

### MANLY-WARRINGAH DISTRICT CRICKET CLUB

Gentlemen,

Your Management Committee has pleasure in presenting for your consideration and adoption the 92nd Annual Report and Balance Sheet.

Although not without some disappointments, it was again a successful season, highlighted by Third Grade winning the Mitchell Cup. On top through most of the season, they attacked each game with enthusiasm and team spirit, and it was this rather than any outstanding player that brought success. Keith Fitzpatrick took over the Captaincy from Tom Felton who retired at the conclusion of last season, and there is no doubt that Keith's job was made much easier by the groundwork of teamwork and self-discipline that Tom had built up in the Third Grade side. Congratulations to Keith and all his players.

First Grade, half-way through the season seemed ready to emulate the previous year, when they contested the final but, with no apparent reason were unable to record a single victory after Christmas. What they did do, however, was to contest the final of the Rothman's Knockout, losing to Sutherland. The feature of this game was tight bowling and brilliant fielding by both teams, but it is no disgrace to our players to acknowledge that the young Sutherland team's performance in the field was of a calibre rarely seen even in first-class cricket.

Of the Second and Fourth Grades: Fourth's did the better, and like last year was always in a handy position. This side, of course, is a very young one and suffers from frequent disruption due to furnishing players to higher grades. On the whole it is gratifying that they do as well as they do and Dick Woodfield is to be congratulated on the full support that he always receives from his players — the encouragement of team and club spirit is as important in the introductory grades as actual success on the field.

Second Grade remains an enigma — it should do much better than it does. It has the players and certainly does not lack team harmony and spirit. It must surely do better in the coming season.

The Poidevin-Gray team, premiers last year, were unable to make up the lee-way of an early loss to Northern Districts, who ultimately won the final. It was a very good side and could again be a strong contestant next year. The Green Shield side, again an extremely young one, played very creditably and they, too, can be expected to look forward to further development next year.

Of the remaining grade sides the two Fifth Grade teams had a mixed season. Dick Bathgate, Dennis Booth and Peter Hart who shared the captaincy did all, and more, than could reasonably be expected, but we will not develop these talented young cricketers to their fullest until we are able to provide a player or manager with a strong background of grade cricket experience.

The City and Suburban team had an enjoyable season even if they did find themselves from time to time under strength.

We also fielded our usual side of very young players in the Manly-Warringah Cricket Association D Grade competition, but the introduction of two C Grade sides playing on turf has had an effect on this team, for its best players are constantly being elevated.

The three club coaches, Jim Burke, Ian Howell and Mick Pawley, were very active throughout the season, but have recommended some changes for next year — they feel that more emphasis must be given to the very junior players. It would be very appropriate to thank our parent body, the N.S.W.C.A. for making it possible to offer payment on a regular basis to our coaches — and in this regard also to thank club members who have also made donations for this purpose. The awards offered annually by the Cricketers Club of N.S.W. were given to lan Felton and Paul Stephenson. Our sincere thanks to the Club for their encouragement to our young cricketers.

Social activities are discussed in detail later in the report, but the effect of the fund raising by this committee is self-evident. The Chairman, Mr. Stephenson, and Mrs. Stephenson, gave very generously, both of their time and their home, with the result that the Social Committee and the ladies associated with it, have made a wonderful contribution to good fellowship among the Club Members and supporters as well as their most welcome help financially. The "Room at the Top" was again a major meeting place for all players, umpires, and supporters. This year, too, through the generosity of Mr. Ray Beard, we were able to display once again our photographs of historical and current interest. The removable boards he has provided have proved of really outstanding interest to our own players and to visitors. Our lady associates were again with us to provide and serve afternoon teas, and we thank all these who were kind enough to help us in this direction.

The Committee had a busy year with rather more meetings than usual, and the various committees and sub-committees were very active on your behalf. The main committees were: Permanent Selectors, Messrs. L. Carter (Chairman), M. Howell and T. Felton; Social Committee, Messrs. J. Stephenson (Chairman), R. Beard, M. Pawley, K. Nichol, P. Moore, I. Howell, M. Elliot, B. Kinsey, M. McEachern and A. Anderson (Convenor). Grounds and Gear: Messrs. M. Howell (Chairman). R. Harvey and A. Anderson. Coaching: Messrs. S. Sismey (Chairman). J. Burke, B. Cook, J. Stephenson and M. Howell.

