

ANNUAL REPORT — 1974-75

Gentlemen,

As will be seen by the notice convening it, our Annual General Meeting this year will be combined with a social function. In doing this we feel that the Committee can fulfill its obligation to account to members for its management, and at the same time involve the greatest possible cross-section of members, parents, wives and girl friends in our activities.

Our 97th year was again a successful one, both on and off the field. The various team reports tell their own story, and if the First Grade was unsuccessful in defending their Premiership, they were at least Runners-up. On the other hand, Third Grade, who were Runners-up last year, won the Mitchell Cup this year — last held by this Club in 1969-70. For both of these teams to contest the Final in consecutive years was a great performance, and a great tribute to the two Captains, Mike Pawley and Graham Howlett. It is apparent throughout the Club, however, that our batting is extremely brittle, with players who are primarily selected for their bowling, finishing the season with averages as good as, or even better than, players selected for batting alone. There must obviously be a more positive approach by these batsmen if we are ever to win the coveted Club Championship, and perhaps pre-season coaching sessions for the younger batsmen by experienced players might assist them to a better mental approach to the task of building an innings.

While, in the light of our results it is possible to look forward to the future with hope, the source of our future playing strength is worrying. Our present generation of senior cricketers both in Manly-Warringah and elsewhere in N.S.W. have had the benefit of cricket at high school level, and of coaching on Saturday morning. Due to changes in the education system on the one hand, and of a surfeit of all-day games on the other, this no longer holds true, and the effects are beginning to be felt in Grade cricket. Too many youngsters lack the basic fundamentals, and it would seem that unless we can find a way to overcome this problem, we will find it difficult even to maintain — let alone improve — our playing standards. This problem is recognised by the Association and the State Coach, Peter Spence, but it is one that we must also recognise and face for ourselves, as a Club.

Another matter affecting the future of cricket (although not so difficult to overcome) is the persistent reports of exchanges of bad language and personal epithets between players. We have had no complaints about our own Club, but it is timely to remind members of their obligation to the good name that cricket enjoys. Surely none of us will descend to the churlish standards of the ignorant few, who, being insensitive to it themselves, see no wrong in making a public parade of their own ignorance in front of others.

Although we had no representative players at first-class level this year, we did have Tom Brooks who was appointed for all Tests in the M.C.C. Series — a great tribute to Tom's efficiency as an umpire, and a great tribute to his concentration. With our felicitations to Tom, perhaps we could record our appreciation to the umpires generally — they are never less than a credit to the game.

It is premature to say that Terry Lee has played his last game with the Club, for although he will be overseas for a year or so, he hopes to make himself available again on his return. We certainly hope so, for in spite of a lean season with the bat, his slip fielding alone is an invaluable asset to any team in which he plays.

Alan Turner offered his services to us as publicity officer, and it was no fault of Alan's that much of his work was not apparent — because of the direct reporting of our games by the "Manly Daily." For this publicity we are most grateful to the "Daily," and to Paul Simon, their reporter. At the same time we should not overlook Alan, and express our thanks for making his very considerable ability available to us.

As always the Club is indebted to many people, other than Club Members, for its continued well being. Accordingly may we express our thanks:

To Members of both Manly and Warringah Councils and their staffs whose courtesy and consideration were — as usual — unfailing.

To Alan Barnes, Bob Radford, John Wood, Harry Suhan and the girls at N.S.W.C.A. who, in spite of a heavy International season, never failed the Grade Clubs.

To our Vice-Presidents and parents who were not only our loyal supporters, but always on hand to swell the coffers on money-making forays.

To the selectors, whose lot it is to suffer the slings and arrows of outraged members, but who, nonetheless, survived unscathed.

Most certainly to our wives, mothers and girl friends who double as providers of afternoon-teas and staunch supporters.

And finally to our Hon. Auditor, Mr. J. G. W. Vallance.

We regret that at the time of writing Mr. Vallance is in hospital and unable to render us the service he has performed so kindly for so many years. We trust and hope that he is well on his way to recovery by now.

In his absence, Mr. Ian Barnes, an ex-First Grade player of the Club, has very kindly offered to cast his critical eyes over our accounts.

FIRST GRADE REPORT

(By MICK PAWLEY, Captain)

The averages hardly indicate the Firsts could have made the Final but that is only one of the many contradictions the past season has been: Turner and Allum missing from the previous season's premiership side, Fraser and Harvey in Seconds by Christmas and most players finding it difficult to bring some semblance of consistency to their performances.

The team average was around one yet we lost only three games before the Final. Against Sutherland a disastrous first innings 73; 130 and easily beaten by a depleted Wests and incredibly 290 against Waverley passed with the opposition only seven down. In contrast meagre totals of 113 vs. Gordon and 130 vs. Mosman and North Sydney resulted in three wins.

