ANNUAL REPORT — 1975-76

Gentlemen,

It's as well we are cricketers and not vignerons, for all we had to show for a season's work wouldn't have been worth picking, let alone bottling. We didn't slide, we fairly hurtled, from runners-up in the Club Championship and 1st Grade to second last in both. Only 2nd Grade improved their position. Everyone in the club knows the reason — we had much the same players, but a much different approach.

Having said that, what are we going to do about it? For the committee's part we accept the criticisms made by the various captains in this report, concerning our centre wickets and practise facilities. We have secured Council's permission to remodel Graham's Reserve practise complex, simplifying maintenance on the turf area, and widening the hard wicket on the road side. If it is available, we hope to cover both hard wickets with an indoor-outdoor carpet surface. We also intend to approach Council on the vexed question of the centre wickets, believing that our problem stems, not from lack of interest or expenditure, but because there are too few staff experienced in wicket making. We also intend to volunteer our help in ensuring that groundsmen have assistance, particularly in September when he must get his strips level sprigged and top-dressed.

With all this we will not redeem, nor will we deserve to redeem our position one iota if players are not prepared to practise and practise regularly. It is an appalling situation when the 1st Grade captain reports that only three players attended a centre wicket practise before a Rothmans Semi-Final. We believe that we must get back to practising as a club on at least one evening a week. Senior players should not only be there, but be prepared to help and advise junior and lower grade players — after all, we are a club and not just a group of numerically rated teams. Individual team practises are excellent in themselves, but should be additional to, and not instead of, general club practise. However this may be, the whole subject will assume even greater importance in the coming season, when it seems more than likely that one-day games will be out, and the opportunity to bat or bowl will only come, on average, every other week — with sometimes a break of at least three weeks.

If the foregoing has been somewhat gloomy, at least all of these grapes we mentioned earlier were not sour, and we would be churlish indeed, if we did not acknowledge what a great year Graeme Beard had — but for an excessively wet season, he may well have challenged Jim Burke's record aggregate of 899. Further, of course, Graeme got his opportunity in first-class cricket, albeit with a baptism that few would have had to endure before him - first wicket down against the West Indies pace attack in full flight. He later made amends for failures on this occasion with a fine innings against Victoria, and although out of the State side for the latter part of the season, he is sure to return. Not the least of Graeme's strengths is his ability to recognise and work on his own weaknesses. Ken Turner had a great season also. He began the season in 3rd Grade and finished it in 1sts with a well For some time we have thought that the responsibility Ken felt towards his team as captain and opening batsman inhibited his own personal performances. This year, simply as an opener, he has commenced to bat and score more in tune with his true ability. He should set his sights on nothing less than a permanent place is 1st Grade.

Socially the club was well supported on the functions we held, and although they were fewer than in previous years, it was gratifying to see younger members of the club attending. As a result of these activities, and of other "non cricketing income" we had a far better year financially than we had dared to hope. We gratefully acknowledge \$500 grant from NSWCA — the result of two great seasons internationally. Also there was a legacy from G. W. Lowe estate of \$200 and it is intended that a suitable board be placed in the Room at the Top for recording the names of the player of the year — surely the most suitable way possible to commemorate George's name.

Our Historian, Tom Spencer, during his many hours browsing through records at the Mitchell Library obtaining information for the history of the club in preparation for our centenary, found that for some time our 2nd Grade records have been incorrect. It will be noted that D. Gee displaces J. W. Burke in the batting aggregate and J. Randall easily eliminates W. Bassett. We are grateful to Tom for putting our records straight.

In spite of earlier criticisms of our wickets, we have never lacked courtesy or consideration from either the Manly or Warringah Councils, and we take the opportunity to thank the Manly Council for their generosity in keeping our oval rentals down to last year's figure, in spite of their own obviously increased maintenance costs. Our thanks also to Warringah Council for upgrading Weldon Park by providing a stand and an amenities room similar to the "Room at the Top."

At cricket headquarters, pressure of work has forced Alan Barnes to concentrate on Australian Cricket Board Work — although still, of course, part of the NSWCA set up. As a result, Bob Radford has been appointed secretary of the NSWCA and we congratulate him on his appointment — at the same time being confident that his enthusiasm, interest and drive will make him an outstanding success. To them both, and to Assist. Secretary, John Wood (to whose lot falls the administration of the Grade Competition), and all the staff, we express our sincere thanks for their unfailing help and sometimes let it be said, for their patience.

Finally to our Vice-Presidents, lady supporters, our Hon. Auditor, Ian Barnes, and to members of the retiring committee, we express our continuing appreciation.