The Club's finances are in a sound position, but it will of course be noted that we lost \$189 on general activities. The stock position, however, is good and it is anticipated that expenditure on materials in the coming season will be much lighter. Our Honorary Treasurer, Mr. Rolf Kinsey, is at present on leave overseas and we wish him a happy holiday and safe return.

With the generous assistance of Manly Council we have established at Grahams Reserve a permanent practice complex consisting of two hard wickets and two turf wickets. As we can use these from either end, this will give us virtually eight practise wickets and these being off the actual playing field, the difficulties normally encountered with maintenance will be removed. In addition of course the groundsman's job at Manly Oval will be greatly facilitated and the ground itself relieved of much wear and tear. We regard this as a major step in the Club's progress and we thank the Manly Council for sharing the cost with us.

### TAIWAN UNIVERSITY CRICKETERS VISIT

In January this year a cricket group from the University of Taiwan organised by Mr. E. D. Darby, M.L.A., visited Manly-Warringah and its accommodation and tuition in cricket was undertaken by our Club.

None of the visitors had played previously, nor had they ever seen the game played. Obviously, then, our objectives had to be modest — in the five weeks available we could hope to do no more than give the students a working knowledge of how to play the game, and the basic fundamentals of its technique. With their wholehearted co-operation and enthusiasm, progress was excellent. Various games were arranged and with the encouragement of opponents who understood the instructive rather than the competitive nature of the matches, our charges became reasonably proficient in their own play and certainly able to appreciate good play in others. By the end of their stay two or three outstanding players were little short of lower grade cricket standards — an astonishing performance in so short a time.

Mr. Pax Trim, a former First Grade cricketer with this Club, and Mr. Bruce Cook, a Life Member, and former Club and State cricketer, undertook the coaching activities, the former foregoing his entire annual holidays to spend the time with the students. This very generous gesture was undoubtedly due to Mr. Trim's dedication to cricket and also to the very strong bonds of friendship which developed between the visitors and all who came in contact with them. It is difficult to find words with which to express our appreciation to both Mr. Trim and Mr. Cook, all the Club Members and others who readily came forward to assist; including the legendary Mr. Bert Oldfield.

The teams which played the students were Manly Fisherman's Club, Manly Catholic Old Boys, M.W.D.C.C., Manly-Warringah Leagues Club, Channel 7, N.S.W. Parliamentarians and Neil Harvey's XI. We thank all these Clubs for their assistance in our undertaking. It might be appropriate to add that the exhibition of batting technique given by Mr. Harvey added considerably to the cricket education of some of our own young players.

Whether cricket will succeed in becoming established in Taiwan as a result of these young physical education trainees learning its rudiments, lies in the future, but from letters received so far, since returning home they have played in at least four games against teams from various sources, a cricket ground has been established and the player-manager, Alfred Chien is engaged in translating the laws of cricket into Chinese.

Hospitality was extended to the visitors by the Mayor of Manly, Ald. Isles; and the President of the Shire, Cr. Huntingdon, in the form of a reception; and suitable gifts to commemorate their visit to Manly-Warringah were given to each guest. The Deputy Premier, Mr. Willis, also received them on behalf of the Premier, Mr. R. W. Askin. The students, hosts and club officials were entertained at the home of the Chinese Consul, Mr. C. Y. Yang, and Mrs. Yang. On their final day in Sydney the team had the honour to be received by His Excellency, the Governor, Sir Roden Cutler, V.C., K.C.M.G., C.B.E.

All the players were billeted in the Manly-Warringah district at the homes of various club members and well wishers. To the hosts, we simply say, thank you. This may seem inadequate, but we know that they feel as we do — that the warm friendships which we all shared make thanks superflous.

At this time he is in England playing Lancashire League cricket—an experience which will prove valuable to him in future seasons.

Mal Elliott found a place in the Metropolitan XI, and prior to a very successful tour of the West Indies with the Australian Schoolboys' XI Paul Stephenson represented the N.S.W.C.A. against both the City and Suburban and Combined Services teams at the S.C.G.