Generally our play was indifferent against lowly placed sides with the fielding dropping back to rock bottom at the half-way stage. Against traditional rivals Gordon and Saints the outcricket was inspired. Lee held 20 catches at first slip whilst Howell and Chapman formed excellent close-in specialists.

Ross Chapman in his first season with the Club had a mixed season but he is an excellent Club man who always trained hard and was readily available to advise junior players. He is indeed an asset. Ross and Ian frequently contributed to promising starts but rarely went on with the job. Many collapses saw 1-50 become 5-70 with Terry Lee having one of those seasons you wouldn't wish on yourself.

Through the disappointments Graham Beard stamped himself as a first-class player of the future with three centuries and a near miss as he compiled the scores that one used to expect of Jim Burke. Graham is at his best on faster wickets and plays with great skill and power off the back foot, the essentials for success at higher levels. Very few of the other run-scoring machines of First Grade can boast these attributes. A natural in any fielding position, who can keep an end going with the ball, Graham has all the credentials the State selectors require to boost the Shield side.

Thirteen years after his initial first XI match Paul Stabback had his biggest season, reeling off 80, 60, 60 and 50 in succession, frequently averting batting disaster and chiming in with useful wickets on the

quicker tracks. Very speedy over 16 yards, the big quickie from Pendle Hill was troubled by blurred vision with catches in the deep, possibly a legacy from a spiteful Gordon bouncer that drew profuse quantities of blood from his skull and left him with a priceless family heirloom, his blood-splattered white hat.

Al Fraser slammed the team's other century in the second innings against Sutherland and must have wondered at the fickleness of the game when he was in Seconds several rounds later. A stirling 160 against St. George measured his determination and heralded his return for the final rounds. Rod McNeill was breezing along after 80 and 40 in his first two innings, then felt the pressure of First Grade cricket in later rounds, cracking a rib in the Gordon Semi. Both he and Tom Purcell will have benefitted greatly from this season's experiences.

The bowlers all made a fifty, the batsmen all took a wicket — it was that kind of season. McPherson's 47 against Bankstown after 9-70 can only be described as an act of God but this innings did put pressure on the number 10 spot, the one position not to produce a half century.

Mal Elliot was critical of his own keeping early in the season but he left no doubt he was at his best with outstanding displays in the Finals.

Jeff McPherson's 9 for 46 against North Sydney aside, neither he nor Paul Stephenson bagged five in an innings, but both were consistent enough to keep our heads above water. Jeff snared 46 and landed in Sydney's top six bowlers for the third season in a row—a just reward for his determination and perserverance. His incredible one-hander at fine leg off Ian Davis could only have been rehearsed in his early years on the ant-beds of Cowra.

Paul Stephenson had a slow start but recovered well to take 35 and bowled with great heart to save the Semi against Gordon with a marathon bowling stint which literally left us in the dark. The second new ball was taken by Uni of N.S.W. whilst Paul was at the wicket and he responded by clearing Sydney Road with three hefty drives to bring up his 50.

Mike Pawley's wickets all came before 1975 by which time the Memorial Club had banned him from operating from the northern end of Manly Oval. The final indignity came when one cleverly disguised arm-ball sailed through the first storey window and rolled under a door into the latrine. This was the signal for other would be "leggies" to press their claims for recognition.

The Final was a dismal affair for Manly the bareness of our score being matched only by the state of the wicket. Our score of 113 was easily passed by Petersham three down, their tail fading to be all out for 143. Petersham had gone through the season undefeated and were worthy premiers. Yet the Manly camp was disappointed at its humiliating defeat and finished the season quietly sipping Reschs and considering how events might have been if only . . .

It won't be the same without Terry Lee next season. That in itself is a measure of the enormous contribution he has made over the last 17 years to our Club's history. Still with few holding mortgages on their First Grade positions, next season promises to bring the best out of the old stayers and offers great opportunities to those youngsters who show they have the temperament to perform in Seconds.

Finally, mention must again be made of our popular scorer Keith "Five-O" Brady, who must go close to keeping the most comprehensive scorebook in Sydney and whose efforts during the season were appreciated by all.

SECOND GRADE REPORT

The final statistics for the season of five wins, eight losses and five draws is not an accurate picture of the team's performance.

At the January long weekend when the side had to win all matches from that point to reach the Semis, the two rain-affected draws when we were in positions of strength put an end to our Semi-Final hopes.

