

### MANLY-WARRINGAH DISTRICT CRICKET CLUB

Gentlemen,

Your Management Committee has pleasure in submitting the 90th Annual Report and Balance Sheet for your consideration and adoption.

We felt at the beginning of the season that our 1st Grade side—surely the most powerful we have ever fielded—could well bring us Premiership honours. On the other hand, the 2nd, 3rd and 4th Grade teams, due to the loss of no less than 19 players from the previous season, were very youthful in character, and were expected to develop their potential, rather than provide any great success on the field.

Although the 1st Grade side were never out of calculations, and even retained a slight chance of contesting the Final right up to the last match, it had unexpected lapses during the season that caused a desperate battle to build up points towards the end. However that may be, if we confess to a little disappointment that we did not win the 1st Grade Premiership, we must also say that we have never seen such a feast of batsmanship as we saw from the Manly side this year. Jim Burke, Graham Thomas, Barry Rothwell and Terry Lee all gave superb displays at various times. No less outstanding was Peter Philpott's bowling. Even on the easy paced Manly wicket, Peter's variety, flight and direction brought him consistent success and his 60 wickets for the season is very gratifying, even if none of us are altogether surprised by it.

Our 2nd Grade struggled during the first part of the season, then showed marked improvement towards the end, and this very young side can be expected to perform much better next year. The 3rd and 4th Grade teams, considering their almost complete lack of grade experience, gave outstanding performances. Both were well placed throughout the season, and as can be read in the reports by their team captains, Tom Felton and Dick Woodfield, have already learned, apparently, to harness their own individual abilities to the general welfare of the team as a whole. If nothing else had come from the season, this in itself is more than worthwhile.

Of the two Shire teams, the C11, captained by Ron Watkins, was the most successful, and was a close contestant for a berth in the Finals. Since both these teams were also extremely youthful, we need have no cause for complaint at their performances.

In the Age competitions—Poidevin-Grey Shield and A. W. Green Shield—the Club also had a good year, the former side contesting the Final against Randwick. It had a pretty desperate struggle to get there, but again the lesson of teamwork and enthusiasm proved its value. The story of the competition is covered later in the report, and we could perhaps content ourselves here with saying that the conduct of the team in all its games and in the Final was a credit to the captain, Ken Turner, his players and to the Club..

Our other teams, the City and Suburban and our team in the M.W.C.A. competition both had enjoyable seasons, and were a source of replacement players for the higher grades when vacancies occurred.

Our position in the Club Championship was 9th, and in the various Grades as follows: First Grade, 6th; Second Grade, 15th; Third Grade, 3rd; Fourth Grade, 6th.

During the season, and on the initiative of Jim Burke, a Sunday knockout competition was organized among the Grade Clubs. This proved an outstanding success, and the competition will take place again next year under the control of the N.S.W.C.A. Your Committee feels that this is a most encouraging step in regenerating and developing interest in cricket, and we congratulate Jim for his management and organization of this very welcome additions to the cricketing programme.

While to date there have been no further changes in Grade Club boundaries, we remain adamant that the present policy of the Association, which is one of adjustment rather than development, is negative. It might well pay us to study the policy of the various codes of football — their development of the perimeter areas, and the formation of new clubs. In matters of publicity, too, we seem to lag, and we urge a more positive policy in publicising cricket. In a highly competitive world cricket simply cannot afford to stand still.

Within the Club the various sub-committees have worked well. Members are aware of the activities of the Social Committee, and we are very grateful indeed for their consistent work on our behalf. Apart from the various special functions held, this Committee undertakes the weekly organisation and running of the "Room at the Top" and it is heartening indeed to find their efforts rewarded with a season's profit of \$195.00. Members may not know so well of the activities of our Grounds and Gear Committee. Especial thanks must be offered to Ray Harvey and Max Howell for their work in this field—we have a new gear locker at Manly Oval, and we also have a comprehensive and realistic evaluation of the Club's gear. This will result in the estimated expenditure next year of some \$660.00 on material. This, of course, includes balls, our largest cost item, but the expenditure will have the effect of bringing our general playing gear to the best standard possible at all three Club grounds. The amount involved will bring home to all members the necessity to protect gear—and to those who need reminding, that the Annual Subscriptions are due and payable prior to the 1st October.

While there are more than eleven players available, Selectors are unlikely ever to achieve universal approval among those vieing for selection, but your three permanent Selectors, Bruce Cook, Len Carter and Jim Burke, together with the various team captains, were conscientious in their application to the problems of trying to achieve a balance among the talent offering.