### FIRST GRADE REPORT

This report, written by the Captain, Jim Burke, naturally makes no mention of his own splendid performance. Jim headed the batting averages with an average of 63.83 in 14 innings in one of which he scored a fine undefeated 107 against Gordon. Jim writes as follows:

Season 1969-70 proved very enjoyable, but also very disappointing. We saw some extremely fine individual performances, but unfortunately after Christmas the team did not function as a team. We all anticipated a very successful season for the team after such a fine performance last season.

The reason for the team's failure is very puzzling and a little hard to pin-point. However, I will venture to say that the prime reason was the fact that we lost Mick Pawley for five matches when representing his State for the first time in his career. Speaking of Mick at this stage, he is most certainly our best bowler, and he showed this by winning the bowling averages. His fielding is always superb, but with the bat Mick did not realise his potential and this possibly might have been another factor in the team's failure. Mick must have gone very close to gaining a place in the Australian XI to tour New Zealand, but in any case he will be gaining very valuable experience during his jaunt to the U.K. to play Lancashire League cricket.

Another of the reasons, I feel, was our poor fielding with the loss of Mick Pawley, Peter Moore and Peter Harvey — our three best fieldsmen. In fact, in two games after Christmas we put down some 17 catches! Add to this the failure of the middle and late batting and I feel we have possibly covered the reasons for our disappointing season.

However, as mentioned previously some fine individual performances were achieved. Firstly, Peter Philpott's great double of 550 runs and 45 wickets which earned "Percy" \$500 in prizemoney from "The Herald's" Best and Fairest Award. This proved a fitting finale to the season for "Percy" at all times tried his hardest and he proved to be one of the team's most valuable members.

We were extremely fortunate to gain the services of John Kasper from New Zealand. John was undoubtedly our best batsman and we were all very fortunate to see some very fine innings from him. Obviously, John should represent his country in the not too far distant future, and while we wish him well in achieving this distinction we will be extremely sorry to lose his services for next season. His fielding in close, particularly at leg-slip was of the highest standard.

lan Howell again showed his undoubted ability, scoring over 600 runs in a very competent manner. Ian, in my opinion, would score extremely well if given the opportunity to play in first-class cricket. His technique is almost faultless and if lan does play a full season next year he should score near 1,000 runs. All he needs is more confidence in his own ability. His century against Cumberland was typical of the way lan can bat when he has that positive mental approach which he should produce more often.

The rest of the batting was disappointing, with flashes of brilliance from Peter Moore and Paul Spraggs. Paul's century against Northern Districts was probably the most brilliant of the season. Paul is obviously happier opening up the innings and in this role he could develop into a real match winner.

Unfortunately, we lost Peter Moore to Brisbane and Darcy Good to Melbourne mid-way through the season and this left a gap in our batting. Peter Harvey had a disappointing season in First Grade, but I feel sure he will regain his position. His fielding at all times was brilliant.

Graeme Beard came into the side in the latter part of the season and gained some valuable experience which should stand him in good stead in the seasons ahead.

Our bowling at all times was our strength, and if it had been better supported in the field our result would have been more favourable. Ken Nichol showed great improvement on the previous season capturing 28 wickets on batting surfaces which did not help pace bowlers at all. He was ably supported in the pace section by Mal McEachern, Brian Kinsey and then finally Paul Stephenson. Paul showed great promise and when he develops a more aggressive approach he will prove a nasty customer to opposing batsmen.

One of the most pleasing aspects of the season was the great improvement shown by popular Tom Spencer. Big Tom captured 36 wickets as our third spinner, and on more than one occasion he proved almost unplayable. Tom has a big future in the game, his fielding is nothing short of brilliant, and with an improvement in his "attitude" towards his batting he is going to be a very valuable member of the "Blues" for many years to come.

Last but not least was the brilliant keeping by our very popular team member "Rolls" Elliott. In fact Rolls had his best season, taking more victims than any other 'keeper in Sydney by a margin of some ten wickets. A very fine performance culminating in his selection in the Metropolitan team, which is a stepping stone to State selection.

To Clive Philpott our so efficient scorer and team treasurer, thank you once again from myself and the boys of the team. We all look forward to your company in the coming season.

That's it for 69-70. As mentioned, not a great season, but there is some good ability there and we all look forward to a successful 70-71.

