The Management Committee has pleasure in submitting the Seventy-seventh Annual Report and Financial Statement for consideration and adoption. In opening, it is fitting to state that this old established club has joined the name Warringah to its title, and proudly announces that it is now known as the Manly-Warringah District Cricket Club. The Warringah Shire is a very important part of our cricket territory and is greatly increasing in strength each year. A record number of teams namely eight (8) represented the club — one (1) into the four (4) grades, the Poidevin-Gray and A. W. Green Shields competitions of the N.S.W.C.A., one (1) the City and Suburban C.A., and a team of advanced coaching boys into the Manly and Warringah J.C.A. The result as regards playing success was indifferent, practically little change from the previous season. There is some satisfaction in knowing that the boys in the age competitions are more than holding their own, notably the Poidevin-Gray team, as they appeared again in the final, making their fourth time in the past six (6) consecutive seasons. Keith Miller ably represented the club in all Test and Sheffield Shield matches during the season. His captaincy, coupled with all-round ability, again considerably helped N.S.W. to retain the Shield. The appointment of Keith as Vice-Captain of the successful Australian team in the West Indies was hailed with satisfaction by members and the cricket-loving public alike. Much jubilation was evident when that complete young star, Peter Philpott, at last gained recognition. He represented N.S.W. in matches against England and Queensland, also acted as 12th man in the Victorian game. His efforts were most impressive, causing a number of good judges to remark that higher honours must come his way in the near future. At present a season in Lancashire League cricket is adding further experience with bat and ball successes. He intends returning to Australia before the commencement of the ensuing season. Congratulations are also extended to Tom Mulry in his appointment as Official Scorer, N.S.W. v. England fixture, at the Sydney Cricket Ground. We feel certain that his competent work gave much satisfaction to the Association. During the season Alan Rogers was nominated as a Vice-President of the club, and it was pleasing to note his acceptance of the position.

FIRST GRADE REVIEW

At the commencement of the season, this team looked particularly strong on paper, but the prediction was never fulfilled, mostly through lack of form of several members, consequently the success of the side was only mediocre. Furthermore the captain, Keith Miller, could not appear very often, as most of his time was occupied, representing the State and Australia. In all, fourteen (14) matches were played, of which four (4) were won, three (3) drawn and seven (7) lost. Our position barely changing in the competition table from the previous season; 2845 runs were scored for the loss of 134 wickets at an average of 21.23; whilst opponents totalled 2855 in losing 123 wickets, at an average of 24.26.

The most notable feature of the season, was Peter Philpott's consistent form with the bat. His innings were correctly and attractively played, and an object lesson to the younger members of the club. He aggregated 462 runs at an average of 51.33. Brian Taylor, next in aggregate 378 runs, an average of 34.36, also

played soundly, and the ensuing season should still see further improvement in this young batsman. Victor Brown, 306 runs, average 30.60, again played bright cricket in obtaining his usual quota of runs.

Unfortunately our acting captain, Eddie Robinson, suffered a loss of his usual form with the bat, nevertheless he again shone with the ball, taking the most number of wickets, 37, with the lowest average of 18.80 per wicket. Colin de Montfort came next with 20 wickets at 20.00. Then followed Peter Philpott, 22 wickets at 30.13 and Tom Brooks, coming with a late burst, 18 wickets at 33.83. This player also showed good defence when needed with the bat, and finished well up in the averages, 28.00.

The custodian, Warwick Davey, gave a very pleasing display, effecting 14 stumpings and taking 12 catches. A number of our younger members did not advance as expected, still we trust the experience will benefit them in the ensuing sason. Once again, our laxity in the field at most times, with few exceptions, also hindered our chances, and this is another feature of the game we will earnestly hope for an improvement.

Scorers of 50 or more were P. Philpott 102, 76, 72, 57, 53, B. Taylor 117 not out, 73, 63, J. Walker 73 not out, and V. Brown 66. Takers of 5 wickets or more in an innings were E. Robinson 7 for 57 (University), 5 for 55 (Waverley), 5 for 82 (Gordon), P. Philpott 8 for 63 (Nth. Districts), C. de Montfort 5 for 40 (Cumberland) and T. Brooks 5 for 44 runs (West. Suburbs).