The batting generally showed an improvement on previous seasons, and half way through the season the batsmen were putting together useful scores of over the 200 mark. Tom Purcell showed great potential, and his innings of 93 against Mosman was the highlight of a very consistent effort from him before he was promoted to first grade.

Don Felton had a good season, and it was a shame he often seemed to be dismissed around the 30 mark when he looked as though he was about to tear the attack apart. Against Northern District he did literally take their attack by the scruff of the neck, but unfortunately a declaration prevented him reaching his century. Rod McNeill earned promotion to first grade with some consistent performances.

Jim Stewart and Tim Russell generally opened the innings, and whilst large opening stands never really eventuated, one or the other usually settled in for a sound innings. Tim was the find of the season with the bat, and his driving square of the wicket was a delight to watch. Once Tim overcomes the full-toss he should score many runs, and it is hoped he will return from the out-back in time for next season.

The new ball attack was shared between Dave Packer and Ken Nichol. Unfortunately, neither of them were able to consistently break through early. On numerous occasions, after an early wicket was taken, the second one didn't fall until the score was over the 50 mark, and both generally bowled more accurately in their second spell with the older ball. Brian Kinsey, unfortunately, had only a brief visit to seconds, and was one of the players who suffered through duty commitments with third grade, and after his tremendous effort against Bankstown, in near century temperature, to bowl 17 overs straight for 3 for 44 he was obviously the support bowler both Dave and Ken required, but duty called.

The loss of Tom Spencer to third grade reduced our spin attack to one with little variety, this is no reflection on the ability of Gareth Blades or Bevan White who tussled neck and neck throughout the season, but it did leave the side without a leg-spinner. Both Gareth and Bevan were able to contain nearly all batting sides, and only Cumberland and St. George ever really got the measure of them.

The fielding was of reasonable standard, even though the odd dropped catch cost us dearly — Dave Packer being the outstanding fieldsman. Bevan White was reliable in the slips, and Tom Purcell always safe behind the stumps.

THIRD GRADE REPORT

(By GRAHAM HOWLETT, Captain)

The Club can look upon the successful 1974-5 season with some hope for the future. Seven of the eleven players in the Third Grade Final were under 21 years of age and during the season each of them was subjected to the type of pressure that could be expected in higher grades. To their credit, whether batting, bowling, or in the field, each of them at some stage contributed to at least one of the team's wins.

It seemed that the line "the game is never won until the last ball is bowled" was written especially for this side. Our matches probably provided ulcers for our supporters during the season as game after game swung delicately in the balance. That the majority of these games were won shows the fine spirit that existed in the team.

During the season two games were won outright, six on the first innings, two lost on the first innings, one lost outright, and six drawn. All home matches were won.

The old adage that good bowling and fielding win lower grade matches again rang true. The team was able to score more than 150 on only five occasions, and only two batsmen topped 300 runs. Collapses occurred regularly, the first early in the season when the score slumped from 1-91 to 9-124 against North Sydney, and the last in the Final when we slumped from 3-96 (chasing 117) to 8-111.

Youngster Greg Simpson scored the most runs (336) and took the most catches (14). His partnership of 55 with fellow schoolboy Mark Byers turned a disastrous 7-49 into a match-winning 116 against Gordon. Greg showed the concentration and determination that was missing from so many other batsmen in the Club.

Greg Hill was perhaps the steadiest of the younger brigade. He obtained the highest batting average and his innings of 92 (Nepean) and 42* (St. George) and 31 (Gordon) were all good innings under pressure.

Keith Fitzpatrick was the other batsman to top the 300 mark. He started poorly but fought back to score the only century of the season. Sam Mesite also found runs hard to come by early in the season, but his 32 and 28 in a low scoring Semi-Final contributed greatly to our win.

Jeff Barratt could not have scored runs with a bat two feet wide for most of the season, but he showed fighting qualities in both the Semi and the Final. He came to the wicket at 5-42 in the Semi and scored 63 before being dismissed at 8-149. In the Final he top-scored in both innings with 30 and 33.

Jeff Logan, who with Greg Simpson, Greg Hill, Sam Mesite and Mark Byers was at school when the season began, looked the best of the young batsmen on more than one occasion. He times the ball well and his 51 (Wests) and 47 (Waverley) were entertaining innings.

Gary Robinson started the season as if he were aiming for First Grade. Four of his first eight innings exceeded 35 but, unfortunately, his form fell away as the season progressed. Gary Flowers looked set on many occasions but then disappointed us all by throwing his innings away. Both these players have the ability to succeed in higher grades with more application.

