ANNUAL REPORT — 1970-71

Gentlemen,

Unfortunately the 1970-71 season was one that was consistently marred by rain — rarely sufficient to wash a game out completely, but only too often sufficient to spoil what promised to be good even matches. Particularly disappointing was the last day wash-out of the Second Grade final, where we had set Balmain quite a formidable total to chase. As a result, Balmain being minor premiers were declared winners of the grade, and we extend our congratulations to them, together withour sincere thanks for their warm hospitality at Drummoyne Oval where the final was played.

Last year we had to congratulate Keith Fitzpatrick as Third Grade Captain on leading his team to premiership honours, and this year we are no less sincere in congratulating Keith on his Second Grade finishing Runners-up. Outstanding performances in the team itself are, of course recorded in the team report, but Brian Kinsey had a most outstanding season taking 34 wickets at an average of 12.1. We record this with particular pleasure as Brian is an outstanding team man and club worker. All in all Second Grade played good purposeful cricket in all departments, with fine fielding pivoting round the clean and efficient wicketkeeping of Ron Holmes.

As Ian Howell the First Grade Captain says in his report, this team faced a year of rebuilding following the loss of Peter Philpott, Mike Pawley, John Kasper and one or two others of the previous year's team. The result was a very unflattering second last, but we feel this was not a true result. Some matches were only narrowly lost, and often this was entirely due to lack of experience of a very young side under rainy conditions. If Jim Burke was again our outstanding batsman, then Phil Allum must be acknowledged as our outstanding young prospect, and improvement at his present rate must bring this very fine young strokemaker into calculations for representative honours. Whatever our lack of success this last year, our prospects for next are much brighter, for with the improvement so evident in our existing team towards the end of the season, it is going to be greatly augmented by the anticipated return of Terry Lee and Mike Pawley.

Third Grade, all things considered, had a good season, but the lack of consistency in the batting mentioned by their captain, Dick Woodfield, is the obvious weakness. Since this is evident also in the Fourth and Fifth Grades, perhaps the club coaches may be able to develop our batting potential more by emphasizing the mental at least as strongly as the technical facet of batting. Dick Woodfield's own performance in taking 40 wickets at an average of 10.7 was outstanding, and indeed it is obvious that it was bowling and fielding that accounted for this team finishing a creditable fourth in the competition.

The Fourth Grade and the two Fifth Grades, as in all clubs, suffer from constantly changing players, and as a result a captain's job is anything but easy — particularly as our own position is aggravated by a lack of seasoned grade players to give these teams solidity and guidance. It becomes more and more apparent that to give our young players the chance to develop their talents to the full, that they must play alongside more experienced players. Unfortunately we do not seem to be able to provide them at the moment.

The Poidevin-Gray and A. W. Green Shield teams had mixed success, although the former looked to be a very good side indeed. Both teams, however, were "young" in as much as most will be available next year. With regard to the Green Shield, cricket administration might well give consideration, in view of the extra year of schooling undertaken these days, to raising the age limit to 17 or 18. We feel that there could be quite a number of boys of this age, who, being at a loose end at this time of the year, are lost to cricket through lack of opportunity to play it.

This brings us to the vexed question of cricket in the State schools, and we are disturbed at a reported falling off throughout the Metropolitan area. Much of this is due to the lack of men entering the teaching profession, but it would be suicidal for cricket administration, or for that matter individual clubs, to sit back and do nothing about it. The N.S.W.C.A. is already active in this matter, and we should not only support them but also make our own drive to encourage cricket in all the schools in our district. Our close relationship with the M.W.C.A. should be used to develop a joint attack on this mutual lifeline to us both.

Unfortunately we were beaten in the first round of the Rothmans' Knockout this year. This competition is highly popular with both players and spectators alike, and members will be delighted to learn that there is every probability that its scope will be widened next year. Not the least of the many advantages of the Rothmans is the opportunity it gives the lower grade sides to see their own First Grade side in action and by doing so, firing their own ambitions. The Rothmans is a most interesting and pleasurable feature of the cricketing calendar.

While the Club did not feature in the 1970-71 awards, we must also extend our appreciation to the proprietors of *The Sydney Morning Herald* for the continuance of their incentive awards to the club that plays the brightest cricket and to the player of the year. In the previous season Peter Philpott won the individual award — we would be delighted this year if the team award came our way — and not necessarily for the financial gain alone.

