TO THE MEMBERS OF THE MANLY-WARRINGAH DISTRICT CRICKET CLUB

GENTLEMEN—

Your Management Committee has pleasure in submitting the 83rd Annual Report and Balance Sheet for consideration and adoption.

On the playing side, the season was a mixed one, with its share of disappointments as well as successes. Of the four grades, only the 3rd XI distinguished themselves, to the extent that they contested the final against Gordon. Both teams at the conclusion of the minor premiership rounds were level on 49 points, but, as Gordon had the higher "average", it was awarded the minor premiership, and, when the two teams also drew the final match, Gordon automatically became premiers. We extend our congratulations to the Gordon Club and also to our own captain, R. Haysom, and his players. Of the other grades, the 1st XI finished tenth, the 2nd XI sixteenth and the 4th XI twelfth.

The Poidevin-Gray side had an excellent season, winning their division very comfortably indeed. However, they were unfortunate enough to suffer the same fate as the 3rd XI, and the premiership was awarded to Bankstown-Canterbury on averages when the final match was drawn. Disappointing though this may have been, the team exceeded our best hopes, particularly as the side we fielded was very young, with the selectors' thoughts directed more to the future than the present. Team captain Terry Lee must be given full credit for his leadership and his own personal performances during the competition.

In the M.-W.J.C.A. afternoon competition, our 3rd grade side was runner-up, and, on congratulating the team, we also thank its captain, Bill Rome, a former first-grade cricketer with the club, who is generous enough to devote his time and knowledge to the development of those boys who, after all, we look to to provide the nucleus of our future grade sides. Their team training could not be in better hands.

Viewing the season as a whole, the most obvious lesson is that a cricketer is not only a batsman or a bowler—he is also a fieldsmen. In almost every instance where our top teams were beaten, the captain reported to the selectors that the fielding was simply not up to Grade standard, with as many as eight catches dropped in a single innings—some hard, some easy—but still dropped. This is not only unfair to the bowler by materially affecting his chances of promotion (no bowler has ever represented N.S.W. or Australia on the performances he **might** have had), but also ensures that the side has not the remotest chance of winning.

The responsibility for improving his fielding rests wholly and solely with the individual—if he cannot practise it during the week, he can certainly practise it before the game commences, and, if he wishes to be considered a good club and team member, he will do so.

The committees worked hard in their respective fields and the Executive Committee acknowledges gratefully their never-failing support.

During the year the Hon. Secretary and the Hon. Treasurer met a committee of the Manly Council with regard to the proposed further turf wicket in the Manly area. They received a very courteous hearing and we have every reason to hope that a wicket will be available in the near future. The committee is very anxious to field more teams, and thus give the opportunity of representing the district to more of the rapidly-growing cricket population in our area.

In this objective, the M.-W.J.C.A., with whom we continue to work in close harmony, has in mind recommending selected boys from their various competitions for coaching on Saturday mornings. This will enable us to gain first-hand knowledge of boys whom we would otherwise know only by repute, and it is difficult to see how anything but good can come from such a scheme.

As members know, Mr. L. W. Gwynne, a life-member and vice-president of the club, was invited to take the chair during the absence of the president overseas. We were very fortunate to have Mr. Gwynne, whose interest in cricket (and our club in particular) is very deep and who has had many years of experience in cricket administration. It is only his due that our appreciation should be recorded.

REPRESENTATIVE HONOURS

Representative honours were soon conferred upon Peter Philpott on his return from overseas, and we are by no means the only ones who feel that, had he returned earlier in the season, he would have gained selection for the current tour of England. Peter has had phenomenal success with the bat and has scored no less than 16 consecutive scores over 50, in all classes of cricket.

Barry Rothwell, Terry Lee, John Barnes and Ross Taylor were selected in the State Colts squad, and Barry and Terry subsequently played in the team, Barry being further honoured by being elected captain for the match against Queensland. This proved to be a very high-scoring match and, as a result, both Barry and Terry had time limitations placed upon their batting, but, in spite of this, both acquitted themselves reasonably well.