### SECOND GRADE REPORT

When the team was originally selected it appeared to be the most formidable Second Grade side to represent the club for many years. However, this was not to prove the case, although six of the original team selected were to gain promotion and represent their Club in First Grade at various times throughout the season (altogether eight players were to gain promotion).

The batting throughout the season was very disappointing with the exception of several splendid individual performances. The team suffered badly from many indifferent batting displays. Players battled to find form which eluded them for most of the season. It was quite common for half of the "bastmen" to be dismissed for less than 100 runs, relying on the lower batsmen to bring some respectability to the score which they managed on many occasions. A lot of credit must go to those players, namely: Ross Hendy, lan MacDonald and lan Felton for the manner in which they fought back under adverse conditions with some fine individual performances, all of which were of considerable embarrassment to the recognised batsmen.

Of the batsmen who performed so well throughout the season, Graham Beard headed the list with the only century of the season: 110 against Mosman. Graham also had a fine 76 against St. George and had two other scores over 50 to his credit. Altogether he scored 397 runs at an average of 30.5, an excellent performance. His form earned him promotion to First Grade later in the season.

Greg Harper narrowly missed his century (96 not out against Waverley). Greg started the season in fine style only to lose form towards the later part of the season. Even with this handicap Greg still managed to be the leading run getter with 461 runs at an average of 21.9. We can look forward to a lot of runs from this young cricketer in the future.

Darcy Good, a most experienced cricketer, was to prove a most consistent batsman and a fine team player. His 82 runs against Western Suburbs was great delight and it wasn't long before his promotion to a higher grade. His transfer interstate was a sad blow to the club.

Paul Spraggs, after a late start to the season through injury, made a tremendous impression as soon as he was selected in Second Grade. In five innings he amassed 224 runs at an average of 74.6, highlighted with a magnificent 89 against University. His promotion to First Grade was inevitable.

Laurie Stokoe had a disappointing first season with us, never quite settling down but showed on occasions what a powerful stroke player he is. His 71 against St. George was a great effort, proving his undoubted ability.

Neil Coltman also had a disappointing season with the bat, failing to "get going" almost the entire season — but to his credit not once was there any display of temperament when things were going against him. His enthusiastic response to whatever duty he was called upon to perform was greatly appreciated. Neil took over the wicketkeeping whilst Ross Hendy was on the injured list, and did a remarkably fine job. It's not every team which can "sport" two such fine 'keepers.

Ross Hendy: what a fine season he had, scoring 292 runs at an average of 26.5 which included some very fine innings (including one of 59 not out against Balmain). When you consider the pressure under which his runs were scored, all the more credit to him. His wicket keeping again was first-class.

lan Macdonald must be rated the "most improved batsman of the team" with his continued improvement with the bat, his undoubted ability with the ball, coupled with some excellent fielding, the club has an excellent player of the future.

Before leaving the batsmen I must mention the effort of Steve Allum who was promoted for the last match against "Sydney." Steve batted in brilliant style to score an excellent 87 runs.

The bowling department was perhaps the most encouraging aspect of the whole team's performances throughout the year. Only twice during the entire season did our opponents score in excess of 250 runs.

The fast bowling position was shared by Paul Stephenson and Brian Kinsey, with Jeff MacPherson replacing Mal McEachern on his retirement. Paul Stephenson gained promotion to First Grade on his return from the West Indies. This left the bulk of the bowling to Brian Kinsey (ever reliable) and Jeff MacPherson. Brian again proved a very good and reliable bowler, capturing 24 wickets at an average of 14.2. Jeff started in Seconds at a "trot" but certainly came home with a "gallop," capturing 16 wickets in his last three matches—including 7-45 against Sutherland and 5-19 against North Sydney — to finish equal leading wicket taker with I. Felton with 29 wickets at an average of 13.4, being the lowest average.

The spin department was shared by Reg Hunt, G. Beard, I. Felton and I. MacDonald. With Graham Beard's promotion to First Grade this made the way clear for lan MacDonald to join the ranks — an opportunity he grasped with both hands. He proved a perfect foil to lan Felton's "off" breaks. The continued development of both these players was most encouraging with both boys showing tremendous potential. Ian Felton in capturing 29 wickets for the season had some fine performances, including 7-31 against "Sydney," 5-90 against University and 5-56 against Petersham.