Finally, no Annual Report would be complete without our very sincere thanks being expressed to those ladies who come forward from Saturday to Saturday, and indeed on any other occasion they may be required, and provide afternoon teas for the various grades. It is beyond question that their kindness is appreciated by all players on both sides and that theirs is a major contribution to an enjoyable afternoon's cricket. Thank you very much, ladies.

### HON. SECRETARIES AND ACTING HON. TREASURER

The Club offers its thanks to Mr. A. W. Turner for his period of service to the club in a number of capacities. Mr. Turner joined the Committee in 1958 and became Honorary Treasurer in 1962. He served in this capacity until he became Honorary Secretary in 1964. In expressing our thanks special mention must be made of the invaluable and unfailing assistance given by Mrs. Turner, Ken and Frank.

Following Mr. Turner's resignation Mr. L. A. Soman offered his services in a temporary capacity, and we are sincerely grateful for his work on the Club's behalf. In Mr. Alex Anderson we are very fortunate indeed to have gained a cricket administrator of very wide experience. He has been a Vice-President of the Club for many years and in addition has been Honorary Secretary of the Manly-Warringah Cricket Association since 1952-53 season. We look forward to a new and close association with Alex.

During the absence of our Honorary Treasurer, Mr. Bob Maxwell overseas, Mr. R. Kinsey became Acting Honorary Treasurer — again indicating his worth as an untiring worker in any capacity.

To all these gentlemen we offer our thanks.

### REPRESENTATIVE HONOURS

Barry Rothwell and Terry Lee were once again selected for Sheffield Shield and whilst their performances did not live up to expectations they, nevertheless, gave of their best. We are sure that they will again be selected for 1st Class Cricket in the future.

The Club would surely have been represented in Senior Cricket by Peter Philpott and Graham Thomas had it not been for their retirement.

Ian Howell, Peter Harvey and Ken Nichol were selected in the Colts Practice Squad and Ian was selected for the Colts team which played in Brisbane. Unfortunately, Ken injured his back at practise and was out of action for a considerable part of the season.

Frank Turner and Phillip Allum were selected in the Metropolitan

A. W. Green Shield team, the latter being appointed captain.

### FIRST GRADE REPORT

It was with great hopes that the First Grade side commenced the 1967-68 season. One might have suggested that this was the most powerful and best balanced combination Manly in its long history has ever fielded. Although, we were finally well placed at the conclusion of proceedings, our ambitions of another premiership unfortunately were not realised. Each individual contributed sound efforts during the season, while the team played extremely well as a whole. However, there were a number of outstanding performances, notably those of Grahame Thomas and Jim Burke whose aggregates speak for themselves. Each of them, during the season played some of the greatest innings seen at Manly for years.

Peter Philpott also had an outstanding season, capturing 60 wickets at a very low average. His assistance, both through his performance and knowledge, was invaluable.

Terry Lee, after a disappointing start to the season, later turned in some first class all-round performances.

This was a very happy team, playing brilliant cricket on many occasions and which, with an extra ounce of luck, could have quite conceivably won the competition.

The fielding apart from a few minor lapses, which are inevitable, was of a high standard throughout the season. In this sphere, Paul Stabback excelled. as did young Peter Harvey as his confidence grew.

With the experience gained this year, these two players should prove now to be valuable assets to the Club in forthcoming seasons. They will have much greater responsibility next season, as there could well be a few established players missing. The same situation also applies to Ken Nichol and Malcolm Elliott, who both showed last season that they are a class above the average player and indeed have the potential to achieve representative honours.

Each of these younger members supported their captain at all times and their dedication and application was noteworthy.

There was a disturbing lack of knowledge of the fundamentals of all aspects of the game shown by some young players who were brought into First Grade on various occasions, and one might think that senior members in the lower grades could accept much of the responsibility for this. Finally, a word for Tom Hart who has now officially announced his retirement, and who again performed very well this year. To Tom, we say thanks for his memorable service and companionship, and congratulations on a wonderful career.

Clive Philpott must also be sincerely thanked for his unselfish managerial services throughout another season.

### SECOND GRADE REPORT

The season completed was mainly one of development for the younger players, brought about by the retirement of several of the old stalwarts during the off season. The team as originally selected had no less than nine players under 21 years of age. This, by previous standards must have been one of the youngest, if not the youngest 2nd Grade team in the Club's history.

Throughout the season there was a continued improvement in most of the younger players. The fielding in the early matches let the team down tremendously, especially in the catching department, where the loss of at least three matches could be attributed to atrocious catching.