Unfortunately, Ross Taylor, of whom we had high hopes at the start of the season, suffered considerable illness and was lost to cricket altogether for a great part of the year. Ross has been forced to move away from the sea air and consequently from our district, and we hope that he will soon be restored to full health.

John Hunt was selected in the combined A. W. Green Shield side which played at Newcastle and, if John continues his excellent progress as a leg-spin bowler, he will shortly be making his mark among more senior cricketers.

FIRST GRADE REVIEW

In comparison with the previous year, and considering the high hopes that sprung from it, the firsts had a disappointing season, finishing tenth with 36 points. We won one match outright, won two on the first innings, drew five, and lost six on the first innings.

The most pleasing feature of the season was the improvement in the batting, particularly in the opening positions, both Stewart Toolin and Ray Bright consistently giving the side sound starts. Early in the season, Eddie Robinson, Terry Lee and Barry Rothwell took full advantage of their opportunities and, while the last two flagged a little in the middle section of the season, Terry in

centuries against Petersham-Marrickville (117) and Waverley (104). Peter Philpott had only three innings with the club and his scores of 55, 90 and 55 were faultless in execution, particularly so in regard to foot-work. Eddie Robinson was the most consistent of all batsmen, apart from Peter, and only two players had a higher aggregate. Our weakness, however, lay in the middle of the batting order, and perhaps we would have won more matches had we had someone to capitalise on winning starts—too often two or three wickets for 150 or so became five or six for 170 or 180.

It was very difficult to assess the true strength of the bowling, since it cannot be said to have been supported by the fielding. The loss of Ross Taylor through illness was a blow from which no club could quickly recover, for Ross, with his sustained pace and unrelenting accuracy, was a headache for all opponents, irrespective of whether he was taking wickets or not. Ross, who will be playing with another club next year, will remember his last match with us when, against Glebe-South Sydney, he took 7 for 31, including the hat-trick, and in the second innings 9-40. Both Tom Hart and Neil Fenn bowled extremely well on occasions and would certainly have shown better results had not so many chances been dropped in close to the wicket positions. Of the spinners, none were outstanding, but we feel that the younger players, John Barnes, Reg Hunt and Terry Lee, gained useful experience. It should be noted that Fenn, Barnes, Lee and Hunt were all members of the Poidevin-Gray side and, while it would perhaps be unfair to expect spectacular success in 1st grade at this stage, we have every prospect of seeing them progressively successful in future years.

Finally, if this side is to gain full advantage from the ability of its members, it must tighten up in its out-cricket, with more than ordinary emphasis on close to the wicket catching. Bowlers—particularly the speed bowlers—lost confidence in their field and tended to try too hard to hit the wicket, rather than beat the bat. The remedy is not difficult and the slip-machine must be worked harder next year.

Brian Alsopp was again the side's 'keeper and was generally sound throughout the season, with eight catches and four stumpings to his credit. Eddie Robinson captained the side throughout the year and Ray Bright was the vice-captain.

SECOND GRADE REVIEW

What happened to the seconds? With what appeared to be the strongest batting side this grade has had in ten years, the team failed lamentably, losing seven, drawing four and winning only one of the twelve matches. Overall, the batting did prove to be stronger, topping 200 runs on six occasions. It was in bowling and fielding that the team fell down so badly. We did not lack bowlers, but key men Tom Brooks, Ian Barnes and Neil Fenn became unavailable or were promoted, and this, together with the lack of a supporting spin bowler, threw heavy responsibility on Ken Waterhouse. Ken had another excellent season, bowling his new-style off-breaks, and in all took 34 wickets and four times bagged five in the one innings.

The available bowlers received scant support in the field, catches without number were grassed in the slips and, in one black afternoon against Petersham-Marrickville, eight dropped catches cost the team a certain win.

to opener, entertained us time and again with run-a-minute stroke-making. He topped 50 on four occasions and, on three of the six times John opened, the partnership also exceeded 50. Making a welcome reappearance with the club, Brian Taylor also batted consistently well, with his innings against North Sydney and Glebe being outstanding for a gratifying fluency. Adrian Leembruggen batted stylishly, but disappointingly was often dismissed in the twenties and thirties. Pax Trim scored the team's only century and mixed other good scores with an unfortunate run of "outs". Ron Watkins and Mick Platt were excellent teammates and batted well in the few matches in which they appeared.

