SEVENTIETH ANNUAL REPORT AND FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

Gentlemen,-

The General Committee has very great pleasure in presenting the seventieth Annual Report and Financial Statement for consideration and adoption.

Seventy years of Cricket. What a record! Your Club prides itself on the fact that it is, with the exception of the Sydney University Club, the oldest established Cricket Club in New South Wales, and that in its long history it has always played up to the best traditions of the game. The occasion therefore, warrants some reference to the history of the Club, which is dealt with at the back of this report.

Five teams were fielded, included in which were three grade teams, one Municipal and Shire team, and one team in the Manly and Warringah Junior Cricket Association. In addition, teams were entered in the Poidevin-Gray Competition and the A. W. Green Shield Competition.

FIRST GRADE REVIEW.

It is a great pleasure to report the splendid Cricket played by the first eleven; it advanced from eighth position last season, to equal fourth, winning five matches on the first innings, losing three on the first, while six were drawn. This is the highest position reached for twenty-five years, when on that occasion in 1923-24 season the team finished runner-up. 2970 runs for 106 wickets, average 28.01 were scored for, and 3149 runs for 116 wickets, average 27.15, were scored against. 62 points were scored.

The season started off with a great fillip with the inclusion of the international Keith Miller in the side. He was, however, only able to play in two matches, on account of big cricket requiring his services. The team was strengthened with four players, N. Sutherland, C. Papayanni, J. Burke, and M. Gilmer. Your Committee takes this opportunity of officially welcoming them to the Club.

C. Papayanni kept wickets magnificently and was instrumental in assisting to improve the general field play and the bowlers. There are few better "Keepers" in Sydney, and he is undoubtedly a great asset to the Club. It is to be hoped he will meet the eye of the N.S.W. selectors next season for higher honours.

J. Burke, formerly a product of the Manly coaching class, and Sydney Grammar School all-rounder, came into the side after leaving school in December last. He won the batting average with the fine average of 80.75, and beat the twent-one year old record held by L. W. Gwynne, obtained in 1926-27.

Your Committee desire to heartily congratulate young James Burke on his splendid performance in this, his first season in the senior grade. He shows sound defence and an excellent temperament for a lad so young and with more experience will improve his field placing and develop power in his shots. A bright future is predicted for him, and if he reaches the top of the ladder it will be gratifying to the coaches of the Saturday Morning Class.

E. Robinson is another player who had a most successful season. He secured the most runs, scoring 551 runs with an average of 50-09. His aggressiveness at the wickets always pleases; hence his popularity with the spectators. Eddie is a product of the Manly Junior Association, and must be considered probably the best player the Association has sent to the grade side.

V. Brown and D. Frazer, the opening batsmen, made some good innings individually, but registered only one good partnership of 61 runs in 62 minutes against Balmain. V. Brown played some very good innings, and pleased by attacking the bowling early in the innings, and placing his team into a match winning spirit.

Other batsmen to assist were B. Cook, M. Gilmer, and J. Gwynne. The bowlers also assisted to make the "tail wag" when required, particularly N. Sutherland and T. Brooks.

D. Frazer scored 104 n.o. in 110 minutes against C. Cumberland, J. Gwynne 109 in 124 minutes against Petersham, and C. Papayanni 114 n.o. in 75 minutes against North Sydney. E. Robinson 103 n.o. v Paddington, 77 minutes.

FIELDING.

It is pleasing to report that the fielding shows a high standard of efficiency. Looking back on the fielding of our opponents, Wests and Gordon, one must realise what an asset fielding is to a team. The summary of catches are shown as follows :—

took 8 catches and 5 stumpings, D. Frazer 3 catches and 3 stumpings; C. Papayanni did not take up wicket-keeping till the 5th round.

BOWLING.

The following players obtained four or more wickets in an innings:-T. Brooks, 4 for 38 v Wests, 4 for 46 v Paddington.

K. Miller, 4 for 39 v North Districts.

N. Sutherland, 6 for 131 v Waverley, 5 for 66 v St. George, 4 for 41 v Petersham.

A. Sharp, 6 for 72 v Balmain, 4 for 63 v C. Cumberland.

J. Burke, 4 for 62 v Paddington.

J. Hodgson, 4 for 40 v University.

J. Burke won the bowling average, although the brunt of the attack was confined to T. Brooks, E. Robinson, and N. Sutherland, the last named capturing the most wickets. A. Sharp bowled well early in the season, but lost form. J. Hodgson and J. Gwynne assisted also with their medium paced deliveries.

