PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It is with much satisfaction and pride that all members of the Club may reflect on the season past, notwithstanding the fact that we have been unable to rejoice in any premiership victories.

Following upon what was a somewhat disappointing previous season, 1980/81 has been one of significant development both on and off the field, individually and collectively.

The First Grade team, after an extremely shaky start—losing 4 out of the first 5 matches—began to get it together. This was brought about by a total commitment and 100% effort together with the achievement of a marvellous team spirit.

The result of this very real desire to succeed was that only one match was lost after Christmas and the team bolted home finishing 6th and missing the semi-finals by just 2 points.

Second and Third Grade, although both endowed with extremely promising young players, had a season of ups and downs. The lesson to be learned here is that natural ability is a marvellous asset, but to make the most of such ability, it must be complimented by hard work, thoughtfulness and concentration. This is all "experience", and provided that is understood, these players and teams will be on the winning road next season.

Fourth and Fifth Grade were teams of which our Club can be especially proud. Led quite outstandingly by our great stalwarts Tom Spencer and Jim Stewart, these very youthful sides—the Fifths averaged approximately 17 years for the most part—had splendid and memorable seasons. Congratulations to them all on their outstanding contribution to the record and image of the Club.

At the outset to the season, your Committee resolved to do everything possible to unify the Club by greater player involvement and to devote particular attention to coaching, junior development, and improvements in social activities.

In November, an informal meeting of all players was held where the players were informed of our objectives and were encouraged to submit their own ideas on possible areas for improvement. This proved to be a most worthwhile and constructive eveningnot the least being that it was realised we all have something to contribute and that every member will be heard and is encouraged to speak openly and freely on any matter of concern to him and of potential benefit to the Club. This was a most important achievement and vital to the continued success of the Club.

An historic step was taken during the course of the season, in the l year appointment of Tom Purcell as the first professional coach for the Club. This has proved to be an unqualified success and reflects the dedication of Tom to his responsibility and of the great effort and much time he devoted to the task. The Club will reap much benefit from his appointment both immediately and in the years to come.

Pursuing this policy of greater emphasis on coaching and junior development, the Club arranged for senior players, in addition to the Coach, to assist at special skills sessions which were available not only to our own Grade players but also to many of the outstanding youngsters in the Manly-Warringah area. These sessions proved to be highly successful and in most instances, were very well attended.

Under the guidance and co-ordination of our committeeman, Tom Hart, the Club continued to sponsor the Manly Cup—a competition amongst the High Schools' teams and open as to age of players. This past season saw that competition supplemented by an under 15 years Manly Shield also sponsored by the Club. Both competitions have attracted strong support and the indications are for even more entries next season. It is hoped and believed that Junior Cricket will be fostered and encouraged by our initiatives in these areas. Much appreciation is extended to Tom for his untiring efforts in this important area.

It will be seen from our Treasurer's report that the season has been very pleasing financially. As Ron Heath has pointed out, this has been due to a variety of factors and individual efforts. Sincere thanks are extended to all concerned, but it would be remiss not to say a special thanks to the Ladies Committee, so ably led by Mrs. Shirley Holmes. The Club is greatly indebted to these enthusiastic and unselfish ladies for their efforts. The results speak for themselves as to just how successful financially the ladies were in their ventures.

In conjunction with the ladies' efforts your Social Committee was very active and a number of highly enjoyable functions were held. These culminated with the Annual Dinner held at the Manly Hotel. Sincere appreciation is extended to Ron Holmes, Bob Rickey and Sam Mesite for their initiative and hard work.

It is pleasing to report that a number of players achieved representative honours during the season. Graeme Beard once again was an extremely successful member of the Sheffield Shield team, resulting in his most deserved inclusion in the Australian team currently on tour in England.

Phil Marks and Mark Kroschel both gained selection for Colts Metropolitan, with Mark performing particularly well in both his games. Both these young players must surely have the prospect of outstanding future careers ahead of them.

Gavin Fletcher thoroughly earned his selection in the N.S.W. U/19 team. It was tragic that this extremely talented lad, suffered a bad injury in the first game of the carnival, as a result of which his participation was severely restricted.