Towards the latter part of the season, however, it was a different story where some outstanding fielding performances helped thwart some of the leading teams in their fight for premiership honours. Most memorable being the "tied" match against University who were 2nd at the time and the final game against Waverley.

The batting throughout the season proved inconsistent due mainly to the lack of experience among the early batsmen. On numerous occasions a batsman would reach twenty or thirty runs and for no apparent reason throw his innings away. Far greater determination will be required if they are to succeed in any higher class of cricket.

Paul Stabback had a short but spectacular two rounds with us, scoring the only century of the season, 122 n.o. against Petersham before his elevation to 1st Grade.

Paul Spraggs scored most runs for the season — 454 at an average of 34.92. His highest score being 87 against Randwick. Paul is a player with tremendous potential but needs to devote more time to other facets of the game.

Alan Frazer and Ken Turner scored 393 and 343 runs respectively and at all times gave of their best.

Later in the season we were strengthened with the return of Ian Howell after a serious eye injury. Ian was fighting to regain his lost form and was rewarded with two fine innings of 94 and 76 n.o.

Some fine performances were given by Ross Fairhall and Steve Allum with special mention to the "all-rounders" Bill Simpson and Bernie Barnsley who contributed more than their share when we had our backs to the wall.

Mal McEachern bowled throughout the season, his most notable achievement being 5-16 against Petersham.

Tom Spencer was another bowler to impress with his "leg" breaks. Although given limited opportunities his improvement in "control" was most evident.

The Wicket Keeping was carried out for most of the season by Doug Timmons until his unfortunate injury in attempting a "Wally Grout" catch. Others to fill the position in a most capable manner were Neil Coltman, Bob Maxwell and Ross Hendy.

Our sincere thanks to Judy Gulliver our scorer and "Wallet watcher," Mrs. Turner and her lady assistants for their great help and assistance in preparing the afternoon teas, and all others who helped to make the season a most enjoyable one.

### THIRD GRADE REPORT

The Thirds had a very successful season and after Round 15 were placed equal second with St. George and so were drawn to play Sutherland, the eventual premiers, in what was virtually a semi-final. They were unfortunate to be caught on a wet wicket and were defeated on the 1st innings. In the last round, then in third position, the team played Gordon and, after losing very narrowly on the first innings, were defeated outright by a far more experienced side.

Throughout the season the team spirit was outstanding and on several occasions matches were won by sheer perseverance and determination. Thinking back over the season, it seems probable that our team was the youngest side in the competition, on most occasions fielding at least five or six players in the 15 or 16 years age group. At all times, the team was a real pleasure to captain.

I think it would be fair to say that the dominant reason for the team's successful season was the excellent fielding in most matches. Some splendid catches were taken, particularly in the close positions and the ground fielding at all times was very sound. Some of the slip catches taken by Tom Spencer, Frank Turner and Arthur Springall was quite outstanding.

The batting on most occasions was sound and the concentration and determination of the regular batsmen was well above average for this grade. In this regard, Phil Allum was quite outstanding and he played many valuable innings for his side and compiled the highest aggregate (349). His three innings of 69, 50 and 45 against Waverley, Sutherland and Gordon were all made against good bowling under adverse conditions. There is no doubt that Phil will quickly establish himself again next season and keep the higher grade batsmen on their toes. Arthur Springall again proved his value in batting, fielding and team spirit. David Headon had a very good season in the 3rds and 4ths and showed rare concentration for one so young, his batsmanship maturing considerably during the season.

Frank Turner played some splendid innings in compiling 331 in his first full season in grade. He has lots of power and all the shots and, with a little more concentration, will undoubtedly score many runs for Manly in the years to come. Other batsmen who contributed valuable innings during the season were Keith Fitzpatrick (including a century in the first match of the season), Paul Stephenson, Allan Turner, Andy Dessaix, Neil Coltman, Graham Beard and Ross Fairhall. It was pleasing to see Ross promoted to Seconds and his success there and in Poidevin-Gray matches. The running between wickets showed real improvement with David Headon, Frank Turner and Andy Dessaix setting examples.

Brian Kinsey was the outstanding bowler throughout the season. He sustained his speed well, was adaptable to whatever conditions obtained, at all times attacked the batsmen and never stopped trying. He thoroughly deserved his promotion to Seconds for the last match and made the most of this opportunity.