The Team was led by B. Adrian at the early part of the season. N. Sutherland replaced B. Adrian in the 6th Round. Your Committee thank N. Sutherland in his first season, and at the same time records the services rendered by B. Adrian to the 1st XI.

SECOND GRADE REVIEW.

This team finished 12th on the competition table, registering 55 points, against 14th place last year—a slight improvement. Four matches were won, two of which were won outright, while six were lost (one outright) and four drawn.

BATTING.

J. Hodgson won the batting average with 37.50, playing a fine innings of a century, 103. It is pleasing to see that this fine stroke maker is improving his form. He eventually was promoted to the 1st XI.

K. Van-Epen played some fine innings, mostly as an opening batsman. He played a nice innings of 91 against West. Suburbs. He has a large variety of strokes and should go higher in the Club. M. Hayman, E. Smith, W. Winter, H. Waide, K. Watkins, and S. Coltman, all made scores during the season at different times. Team work appeared to be lacking, however, and the players could not consolidate a position sufficiently well enough to maintain a match winning sequence. B. Taylor, a former S.H.S. player, did not do himself justice. Much more success is expected of this young player in the future.

BOWLING.

The brunt of the bowling fell on the shoulders of K. Magor, R. Bennett, W. Winter, and K. Watkins. K. Magor again took the most wickets. This is the third occasion that this player has recorded the most wickets in this grade. K. Watkins won the average with 11.90, while W. Winter, who shows great promise with his left arm deliveries, captured 20 wickets.

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The team had several captains during the season, which is not good for the building of team work. There was, however, a definite improvement in the team in its last series of matches.

THIRD GRADE REVIEW.

This team came 13th, compared with 16th the previous season. Four matches were won, three lost, four lost on the first innings, and two drawn. It was unfortunate the match against Paddington could not be completed at Brookvale as the team scored over 300 runs and would have been hard to beat.

BATTING.

D. Bensley, who played his first season with the Club, won the batting average. He was a product of the Collaroy Club the previous season. This player has great possibilities and should go farther in the game. H. Watson is a most attractive batsman. He scored the only century for this team. R. Horton showed some of his pre-war form and won the aggregate. Other players to show good form were B. Watkins, G. Lewis, F. O'Brien.

BOWLING.

The brunt of the bowling was done by R. Watkins, G. Lewis, G. Morrow, and R. Elrington. R. Watkins took the most wickets with 26, and his brother Ken won the average with 12 runs a wicket. K. Watkins secured 5 for 46 against Marrickville, whilst G. Morrow took 4 wickets for 26 against University.

CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP.

The Club finished 10th on the Club Championship table.

MUNICIPAL & SHIRES TEAM.

This team finished 9th on the table compared with 10th the previous season. G. Humphries won the batting average, while V. Taylor won the aggregate. M. Boyd won the bowling average and R. Britten captured the most wickets, taking 39 for the season. He also took a hat-trick. H. Frazer and A. Evans also bowled well. The team was captained throughout the season by J. Blades, and it has been reported the players enjoyed their cricket.

POIDEVIN-GRAY COMPETITION.

This team finished 5th in the "B" Division. J. Burke won the batting average with 69.50, and broke the record previously held by J. McCabe. W. Barry came second in the batting average, while G. Morrow won the bowling average, and D. Shenstone captured the most wickets.

A. W. GREEN SHIELD.

This team went through undefeated and finished second to Mosman in the North Division. It was a young team and most of the key players will be available for some seasons to come. J. Dower won the batting average, and B. McManus won the bowling average, taking the most wickets. P. Philpott was perhaps the best allrounder.

JUNIOR TEAM, M. & W.J.C.A.

Your Committee again entered a team in the Manly and Warringah Junior Association on the malthoid wickets. The team was again managed and captained by Charles Hattenfels, who takes a very great interest in these lads. There were quite a number of young lads who showed promise in these matches. Among the best to perform were C. Ball, who won the aggregate with 344 runs. N. Verity, P. Philpott, D. Hain, D. Ellis, J. Dower were the most successful with the bat, while P. Philpott captured the most wickets with 46, average 11.87, closely followed by B. McManus, with 34 wickets, at a slightly better average of 10.41. C. Ball made a century of 110.