PRESIDENT'S ADDENDUM

ALEX ANDERSON — JOYCE ANDERSON

After thirty-odd years of cricket administration, Alex Anderson has decided to call it a day. Alex's association with the game in Australia began in the Blacktown district, where his enthusiasm led him, not only to form his own team, but to provide his own ground as well. On transferring to the Manly-Warringah area, he founded the present Foresters Club in the M.W.C.A. Competition. His administrative abilities were quickly recognised, and he became Hon. Secretary of the Association in 1954, a position which he held continuously until 1969-70, when he was elected President. During this time, if not solely due to his efforts, then at least largely because of them, the local Association progressed enormously, with such notable milestones as the formation of the Saturday morning Boys' Competition, and with the number of afternoon teams more than doubling. During this period, too, Alex in conjunction with Des Sainsbery, found the time to form the Manly-Warringah Sporting Union, an outstanding contribution to the harmonious relationship that now exists between the different sporting bodies in the district.

More directly affecting our own particular club was his initiative, again with Des Sainsbery, in drawing the two cricketing bodies in the district closer together. As Delegate from the Manly-Warringah Association, he regularly attended our meetings, contributed to them, and because of that contribution, and because of his interest, was made a Vice-President — a recognition of his value, and not because of any position he may have held in a brother organisation. Finally, in 1967-68, Alex became our Hon. Secretary, and Delegate to the N.S.W.C.A., while at the same time fully maintaining his association and position with Manly-Warringah Cricket Association. He has now decided to relinquish both offices with us, and his Presidency of the Manly-Warringah Cricket Association.

During all these years, Alex has had not only the full support, but the active assistance of his wife, Joyce, who in her own right, and again because of her value as an administrator, is a Life Member of the Manly-Warringah Cricket Association. Indeed, in ringing the Anderson household for information on any cricketing matter, it is immaterial whether Joyce or Alex answers the phone, for both of them either have the answer at their fingertips, or at least can very quickly lay their hands on it.

All in all, it has been a phenomenal partnership, and there would surely be few districts, anywhere in Australia where cricket has been so well served, or where two administrators will be more sorely missed. We join the Manly-Warringah Cricket Association in expressing our appreciation of truly outstanding service, and wish them both every happiness in their retirement.

FIRST GRADE REPORT

Whatever happened to Manly the local cried. From first to second to second last in three seasons with a waterlogged second half depriving us of consolidating our plunge to the wooden spoon.

The writing was on the wall when a combined M.W.C.A. side beat us at Weldon in a pre-season social fixture that was marked by a devil may care attitude that most players carried through the season with them. One hundred and fifty was passed against UNSW in the first round (a first innings total amassed only five more times thereafter), Frank Turner bludgedning 70 in his return innings with the club. Victory was by the narrowest of margins and even though few were fit or prepared to practice the talk was optimistic as though our place in the Final four was a mere formality.

The next few rounds brought a sharp jolt of reality back to the camp. A dozen chances turfed against Northern Districts butchered what should have been a certain win, then Saints, Gordon and Nepean applied the mincer as the "Collapso Kids" crashed for less than 120 on each occasion. Marshall Rosen's staggering 5-18 off 21 balls was matched by Geoff Davies 7-23 for Nepean, crippled back and all.

We did recover to take our only other first innings points as Graeme Beard, after making a pair in his initial first-class match and being dropped at nought, went on to play a lone hand against Randwick. His 187 erased from the record books the late Les Gwynnes 175 n.o. scored in the 1926-27 season.

Then we reached the bottom of the pit. Balmain fired us back into the pavilion before lunch for 29 and for Christmas, lowly rated Sydney took a bite of the cake. Frank Turner made one of his five ducks against Balmain and Mike Pawley a pair as the "Daily" carried headlines of record membership to the now legendary "Duck" Club. By the season's end 35 had joined out of 170 wickets lost with Turner, Pawley, Elliot and McPherson granted Life Membership. History records the Balmain game as an outright victory to Manly but there was little morality in the win. Tom Purcell had donned the gloves in the second innings and in his sole keeping role was brilliant in assisting with four dismissals. Mal Elliot bagged only nine for the year and even though this was probably his worst season the bowlers were rarely able to get the ball past the bat.

Jeff McPherson and Paul Stephenson both lost considerable pace from previous seasons and with Pawley not penetrating batsmen were more than comfortable against a pedestrian attack that lacked variety.

The fielding had been good up until Christmas yet the bowlers dismissed the opposition only twice in the first nine rounds and had an overall striking rate of one wicket for seven overs compared with a wicket lost every four overs. Also two sundries were conceded for every wicket taken against one sundry per wicket lost.