We desire to convey our thanks to Mr. Clive Philpott for ably performing the duties of manager and Mr. Tom Mulry for again scoring in his usual efficient manner.

SECOND GRADE REVIEW

In spite of some excellent individual performances, this grade's overall result disappointed. Of 14 matches played we won 6, lost 6 and drew 2, finishing 8th in the competition table. Allowing that the team's balance was often upset by replacements to first grade, and other unavoidable reasons, (28 players represented seconds), it must also be noted, that the batting only too frequently lacked the determination to overcome early reverses. The brunt of the bowling fell to R. Haysom, M. Davis, G. Wearne and B. Cook, and to these players, primarily must go the credit for dismissing no less than 9 sides under 200 runs. They, and their supporters fully deserved their success. Our fielding lacked consistency. Outstanding exception being M. Davis, whose slip fielding throughout was first class. M. Mingay, J. Dower and B. Rothwell also showed they had not neglected this part of their cricket.

J. Nelson kept wickets for the major part of the season, and P. Nelson during earlier matches.

The team's captain was J. Hodgson, with J. Gurd deputising during his absence.

Best performances: Batting, B. Taylor 124 n.o., S. Toolin 97, J. Nelson 92, B. Cook 85, J. Gurd 72, J. Hodgson 63 and 56 n.o., N. Verity 60, B. Rothwell 59 n.o., R. Bright 58, and M. Davis 56. Bowling, R. Haysom 5 wickets for 59 runs, and 5 for 30, M. Davis 5 for 33, J. Dower 7 for 31, B. Cook 6 for 45 and G. Hooker 5 for 23 runs.

There is no reason why this team should not head the competition, but they must give their bowlers full time support,

and the batsmen acquire an aggressive determination to build a match winning total.

THIRD GRADE REVIEW

This team receded from 8th to 14th position in the competition table. Apparently the continuous alterations of the personel to represent the side did not help to consolidate the strength of team work that is so necessary for success. Four (4) matches were won, three (3) drawn and seven (7) lost. A total of 2157 runs were scored for the loss of 136 wickets at an average of 15.86, whilst the opposition totalled 2604 runs in losing 138 wickets at an average of 18.86. Young Bill Cook was on top of the batting with an average of 31.80, followed by Ron Watkins with 26,42. With the ball, Ian Barnes had excellent figures, 30 wickets at 11.40, then came Bob Doolan 20 wickets at 14.35, Graham Hooker 18 at 22.35 and Ron Watkins 17 wickets at 28.00.

Scorers of 50 or over were Bruce Avis 74, Barry Rothwell 66 and Bill Cook 52 not out. Takers of 5 wickets and over in an innings were I. Barnes 6 for 36 (Randwick), 5 for 25 (Balmain), R. Doolan 5 for 26 (West. Suburbs), 5 for 84 (Nth. Sydney), G. Hooker 5 for 55 (Cumberland), 6 for 143 (St. George), and the captain, Ellis Rothwell 5 wickets for 29 runs (Waverley). The wicket-keeping during the season was shared by Ray Bright, Pat Nelson and Rod Lloyd.

FOURTH GRADE REVIEW

This side registered its best position on the Competition Table for many years by finishing in 7th place, with 50 points. Much of the credit for this improvement is due to the opening bowlers, who gained success by attacking the stumps at every opportunity. Ken Waterhouse and Barry Veitch were the most successful in this department and registered many fine performances including six (6) wickets for 9, and four (4) wickets for 12 runs respectively, in the first innings of the Gordon match.

The batting continued to show improvement and had the team not suffered from frequent changes they would have developed more reliable combinations. Max Hayman scored most runs, 260, and the best batting average, 26.00, and Ken Waterhouse the leading bowling figures, 28 wickets for an average of 7.35. Rod Lloyd again showed good form as wicket-keeper, and is a valuable member of the club in this position. The fielding was satisfactory throughout, with the exception of a number of lapses in the slips position. The captain of the side was Max Hayman, and deputies at various times were Frank Collins, Alister Thompson and Len Soman.