CONGRATULATIONS TO SUCCESSFUL CLUBS.

We desire to congratulate Gordon D.C.C. on winning the 1st Grade competittion and Club Championship, 2nd Grade to Western Suburbs, 3rd Grade to Gordon, Poidevin-Gray and A. W. Green Shield to Paddington, Balmain "A" Shires and Glebe the "B" Shires.

REPRESENTATIVE HONOURS.

Keith Miller, who came to your Club last season, played in all Test matches against India, represented the State in all Sheffield Shield matches. He was eventually selected to tour Great Britain with the Australian XI. We congratulate him and trust he will have a successful and happy tour.

Congratulations are extended to T. Brooks, who represented his State against Queensland, and made the Southern tour to play against Victoria and South Australia in Sheffield Shield cricket.

N. Sutherland, V. Brown, and E. Robinson represented the Club for the Association in matches against country centres. J. Burke was chosen to represent a metropolitan colts team to tour the country.

COACHING CLASS FOR SCHOOLBOYS.

This useful work was again successfully carried out at Manly Oval each Saturday morning by Messrs. Lowe, Randell, and Gwynne. This season completes 15 years continuous service. The class is the oldest and perhaps the most successful coaching class in the State. Another crop of young "Teen Ages" have been turned out to carry the banner of cricket for the future.

MANLY OVAL.

Your Committee is appreciative of the efforts of Manly Council in sponsoring the game on the Oval. It however is concerned about the foreign grass called "Crab Grass," that has got into the Oval near the wickets. Your Committee offered "working bees" of club members to Council to assist Council to take this weed out, but the offer was not accepted although appreciated by Council. The weed must be eradicated as quickly as possible. Club Officials were shown many kindnesses by Council Officers.

BROOKVALE OVAL.

Your Committee is grateful to the Warringah Shire Council for providing turf wickets at Brookvale, particularly are we thankful for the practice wickets at the early part of the season, when the Manly Oval is unavailable. The outfield and wickets, however, were not up to the standard of It may be that the Oval is getting too much wear and previous seasons. tear during the Winter months, by playing on Sundays in addiition to the Saturdays. It is the considered opinion of your Committee that if solid repair work of the Oval does not go on after a heavy season of the Winter sport, the Council would eventually be troubled with a soil eroded area that would eventually not even be fit for Football. Top dressing and grass growing must be carried out during the Summer months. We thank Council Officers for their co-operation, and particularly do we record the services rendered the Club by E. Hatcher, the curator, who is keen on his job, and has expressed a wish to make Brookvale the best oval in Sydney.

MANLY & WARRINGAH JUNIOR CRICKET ASSOCIATION.

The cordial relationship that has developed between the Officials of the above Association and your Club Committee and Members was again in evidence last season. Two practice matches were arranged between teams representing the "Daily Telegraph" possibles. The "Martin Shield" possibles, and members of your Club. Both matches were played at the District Park, and considerably helped your selectors in their deliberations when grading the teams for the first two rounds. In addition the Junior Association made no charge for batting fees to the Club for these fixtures. We record our thanks to the officials of the Association.

MR. GEORGE LOWE.

During the part of the month of January last, Mr. George Lowe was appointed manager of country boys housed at the Sydney Cricket Ground for coaching. He made a great success of his job and presented an excellent report to the Delegates of the N.S.W. Cricket Association, which was very favourably received. In addition, he supervised the practice at the ground for Sheffield Shield players. All this work is done by Mr. Lowe in an honorary capacity and is much appreciated by the head body. In addition he carries out his coaching and other work for the Club. Since he joined in 1906 he has done an amazing amount of good work for this Club.

SOCIAL COMMITTEE.

A Social Committee was formed to carry out social activities for members. A christmas smoko was hailed as a success in December last, and a Golf Day held at Bayview was also a success. The Committee records its thanks to Mr. Bruce Miles, who acted as Honorary Secretary, and to Mr. F. "Bill" O'Brien, Honorary Treasurer. Both these two young members did excellent work on this Committee.

SOCIAL MATCHES.

On the 15th November, 1947, Newcastle Cricket Club played against a Club team at Brookvale, resulting in a win for the Club.

In February last a team from Richmond played against a Club side at Brookvale. This match was also won by the Club. Both visiting teams were entertained at luncheon as guests of the Club.

