

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE MANLY-WARRINGAH DISTRICT CRICKET CLUB

GENTLEMEN—

Your Management Committee has pleasure in submitting for your consideration and adoption the 86th Annual Report and Balance Sheet.

Like the best laid plans of mice and men the high hopes with which we started the season 'oft went agly", but the cold winds of failure are not so harsh if one knows the reason for which they blow. Had we known at the beginning of the season that only on one occasion would our first grade side take the field as originally selected, our optimism would have been qualified with great caution.

Before the season was barely under way, three first grade players retired, and one was injured and although their places were competently filled, this, together with the fact that during the season an additional four players gained representative honours resulted in the team at times being eight players below its original strength.

That it performed well in spite of this, will be demonstrated in the review, but the snowballing effect on the lower grades which had to withstand their own normal defections, was nothing short of catastrophic.

As an example, third grade played most of the season with only four of the original side, and its captain concluded the season as first grade wicket keeper. Second grade also lost its captain more often than usual due to the heavy demands of big cricket and shouldered its burden in maintaining first grade strength, but as far as possible the young players in fourth grade were left unmolested under Bruce Adrian's guiding influence, and one of the brighter side effects of 1st grade troubles was the opportunity afforded at least six boys to enter grade who the previous year were playing in the Manly-Warringah Association on matting wickets.

From the foregoing, it will be seen that our low position in the Club Championship was largely due to the fact that with all respect, about 75% of playing members were selected one grade above that which their ability justified.

Generally, the teams were badly balanced, with too many all-rounders, too many bowlers to share the new ball and too many leg-spinners. The absence of good off-spinners was a serious handicap and as ever, very few reliable batsmen. Truly a selectors' nightmare.

Following a most gruelling winter, the practice wickets at Manly were unavailable until December which had a dampening effect on those who were keen to improve their performances and was reflected in many instances. We confidently hope that turf practice facilities will be available from the first practice of the 64/65 season and the corresponding upsurge of morale and performance should have the players on their toes for those vital first two rounds.

The luck of the draw played a big part in this seasons grade competitions as apart from normal weather hazards there were six all-day fixtures in which weaker sides were able to achieve results in the restricted playing time out of all proportion to the expected result from a two day fixture.

It is to be hoped that the Grades Committee will give earnest consideration to the many alternative suggestions which will undoubtedly be forthcoming for conducting the season ahead.

The Poidevin Gray side started shakily but then acquitted itself well. Age shall not weary this side for a few seasons yet and if it can be kept together will make its mark.

Only wet weather prevented the Green Shield team from winning the division in what was hoped would be its vintage year. Four of the side have already appeared in grade and others are on the threshold, so this competition is more than serving its purpose. Due to the effluxion of time there will be some vacancies available to the district juniors next season.

Three teams were entered in the M.-W.C.A. competition and all reached the semi-finals.

The B1 team under the indefatigable Bill Rome again won its premiership and it is pleasing to know that most of this team will have the opportunity to play on turf next season.

Both D grade teams met in the semi-final but the victor went down in the final.

This season we had the full benefit of the reconditioned Manly Oval and many were the enthusiastic comments received from visitors. The draining of the ground after heavy rain is a feature and further improved during the season as irregularities were ironed out. The dressing rooms and recreation area are unsurpassed in the Metropolitan area and the entire setting of the ground in the middle of a block of natural parkland and playing area with the sea and pines in the background is delightfully unique. The mind shudders at the recollection of only recent years that this area was envisaged by some as another concrete jungle.

L. M. GRAHAM'S RESERVE

Under the skilled hands of Dan Delaney, who will be remembered as the man who restored the grass to Manly Oval, the new turf wicket proceeded according to plan during the summer months and its assimilation into the club's activities from the beginning of next season will be a milestone in our history. It should serve mainly as a means of easing the transition of promising young players of the district from matting to turf wickets and long term benefits to cricket notwithstanding, the Manly Council is to be congratulated in transforming this area. We shall all watch its future planned development with great interest.

WICKET COVERS

Due to the industry of Mr. Alan Lee we were able to experiment with covers at Manly Oval, but the weather pattern for the season was such to preclude any firm opinion as to their value. One feature quickly established however, was the amount of work involved in their handling.