After Christmas the fielding was deplorable, for every catch held two were dropped; whatever heart the bowlers had was relentlessly drained.

The one match when the old devil was to the fore was the Rothmans K.O. against last seasons conquerors, Petersham. On a faster Manly Oval and spearheaded by the quicks the premiers were routed in less than 20 overs for 70. The fire died as quickly as it had flared and when only three first graders could make a centre wicket practice in preparation for the Semi against Newcastle the curtain was finally drawn on the season's aspirations.

One remembers the outstanding fielding of Tom Purcell in the Petersham match, the excellence of which was maintained throughout the year. Unfortunately Tom was unable to repeat the previous season's dose with the bat but his turn will come.

Greg Hill, promoted to Firsts early on, scored a beautiful 96 in his second game against North Sydney. Unfortunately for him, others found fault with his technique and he was showered with much "well-meaning" advice, even in the centre, all to the detriment of his own game. Still, the experience will stand by him, and with his fielding improving out of sight, he even took a point in the "Herald" award for a non-stop effort against Wests. Greg can look forward optimistically to his future in First Grade cricket.

Of the senior players, Ian Howell, Paul Stabback and Alan Frazer found it difficult to practice and with other things taking prior importance their performances fell away disastrously by the New Year. Frank Turner made 421 runs and set a "Hammer Throw" record at Pratten Park but was too inconsistent to handle the responsibility of a top of the order batsman.

Terry Lee and Rod McNeill were missing from last year's finalists whilst Ross Chapman, Peter Sullivan, Paul Stephenson, Alan Fraser and Paul Stabback in turn became unavailable as the summer progressed making it possible for 22 to represent First Grade.

Such is the story of the 1975-76 season. Few accolades and plenty of razzods for a side that rarely found time or opportunity to practice and strolled through the season with a mental inertness more appropriate to a Saturday mornings boys' team. Sure, the nets are a disgrace and hardly befitting or inspiring to a First Grade club. Even so, centre wicket practices, generously prepared by Merv Paynter, were poorly attended.

Significantly the "I'm all right Jack" syndrome that pervaded the top grades left Manly floundering at the bottom of the Club Championship and absolute last in the "Herald" Team of the Year Contest.

Without a greater commitment of individuals to the affairs of the Club and more dedication to fitness and practice the limbo of the season gone will accompany us into our centenary year.

One final observation: How important it is to be in top gear at the start of the season and get points on the board before Christmas.

In the words of "5.0" Brady, one whose dedication to the precision of his task leaves statistics that few will take heart from perusing: "If Winter comes, can Spring be far behind."

SECOND GRADE REPORT

(By GARETH BLADES, Captain)

It is most probable that many captain's reports for the 1975-1976 season will contain mention of misfortunes due to rain and our own results must certainly be evaluated in this light to get a true perspective of the team's performances overall. Certainly other sides suffered in this regard, but when looking through the score book, it can be seen that on at least three occasions after Christmas we won the toss, made presumably the right decision (i.e., to bowl) but on each occasion were rained out with less than 100 runs to get and either nine or ten wickets

in hand, we surely were worse treated than most. In fact, it was unanimously agreed upon by team members, that Bruce Tapp, who is never lost for a word, must have said something to upset the "powers" for in the later half of the season, each time he donned the pads the rain fell. He only got to the crease after Christmas on three occasions and this was also the case with many of the other middle-order batsmen.

Perhaps the most unfortunate aspect of the whole season was the premature decision by our governing body to cancel an entire January long weekend of cricket (two rounds) due to rain which fell prior to the Saturday. This was very disappointing as we were down to meet competition leader Cumberland, which was our chance to prove our worth and peg back the leaders and open our chances of reaching the Semis.

Nevertheless, our results were reasonably satisfactory and provided a tremendous amount of self satisfaction to team members. Our overall results were: seven first innings wins (one subsequently lost outright); two outright defeats (one after a first innings win); three first innings defeats; two draws; five rain-affected draws.

The season, being my first as captain of a Manly side, was very rewarding, and we had a great team spirit coupled with the will-to-win, and a very satisfying fellowship amongst team members. The boys moulded into a most formidabl unit not to be underrated by any opposing team, also enjoying such team spirit on a harmonious social basis.

The season belongs to Ken Turner, a most consistent scorer throughout, rising from Thirds after four games, and amassing a total of 479 runs in ten completed innings. The way he worked at his game, fielding included, should be a true example to all younger members of the club. His century against Mosman was a delight to watch, containing all the necessary facets to build an innings and then showing mastery to completely dominate a more than useful attack.