Reg Hunt again proved a great asset to the team with his allround ability. Although not having one of his best seasons with the bat, he again proved his value as a good club man. I would like to mention all other players individually but space will not permit, so I must thank them collectively for a most enjoyable season.

In closing I would like to thank Rolf Kinsey our scorer and banker and to the ladies at the "Room on the top" our sincere thanks.



### THIRD GRADE REPORT

Keith Fitzpatrick reports that his team put up a consistent performance to win both the Minor and Major Premierships. A significant factor in the success of the team was that basically it remained the same throughout the season and the players and team improved from match to match.

A genuine team spirit developed during the season and this was illustrated by the manner in which the batsmen fought strongly down to No. 11, bowlers rose to the occasion and the fieldsmen threw themselves at everything.

All players had their moments of glory, but it was essentially a team effort which carried the day.

In the final, which was played on Manly Oval against Sutherland, Manly scored 267 on the first day and the second day being washed out Manly being Minor Premiers were declared Premiers. It was bad luck for Sutherland who had proved themselves worthy opponents.

17 matches were played, of which we won 1 outright, 11 on the first innings, drew three and lost 2 on the first. A total of 3,461 runs were scored by Manly for the loss of 167 wickets — an average of 20.7 as against our opponents 2,591 runs for the loss of 182 wickets—an average of 14.2.

A particularly pleasing aspect of the season was the manner in which the younger players applied themselves. The rashness and inability to knuckle down, which usually goes hand in hand with youth, was generally missing.

Kevin Davidson as an opening batsman rarely failed to give the side a good start. He headed the batting aggregate and average, and, for good measure, also topped the bowling average.

Kevin scored 86 in the opening match against North Sydney and this was only the first of many fine innings. When the team got away to a disastrous start in the final Kevin showed mature temperament in scoring an invaluable 54. His bowling showed real promise, although it sometimes lacked direction. He usually bowled in short spells and had the happy knack of picking up vital wickets. This lad shows great promise which, I feel, has been fostered by the selectors' policy of not rushing him too quickly into higher grades.

Frank Turner came to the team just before Christmas and proved his worth by scoring 35 against Cumberland in his first match. He has "potential unlimited" and played several innings which showed that he is on the road to harnessing it. Frank's innings of 26 in the final was scored at a crucial time and showed maturity.

Both Alan Frazer and Neil Boden played many sound innings without progressing to really high scores. Alan showed commendable determination and his 62 against University was a match-winning effort. Neil proved to be the man for a crisis, as his last innings were played when things were going badly for the team. In one innings he had the distinction of taking six catches, several of which he made into chances.

The Phil Allum who commenced the season bore no resemblance to the Phil Allum who finished the season. He began by scoring 117 runs in 12 innings, but his last 5 innings totalled 261—highlighted by a 125 against Northern Districts, the only century scored for the thirds. Once Phil found his form there was no stopping him. He mastered all bowlers and was particularly severe on the spinners.

Greg Wilson and Steve Allum both showed ability if not consistency. Each remained keen and tried hard throughout although things didn't go right for them. Greg applied himself well and he will certainly show marked improvement in the seasons to come. Steve dropped back to the Fourths and after finding his true form finished the season in seconds, scoring 76 in the final match.

The opening attack was carried by Phil Stabback and Des Hartman. Phil was Vice-Captain and rendered valuable assistance to me and to the team as a whole. His accuracy is borne out by his average of 12.2 runs per wicket and he always attacked the batsman. His effort of 5 for 39 against Gordon was a match-winner.

Des Hartman, a newcomer to the club, bowled without much luck in the early games, but once he settled down showed his true form. Des, who has had a lot of First Grade experience with Cumberland, utilised this and thought many batsmen out with his studied approach to his bowling. He was an excellent team-man and was ever ready to impart his knowledge to the younger players.

Four for 33 against Northern District was his best bowling figures and he finished the season in great style with the bat when he scored a great 44 in the final. He commenced batting with the score 7 for 181 and was last man out at 267.