Warwick Davey kept wickets and also was the team captain, Ken Waterhouse deputising as captain when Warwick was unavailable.

THIRD GRADE REVIEW

As has been mentioned earlier, this team was the most successful of the four grade sides, and of the matches played, we won 1 outright, 7 on the first innings, drew 3 and lost 1. In our semi-final we defeated St. George, but only drew with Gordon in the final, and as a result since Gordon had the better average, we were awarded the runner-up position.

Consistently throughout the season, thanks to Len Carter and Allan Turner, the side started well, on five occasions topping 50 and on three topping 100 for the opening partnership. This brought Len Carter the honour of taking out the aggregate and the batting average, while Allan Turner scored the side's only century. Perhaps the younger batsmen did not take sufficient advantage of the good starts, and this is most disappointing since it shows not a lack of ability, but a lack of determined application. They could well have learned from the example of Ron Evers, who batted with the sole intention of making the best possible use of his stay at the wickets, and who gained his reward with some noteworthy batting performances. It should also be mentioned that Ron's consistency gave the side the fullest possible support in the field, and all in all was one of our best team men.

Notwithstanding some changes in personel, the bowling throughout the year was steady and purposeful—only two teams scored more than 200 against us. Ellis Rothwell took most wickets (25), at an average of 10.6, and as is indicated by these figures formed with Bob Haysom, Mike Pawley and later with Ron Watkins the substantial part of the attack.

In the success of the bowlers, however, it is most significant to note that in his reports to the selection committee, the captain consistently remarked that the fielding and catching was sound, and of the first three grades an analysis shows that 58 catches were taken in 3rd Grade as against 42 in 1st Grade and 37 in 2nd Grade.

Of the younger players, Mike Pawley made a big step forward this year—possibly more as a bowler than a batsman—but nonetheless he showed a welcome intention of stroking the ball crisply, and we feel that this, allied to a sound batting technique, and in conjunction with his bowling we will shortly see Mike earning promotion.

Bob Haysom, in his first year as captain, proved an excellent leader—he kept the games alive and his team on their toes, and furthermore, when occasion demanded, accepted in full a captain's responsibility, both with bat and ball. The committee feels sure that it expresses his team's thoughts when we congratulate him on the years play.

FOURTH GRADE REVIEW

The team finished in 12th position with 30 points, which was disappointing to a certain degree as we had on the whole a fairly well balanced side throughout the season. There was a sprinkling of older players which we had hoped would bring more solidity to the side, but it was insufficient, apparently, to overcome inconsistent batting in the early matches.

Towards the end of the season the batting improved and some excellent totals were attained. Chris Brookes scored the only century (114), and won the batting average. Greg Freeman's 81 should also be mentioned, and while the performances of both these young players did not come up to expectations during the early part of the season, perhaps their later successes will have shown them that only concentration and determination is necessary for them to make full use of their definite ability.

Of the bowlers, Ian Page was impressive, without returning any sensational figures, and he possibly suffered by lack of a regular opening partner, for at no time did the team have the same opening pair. Clive Cruickshank, a young leg-spinner, had a most encouraging first season with a grade side—notwithstanding pressure he kept the ball well up to the batsmen, and will undoubtedly improve with experience.

Fielding, generally, was patchy, but it must be said that some excellent catches were taken during the season, and highly commended in this department are Arthur Springall, Chris Brookes and Clive Cruickshank. Lapses occurred in ground fielding, however, and there is obvious room for improvement here.

Team spirit was always high—a particularly pleasing feature when more than 30 players represented this team during the season, and this reflects credit on Doug Dessaix, who captained the team throughout the year.

CITY AND SUBURBAN REVIEW

We played 20 matches for 7 wins and 13 losses—two of these by one run off the last ball of the day.

Batting was again weak in this team, with G. North winning the average with 16.36 and H. O'Halloran scoring the most runs—281. H. Frazer was next highest scorer with 222.