Relegated to Third Grade after five rounds, Tom Spencer played a match-winning innings against Uni of N.S.W., but being in a side which often struggled to reach 100 runs — just what a leg spinner doesn't need — Tom consequently did not receive as much bowling

as he deserved. His best performances during the rounds were 6/25 (Uni of N.S.W.), 4/18 (Bankstown) and 3/25 (Cumberland) — all match-winning efforts. With the pressure on in the last three rounds, he lifted the younger players with two brilliant catches at leg gully. His bowling spell after lunch in the Final when he took 5/13 from seven overs must rank as one of his best performances with the Club.

Brian Kinsey once again bowled at the stumps and was rewarded with the most wickets (58). He was the pillar of the attack and included in his performances were a superb 7/48 on a batting paradise against Northern Districts at Asquith, 5/22 (Cumberland), 5/23 and 4/25 (Sutherland), 4/21 (Mosman), 4/23 (Nepean) and 4/24 (North Sydney). A fieldsman of doubtful repute, his elegant "swallow dive and clutch" in the deep field in the Semi-Final will be talked about for many years by those fortunate enough to have seen it.

Steve Byers must have been one of the most improved players in the Club. From a doubtful start in Fourth Grade, he progressed steadily, and it was he who routed Gordon in consecutive games at the end of the season. His figures of 4/20 from 12 overs, and 5/44 from 15 overs speak for themselves. He has a fine future with the Club.

Jeff Barratt appeared to have some difficulty in sighting the stumps on occasions, but his genuine pace forced hasty retreats by many opposing batsmen. Thirty wickets from Jeff completed a fine all-round season.

Ian MacDonald was the side's second spinner, before football commitments forced his withdrawal. He bowled extremely well on occasions, with 5/30 off 19 overs against Wests, being his best effort. Greg Simpson must have been disappointed at the lack of bowling opportunities he received, but he, too, performed well when called upon.

In the field the side never gave up. Keith Fitzpatrick stalked the cover area throughout the season, and Jeff Logan lacked nothing in comparison in the Final.

Batting on a grassy strip, Manly were soon in trouble. Greg Hill was the only Manly batsman to stand up to the attack and when he was out for 31 the score was 6-48. Another wicket fell immediately and schoolboys Greg Simpson and Mark Byers came together. They gradually took control to add 55 in 78 minutes, enabling us to struggle to a score of 116. Gordon fared no better against Byers and Kinsey, with Tom Spencer starting the rout with an almost impossible catch at leg gully. From 5-24 Gordon slowly recovered to 8-94 when a cloudburst sent players from the field at 5.00 p.m. With prospects of a wet ball and slippery approaches, the odds favoured Gordon, but two fine catches at first slip in the first over after resumption gave the team a place in the four.

Jeff Barratt was brought back into the side for the Semi-Final and what an expert selection that turned out to be. We won the toss and batted at Graham Reserve, and were soon in trouble at 5-42. Jeff Barratt then joined Sam Mesite who had been batting patiently, and

the pair added 68 invaluable runs. Mark Byers chimed in with another useful innings and we finished with 152. Once again the pace trio of Byers, Kinsey and Barratt combined to dismiss Gordon for 122, with B. K. delivering the final touch with "the catch" to give the

skipper his luckiest ever wicket.

In the Final, Sydney University won the toss and batted on a dampish wicket. Byers and Kinsey bowled well but Uni looked dangerous at lunch when they were 4-91. An early breakthrough after lunch was essential and Spencer obliged. Bott attempted to drive and Barratt at close gully held a great cach to start the slump. Twenty-six runs later Uni were all out and Manly need 118 for victory. Opening for the first time, Mark Byers helped Manly to a 30-run opening partnership with Gary Flowers, and with Jeff Barratt and Greg Hill batting well we were on top of the world at 3-96. But with Barratt's dismissal Manly became defensive and before too long the score had slumped to 8-111 (with only B.K. to come). However, a combination of luck and determination from the rearguard of Howlett, Spencer and Kinsey saw us through to a total of 130, and although Uni closed its second innings, Manly won outright by four wickets to take the premiership.

Success is measured not only in the results of games played, but in the attitude and effort given by the players who make up a team. I would like to thank all of my players for their co-operation in helping to make the season as successful and enjoyable as it was.

I would also like to thank Mr. Kinsey for his pencilling, and on behalf of the players, apologise for the extra grey hairs we gave him.

Finally to my wife, Rhonda — thanks for all the assistance with afternoon tea chores, and to lending me to the Club for the season.

May the youngsters who helped Third Grade win this competition help First and Second Grade to success in coming seasons.

It was an honour to look after the Poidevin-Gray side, not a winning side, but a happy bunch of good cricketers enjoying the game of cricket. If I am lucky enough to be returned to Sydney in the near future with my job, I know where to come for a game. Thank you, Manly.