We divided our coaching this year into two groups—one comprising the younger members of our two senior grades and a selected number of younger players in the 13-15 age group. The first attended Barry Knigh'ts indoor nets in the city, and the second were coached on Sunday mornings by club coaches Ian Howell and Tom Spencer. These two were very ably assisted by Peter Harvey who volunteered his services each Sunday and Peter's club spirit is gratefully acknowledged. In fact the enthusiasm of both the coached and the coaches, together with the committee members who acted as time keepers and practise managers, is a credit to club spirit generally. Brian Taber the official N.S.W.C.A. coach visited us, studied the boys, discussed their cricket with them personally, and finally gave them a short address. He is a great acquisition to the Association.

Our social activities continue in a very happy vein. The Room at the Top was perhaps not as well patronized as in previous years, but some pretty rainy Saturdays may account for some of this. John Stephenson, the chairman of the social committee, and Pat, his wife, continued as the focal point of our off-field activities, and it is difficult to find words to express our appreciation of their contribution to the welfare of the club. Indeed, we are very happily endowed with many wives and mothers who are always prepared to put themselves out on our behalf and it was only because of this goodwill that we

were able to receive and billet the members of the New Zealand school-boys Cricket Club who visited Sydney last January. We had the privilege of entertaining the Mayor and Mayoress, Ald. and Mrs. David Hay to lunch at the Oval on this occasion, and we thank them for their interest.

Our annual dinner was held at the Balgowlah Golf Club and was exceptionally successful and well attended. Perhaps we should say here that the parents of younger members are particularly invited to attend — preferably but not necessarily with their sons. We will be glad to meet them and introduce them to the other parents and players.

While the Club is fortunately well able to withstand the loss sustained, our financial result is non-the-less disappointing. Spectator attendance was well down on previous seasons, mainly we feel, because of generally unpleasant summer conditions, and our expenditure on materials was very much higher than anticipated. To state the obvious, the incoming committee must take steps to arrest this downward turn in our finances.

Your permanent selectors, Max Howell, Tom Felton and Keith Fitzpartick worked extremely hard, with Max and Tom travelling long distances to make sure that all teams were under constant review. Ray Beard, practise captain and leader of the gear committee, was also an indispensable club member. People of their dedication are rare and not readily replaced and we offer them and all other members of the committee who worked loyally for the club throughout the year our sincere thanks.

REPRESENTATIVE HONOURS

Four of our players: Phil Allum, Graeme Beard, Jeff MacPherson and Paul Spraggs were chosen in Association sides this season. Phil represented three times and scored a brilliant 109 against the Combined City and Suburban XI, whilst Paul Spraggs also made the "ton" with an entertaining 104 not out against the Combined High Schools.

Two of our A. W. Green Shield players gained recognition by the Association Selectors, Stephen Weir for the Combined City 1st XI, and Tom Purcell, our very promising young wicket-keeper, played for City 2nds, both against combined country elevens. We congratulate our representatives, and look forward to their further successes.

FIRST GRADE

Captain, Ian Howell, reports

The loss of Peter Philpott, Mick Pawley, John Kasper and Peter Moore from last season's eleven was a heavy blow, but nevertheless provided opportunities for our promising younger players.

As expected the team finished well down the competition table, but the improvement shown in the second half of the season augurs well for the future of the club.

Batting performances were highlighted by the amazing consistency of Jim Burke, and to a slightly lesser extent Phil Allum. Jim undoubtedly is still the best grade batsman in Sydney. He scored 699 runs in only ten completed innings, and had he been available for all games would have most certainly bettered his First Grade Record aggregate of 899. Jim's vast experience, and his willingness to pass his knowledge on to others was a great help to me personally, and to all players in the club.

Phil Allum stamped himself as a player of the future. A brilliant century scored for the Metropolitan XI was the culmination of a great season. Undoubtedly Phil will be subjected to greater pressure next season, but he possesses such fine temperament and technique that he should continue his amazing success story and step up into representative cricket in 1971-72.

Paul Spraggs continued to be something of an enigma. Possessing as much, if not more natural talent than anybody else in the club, Paul again failed to be the dominant force that we all expect him to be. I am positive that if he were to adopt the same aggressive approach to his batting in first grade as he displays in seconds he would score many many runs.