Bernie Barnsley performed very well in the early matches before his promotion. Paul Stephenson bowled very well on many occasions and, when he learns to adapt his speed and length to the conditions, will have even more consistent success. Tom Spencer went from strength to strength with the Thirds and no team (or for that matter, no batsman) played him with any confidence. Given the required amount of bowling, he will be a very valuable member of Manly attacks for many seasons. Graham Beard showed real promise as a leg-spinner and as his experience broadens he will also be a real asset to the Club. His 6-27 against Cumberland with a very wet ball was an outstanding effort.

Ian Felton, promoted for the last match against Gordon's experienced batting side, recorded a plendid 4-30 from 15 overs and showed promise in the off-spinning department.

The Thirds were most fortunate for a good part of the season to have Ross Hendy as 'keeper. He concentrated very well, made some excellent catches and stumpings and at all times was a real inspiration to his bowlers and fieldsmen. He also demonstrated very good Club spirit and it was gratifying to see him promoted towards the end of the season. Neil Coltman, Barney Murray and Mal. Storey also 'kept on various occasions.

The team is very much indebted to Rolf Kinsey for his support as scorer and general al-factorum. To him we express our sincere thanks and appreciation.

### 4th GRADE REPORT

The Club can look forward to many years of cricket prosperity if this season's 4th Grade side gives a true indication of the talent available. At the start of the season only one member of the team had played grade cricket before and the average age (excluding the Captain) was a little over 17 years. The results show just what a combination of ability and enthusiasm can do.

Several players earned promotion early in the season and David Headon, Ross Hendy and Paul Stephenson continued to perform very well in higher grades. The replacements, who included Neil Boden, Barney Murray, Bob Maxwell, Phil Stabback and Andy Dessaix, succeeded in keeping pressure on the 3rd Graders who had to fight to retain their positions.

A number of close matches, particularly two memorable occasions at Manly Oval, added excitement to the season. These were both one run results and the St. George game was won with the last ball of the last over after a hat-trick by Ian MacDonald and a last wicket partnership of 75 runs by St. George. The number of spectators on this occasion proved that the game itself rather than "name players" still has drawing power.

The spirit of the team could not have been higher and this factor was reflected in the consistent performances of Don Farrell, Neil Boden, Greg Wilson and Andy Dessaix as well as the rarer flashes of real brilliance produced by Alan Howell, Dave McGuinness and Phil Stabback when really necessary. The club can expect many years of wicket taking from spin bowlers Ian Felton and Ian MacDonald who did a lot of hard work and made almost all opposing batsmen unsure of themselves. Barney Murray did a solid job behind the stumps and once again his consistency as a middle order batsman. We hope Graham Blades and Mick Sainsbery will be able to start at the beginning of next season not half-way through. Although Greg Harper only appears in the also batted list, his century before tea in the last round (his first game in grade) showed that he will be a real force in the club in future years.

### C1 SHIRE REPORT

This team finished 3rd in the competition after being defeated by Gordon in the semi-finals in the first innings. Out of the 14 games played Manly-Warringah won 10 (two outright) and lost four (on the first innings).

In comparison to most of its rivals, Manly-Warringah was an inexperienced side (average age 17) and for the most part played entertaining cricket. The future of the club seems well assured if the younger members of this team continue to develop as was the case this past season.

The batting fell mainly on the shoulders of Greg Harper, Alan Chapman and Kevin Davidson all of whom displayed great temperament. Greg Harper was the team's only century maker (115 n.o. against Pennant Hills) and is a player of great potential.

The strength in this side lay in the ability of its bowlers to dismiss the opposition for a comparatively low score. Geoff Nichol took most wickets (42) and invariably had success each time he was called to the crease.

Ron Davis was the outstanding catcher and he was ably supported by Alan Chapman, Alan Druery, Greg Harper and Kevin Davidson. However, the ground fielding in general could have been improved.

The Club is grateful to the parents and friends of the team who not only gave their support and encouragement but also assisted in transport to the various grounds.

### SHIRE II REPORT

This year's Shire II team did not have nearly as successful a season as last year, with the result that it finished many places lower in the competition table. The season was not devoid of highlights, however. Nick Berryman was the only century-maker and deservedly won the batting average. Other noteworthy performances with the bat were recorded by Greg Davies, Chris Graham and Mick Sainsbery—the latter's 67 n.o. in a little over half an hour almost gained a miraculous victory for the team in its last match. The bowling honours clearly belonged to Grahame McLarn who controlled his leg breaks with considerable accuracy in obtaining 27 wickets. Matchwinning bowling efforts were also handed in by Robin Voss, Ken Little and Mick Sainsbery. Unfortunately the bowlers, and indeed the whole team, were often let down by poor slips catching and bad ground fielding. However, there is promise of better things to come next season when several, at least, of this team will be pressing hard for higher honours.