John and Reg Hunt proved to be the two best leg-spinners in the competition. John showed that he could bowl accurately and economically for long periods as he bowled to his field. He flighted the ball well and contained all batsmen. In batting he scored a dashing 33 against Sutherland in the final.

Reg, who was dropped from Second Grade in December, gave the team his wholehearted support. He always seemed able to gain a vast amount of turn and there wasn't a batsman who could pick his wrong-un. His figures of 4 for 9 in one innings is a good indication of how little most batsmen knew about him.

Two 'keepers were used during the season, Barney Murray and Ron Holmes. Ron, a newcomer to the club, took over after the second round and proved to be a most capable 'keeper as well as being a thorough gentleman. He held some fine catches and the manner in which he kept to the spinners helped them immensely and gained them many wickets. As a batsman, Ron was a capable No. 10 and would have scored more runs had his partners not got out.

The "Spin-Twins" lan Felton and lan MacDonald produced such good form early in the season that they earned quick promotion to Second Grade.

Jeff MacPherson, who was promoted from Fourth Grade, merely passed through the team on his way to seconds. His figures of 15 wickets in three matches at a cost of 6.5 runs per wicket speaks for itself.

Laurie Stokoe and Neil Coltman made brief appearances and acquitted themselves well before returning to Second Grade. Other players who participated in only a few games were Ken Little, Graham Blades, Stephen Green, Geoff Nichol and John Branscombe. All were enthusiastic and gave of their best for which the team was very appreciative.

As the fielding of all players, throughout the season, reached such a high standard, individuals have not been mentioned. The keenness and ability of the team in the field contributed to its success in no small way.

### FIFTH GRADE "A" REPORT

This was one of the youngest teams in the Competition and due to an accumulation of reasons finished well down the ladder after a promising start to the season. With numerous changes made in the side after the first few rounds and some very sub-standard wickets to play on, there was not the strength in the batting or the bowling to gain the team victory in several matches. However, despite these difficulties the team spirit remained good but a more conscientious approach to the game was needed by some of the players.

The bowling on the whole was our strongest point. Steve Green bowled exceptionally well at the beginning of the season and thoroughly merited his promotion to a higher grade; he still finished as the most successful bowler with 24 wickets at 11 runs per wicket. Of the regular bowlers Steve Erichsen was very consistent with his medium pace deliveries taking 29 wickets at 16.21 runs per wicket. Don Felton bowled his off-spinners very accurately and Andy Elkin spun the ball prodigiously on occasions. However, he needs to bowl more slowly and give the ball more air in the future when he could turn into a very competent bowler.

The batting was, apart from a few isolated occasions, very poor. Lack of experience and technique on poor wickets together with the need to graft for runs let the side down and wickets were needlessly thrown away on many occasions. This resulted in a large number of very low scores. During his short spell in the team Alan Drury batted very well indeed and the 81 against University in the first round was a fine knock. He also made a good 67 against Northern Districts "A" and still finished the best batsman with 224 runs at an average of 37.33.

Graham Dudley also had a successful season and scored the most runs, 343, at an average of 17.15 with good scores of 78, 64 and 48. Good support came from John Haysom and also Steve Erichsen who is developing into a useful all-rounder. Of the very young players Mark Stedman appears to have the makings of a great player with a wide range of shots, good footwork particularly against the spinners and a sound technique. Sam Mesite is also a player in the same category and much can be expected of these two youngsters in the future.

The fielding generally, was mediocre, but on a few occasions quite good. Graham McLarn and Mark Stedman took some fine catches near the wicket and John Haysom and Steve Erichsen were very able outfielders.

The Captain, Dick Bathgate, who made this report, kept wickets for most of the season. He was ably relieved on occasions by Graham Dudley and Peter Hunt.

### GROUNDS

### Manly Oval

The almost total lack of grass on wickets prepared for matches was not due to weather conditions, or lack of endeavour on the part of the groundsman, Merv Paynter, but was brought about by the lack of sprigging, etc., early in the season. ### Weldon Park

The wicket area, whilst still providing our younger players with plenty of excitement, was generally well prepared although heavier rolling is necessary before good wickets can be expected.

### Practice Wickets

The completion of the new enclosed practice wickets at L. M. Grahams Reserve should prove of immense value to the club, there being two turf and two "Laycol" wickets for use as weather dictates.