John Weight forced his way into the side following good performances with the Seconds, and added solidity to the batting. John is a great team-man and was indisputably the best out-fielder in the side. He played several fine innings during the season, but none better than his magnificent unbeaten 58 against Gordon.

Graeme Beard adapted himself quite well in his first complete season of First Grade. Batting-wise, he was restricted by the high number of one-day fixtures, as on many occasions he was forced to bat under difficult conditions. Graeme's bowling progressed noticeably, and when he develops a ruthless approach to opposing batsmen he will then possess all the qualities of a top-class leg spinner.

Our bowling, for years the team's strong-point, suffered most through the retirement of "Percy" and the temporary transfer of Mick Pawley, and the position was aggravated by the untimely form lapses of our two key bowlers Ken Nichol and Tom Spencer.

Ken experienced a disappointing season. He suffered through missed chances in the first few matches, and this seemed to lead to a loss of confidence, resulting in subsequent loss of form. However, Ken showed his fine fighting qualities by bouncing back after being dropped to the Seconds, to end the season in First Grade with a best ever performance of 8 for 52. With his confidence restored, Ken will pose a major threat to opposing teams next season.

Similarly, Tom "The Lizard" Spencer, suffered a like fate. Tom is very much a confidence bowler, and because studies limited time for practice, his form fell away. With more time to devote to his game in the future Tom is a player on whom much will depend in our efforts to climb back up the ladder.

A young bowler who improved greatly during the season was Jeff MacPherson. Jeff is deceptively fast off the wicket and his bowling, especially against University, was hostile and well sustained. Jeff will continue to improve and if he can put on a little more weight during the winter months he should reap a harvest of wickets next season.

Paul Stephenson was unlucky to be troubled early with injuries. He had a difficult task regaining his place in the team, but once there he bowled beatutifully. When Paul drops his pace slightly, and concentrates on movement through the air and off the wicket he is then a far better bowler. If he can get fully fit before next October, 1971-72 should be a big season for Paul.

Reg Hunt played in four games only and was unlucky not to have played in more, his double against Gordon in capturing 2 for 37 and then scoring 34 not out in an unfinished partnership with "Woodro" Weight was outstanding.

Ross Fairhall made a welcome re-appearance with the club and batted with customary aggression. He was a valuable change-bowler and his fielding, apart from occasional lapses, was brilliant.

Greg Wilson, Greg Harper, lan Felton and lan MacDonald all performed well and no doubt will benefit from the experience. Peter Harvey had a season in the "horrors", but he is too good a player not to fight his way back.

As usual the wicket-keeping of "Rolls" Elliott was first-class. He was starved for opportunities in many games but was ever alert to accept whatever chances came his way. At all times Mal provided encouragement to our bowlers.

Well, that just about sums it up. Every club has to go through a team-building stage as we did last season. Even allowing for this, losing is not pleasant. We have the players to fight our way back, but it will take a determined team effort. The return of Mick Pawley and Terry Lee will lift us tremendously and our young players should all show the benefit of last season's experience. However, we must develop a "win at all costs" approach to the game, an approach which has characterised the St. George teams over the years. On paper we should be equal to any team in the competition, but premierships are not won on paper. What is required is a real will to win and a hatred of being beaten. If we can produce this spirit then Manly-Warringah will be a major force in the forthcoming season.

SECOND GRADE

Captain, Keith Fitzpatrick, reports

The Second Grade team had a most successful season, finishing the competition in second place to Balmain who were awarded the premiership when the final was washed out on the second day of the match. Throughout the season, the players showed a positive approach to the game and gave it everything they had irrespective of the position to the game. Basically the team was young in years and this, allied with the ability displayed, augurs well for the strength of the club in future years.

The fact that this was a TEAM of cricketers in the true sense, is supported by the fact that only two players scored more than 300 runs while only four others scored more than 200. These figures for a team which contested the final highlight the wonderful team spirit allied with outstanding bowling and fielding. That tired old cliche 'catches win matches' was flogged to death by this team during the season. The fielding was of a very high standard and there wasn't a bad fieldsman in the team throughout the season.