At the beginning of the season Peter Sullivan made a welcome return to the club but only to be forced to depart the scene, because of personal reasons, when he looked like being the success of the season. His departure was a real blow to the club because his application and results carved him First Grade honours where successes continued. Similarly the team suffered with the elevation of Greg Hill, who performed consistently well for the team in early matches.

The batting was generally steady, no stars, except Ken, and honours The winning matches were made so by the treshared throughout. mendous fighting qualities of all batsmen. Particular mention must be given to Bruce Tapp who could talk bowlers off a length; Mark Byers who took much delight in tearing the attack apart from the first ball, crisis or not; Greg Simpson who has the ability to do anything to win a match and with the determination which could make him a player of bigger things to come. Jim Stewart's guile and tenacity remains to make him a highly regarded player and his innings against the starstudded St. George was a gem — perhaps the innings of the season. John Weight started well, finished well, and was completely bamboozled by the middle season slump. But the little "Woodrow" was always great value to the team with his agility in the field. Possibly the most improved batsman was Sam Mesite who suddenly realised that he is a good batsman and all bowlers could be treated on their merits. Greg Hill, with us in the early period, and who perhaps should have stayed longer, is going to develop and we can be sure of seeing greater things from him in the very near future. Peter "Fingers" Harvey returned from Hong Kong and showed his class in one dazzling innings and also held a catch!

In the bowling department the "Purple Heart" must go to Brian Kinsey. One cannot give him enough praise. For my own part I can only say "thanks to him" for his lion-hearted efforts, and for teaching me that every team needs a B.K. — not for batting. In fact, his tag, B.K., now goes hand in glove with "Jaws" which has something to do with his catching style. The veteran (27 years old) Ken Nichol, showed some "old" venom and bowled well throughout the season and I am sure he was spurred on by B.K. in the contest to achieve most wickets. Unfortunately, Steve Byers "broke down" this season and we hope that he is fit next year for he is developing into a good mover of the ball — an attribute lacking by many quickies these days.

May I, at this juncture, pass on my thanks to all team members for the way they reacted to my decisions — right or wrong — and the way they assisted in making my job easier and enjoyable. I sincerely hope all got as much satisfaction out of this season as I. The older members advised and this assistance was invaluable. Not to escape mention is Tom Spencer who worked well all year, instilling confidence, enthusiasm and showing the fighting qualities to get us through many games. His assistance, as my vice-captain, was an inspiration to all, and his performances praiseworthy. Tom is a good bowler who worked consistently all year and was greatly responsible for the excellent practice attendances we had during the year. Thanks to Tom and his wife, Lynne, for the hospitality extended by them to a film evening for the team during the season, showing many of our players in full flight, highlighting many idiosyncracies such as B.K.'s unique batting style.

A special thanks also to all team members' wives and mothers for excellent afternoon teas. To Rolfe Kinsey (who still thinks Brian could have been a good batsman!?) our thanks for a job well done with the score book.

To Mr. and Mrs. Alex Anderson we, the team, express our sincere appreciation for everything done in 1975-76. Joyce and Alex became part of our team and, in fact, could be classed among our chief supporters.

I also thank the Club, Mick Pawley and co-selectors for supporting us during the season and extending the time of promotable players in our endeavour to gain a Semi-Final berth.

THIRD GRADE REPORT

(By KEITH FITZPATRICK, Captain)

Compared with the Premiership winning side of the previous year, the team did not have a good season. Many new faces appeared in the team, several of whom performed well and showed real promise.

Generally, the standard of cricket played by the team was mediocre. However, I feel that this was mainly due to circumstances which made it hard for the players to develop their confidence and improve their technique.

Apart from the weather, one aspect outside the control of the players which certainly contributed to a large extent to the individuals and in turn to the team's poor performances, was the condition of Graham's Reserve, our home ground. The outfield was in poor condition throughout the season, and the wicket areas was the worst in the Sydney Grade Cricket Competition. This was the situation from the start of the season until the finish and I feel that it is not possible for young players to perform well under such conditions.

The team commenced the season with Brian Kinsey as captain. Brian's ability is such that he is much too good for Third Grade and after three matches he regretfully bowed to the inevitable call of Second Grade. There, he proceeded to confirm that he is also a good Second Grade bowler.

The team's strength was its bowling, the bulk of which was carried out by Rob Green and Ian McDonald. Rob always bowled tightly and at no stage were opposing batsmen able to get on top of him. He took most wickets and must be pushing for promotion next season. From the other end, Rob was complemented by "Macca," ever ready to tempt the batsman with his now famous "slower" or "hit me" ball. The character of the side, a great entertainer and team man, Ian is improving with age.