John Gavagna, following his achievement of being the highest wicket-taker in the A.W. Green Shield competition, was a very logical choice in the combined side which played country. John is to be congratulated on his efforts.

With many thanks to David MacPherson, the Club again had available Puma gear as awards during the season. These are great incentives for all players and are much appreciated by the Club.

Your General Committee worked constructively, hard and harmoniously during the past year with every member enthusiastically giving of his best. The attendance record is indicative of their total commitment.

In conclusion, the Club has been a "winner" this past year, which in the final analysis has been attributable to the fact that both the players and the administration have given a 100% effort at all times. More importantly, this has helped to enhance the game of cricket itself.

Congratulations to all, but let us not sit back and relax.

We must each enter the new season with one major objective—

"I will give of my best; I will make the time to practice;

I will develop pride in my own accomplishments and in my own

103RD ANNUAL REPORT

To the Members of the Manly-Warringah District Cricket Club.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

The Management Committee has pleasure in submitting for your consideration and adoption the 103rd Annual Report and Financial Statement.

Your Club entered teams in all five grades during the past season as well as teams in the Poidevin-Gray and A.W. Green Shield Competitions.

Our position of 7th in the Club Championship was a pleasing improvement on the past two seasons.

First Grade had a nightmare start to the season but finished with a strong run which saw them finish 6th in the table just two points away from a semi-final berth. Congratulations are due to the whole team for the strength of character shown in a tremendous fight back and to Captain Barry Rothwell who so ably led the side and encouraged those struggling with their form. The result was a happy team with each member supporting and complimenting each other. Second Grade had a season of mixed fortune, finishing 12th in the table. The results may not have been all that rewarding but the opportunity was given to several young players to gain experience at this higher level and possibly they were a little overawed. The lessons learned should, however, stand them in good stead for next season and we should be looking to a better achievement in the competition. Captain Ian Howell richly deserves our thanks for a job well done and for his encouragement of the junior members of his side.

Third Grade finishing 12th in the table, fall basically into the same category as Second Grade. To be fair, however, it must be taken into account that they suffered more than any other grade through team changes and this had an unsettling effect. Tim Stanley captained the side during the first half of the season before going overseas on holiday, Ron Holmes taking over to the end of the season. Both of these fine Club men contributed with their skill and enthusiasm, to the development of some fine young

players and the rewards for their efforts will bear fruit in the season to come.

Fourth Grade, under the guidance and inspiration of Captain Tom Spencer, were the team which so nearly brought our Club a premiership. After finishing 4th in the table, they were literally blown out in the semi-final against Sydney Uni., in most unfortunate circumstances. This, however, detracts nothing from their fine overall efforts for the season. The abilities and potential of young players in this side bodes well for the future.

Fifth Grade were the surprise of the season, finishing 13th in the table when at the outset we doubted they would be able to hold their own in more than a couple of matches because of their age (averaging between 15 and 17 years) and inexperience.

Under the astute captaincy of Jim Stewart, these young players showed a maturity beyond their years and an ability and spirit which did credit to the Club. Many of these talented players will undoubtedly advance through the Grades in the seasons ahead.

Our Poidevin-Gray and A.W. Green Shield sides played positive cricket in the right spirit without reaching any great heights. Both sides were happy teams and their behaviour was a credit to the Club. Our thanks for expert and enthusiastic management of these sides go to Dave MacPherson and Tom Spencer, also to Phil Marks and John Gavagna who proved themselves capable captains.

TREASURER'S REPORT & FINANCIAL STATEMENT

Financially the 1980/81 season was very successful. The Club finished with a nett excess of Income over Expenditure of \$773.

This was brought about by the following:

- a) Preparation of a budget at the beginning of the year to meet requirements of the guidelines set down on our Income and Expenditure for the year.
- b) To the members who supported the various social activities during the year.
- c) The Ladies' Committee who worked so hard for the Club with their many functions.
- d) Manly Rugby Union Club who allowed our Club to use their facilities during the season.
- e) Many donations were received during the year to which we thank you for your support.