PLAYING ON

Two items of great significance to the club were made public at the end of the season. Peter Philpott and Tom Brooks announced their retirement from first class cricket and broadcasting respectively, and although regretted by cricket enthusiasts, their intention of continuing with grade cricket is decidedly to our advantage.

First grade last season took the field under four different captains and no matter how capable the deputies may be, it is not conducive to efficient team work.

In Peter Philpott, the club has no equal in a captain possessing all the qualities essential to bring out the best in the team, his own all-round ability allows him to set such a strong example in all departments of the game that it is now coming to be regarded as an honour for those promoted while those who are already in the side feel conscious of any carelessness which lets him down, and that is how it should be.

With Tom Brooks in control of second grade, it is certain that no player will be recommended for promotion if he has not measured up to Tom's yardstick in proving himself a good team man in all respects and here again, we have a captain who has learned his cricket the hard way and is not slow in expressing strong disapproval of any action which falls short of his standards.

At the beginning of the line in fourth grade we have in Bruce Adrian another captain of the same mould who does such a fine job with his raw recruits and it is to be regretted that so many other first class cricketers retire without having first put something back into the game which has given them so much.

We, as a club should at least be thankful for Peter Philpott, Tom Brooks and Bruce Adrian.

REPRESENTATIVE HONOURS

To Manly-Warringah this season went the signal honour of providing more players for the N.S.W. XI than any other district.

Gordon Rorke, Peter Philpott and Terry Lee were selected in the first Shield game, but Gordon, sorely troubled by the trial no-ball law lost his rhythm and fell from favour. Terry was selected in the Australian XI against South Africa and at this stage reached his highest point for selection as a tourist to England. He was unfortunate in that Vievers, of Queensland, made the most of many opportunities with which he was blessed and Terry, on the Southern Tour, spent most of his time as drink waiter, thus having no opportunity to press his claims.

Peter Philpott had a vintage year and although given very few opportunities with the ball when the national selectors were present reached great heights when honoured with the captaincy. His thrashing of Queensland and outwitting of the cagey Victorians in a tactical battle of captaincy was made possible by his own outstanding performances with bat and ball.

It was therefore unbelieveable that in spite of this, and his unequalled experience of English conditions he should fall victim of the State quota system when the team to tour England was announced.

In a season of great achievement nothing however, gave greater satisfaction than the selection of Barry Rothwell in the State side. Since the age of 15 Barry has never been far from the selector's thoughts, but living in N.S.W. at times felt the hopelessness of his ambitions. Although his best cricket years lie ahead, Barry, in view of his time in first grade has been regarded as a veteran and so it came as a surprise to many outside Manly when, following a good beginning to the grade season, the selectors finally gave him the nod. That he made every post a winner in his few appearances will ensure his retention in the top flight next season and we all wish him well in the bright future which was predicted years ago.

It can thus be seen how the club's performances were affected by our Representative commitments, but any feelings of disappointment are tinged with pride and the opportunity to bask a little in their reflected glory.

FIRST GRADE REVIEW

Although we finished equal 9th on the table, no team could take the field against M.-W. in the knowledge that victory was assured and although never at full strangth our performances against the four teams which were ultimate semi-finalists supports this contention.

Other problems notwithstanding we could still have been at the top if the club had possessed a wicket-keeper who could consistently handle

Peter Philpott and Terry Lee. These two bowlers require a 'keeper of almost international standard and no criticism is intended of the three who performed well by normal 1st grade standards. However, any team which has to concede over 400 sundries in 12 games can have no premiership aspirations. It can be taken for granted that in this figure there would be a proportionate number of missed chances and mostly at Peter Philpott's expense.

The bowling was of the usual high standard with Tom Hart answering every call on his fighting qualities and still enjoying little luck. He never deviated from his principle of attacking the batsmen and under comparable conditions was according to an experienced umpire as fast as any bowler in Sydney.

Gordon Rorke spent the season battling a set of circumstances, especially designed for his benefit and subsequently lost his former striking power. However, he never stopped trying and later in the season had developed into an "into the wind" bowler, rarely failing to pick up valuable wickets.

Peter Philpott usually bowled too well to get wickets; beating bat, stumps and 'keeper with monotonous regularity and must have cast many wistful glances across the Spit where dwells Doug Ford, with whom he had essential understanding in Sheffield Shield cricket.