### POIDEVIN-GRAY SHIELD

The Poidevin-Gray competition came to life last season with a much more realistic draw in which each team played the other within their own division, culminating in a final played over two full days.

The fact that such days happened to be Sundays marked a turning point in the Association's history and we hope that the favourable public reaction was well noted.

With Ken Nichol injured and Peter Harvey the only other team member with current first grade experience, it was proven once again that there is no substitute for keenness and self sacrifice when a competition is to be played over a holiday period.

After a shaky start in which the above qualities prevailed, the team, profiting from new-found confidence, unwound a string of meritorius wins over North Sydney, Balmain and Mosman, a washout with University and a tough fighting draw with Sydney. With a path to the final wide open we then faltered against Northern Districts and were well beaten. Thanks, however, to a sound win by the then form team Mosman over our main rival, University, we were still in the final.

South of the harbour similar events had been unfolding and it was not until almost the last ball of the rounds had been bowled that it could be established that Randwick would be our opponent at Waverley Oval.

Space does not permit full justice to be done to this game which had everything a game of cricket should produce — tension, great individual performances with bat and ball, brilliant fielding and a last ditch stand which took us to the brink of victory.

From a host of incidents we recall the lone hand played by Randwick Colt A. Turner which saved his team from collapse — the sustained bowling effort of Tom Spencer and his memorable ninth wicket stand with Paul Stephenson.

Over the period of the competition it is impossible to single out any one member of the team for special mention as this was an undoubted team effort and each in his turn performed some feat with bat, ball or in the field.

Consistent scoring requires a sound start and Ross Fairhall and Paul Spraggs emerged as the most promising opening pair in the Club. Only one point clouds their future — if the Army claims Ross, who will get Spraggsie to the games on time?

Paul Stephenson was the find of the series with sound all-round performances, and like most of the team still has many years of Poidevin-Gray competition ahead. Tom Spencer, who will be hard to replace, is the only one to pass the age barrier but the call-up could also claim Ken Nichol.

Cold statistics will have to tell the rest of the story — a story of which the club may well be proud, a story known only to a few of the families who were absorbed from the first to the last ball of a series of cricket at its best.

The team was captained by Ken Turner, whose infectious enthusiasm and fitness was a major factor in developing the team spirit and keenness present in this side. It was an excellent season.

### A. W. GREEN SHIELD

A squad of 14 boys were chosen to represent the club in the Under 16 A. W. Green Shield. The team was capably led by Frank Turner and although it did not look as strong as in previous seasons the team gave a fairly good account of itself by winning three, losing three and drawing one.

Manly got away to a bad start in the first match being sent in on a wet wicket against North Sydney and were beaten on the first innings after the wicket had dried out. They won their next three matches and seemed to have a good chance, but following losses in the next two games and a draw in the last match finished in fourth place.

The batting generally was disappointing. It was expected the team would be fairly strong in this department with two regular 3rd graders in Frank Turner and Phillip Allum, but the team failed to score heavily and on a couple of occasions it was left to the tailenders to show how. No centuries were scored and only five scores of over 50 were recorded. P. Allum was the leading batsman with an average of over 50 and batted well on occasions.

Opener Chris Graham scored most runs and went for his shots from the start and hit the ball very hard. The fielding was good, many fine catches being taken. Frank Turner set a good example in the field and all the team backed him up. Chris Graham kept wickets in fine style taking 13 catches, plus 11 stumpings.

Congratulations go to F. Turner and P. Allum for being selected in the Representative side at the Sydney Cricket Ground against Country and also at Newcastle. P. Allum was made Captain of both these teams.

It was pleasing to see the players parents whenever possible. Thanks go out to Mrs. Turner and the other ladies for providing refreshments at Manly Oval. The team was managed by Don Allum who was very pleased with the boys' behaviour.

### CITY AND SUBURBAN REPORT

The team played 22 matches for 14 wins and 8 losses, of which five were for less than 7 runs. The team scored 2,807 runs for the loss of 196 wickets at 14.32 — the opposition 2,343 runs, 186 wickets at 13.18.

The fielding was excellent this year in all phases — especially 'keeping by Cliff Watson who held 11 catches out of the 66 taken by the team. A mention must be given to Nelson Lawrence and Albert Goodridge for their general all-round fielding.

The annual dinner was held at the Pacific Hotel in Manly who once again turned on a very fine meal.