A social match, organised and captained by E. Darby, M.L.A., against a team, captained by former international W. A. Oldfield, was played during the Christmas festive season on the Manly Oval. It was a great success, many cricket lovers supporting the match to see old champions such as Tommy Andrews, Johnny Taylor, Bert Oldfield. Alf Jones, the former international umpire, and Warren Bardsley acted as umpires. Money to the extent of £45 was raised for Legacy and Food for Britain. It is the purpose of the Committee to sponsor an annual fixture of this character.

The Committee staged a match, at short notice, on Saturday, 28th March, for the Mayor of Manly's Olympic Appeal, raising $\frac{f6}{3}/6$ for the fund.

PRACTICE CAPTAIN.

Mr. Jack Ryan again supervised the practice at Manly Oval for Club members. He was assisted at times by Mr. Arthur Braddock. To both these gentlemen, your Committee records its grateful thanks for attending to such important work, and giving up so much time for the benefit of individual members and the Club in particular.

AFTERNOON TEAS.

The Committee express on behalf of the players its appreciation to Mesdames Lowe and Gwynne for organising groups of ladies to prepare afternoon tea for the players, umpires, and the Club supporters and visitors. This work is much appreciated and has now become an important part of the social activities of the Club, but the work is arduous on the two groups of ladies, and the Committee is hopeful of obtaining more groups next season.

AUDITORS.

We again record our appreciation to Messrs. J. L. Searle, F.C.A., and G. M. Dunlop, for acting as Honorary Auditors.

THE PRESS.

Your Committee is appreciative of the publicity given the game through the columns of the daily press. The rationing of newsprint is a reason for reduced publicity, but your Committee considers that the results of matches played in lower grade teams should reappear. To the "Manly and Warringah News" and "Manly Daily" we are indeed grateful, for supplying in their papers all the results of matches and the necessary publicity of Club activities.

FAREWELL TO KEITH MILLER.

In conjunction with the Mayor of Manly, your Committee gave Keith Miller a civic farewell in Manly Council Chambers on the eve of his departure to England with the Australian XI. It was a very happy and representative gathering of sportsmen from cricket and other sporting bodies. The Rugby Union Football Club, the Swimming Club, Sailing Club, Athletic Club, Manly Surf Club, Manly Junior Cricket Association. Umpires' Association, were all represented by their leading officials. In addition these bodies subscribed to the cost of the presentation. Apologies were received from the Manly and Balgowlah Golf Clubs. but handsome cheques were received. Other private citizens also subscribed. Mr. R. A. Oxlade presented Keith Miller with a suitable travelling trunk, and in a short and sincere speach Keith expressed thanks. 

HISTORY-1878-1948.

(Compiled by L. W. GWYNNE).

It is not the intention to present to members other than a brief report of the history of the club's seventy years of activity. It is quite possible that some items of importance may have been missed, but it would take many long months of research work to obtain a complete record. However, when the Club reaches its 75th year, some of the information appearing in this report can be brought forward.

In the early days cricket was played at Ivanhoe Park, site of the present oval, on a concrete wicket covered with matting, owned by the late Mr. Adrian, a generous, public-spirited gentleman. At his own cost he laid pipes to drain the ground. He eventually decided to sell the ground and, by arrangement with Mr. C. Hayes, the then Mayor and "father of Manly," the ground was purchased for the public. It is in the main due to the shrewd foresight of Mr. Hayes that Manly has its present beautiful ground. The Park having thus been secured, funds to enlarge and improve it were sought by Messrs. Trenchard Smith, C. H. Hayes, R. M. Pitt, and John Woods, £400 being eventually raised by public subscription. The late Hon. W. Bede Dalley, a fine sport, scholar and citizen, was generous to a fault, giving freely to all worthy causes. In this collection for the Oval he headed the list. In addition half the net proceeds of the old wildflower shows were devoted to improvements for the Park, organised by the Manly Club cricketers of those days. It is also recorded that the late Mrs. H. T. Robey contributed largely to the success of many functions held for park improvements. The laying of the oval was entrusted to an expert loaned by Mr. Ned Gregory, the head of that great cricketing family and first curator of the Sydney Cricket Ground, the turf used being obtained from Richmond. Since the formation of the oval improvements have been made from time to time, until at present, with its splendid natural location and surroundings, it is unsurpassed in any suburb.