Terry Lee, when he was with us, made the fourth member of a well balanced attack but he too, suffered from missed chances. Eddie Robinson usually picked up a wicket as a change bowler and at times was called upon to take over our main spin attack. Reg Hunt had few opportunities and John McCabe bowled steadily when called upon.

The batting showed more depth than for many years, John Blaikie had a mixed season with several aggressive knocks following a bad start. Early in the season he lost his partner Brian Taylor through injury and there were few good opening partnerships. However, such was Eddie Robinson's form that with few exceptions the side was rarely in trouble. Eddie continued to hammer all bowlers and it would be difficult to determine just which of his many fine innings was enjoyed the most; the century against Waverley could well have been eclipsed by his domination of the St. George attack when he was run out at 48. Terry Lee hit the side out of trouble on several occasions, but we remember his boundary studded 82 and 56 against North Sydney and University respectively. Barry Rothwell finished the season as he began and rarely failed to reach double figures. As mentioned earlier, this was one of his best years, a year in which he seemed to come of age as a batsman, his fielding as ever, outstanding.

Peter Philpott was the rock on which bowlers foundered and a study in concentration and determination. He would sell his wicket dearly and who will ever forget his double century partnership with Barry Rothwell against Cumberland under unfavourable conditions. Batting well below his qualified position we had John Weight who showed great maturity in various crises and only failed on the occasions when he was required to bat out of character. This also applied to Reg Hunt, who needs to bat higher if his batting ability is to be capitalised.

Tom Hart's bowling efforts appeared to affect his natural ability with the bat, but Gordon Rorke used his long reach and experience to good effect on several occasions when the tail was called upon.

Generally there was lack of depth in the lower grades to fill the first grade gaps which occured for reasons previously mentioned, the bowling and batting usually managed to hang on, but apart from the wicket keeping problem, there were just too many to hide in the field, as our out cricket often fell below standard.

The team took the field at different times under Peter Philpott, Terry Lee, Barry Rothwell and Eddie Robinson and was managed as capably as ever by Clive Philpott, who also acted as scorer, statistician and security officer. The few occasions on which we struggled onto the field without his help only served to highlight his value to the team and the club.

SECOND GRADE REVIEW

The team's function as a gap plugger for 1st grade undoubtedly removed us as a semi-final threat to those more forutnate, but it is pleasing to record that there was no diminishing of enthusiasm or support of the sorely tried captain as the season progressed.

Sufficient games were won to maintain morale and the few isolated instances of discontent were swamped in the unselfish attitude of most to the game itself, so that in the final analysis, all who passed through the ranks could say at the end "that was a good season!"

As expected, we soon lost John McCabe to first grade and the services of solid bat, steady bowler and brilliant slips field. Next to go was the veteran opening pair Nev Travers and Allan Turner, who had relished the opportunity to pick up the threads of an association borne of Green Shield days. Valuable time was lost here as Nev first had to prove himself in 3rd grade. In a spirit of adventure common to those whose cricket future has already happened they rarely failed to give the side a start and reached their peak with an opening partnership of 219 against Glebe. Nev's cavalier disregard of the terrors of the lifting ball outside the off stump in the best Barlow tradition was a prolific source of runs for the team, of constant anxiety to the captain and frustration to the opposing bowlers. Their protests notwithstanding, they made spasmodic appearances in first grade to their own detriment and the vital opening position of this team.

From those with no future to one with plenty we move to left hander John Branscombe, who made the team in the last round and greatly impressed with his desire to hit the ball as hard and often as possible in the Bruce Cook manner. Paul Stabback, also continued to show progress as an all-rounder. Attention to advice from the right quarters allied to a stubborn fighting spirit and keenness to practice reaped its own reward in his subsequent elevation to first grade.

Gareth Blades and John Davis did not progress as anticipated and may be regarded as marking time, destined to move on as long as keenness is there. Gareth's fielding ability alone won him a place in first grade for the last match, a fact which John could note to advantage.

Chris Brookes showed flashes of brilliance, but lacked consistency, as did Charlie Nash, while not enjoying the best of luck. Bob Haysom was also in this category, but was also a valuable stock bowler and loyal vice-captain.