The bowling was much stronger, and two hat-tricks were performed—by W. Hoy, when he took 4-13 against Lane Cove and by A. Evans, when he took 8-54 against Nth. District Association. Since both these players are undoubtedly our senior playing members, it is pleasing to see them not only still playing, but still apparently successful.

The fielding was an immense improvement over previous years and some excellent catches and run-outs made. The catches materially helped A. Evans to win the bowling overage with 10.9 and W. Hoy took most wickets (40).

H. Frazer, who captained the side, has reported that good team spirit throughout the year helped to make the games most enjoyable, and he extends his thanks to his team for their support and to the committee for their consideration throughout the year.

POIDEVIN-GRAY REVIEW

Although on paper the team compared unfavourably with the previous year, the results achieved far exceeded those of its predecessors and the expectations of the club generally. A great deal of credit for the team's successful progress to the "runner-up" position must go to Terry Lee, who captained the side with imagination and energy, and at all times implemented a policy of keeping the game alive with sporting declarations. It is to be hoped that Terry is not discouraged in this determination, for unfortunately, in chasing unnecessary, and even unlikely outrights, the team's "average" suffered, and it was on averages that the competition was finally resolved.

The outstanding batting performance of the season was of course the century scored by Terry against the powerful Mosman side, a century made all the more memorable by the fact that he first had to overcome an indigent start by the side, and not only did so, but eventually dominated completely an attack which at no time became loose. Although big scores eluded him, John Blaikie batted with fine aggression, and John Barnes and Reg Hunt also had some useful performances.

Neil Fenn, Terry Lee and John Barnes did the lions share of the bowling, and Neil's 18 wickets for 134 runs off 49 overs gave him the bowling average at 7.45. Terry took the most wickets (31) at an average of 8.42, and both these players should feel very satisfied with what was well controlled bowling with a full measure of penetration. Spin bowlers Reg Hunt, Mike Pawley and Clive Cruikshanks had, perforce, very limited opportunities, but their turn will come.

Greg Freeman, Paul Galloway, Gareth Blades and Russell Armstrong, the wicket-keeper, all fitted into a well balanced side, and apart from individual performances gave excellent support to the bowlers, and the number of run-outs picked up by these players in particular had a material bearing on the success of the side.

Particularly, we are happy to report that the team spirit was such that willing reserves, Brookes, Unicomb and Springall, had no opportunity to show their form, and with all players eligible next year with the exception of Terry Lee, who just misses out, we hope to do well again.

We were privileged to have at our meetings Vice-Presidents Gwynne, Lee, Hayman, Hoy, Anderson and Sainsbery, and we not only appreciate their interest, but also their unfailing assistance and advice. Mr. Gwynne continued to act as chairman while Mr. Lowe was overseas, and Mr. Hayman was kind enough to take the chair on one occasion when Mr. Gwynne was absent. We also thank Mr. Waterhouse, who attended on one occasion to advise us on a matter about which he had some professional knowledge.

Finally, we again express our most sincere thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Lowe and Miss Booth, who so kindly opened their home for our meetings.

COACHING CLASSES

We were again busily engaged at the Oval on Saturday mornings, and, whilst there was a falling off in the attendance of older boys at net practice, the matches supervised by Mr. Lee and his brother were very well attended by the younger boys.

This part of the club's activities has now been conducted for 28 years, having its beginnings in 1933, when Messrs. J. Randell, L. Gwynne and E. Vaughan formed the first coaching committee—to be joined the following month by our President, Mr. Lowe. With the growing population in the Manly-Warringah area, it is perhaps time for the club to consider extending its activities to Brookvale Oval in order that we might provide the very necessary fundamental knowledge to those boys who may not be able to make the journey to Manly.

SOCIAL REPORT

It is unfortunate that successive Social Committees find it necessary to report that, apart from a minority who assist at all times and in all ways, general support from the club is weak and, in far too many cases, lacking altogether. In spite of this, the committee, consisting of Messrs. Wearne, Blades, Carter, Dessaix, Toolin and Soman, and chaired by Mr. Cook, worked hard for their fellow members and a big programme was successfully negotiated. Various competitions were conducted and were of material benefit to the club's finances.