Tents were good enough in the early days of Manly cricket; then came the old wooden pavilion, the plans of which were drawn by Mr. Trenchard Smith; this served club needs until the present structure was erected. Mr. W. S. Mitchell, when hon. treasurer, obtained consent to cater for life members at $\frac{15}{5}$ - each to start a fund for a new pavilion. In 1909, the Council agreed to erect a new pavilion, and the monies collected by Mr. Mitchell's efforts were handed over to Council as part-payment of cost. Mr. Mitchell also collected enough money to furnish the committee room for the Cricket Club. He was indeed a very keen and worthy official. To the Manly Council is due full credit for its co-operation and its decision also to erect fine training quarters at the back of the pavilion for footballers. The Metropolitan Rugby Union, Manly Rugby Union Football Club and Council, each contributing a share of the cost. (The pavilion and appointments are now out of date, but conferences have already taken place with Council and sporting bodies to prepare plans for constructing a new pavilion when the housing position improves.-Hon. Sec.).

On the formation of the Club in the year 1878, the office-bearers were: President, Mr. A. Hilder; Hon. Secretary, Mr. C. R. Smith; Hon. Treasurer, Mr. G. G. Hole. Since then the Club has had only two Presidents: the late Dr. David Thomas, who held office for twenty-five years, and your present President, Mr. R. A. Oxlade, who has held office for twenty-six years. Our sitting President therefore holds the record. He has represented the Club since 1910 (38) years) on the N.S.W. Cricket Association,

and has been chairman of the executive (N.S.W.C.A.) since 1913. In addition he has for many years represented N.S.W. on the Aust. Board of Control and on at least eight occasions has been selected as Chairman of that Board. Mr. Oxlade has given to Australian cricket, administrative service unsurpassed by anybody in Australia. The Club has had 12 Hon. Treasurers, the longest term, 21 years, held by the late C. B. Cochrane (1911-1932). There has been 17 Secretaries since the Club's inception, some of whom have done magnificent spade work. These included F. Trenchard Smith, Stan Ridge, E. Mack, D. Hogan, W. S. Mitchell, R. A. Oxlade, and G. M. Dunlop. Records show that many improvements were made during the time the abovenamed gentlemen held office. Your present Hon. Secretary, Mr. L. W. Gwynne, has been in office for 13 years, the longest on record. Mr. C. K. Hayman has been your Hon. Treasurer for the last eight years, and Mr. G. W. Lowe has acted as Hon. Assistant Secretary for eighteen vears.

From 1878 to 1893 social cricket was played, and amongst great cricketers participating were F. R. Spofforth, W. L. Murdock, and S. M. J. Woods. Outstanding matches were played against Dr. W. G. Grace's XI and Victorian XI's. In 1893 Manly entered 1st Grade Electorate Cricket. From 1894 to 1904-5 the Club played 2nd Grade cricket. From 1905-6 Manly was combined with Mosman, and played as Middle Harbour, with headquarters at Manly. In 1921-22, on the redistribution of boundaries, Manly again became a District Club.

Although not so successful on the field of play, the Club has on occasions had some measure of success. In 1902-3 season it won the 3rd Grade competition. In 1920-21 another 3rd Grade competition was won. In 1923-24 the 1st Team finished runners-up. In 1938 the Club won its first A. W. Green Shield competition and two subsequent competitions. Your Club has reaped the benefit, in a degree, to the success of these teams.

From 1878 till 1900 the following players assisted to make your Club. Apart from those already mentioned they were W. Hunter Smith, C. R. Smith, W. Frazer, F. Trenchard Smith, Harris Woods, G. G. Hole, F. Ridge, A. F. Hayes, S. Patterson, W. Walton, E. H. Mack, O. W. Rawson.

From 1900 to 1922 another crop of great players carried on. They were J. Randell, A. Ogilvy, W. H. Whiddon, F. Ridge, S. Ridge, W. Frazer, D. Reed, A. Buckley, C. Whiddon, F. Row, G. W. Lowe, D. Gee, J. Hodgkinson, C. Brownlow, W. W. Chapman, E. Bull, A. Little, G. Dunlop, K. Walton, J. D. Scott, F. S. Middleton, B. Kortlang, E. P. Woolcott, R. B. Minnett, Arthur Mailey, J. Searle, Snr., F. Anderson, J. Anderson.