I must point out that to keep within our year's Budget has been a problem with rising costs of equipment and grounds. To alleviate some of the problems next year, your Committee authorised that our 1981/82 supply of cricket balls be bought before the rise in costs and which has been shown in the Balance Sheet under "Stock on Hand". Our "Investment Account" has been reduced by \$500 to meet a cash flow situation and this amount will be repaid early in the 1981/82 year.

GRAEME BEARD


The Manly-Warringah District Cricket Club has produced many outstanding players throughout its illustrious history.

Specialist Skills Sessions during the season a number of Sunday sessions were conducted which were devoted to improving skills in the specialist areas of opening, top order and middle order batting, quick, medium and spin bowling. I consider those who attended benefitted greatly.

Boy's Saturday Morning Competition it was a great pleasure to be able to spend some time (regretably too little) with the two Under 12 Cawsey Shield teams and the two Under 14 Moore Shield teams. Many of these players are Grade players of the future.

I would like to express my thanks to all who assisted me in my role as Club Coach and in particular the committee for their support, Bob Tuckerman for his assistance in organising so many things, the First Grade side, expecially Sam Mesite Murray McKeough and Bob Rickey and Dave MacPherson for his help with the quicks.

I would like to make mention of some lower Grade players Brad Livett, David Batty, Neil Tuckerman, Gavin Fletcher, R. Pierce and of their outstanding attitude to practice; those players rarely missed a practice session and whilst there, were totally involved. A perusal of other sections of the Annual Report will indicate their successes.

Finally, I would like to express my delight at the wealth of young talent the Club now sees itself with—the potential which we now have must continue to be developed and if this is done, I firmly believe that in the immediate future Premierships and Club Championships will flow to this great Club.

The 1980/81 season commenced for this side as a re-building exercise with the objective of consolidating a team nucleus and developing the abilities of our younger top players. It is with much pleasure and a sense of pride that, not only were these objectives achieved, but that the top team in the Club performed at a level that was indeed, far higher than was originally anticipated.

There was a belief that one of our serious deficiencies was in the pace bowling sphere. The results, as can be seen, prove that this was a grossly incorrect assumption with both Bob Rickey and Steve Byers turning in outstanding performances. It was also predicted that our supporting bowlers were inadequate and far too inexperienced for First Grade competition. In this phase, it was Mark Kroschel who put the "squash" on that prediction. What a super season this lad had. He is improving rapidly with every game—willing to learn and easy to advise. Mark was suitably rewarded for his endeavours when selected for Metropolitan in both games against the Country teams. In those matches, he kept faith with the selectors with his excellent performances. Mark has an extremely promising future provided he does not rest on his laurels and keeps working hard. Those three players formed the striking force of our attack, but were well and importantly supported by Phil Marks and, surprisingly later in the season, by Greg Hill, who would be well advised to develop and practice his very useful "leggies".

Graeme Beard, when available, was obviously a vital member of the team—in regard to both the attack and the batting strength. Whan an invaluable player he is—arguably the best and most dangerous cricketer in the 1st Grade Competition.

The Firsts commenced the season disappointingly, losing 4 out of the first 5 games. But it was indicative of the team spirit and individual determination that the team well and truly pulled itself out of that rut. There was dedication and determination to succeed. This underlying drive spurred the players on to greater effort which was rewarded in the second half of the season with consistently strong and successful performances.

The overall result of that effort was a placing of 6th in the Competition—failing by a whisker to make the final four. The performances of our batsmen over the season can leave us with a sense of optimism for the coming season. Sam Mesite, at last, is starting to prove what a really good player he is, having adopted a more restrained and responsible approach to his cricket. His century against Sutherland was not only a match winner but was worth walking from Caringbah to Palm Beach to watch—provided you weren't a Sutherland supporter. At various times, Murray McKeough—a player of tremendous ability; John Grimble—a thankful acquisition from Northern District; Graham Wilks—the best "silly leg" fieldsman in Sydney; Greg Hill—potentially a top "all-rounder": and Phil Marks—a gifted sportsman, plagued by a very worrying eye injury for much of the season, all made handsome contributions. They all must, however, become more determined and consistent in order to realise their true potential.