Mr. and Mrs. Soman were kind enough to make their home available for a social evening, which was thoroughly enjoyed by all who attended. We are very grateful to Mr. and Mrs. Soman for their kindness.

Over the Australia Day holiday week-end we were delighted to be able to offer hospitality to a team from Dubbo Association, whom we had visited the previous Easter. Two matches were played, Dubbo winning the first and ourselves the second. Those Dubbo players who required it were billeted by members, and proved very popular guests, but nonetheless we thank their hosts for assisting us in this way. On this occasion it was Mr. and Mrs. Cook who offered their home for the entertainment of the Dubbo players and officials, the evening being well attended and an unqualified success.

Singleton also visited us for a social match at Brookvale, and this, too, was a most enjoyable game.

During these two visits, our Ladies' Auxiliary bore the brunt of a heavy programme of lunches and afternoon teas, and inadequately though our thanks may be expressed, they are indeed most sincere. As a mark of their appreciation to their "working wives", the husbands took them to a dinner-dance at Newport and, while this function was of a private nature and not a club matter, we feel that members will be glad to know that our appreciation was expressed in this way.

Our social activities concluded with an end-of-season "smoko", which was reasonably well attended and very well enjoyed, and overall we are happy to report that on the season's activities we managed to raise £125 towards the maintenance of the club.

FINANCE

The Annual Statement of Income and Expenditure on both the General Account and the Social Fund Account and the Balance Sheet are printed at the end of this report. The General Account showed a surplus of £105/13/3, which compares favourably with the previous year. It will be noted, however, that the receipts from the Manly Oval gate were the lowest for many years. The Social Account once again showed a substantial surplus at £123/16/3 and as well defrayed the costs of bringing two country teams to play at Manly.

Stock on hand includes 10 dozen cricket balls, purchased at a special price which will show a considerable saving on the ensuing year's anticipated costs.

The club's finances are in the soundest position for many years and reflects the committee's policy in providing a proper balance between costs of materials and players' subscriptions and fees.

PRACTISE CAPTAIN

Mr. Anderson was again our practise captain, and we regret that he again had to report that attendance at the mid-week practises was most disappointing. The committee is at a complete loss to understand why this should be so, since it is obvious that no player can do himself or his club justice unless he uses practise to either retain or regain form. Notwithstanding this, however, the club is most grateful to Mr. Anderson.

Both Messrs. Dan Delaney and Merv Paynter, at Manly and Brookvale Ovals respectively, continued to co-operate most amicably with the club, and we tender our thanks to them for their help. The wicket at Brookvale continued to be well suited to run-getting, although early in the season it had a tendency to powder rather more quickly than in previous years. At one stage of the season, the Manly wicket came under fire, but an analysis of runs scored for and against Manly-Warringah, both at home and away, showed a very close similarity. While we do not pretend that the Oval wicket is perfect, its "difficulty" lies in its extreme slowness rather than in "devil", and in any case it is certainly improving year by year, and is not in itself an excuse for failure.

LADIES' AUXILIARY

Once again the ladies were unfailing in their assistance to us—they served us afternoon teas at our competition matches and both luncheon and afternoon teas at our social games. We have no wish to single out any particular ladies for their help, for it came this year from many quarters, and we are sincerely grateful to them all. It is hoped that next year we will be able to meet prior to the season commencing so that the ladies can arrange their activities in the manner most suitable for themselves.

DELEGATES

N.S.W.C.A.: Mr. Lowe and Mr. Hodgson were again our delegates, with Mr. Gwynne deputising for Mr. Lowe until his return from overseas. It is no news to members to be informed that Mr. Lowe's honorary services to the Association are most warmly appreciated by that body, and his work as a member of the Country Committee, as supervisor of the nets at the S.C.G., and as manager and coach of the country boys' cricket camp are constantly referred to and praised by the Association executive.

M.-W.J.C.A.: Our happy association with this body was again entrusted to Mr. A. Lee and Mr. Bob Philpott, and we have every reason to be well satisfied with their efforts to promote the welfare of both the Junior Association and ourselves.