From 1922 till 1948, in another 25 years of cricket, the following players assisted your Club: J. M. Gregory, R. B. Minnett, L. W. Gwynne, J. Randell, G. W. Lowe, R. A. Bubb, A. Freeman, C. A tribute to the various curators who have prepared the green swards over the years is here paid. The minutes show that J. Criddle was one of the first curators. J. Randell has had a lot to do with oval matters over his long membership with the Club. In addition to being easily the most successful bowler the club has produced, he supervised oval work, including the construction of the scoring board and the present sight-boards—J.M.R. has been a pillar of the Club for 48 years. A. Bashford and W. Gagie were others who made wickets. Those who had the pleasure of playing on wickets made by Harry Bray were indeed fortunate. W. Bunting, our present curator, was a member of your Club, and an active player prior to World War I. Your Club, in conjunction with Council, must do everything possible to assist him to bring the Oval to a high standard, for without good practice wickets and reliable wickets in the centre, there is little chance of your Club being able to fly a premiership flag over the pavilion.

The longest hits recorded as having been made at Manly were as follows:—Harris Woods hit a ball on the Manse outside the ground; Jack ("Ironbark") Woods hit a ball into a figtree near the Post Office on the eastern side of the ground; O. Rawson straight hit a ball into a house in Gilbert Park; Bruce Cook made a hit on the pavilion near the "Crow's Nest" off former international H. Hendry; Eddie Robinson hit a ball into the road between the Manse and the Soldiers' Club.

In the "Saturday Referee Pictorial," dated January 17th, 1914, a former officer of the Club, Mr. Adam Ogilvy, wrote: "There is no better sport than a Manlyite. True to name, Manly and triers every time. In victory modest; in defeat, giving credit to the other side as better men. No squeaking." The seed then sown has borne fruit. The same spirit exists to-day, and we trust may long continue, for there is no better place on earth than Manly and Warringah Shire for good sportsmen.

Finally, in completing seventy years of cricket, your Club is not unmindful of the splendid services rendered to Manly by, and the splendid cooperation received from, football, surfing, swimming, golf, tennis, sailing, and other sporting bodies, for advancing the interests of Manly and District. In addition, the concessions given by the Civic Fathers to every sporting body for the welfare of the District has always been in evidence, and may it long continue.

OLD MEMORIES.

The "Sydney Morning Herald" reported the match as follows :----

Lord Sheffield's Team versus Manly Club. February 11th, 1892.

A match was commenced yesterday, at Manly Oval, between 22 of the local players and Lord Sheffield's team, 12 in number. Mr. Lakeman, Vice-President of the Manly Club, welcomed Dr. Grace and his team on landing at the wharf. Mr. Harris Woods, the local Captain, won the toss, and decided to send the Englishmen in on a matting wicket. Grace and Sharp opened the batting to the bowling of Stan Ridge and Frank Ridge. In the first over Sharp played forward to S. Ridge, and was caught out at the wicket. Abel followed and was caught out in slips by W. Frazer, off F. Ridge, Stoddart came next, and, after a couple of singles had been scored, he was caught in the same way by W. Frazer, off F. Ridge. Radcliffe joined Grace, and, in attempting a single off a slip by Grace, was run out. (Four for nine runs).

Read filled the vacant crease and scored a couple of fours in his first over off S. Ridge, slipping one and driving another to the off. Grace ran a single off F. Ridge, and the overthrow going to the fence, and giving him 5. Read tried to play S. Ridge, but was clean bowled. 5-10-27. Peel was the next batsman, and Grace was missed in the slips by Cozens. The English captain attempted a big hit off S. Ridge, but did not get hold of the ball, and put it up in the slips, Cozens again missing it. Grace hit F. Ridge for 4, and then played him to the off. Harris Woods fielded the ball and Peel ran. Grace told him to go back, but the warning was too late, the fieldsman returning the ball while Peel was between the wickts. 6-17-48.

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England won by 38 runs on the 1st innings.

Lord Sheffield, to commemorate his visit, and in appreciation of the reception accorded him by the Australians, presented a handsome trophy, now known as the Sheffield Shield, to be competed for by the respective States.

Frank Ridge, still hale and hearty, and living in Manly, tells an amusing story about this match. Going in first wicket down after Hunter Smith had failed to score against Johnny Briggs, he was advised by his captain, Harris Woods, to play steadily till his eye was in. Unable to resist the first ball he received from Briggs, however, he belted it right out of the ground in front of the pavilion. At dinner that evening his father, who very seldom watched cricket, reminded Frank of the shot he had made that afternoon. He said: "Do you know, my boy, you very nearly hit your mother!" Frank was one of Manly's best batsmen; he played a splendid innings against Randwick in Second Grade in 1904, of 254 not out.