At the start of the season, several players showed such good form it was obvious they would quickly gain promotion to the Firsts. Phil Allum continued his brilliant form displayed at the close of the 1969-70 season by scoring 54 and 119 in the first two matches. John Weight and Jeff MacPherson also performed well and all three were promoted after several matches. Brian Kinsey, Vice-Captain of the team, deserves special mention. His keenness and astute advice was invaluable to me, as Captain, and to the team generally. He took the bowling honours with the excellent figures of 34 wickets at 12.1 runs each and, when the occasion arose, proved he is the best wet wicket bowler in the club. His keenness in the field was also rewarded as he took the most number of catches (7), excluding those taken by the wicket-keeper.

Paul Spraggs won the batting average and aggregate and was a real match winner. He hit the ball very hard during his innings and his dynamic 105 against University included 5 sixers. Paul applied himself well when fielding and showed considerable improvement in this aspect of the game. Greg Harper and Neil Boden were the team's batting "sheet anchors". Both showed they bat better in a crisis and they steered the side out of trouble on numerous occasions. They showed continued improvement throughout the season and will surely play in a higher grade of cricket in years to come. They showed excellent temperament in the final against Balmain when Neil, who came in with the score 3-37, scored 33 while Greg batted atmost throughout the entire innings to score 79 in 383 minutes.

Reg Hunt, the team's No. 1 leg spinner was the only player to qualify as an all-rounder. He finished with the good double of 24 wickets at 19.2 runs each and a batting average of 20.2. Reg showed great keenness throughout the season and deservedly gained promotion to the Firsts, even though that team already had two leg spinners. Ian Felton bowled most number of overs for the team and he and Reg were good foils for each other. He has an aggressive outlook when bowling and was probably the only off-spinner in the Second Grade competition who attacked the batsmen. He has a good variety when bowling and a lot can be expected from him in the future.

One of the most popular members of the club and an excellent team man was our wicket-keeper, "Gentleman" Ron Holmes. This was Ron's second year with the club and he has improved each year. His general soundness, and at times brilliance, did much to sustain the team's high standard in the field. The bowlers owe him a vote of thanks as he took 26 catches during the season, five in one innings.

Paul Stephenson had rather a mixed season as he moved between Seconds and Firsts. He fitted in well with the team and always gave a wholehearted effort. His figures of 6-49 against Bankstown proved to be a match-winning effort and his bowling average of 14.4 runs per wicket is a good indication of how well he bowled. As a batsman, Paul had a poor season, but once he starts to hit the ball again he will develop into a handy batsman. Although his playing programme was interrupted on several occasions, Alan Frazer performed consistently. His batting showed a marked improvement this season as he started to hit down the line. Always an aggressively bat, Alan climaxed this season with an excellent 51 scored in the final. He hit Kel Wright of Balmain out of the attack when that bowler in his first over with the second new ball had figures of 3-24 from 14 overs. For a player of his calibre, Kevin Davidson had a disappointing season. In patches he produced his excellent batting form of the previous season without really getting going. However, I feel that this year was a transition period for Kevin as a lower grade player, and that he will show his true form next season. His bowling opportunities were limited but he made the most of them and gained the only hat-trick for the team against University, 3-18 from 8 overs. Ian MacDonald is another player who didn't produce the form he has shown in previous seasons. Ian's start to the season was not good and this affected his confidence when bowling. However, his batting improved considerably and in future seasons he will be expected to perform as an all-rounder. John Hunt was promoted to the side half way through the season. He bowled accurately and gave good support to his brother Reg and Ian Felton. Although it is unfortunate for John that he and Reg are such similar types of bowlers, it is the club's good fortune to have two leg spinners of such high calibre. Ken Nichol had brief appearances with the team and acquitted himself well before returning to First Grade. Other players who made brief appearances were Steve Green, Peter Harvey, Ross Fairhall and Steve Allum. All were enthusiastic and tried hard.

The thanks of the team go to John Stephenson and Rolf Kinsey for their work as scorers and to the ladies at "Room at the Top" who provided the afternoon teas. I would like to than the players for the support they gave me throughout the season and I trust that they enjoyed the games as much as I did.

THIRD GRADE

Captain, Dick Woodfield, reports

Although this team finished in a creditable fourth position in the competition it rarely gave the impression that it could hold that position with any degree of comfort, let alone do better. There were some outstanding individual performances, which often resulted in very convincing wins, but generally we either just scraped home or just lost in fairly low-scoring games. It seemed that after the elevation of Neil Boden and Alan Frazer, we had no batsmen who could be relied upon to take an attack by the scroff of the neck and put us in a certain winning position. There were occasional flashes of brilliance from Phil Russell, Greg Wilson, and later in the season, Ross Fairhall and Jeff Barratt, but if some of the more experienced players had shown more application the story could have been quite different.