David "Toy Town" Roebuck worked up considerable pace at times and could always pull out an extra stop. He escaped promotion on occasions only because of the nature of the first grade attack. He appeared to beat bat and stumps more often than luck should have it and main-

tained greater accuracy than before.

Neil Fenn had a troubled season with the front foot, but then slowing down demonstrated in one match that he could still go places with this type of left hand medium pace, subject of course to practice and preparation. He subsequently performed competently in first grade when called upon. We are not invoking poetic licence to state that Ray Yell bowled well—the nagging accuracy of his leg spinners assured economy

and the top spinner commanded respect. Due to a preponderance of medium pacers he did not bowl as many overs as usual, although he missed

one match and played one with first grade.

There was unfortunately little opportunity for John Hunt to show his wares, although early in the season it appeared that he may have developed as a batsman. He has a definite future as a slow bowler and was selected for special coaching at the S.C.G. In an effort to obtain more bowling he was placed in 3rd grade, but circumstances foiled our intentions there, so if nothing else went his way he should have acquired a philosophical approach so necessary for a bowler of his type.

Roger Hooke, who performed so capably in 3rd grade had a run of outs until the Waverley game when he occupied the creases for some

time.

Derek Roberts and Bob Maxwell competently officiated behind the stumps in between first grade appearances and Derek as usual displayed

truculence and tenancity with the bat.

Although unable to bowl until late in the season Tom Brooks' value as a batsman alone should be obvious from the averages. Most of his best innings were played under pressure and always on the occasions when he reverted to his natural style of hitting the ball into and over the fence in the mid-wicket area. His own performances notwithstanding, his place in the side would be justified by virtue of his positive captaincy and the team was always conscious of the fact that a player of his background deserved better than they could give.

Stephen Yell was our capable and efficient scorer, although he too was promoted to first grade on one occasion, where he performed with

distinction.

THIRD GRADE REVIEW

As originally selected, this team appeared to carry the club's highest hopes for a premiership and it measured up to some successful teams

we have fielded in this competition over the years.

The first few matches fully justified our confidence and during this period a win was recorded against Petersham-Marrickville, who ultimately won the Premiership. However, coming events were already casting their shadow and first grade troubles immediately began to take effect as one after another, third graders plugged the gaps. From this point, the decline and fall of the team was inevitable and there was to be a long interval before the next win was recorded.

Things began to look up in the second half of the season with the arrival of John Branscombe and Malcolm McEachern, but the incentive was missing. However, in the last two matches honour was regained when Branscombe scored a blistering century to put the team in a strong position against Balmain before rain intervened and we won the last match outright.

Thus the season finished as it began, but in the meantime 30 players had appeared with the side, only four of whom, Watkins, Woodfield,

Dessaix and Cruickshanks, were in the original selections.

The averages tell the story, the bowlers, particularly Watkins, Woodfield and Cruickshanks performed capably, but of the regular batsmen only Ron Watkins exceeded 200 runs.

FOURTH GRADE REVIEW

This team comprised mostly young players making their debut into grade and although their position did not at any stage of the competition justify preparations for a victory dinner, several matches were only lost by sheer inexperience.

Batsmen well set, throwing their innings away with victory in sight so their friends could have a hit (with the inevitable Manly result), a fieldsman missing a simple catch because of an oversize cap falling over his eyes, bowlers striving for extra pace at the cost of accuracy, all written off to experience. Then inexcusably, slopping fielding, missed catches and stupid run outs, wrote the epilogue to the season.

Subject to the above being absorbed, Ken Turner and Peter Sullivan as batsmen, Joe Pawley, Brian Kinsey and Geoff Stevenson, bowlers, and Ken Nichol and Peter Lee, as all-rounders, have marked ability and an assured future in cricket, subject of course to their own mental approach and dedication to the game. Bob Cotton was slow settling down to grade, but his kenness finally paid dividends as he later played some solid innings.

Veteran Jack Blades again displayed great spirit in making himself available and standing down when a younger player would be affected. Jack is still as good a wicket-keeper as the club possess and a badly needed inspiration in the field. Towards the end of the season, Harry Mullens, a former Glebe senior player, helped us out and could be of great value to this club in the future.

Ker. Turner displayed greater power and improved footwork and showed signs of developing into a good cover field.