Grant Mairs showed promise as a leg spinner, although his opportunities were limited because of the high incidence of wet Saturdays. He showed that on a firm wicket with a bit of bounce, he had the ability to bowl accurately for long spells. He also showed ability with the bat, but lack of application caused his downfall on several occasions.

Two youngsters who came into the side at the end of the season and showed real ability were Greg Hayes and Ken Pitcher. Greg, a left-arm fast bowler, bowled extremely well with an old ball and took 6-14 off nine overs. Ken bowled medium-pace steadily and accurately to finish with 3-12 off eight overs. With practice and perseverence both these players should become permanent fixtures in higher grades. Barry Dummermuth also bowled well on occasions, with best performances of 4-14 and 3-42.

Whilst the bowling was adequate, the batting generally was not good. Ken Turner and Sam Mesite batted consistently well and quickly won promotion. Reg Ryan, a newcomer to the club, showed great application and his ability to get his head down and fight for runs was a lesson to the younger players. Reg headed the teams batting averages and aggregate. He was a keen and enthusiastic team member and he held some great catches behind the wicket.

The only all-rounder the team could boast was Mark Stedman. With the ball he turned in some fiery performances and bowled with real pace. His 5-30 off 12 overs against Sutherland was a real test of stamina and his 4-30 versus North Sydney was also a good effort. He was also a hard-hitting No. 4 batsman who turned the tide on several occasions and placed the team in a favourable position. His gully fielding was both brilliant and acrobatic.

Of the other batsmen, Jeff Logan, Mick Boyer and Graham Dudley all showed promise and played good innings, but without consistency. The overall fielding standard of the team was only fair. Fielding is an aspect of the game which most players ignore and, naturally, it is reflected in their performances.

Although the team did not enjoy a particularly successful season cricket wise, it was a happy season and all players proved to be good team men. The team won five matches, lost eight and drew three.



GRADE B2 REPORT

BATTING

Some excellent batting performances were recorded although it is my belief that more concentration and application by these young players is needed before they are eligible for higher grades. Maybe these attributes develop with age.

Greg Hayes started off with an 86 and with his fast bowling looked a good all-rounder. It was not long before he was called to a higher grade.

Chris Harper did well as opener, and needs to develop a technique against the rising ball. His partner, Greg Frost, has plenty of talent, he needs to concentrate on avoiding to pull the ball constantly off the leg stump.

Roger de Silva shows plenty of dash and attack, and a bit more effort in defence, he could build consistently good scores.

Steve Hutchinson was more a defensive batsman, but his daring should develop as he becomes more experienced, and Mark Kroschel shows good all-round batting ability, mixing attack with defence in the right proportions. The most improved batsman was Jaaka Tarhala; he was down the list most of the season but in an experiment, he was elevated and met the task with some good scores.

The other batsmen whilst they all play down the line, more and more cricket should bring them out.

BOWLING

At the start of the season the attack lacked real penetration, particularly with the loss of Greg Hayes. Match by match our opening combination of Phil Webster, right arm, with left-armed Tim Tucker proved to be effective, these both picking up a good season's tally of wickets at low averages. Phil Webster's speed and accuracy improved to the extent, with plenty of bowling practice, he will be a very useful opening bowler. As the run up of Jim Tucker's is straightened out, his speed will be much, much faster and his natural curving inswinger is a ball he needs to concentrate on. Mark Kroschel is the leg spinner of the future, his action is good and with a bit more follow through. should be able to bowl a consistent length throughout a match. Hutchinson with more concentration will be able to bowl excellent biting off-breaks. Lee McMaster took over the opening bowling in the absence of the regular bowlers; his action is good and with plenty of practice he will be worth watching for the future. Chris Harper bowled his medium pace with plenty of swing; more accuracy and a bit more pace will yield him some good figures.

FIELDING

Generally the fielding was excellent with some brilliant catches being taken. The slips fielding needs to smarten up and there was a noticeable lapse in fielding enthusiasm when the opening side tended to dig in. This human failing is a difficult one to overcome. Greg Frost did excellent work behind the wicket, and with more practice down the leg side will develop into a fine wicketkeeper. Greg Dunn as stand-in keeper sights the ball well off the fast bowling, and with the slow bowler he needs to stand up closer to the wicket to be effective for stumpings.

These boys at the average age of 17 to 18 years will stand Manly Club in good stead for the future provided they are not rushed into higher grades too quickly. That necessary maturity is not there yet; this showed itself time and time again playing against older sides, it is here where it is absolutely necessary to have an adult in the side to lead and to guide.

It has been my pleasure to help the boys in their game of cricket; they are all of good character. They all enjoy their cricket, and, after all, "that's what it's all about."