The bowling, in some respects, suffered from the same faults as the batting, but in this case the problems arose more from lack of experience on the part of the younger players. John Hunt, while he was with the team, never stopped trying and met with considerable early success and thoroughly deserved his promotion. Steve Green, after a somewhat shaky and erratic start, produced some really good performances, particularly against St. George under very difficult circumstances. Greg Wilson became an established opening bowler and could do very well in this role in the future and towards the end Jeff Barratt caused a few surprises with late movement and bounce.

Fielding and wicket-keeping were inconsistent throughout the season. The services of Steve Allum behind the stumps against his will were very much appreciated and Wayne Florentine was improving with every match until football commitments removed his no longer flapping shirt from the scene. Tom Purcell took over for the last few matches and looks to be a very good prospect for the future. Steve Green took eight catches, most of them off his captain's bowling, and Steve Allum was always first-class in the fielding department with Greg Wilson and Phil Russell not too far behind. Most of the young players could learn a lot from Steve Allum's example.

There is no doubt that we have a lot of talented young players who will have benefited from their experience in Third Grade this season, but more signs of concentration and application, particularly in the batting of some of the more senior players, would have helped them even more. With an average of only about 18 runs per wicket against us, we could manage only 15 ourselves; this just was not good enough. Let us all look forward to a better season in 1971-72.

When one allows for the number of players through the grades missing from the previous season, it is not really surprising that the results of our grade were disappointing. The side was almost completely new, and untried. In addition the personnel of the team that started the season bore no resemblance to that which completed the season, a total of 31 players having appeared in the team.

We won only two games and drew two others, but lost several narrowly. On quite a few occasions games were lost through inexperience; more specifically, our batsmens' inability to graft their runs and bowlers not bowling to one side of the field.

Perusal of the averages highlights the poor batting which resulted in the bowlers having the opportunity to bowl only approximately half the number of overs bowled in previous seasons.

With more practice he has the ability to play in higher grades next season.

Denis Booth also played several games in the thirds, but without success. Steve Erichsen opened the bowling with good results early in the season, but was forced to undergo a shoulder operation after round 5 and did not bowl again. He also made his presence felt with some hard-hitting knocks and returned to play two games late in the season to help us out.

Perhaps the most pleasing aspect of the season was the considerable promise shown by new youngsters such as Steven Marshall, Steve Byers, David Packer, Ian Hendy and Peter Vernon, all of whom played the last few games in Fourths. It surely must augur well for the club's future when it is realised that on many occasions we fielded a team with six players 16 years of age or under.

I look forward to seeing a big improvement in the performances of all team members next season. I extend my thanks to all players who appeared in the team for their support during the season.

He has, by his selfless efforts brought home to Manly, through the lads he has coached, the Harold Moore (Under 14) Shield two years in succession, and in so doing has developed in many young cricketers ability and a sense of team spirit which they possibly would not otherwise have had.

Mike Murfin Reports -

This young team did indeed have a wonderful season. All the boys were under 14 years of age, but against teams in the all age bracket only missed taking out the C2 competition by one point and in fact were leading the competition until the last game when rain spoiled their chances of dismissing Balgowlah Rugby Union team cheaply enough to win on a first innings. Perhaps it is not yet known but these boys also represented Manly-Warringah in the Moore Shield Inter-district competition, playing sometimes brilliant cricket to take out this Shield for the second year running.

Great credit is due to the boys for their keenness and devotion to the game, for although they must have been weary from playing in the Saturday Morning Boys' Competition not one boy in 14 matches refused to turn out again in the afternoon.

Their ability is reflected in some outstanding results — out of 14 matches they won 7 outright, beating such teams as the Manly-Warr. Leagues Club outright twice and Seaforth Baptists outright in one day. These two teams came third and fourth in the competition.

It is very difficult to pick out any particular boy as being outstanding. Their strength was in being a team, always someone came good at the right time. Their fielding was excellent as was the bowling and particularly the wicket-keeping. If there was a weakness it was in the batting. Still, considering half the balls they received whistled past their heads this is not surprising. The batting average and aggregate was taken out by Rod McNeil with 351 runs at an average of 29.2.