Big-hearted Brian Kinsey bore the brunt of the bowling and throughout the season displayed excellent stamina and keenness, these qualities having been well noted. Geoff Stevenson also tried hard and was a useful tail-ender, but will need to be available for all games to gain higher honours. Ken Nichol had purple patches with bat and ball, but fitness and availability need attention. He wobbles the ball well for his age and should seek as much advice as possible on the control of this asset. Peter Lee showed good form as a stock bowler, never striving for too much pace, and several innings of great potential were terminated only by lapses of concentration. Greg Freeman, making his comeback, began in a blaze of glory with a century, but elevation to 3rds as a result thereof deprived him of the opportunity to consolidate and he was unable to maintain consistency. It was good, however, to have his acrobatic slip fielding with us again. Ian Gordon joined us during the season and immediately justified those who were critical of his absence from early selections. Joe Pawley also joined late and settled in quietly, but next season could be a most valuable slow spinner and steady bat.

Reference has already been made to Bruce Adrian's contributions as captain of this side and the batting averages tell their own story as to his value to the team generally. An injury suffered in a "big game" accident towards the close of the season left a gap which could not be filled.

CITY & SUBURBAN REVIEW

This team captained by Harry O'Halloran received the backwash of the grade sides' personnel problems, but fielded teams for all fixtures if at times depleted. Stalwarts, Harry Frazer, Bill Hoy and Harry O'Halloran bore the brunt of the batting and bowling, well supported by Nigel Amery, Lin Cameron and Lin McClachie, who achieved the only hat trick of the season. The fielding generally was of high standard and well above the general quality of some of the grade sides. Jack Pitcher, when out of grade, was an accomplished all-rounder. Out of 21 games played, 10 were won, 10 were lost (5 narrowly) and one drawn.

Harry O'Halloran and Nigel Amery represented Combined City and Suburban against the Teachers.

POIDEVIN GRAY SHIELD

With nobody yet approaching retiring age this can still be considered a young team and its performances viewed in that light.

In the first match the selectors experimented with some G.P.S. boys with mixed results, but John Branscombe and Malcolm McEachern have since adapted themselves well to grade cricket and the experiment could be considered successful. We had no doubts on the ability of John Weight, who has been with the club since Green Shield days and he was the sheet anchor on which the batting was based.

Too often, John was batting to save the side, due to the absence of a good opening partnership and generally insufficient runs were scored to enable the varied bowling attack to operate efficiently. However, there is nothing unusual about that in the Manly tradition.

The second match was lost narrowly after we were sent in on a wet wicket, the third was lost following one of the occasions when we declared with runs on the board, but Northern Districts' strong batting side got them. The fourth was won, after a day of good fighting cricket against Mosman and featured an aggressive fighting innings by John Branscombe of 64 and an impressive debut by Joe Pawley, in which he took 6-29.

Apart from those previously mentioned, Paul Stabback top scored with 70 for the series.

It is hoped that with a more settled first class season in 1964/65 more attention can be given to this aspect of our activities.

SOCIAL

The season began in a blaze of activity with the entertaining of the North Shore Club from New Zealand against whom two matches were played over the last week-end of the trials on a wicket provided by the M.-W.C.A. The club were our guests at a dance held in the Recreation Room, at Manly Oval on the Saturday evening, and a sumptuous lunch was provided at Mr. and Mrs. Hodgson's home at Clontarf on Sunday. The excellent cuisine and food was provided by our tireless wives and mothers and deeply impressed the visitors. Sunday tea was catered for by the Manly Rugby Union Club Ltd., our good friends on occasions such as this, and so we sent North Shore Cricket Club on their way and settled down rather belatedly to our own domestic affairs.

Another dance was held in the Recreation Room, on 14th December, and although an enjoyable night was had by those who attended, it was confirmed by the small attendance of club cricketers that this expensive type of entertainment is not desired by the majority of members. The incoming committee will have the task of deciding the type of social gatherings if any are required, bearing in mind that they must be self supporting and not a drain on accumulated funds as will be seen from this year's financial statement.

During January a match was played against a team from Goulburn, at Brookvale Oval, lunch was provided and the facilities of the Manly Rugby Union Club Ltd., were again enjoyed after the match.