CITY AND SUBURBAN

Being the initial season, this team did very well in winning eleven (11) matches, drawing three (3) and losing five (5). The total of runs scored were 1748 for the loss of 146 wickets, at an average of 11.97, whilst opponents lost 155 wickets in scoring 1655 runs at an average of 10.67. Bowling predominated, as is usual on half-day games. Harry Frazer performed most commendably, in dismissing 41 batsmen for only 9.12 apiece. Barry Veitch headed the average with 13 wickets at 5.84, then followed Colin Hooker 18 at 7.55, D. Spiden 13 at 8.00, and Arthur Evans 11 wickets at 16.81. Jack Blades made the highest score 79, most runs 188 and best average 23.50. Terry Smith was next with 154 runs at

22.00. Notable bowling figures were H. Frazer, 6 wickets for 8 runs (Commercial Travellers), 5 for 20 (Briars), 5 for 23 (Aloysius Old Boys), 5 for 17 (Bank of N.S.W.), and B. Veitch 6 wickets for 6 runs (Padd. Vets.). The wicket-keeping was in the hands of Terry Smith and Jack Blades. Alan Rogers and Colin Hooker mostly looked after the side during the season.

MANLY-WARRINGAH DISTRICT

This team of coaching class boys, playing on malthoid surfaces (against men, mostly), performed very well. Figures do not adequately express the position, as throughout the season a number were called upon to fill vacancies in the higher grades of the club. The main object of this competition is to give the lads valuable match experience, which greatly benefits them, when elevated in such cases. Six (6) matches were won and nine (9) lost, in scoring 2062 runs at an average of 13.65 per wicket, whilst their opponents totalled 2117 runs at an average of 12.37. Thirteen (13) year old Terry Lee amassed 383 runs, at an average of 25.53, with the highest score of 75 runs; whilst John Barnes of the same age, made 240 runs, averaging 24.00. Both lads filled vacancies that occurred at the last moment in grade sides. Tallish John Barnes, slow left-arm bowler also achieved creditable bowling figures by taking 32 wickets at 8.12 apiece. Slow leg break bowler Harold Redmond took 23 at 8.61. Another bowler of the same type in Wally Gale, 29 wickets at 12.10. The captain, John Edwards also had good figures, 26 wickets at 15.30 each. Paul Smith and Michael Fitzgerald shared the wicket-keeping during the season. We would exhort all the boys to constantly practice fielding and catching. The club is deeply indebted to Mr. Alan Lee and his good wife, for looking after the team during their matches.

POIDEVIN-GRAY SHIELD

As aforementioned, our boys again excelled in winning the "B" Division of this competition without loss, particularly as their all-round captain Peter Philpott was engaged elsewhere. after the second round. To play in the final four (4) times in the past six (6) seasons is no mean achievement, and although we were beaten this year by an exceptionally strong side in St. George, winners of the "A" Division, we were not disgraced. We heartily congratulate the victors in their excellent play, coupled with good sportsmanship. Alan de Montfort headed the batting with an average of 31.60. His grand attacking innings of 74 not out, embracing magnificent all-round strokes in the final game, clearly showed what this fine young player is capable of, and with that little more restraint, at the commencement of an innings, better things must come his way next season. Bryan Bradley, Ray Bright, Peter Proudfoot and Murray Mingay, all batted well, whilst Peter Philpott in two (2) matches took nine (9) wickets for 97 runs and Barry Veitch and Ian Barnes with fourteen (14) wickets each at low cost tend to show fine promise in the future. The fielding was keen, Alan de Montfort and Barry Rothwell being shining examples. Murray Mingay, in taking over the captaincy from Peter Philpott did his best to bring victory. Ray Bright and Rod Lloyd shared the wicket-keeping with credit. All members of the side with the exception of Peter Philpott are still eligible to play in this age competition next season.