July, 1896-Death of Mr. A. Hilder, Club's first President.

July, 1897-Mark Mitchell elected a member.

July, 1897-F. L. Row won Club's batting average with 41.00.

- July, 1897—Vote of thanks to F. Trenchard Smith for his services to the Club.
- July, 1897—Additions to old pavilion were made on plans submitted by F. Trenchard Smith.

Sept., 1900-Full programme of cricket played on Farrel's Paddock.

Nov., 1900-J. Cridle resigned as caretaker of Manly Oval.

Dec., 1900-J. Randell elected a Club member.

Aug., 1901-D. Reed wins batting and bowling averages.

Aug., 1901-Oval drained and top dressed with couch sods.

Oct., 1901-Mr. J. Bonner presented the Club with a horse.

Dec., 1901-Smoke Concert to S. M. J. Wood, to celebrate his return to Manly.

March, 1902-Director of Botanic Gardens, Mr. Maiden, and Mr. Baker, Scientific Botanist of Technical College, strongly opposed ploughing

the Oval, on the grounds that (a) level of Oval would be destroyed; (b) result would be a copious growth of rubbish and weeds. (How

true is this advice !—Hon. Secretary).

Aug., 1903-D. Gee and R. E. Adrian elected Club members.

1902-03-Won 3rd Grade Competition.

Dec., 1903-Club colours were selected : light blue, dark blue and red.

March, 1904—The Club purchased 25 Club coats, 14 silk caps, 36 cloth caps, 25 sashes, 3 dozen ties, and 1 dozen hat bands.

Nov., 1904—Move to approach Mosman Council to construct practice wickets at Mosman Park.

- April, 1905—Advice that Minister for Lands approved the plans for a proposed Cricket Oval at Mosman. (Certainly an asset to Mosman to-day.—Hon. Secretary.)
- April, 1905-N.S.W. Cricket Association admits Middle Harbour Cricket Club to first grade competition.
- April, 1905-D. Hogan (Manly) and William Gordon (Mosman) were the new Club's first delegates to the N.S.W.C.A.

Aug., 1905-R. A. Oxlade elected Hon. Secretary 3rd team.

Oct., 1905-C. B. Cochrane elected a member.

June, 1906—Club endorses action of N.S.W.C.A. in making efforts to keep the management of cricket in constitutional hand and not proprietary clubs or irresponsible body of players. Aug., 1906-G. W. Lowe elected a member.

Aug., 1907-G. M. Dunlop elected a Club member.

June, 1908—Cap and blazer of Club was made with a badge of a "waratah" inserted in front of cap and pocket of blazer.

April, 1909—On the 9th day the present pavilion was officially opened by the Mayor of Manly.

Aug., 1909—Club vote £130 to Council for towards expenditure of new pavilion.

May, 1910-Erection by the Club of "Crows' Nest" above pavilion.

July, 1910-W. S. Mitchell resigns as Hon. Secretary, R. A. Oxlade elected.

July, 1910—Presentation of mounted ball and mounted bails to J. Randell and E. J. Long (wicketkeeper) for creating a world's record by taking 9 wickets in one innings, the batsmen being either stumped or caught.

Oct., 1910—Donation by Messrs. Bruce & Walsh of Pavilion Clock.

Sept., 1912—Club vote of £30 to Council for Oval improvements.

Aug., 1912—Club vote of 250 to Council for Ovar improvements. Aug., 1914—R. A. Oxlade elected member of Executive, N.S.W.C.A.

March, 1915—Club Committee supports Military Drill Company formed

under N.S.W. Rugby Union Scheme.

May, 1915—Alan Mitchell. member of Club's 1st XI killed at Dardenelles; he was first soldier from Manly to give his life in the war. The War Memorial Monument on Corso was erected by his father to perpetuate his memory.

July, 1915-A. Little elected a member.

July, 1915—W. Hunter Smith presented gifts of valuable old photos and records, which replaced some of the old records destroyed by fire 20 years previously.

Aug., 1917—Dr. R. B. Minnett, Arthur Mailey, A. J. Hopkins, J. D. Scott, and T. Waddy elected members.