Our annual fixture with the Union Club was played on Manly Oval on Anniversary Day and despite a marathon innings by Eddie Robinson, we were fully extended against some of our old stars, Rod Lloyd, Bill Simpson, Mike Rogers and Mick Platt. The usual hospitality was dispensed by the club during and after the match.

The pleasant environment of the Recreation Room, at Manly Oval, during and after a match was appreciated by our own and visiting teams

and the season concluded on a convivial note with members of all teams performing their post mortems on the season with enthusiastic support from the Cumberland first graders. We are indebted to Jack Blades and Woody Weight, for their tangible support of this function.

Our first "Vice-President's Day" was inaugurated on 21st February, when all those ladies and gentlemen who appear each year on page two of the annual report, were invited to meet their club at afternoon tea. Our ladies excelled themselves on this occasion and the popularity of the function can be estimated by the number who attended and stayed on to enjoy the cricket.

The election of Vice-Presidents is too often taken as a formality, but it is our intention to see that those who honour us with their acceptance are made to feel an integral part of the club. That they desire to be so regarded is evidenced by the high percentage of replies received to the invitations, which will be issued annually hereafter.

It was hoped this year to be able to thank individually the mothers, wives, sisters, aunts and even grandmothers, who officiate so charmingly at afternoon tea and special functions, but although at least 15 names come readily to mind the risk of omitting one other, renders the operation too hazardous so will all the good ladies to whom this refers modestly accept their due, continue to favour us with their presence and encourage others, particularly where 2nd, 3rd and 4th grades are concerned.

We also acknowledge the many willing fellows within the club—some of whom were willing to work at social functions and those who were willing to let them. It should not have been necessary for the first grade captain to organise drinks after the game, but he always found himself elected.

GROUNDS

As mentioned earlier in the report Manly Oval fully justified the inconvenience we suffered last year, but not without some very strenuous toil by the then groundsman Tim Bridger, who worked against the calendar to repair the ravages of winter.

To our great regret, Tim suffered a breakdown in health early in the season and has since been on lighter duties, but never far from the Oval which still holds his interest.

We were fortunate that Frank McEwan was able to step into the breach without any interruptions to the restoration of the ground and the club has been grateful for his interest and co-operation despite the many demands on his time. Frank and his assistant Bill McAlister, are confident that the grass will be growing as well next September as it was last, and we will be very pleased to see this prediction confirmed.

Our two scorers Ian Smith and Robert Lumsdaine struggled manfully with the improvised scoreboard, but we understand that their conditions will be much improved next season.

A serious situation arose at Brookvale Oval at the beginning of the season with the resignation of the resident groundsman, but some great liaison work by Bruce Adrian ensured that a wicket was prepared for each match and few realise just how fortunate the club was in having Bruce to watch our interests. In this regard we are most grateful to Tim Beaumont, who held the fort until a full-time groundsman was appointed. The Warringah Shire Council is to be commended on its careful scrutiny of the varied applications it received and in Jonathon Hodson it would appear that the time taken will in the long run pay handsome dividends.

We have noticed the rapid deterioration of wickets in other municipalities which have been affected by changes in Local Government structure or by retirement of established curators, wickets which once were regarded as classic examples of the curator's art, are now playing similarly to the Manly wicket, which received so much adverse publicity a few years ago. We are fortunate therefore that the staff changes referred to above have been accomplished without any adverse effect on our wickets and we should now be attracting batsmen to the club instead of bowlers after easy pickings.

FINANCIAL REPORT

The Income and Expenditure Account discloses a surplus of £45/10/5 compared to £109/5/6 last year. The drop is due to increased administrative expenses although this is partly compensated by additional income in the form of Member's Subscriptions and revenue from Manly Oval which was not in operation last year.

The Social Fund Account shows a deficiency of £37/12/5, however, this does not reflect the worth of this side of the club's activities as a number of memorable functions were held during the year. It is anticipated the Social Committee will produce a surplus next year.

It will be noted that as proposed two years ago £700 has now been invested in gilt edge securities in the form of Commonwealth Bonds. The income from this asset will help cover the cost of materials to be purchased in future years.

Generally the club's financial position is still secure with an increase in net tangible assets of £8. Provided members meet their obligations to pay subscriptions as they fall due and thus reduce telephone and postage expenditure, next year should see a further consolidation.
