two matches during the school holidays, showed skill against Glebe in scoring 49, and a good temperament against Western Suburbs in scoring 28. This player has a bright future.

D.Frager started off with a splendid century against waverley but for some unaccountable reason he lost his form. His ability is too well known and better things are expected from him next season.

S. Coltman, the Team's wicket-keeper played a useful innings of 52 against N. Sydney, while E. Smith's innings of 55 against St. George and 45 against Mosman, showed form on those occasions.

A. Walker is a better batsman than his figures indicate. T. Brooks, who finished 2nd in the batting average showed batting ability above the ordinary, and with A. Sharp and F. Ring, made the tail wag on occasions to the benefit of the side.

J. Hodgson is a batsman capable of better figures.

A. Walker headed the bowling with 53 wickets at 11.04 each. A magnificent performance. It was indeed unfortunate for him that he strained a muscle in his back at the commencement of the season and could not bowl with effect till the sixth round. However, in the following seven matches he bowled brilliantly, capturing 44 wickets. His figures were 7 for 77 against Western suburbs, 0-25 against Glebe 2 for 68 against Marrickville, 6 for 1 against Randwick, (lst. innings), 5 for 45 (2nd. innings), 4 for 45 against North Sydney 6 for 52 against Northern Districts, 1 for 8 against Cumberland (lst. innings), 7 for 6 (2nd innings). He secured the greatest number of wickets for all clubs and his name will be placed on the association records for all time. D.Halstead on his discharge from the R.A.A.F. won the batting average and proved the most consistent batsman. He has lost none of his forcefulness and should go higher next season.

H.Dale won the aggregate and scored the highest individual score. This young player, up from the juniors for the first season shows great promise.

R.Brown proved the mainstay of the batting and a reliable opener. He is capable of better figures. He proved a popular member of the Team.

K. Watkins showed some of his skill he was displaying prior to his joining the Services. He is a steady and reliable batsman.

R.Watkins was the most improved batsman. From the 11th position in the batting order he became a reliable opener and in this position he played his best innings of 51 N.O. against Northern Districts.

W.Morgan, who captained the Team after the elevation of G.Lewis, showed form during some of his innings. He proved a keen leader of the Team and should gain a position in this capacity next season.

C. Watson. This young player shows great promise. If he will exercise a little restraint he will go a long way in the game. Like his father, he has some excellent on side shots.

J.Blades proved a promising batsman and wicket-keeper and a good Club man. He should gain higher honours next sesson.

G.Lewis who captained the Eleven for a part of the season proved a steady and reliable team man. Two good innings when the Team was struggling for runs showed his true worth.

R.Watkins bore the brunt of the bowling and captured the most wickets. He keeps a good length and moves the ball occasionally from the batsman with good results. He has a future as a bowler.

W. Hoy captured 27 wickets and bowled well on occasions. There is no keener player.

G.Morrow, who did not play till later in the season on account of academic examinations, won the batting average. His best innings was 75 NOT OUT. This young player, who shows intelligence in playing his cricket, will soon force his way to higher teams.

C. Watson is another player with a future. He made the only century, scoring 106. J. Blades, A. Kelly and J. Noblett are players who showed form on eccasions, while V. Taylor made the greatest number of runs in scoring 359.

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POIDEVIN-GRAY TEAM

631 runs were scored for the loss of 31 wickets, average 20.30 as against 734 runs for 48 wickets average 15.30. The Team finished with 16 points.

The outstanding features were the bowling of A.Walker who secured the most wickets and won the average. The all-round ability of J.Burke and the batting display of J.White and W.Barry who scored 112 NOT OUT and 97 respectively at Mosman. R.Watkin's bowling and his improved batting were also noteworthy. C.Watson also showed promise with the bat. With a more even share of luck this Team could have won this competition; as it was, they were runners-up in their division.

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A.W. GREEN SHIELD TEAM.

547 runs were scored for the loss of 42 wickets, average 13.36 as against 757 runs for 36 wickets, average 21.02. The side won one match and lost three.

Manly Oval not being available until after the end of the competition, this Team did remarkably well under the circumstances. Only once were they completely dismissed during an innings, and at no time were they outplayed. They were a very young side, some of their ages being around twelve and thirteen years. At least nine of the boys will be available next season, and with the experience gained a successful season is anticipated. Much, in the future, is expected from D. Shenstone, P. Philpott, J. Dower, N. Verity and P. Hanlin. An unfinished partnership of 80 runs against North Sydney at Brookvale between Peter Philpott (age 12) and Peter Hanlin (age 14) was an excellent performance.

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JUNIOR TEAM. (M.& W. J.C.A.)

This Team was captained and managed by Charles Hattenfels. He was the mentor and guide of the team and the great interest he displays in his boys, at a sacrifice to his own cricket was a demonstration of a true sportsman. To Charles the Committee is deeply grateful for his work.

R.Stevenson, who won the aggregate with 398 runs was the outstanding batsman. C.Ball, who won the average improved with every match. J.Dower, who finished fourth, is one of the Club's most improved colts and more will be heard of this boy in the future. Peter Philpott, who was the baby of the Team, (not 13 years old,) secured the most wickets viz; 33 at the lowest cost of 12.72 per innings. He bowls a well controlled leg break and amazes with the splendid length he keeps. He is also a splendid batsman and a remarkably good fieldsman. The Coaching Class has never had a more talented and natural cricketer than Peter. The Committee trusts that he will keep up his cricket as his future is assured.

F.Borchers, J.Bowder, R.Milligan, D.Hain and F.Martin all showed ability on various occasions.

FINANCIAL REPORT

In spite of the abnormal conditions of War Time Cricket your Committee, during those trying years made every endeavour to build up Club Finances for that happy occasion when all Members returned from the Services to take their rightful places in village Cricket Teams.

So successful were their efforts that the cash balance for the commencement of season 1946-1947 just concluded, was £106-16-0.

Much of this cash balance had been accumulated by continued use of poor quality materials and careful exercise of the purchase of only the bare necessities to carry on each season and the utmost in support from local enthusiasts. The work of Mr. G.W.A.Lowe was of inestimable value.

This season therefore, commenced with the necessity to purchase as much new materials as possible including new practice nets.

What was not taken into calculations was the unfortunate loss of Manly Oval as main venue for local matches until the end of the season.

This made serious inroads in estimated income from the support of Associate Members and resultant revenue.

Brookvale Oval proved a splendid second ground, but except for the St. George Match played there, did not receive the public support hoped for.

The very healthy appearance of the balance sheet is therefore due entirely to the true interpretation of the Club's financial position by the Executive and Members of the N.S.W.C.A. who increased the general grant issued to all Clubs, by £40 to assist in the rehabilitation of your Club's finances after its unusual season, and thanks are expressed to your Delegates for their work in this regard.

Included in the cash balance is the sum of £100, a special purposes grant from the N.S.W.C.A. This sum will be held in trust for such particular purpose and the account will be adjusted by special deposit at the direction of your incoming Committee.

The coming seasons prospects appear to be excellent for a normal years working, but the continued support of enthusiasts is of paramount importance and the jealous pride that every Member should have in the continued welfare of the Club can best be expressed by meeting all obligations promptly and the exercise of care and concern over Club property and materials.

A very happy and successful season to all Members.