A. W. GREEN SHIELD

Although we were unable to perform the "hat trick" by winning this competition for the third year in succession, still the lads did reasonally well, as they suffered only one (1) defeat in seven (7) matches during the season. They were unfortunate in losing a sequence of tosses, and under the existing rule, where a team can continue an innings in the afternoon, after occupying the creases all the morning, in a number of instances, there was not enough time left to force a win and a draw thereby resulted, giving only two (2) competition points. Seven (7) matches were played, of which two (2) were won, four (4) drawn and one (1) lost. Barry Rothwell batted excellently, securing 332 runs (7 short of the record), at an average of 55.33. As captain he also handled his team well. This fine young player continues to show very definite promise. Bruce Avis was not far behind with fine results having an aggregate of 307, including a nice innings of 120 not out, with an average also over the half century mark, 51.16. John Barnes, with correctly produced strokes, totalled 223 runs, also with an innings of 106 not out, and a good average of 37.16. Bill Bailey was next with an average of 20.75. The brunt of the bowling was borne by Jim McCann (stylish medium right arm action), and John Barnes (slow left arm high action). It was observed that the work in the field could have been much better and it is hoped that greater attention will be paid this important section of the game. Barry Rothwell, John Barnes and Bruce Avis secured selection in the combined A. W. Green team against Country Boys, at S.C.G., and performed with much distinction.

COACHING CLASSES

The Coaching Classes continued for the 22nd year with good attendances throughout the season. The results obtained were heartening, and the coaches Les. Gwynne, George Dunlop and George Lowe, predict excellent prospects for the future. Unfortunately, esteemed colleague, the late George Dunlop passed away during the year, and his most valued honorary services were greatly missed. George was endeared by all the lads, and being gifted with tact and patience, had the happy knack of getting the best out of his charges. Later on Messrs. Alan Lee, George Pappas and Jack Bright offered assistance, and their services were much appreciated by the club.

PRACTICE CAPTAINS

Again we repeat our recognition of the valued help of Jack Ryan and his assistant, Arthur Braddock, in controlling our week day practices. This club is most appreciative, and we trust that the services of these popular fellows, will again be available in the coming season.

AFTERNOON TEAS

Thanks again also go out to those constant ladies, who dispensed afternoon tea and lunches at Manly and Brookvale Ovals during the season, and also served supper at our annual meeting. Particularly we would like to mention Mesdames Dower, Cousins, Poignand, Rothwell, Twentyman, P. R. Lowe and G. W. Lowe. Also Misses Hurwood, Booth, Julia, and Virginia Dower. Without their valued help, we would be in very sore straits.

SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

The following items were arranged by the Social Committee under the Chairmanship of Mr. Alan Rogers. A team representing the club visited Katoomba at Christmas time to engage the locals in a friendly game of cricket. All had a happy time. The arrangements at Katoomba were in the hands of our late member Don Brooker.

Arrangements were made for a team of young players to visit Penrith in January. Owing to very heavy rain the match had to be cancelled at the last moment.

At the invitation of the local officials, a very enjoyable Easter tour to Wellington was undertaken by the senior members of the club. A most interesting game eventuated with the district talent thoroughly testing the ability of the visitors. We desire to record our thanks and appreciation to the Wellington Association for the able manner in providing such contest and entertainment during our stay. It is our intention to reciprocate this visit in the coming season.

Four (4) young members of this club were included in a representative Poidevin Gray and Green Shield team under the management of your secretary, to play matches in Junee at Easter. Our boys did well and enjoyed themselves.

On leaving for overseas, personal gifts were made to Keith Miller and Peter Philpott to wish them "Bon Voyage" and a safe return.

"Club Smokos" were held at Christmas time and at the completion of the cricket season at Manly Oval pavilion. All present thoroughly enjoyed themselves. It is a great disappointment that a better attendance was not forthcoming, if only to show that the efforts of the social committee are appreciated in arranging these "get togethers."

In addition he was requested to act as a member of the Schools Committee and a co-opt. member of the Coaching Committee of the N.S.W.C.A. At the invitation of the North Coast Cricket Council and approval of the N.S.W.C.A. a fortnight's tour of all Associations from Kempsey to Grafton, embracing over 250 boys, was undertaken in December.