There were indeed other players who contributed to the First's 80/81 record. Notable among these was Des Hartman who turned in some strong early season performances before having to make way for the emergence of Steve Byers.

Ken Pitcher, Chris Hynes, Russel Pierce and Gavin Fletcher—the last two are not far away from being permanent members of the top team, all had runs and never let the team or themselves down at any time.

Which all brings me to Tom Purcell—a totally loyal and constructive Vice-Captain, and a huge inspiration to the team. He may not be the top keeper in the State, but his performance behind the stumps was always reliable and his tremendous enthusiasm was a constant encouragement on the field. Thanks Tom for your support and contribution.

If there was a better fielding team in Sydney last year, we

did not play against them. A vital aspect of the game, our performances in this sphere contributed significantly to the overall results.

I am very proud of this team, which I believe was a credit to the Club. I wish them all increasing success next season and would also sincerely thank Don Sellin (scorer), John Mesite, Keith Marks and Alan Waters for their support and efforts during the year.

To our ladies—and in particular, Diana Lander, Tracy Duder, Margaret Kroschel, Helen Sears and Sue Johnson—for their delightful and morale-boosting support over the season; also for the tremendous sustenance provided at the midafternoon break.

If one looks back over the season and evaluates success by the number of points scored, then I guess we had an average season. For this reason I propose to direct my report more to observations of those players who spent much of their season with me. Our batting was disappointing, but we have young players whom I hope will have benefitted from their season's experience. Michael Yell had a poor season for a player of his undoubted ability. Lack of concentration saw Michael lose his wicket on several occasions, after he had done all the hard work. A spell in Third Grade was imposed to impress upon Michael the importance of continuing on after getting a start. I was most impressed with Michael's form in our last few games after his return, and Michael should now be set for a big 1981-82. No doubt, John Grimble will be made mention of in other sections of this Annual Report. Suffice then to say here that his batting in Second Grade was brilliant, capped by an outstanding century against North Sydney.

Two young "up and comers" in Stephen Colby and Stephen Johnson were initiated into higher grade cricket. Although neither set the world on fire, both have great potential, and next season should see them reap the rewards of their season's experience. Stephen Colby is an exciting prospect who learnt quickly the price an opener pays for poor judgement early in an innings. Stephen has a marvellous eye, and picks up the line and length very early. Concentration, both at the crease and in the field is the area where Stephen now has to work to improve. Stephen Johnson suffered from too many people telling him what he was doing wrong, resulting in a loss of confidence in his own.

he was doing wrong, resulting in a loss of confidence in his own ability. Stephen has as much natural talent as any young player to come into this Club in my era. Stephen should not allow himself to get bogged down in too much theory, and when he begins to believe once more in his own talent, then watch out!

Ken Pitcher, Chris Hynes and Richard Trim played as all-rounders. Ken and Chris were both disappointing with the bat for players of their abilities. Ken could not get going at all, yet he looked so good in the nets. I am certain that if he can get a good score in one of the early matches next season, then Ken will be on his way. Chris scored a memorable 66 against Gordon, but only reached 20 on two more occasions. The problem lies in the back-foot play of Chris. Once he gets into the habit of getting further across behind the line of the ball then Chris can look forward to many more runs. Both Ken and Chris were outstanding in the field, and bowled very well.

Richard Trim had one of those season with the bat that he would like to forget. Richard, to his credit, continued to practise diligently and regularly, and has even retained his sense of humour. His leg-spin bowling previously somewhat erratic, improved markedly. Next season should see Richard develop into a very handy all-rounder.

The wicket-keeping was shared by Ron Holmes and Richard Weekes. Ron as always was an excellent team member and keeper, until he opted to give youth a chance. Richard was selected as a keeper/batsman, but as the season progressed, Richard's batting improved to the point where he was our most consistent batsman and worthy of a place in the side on that strength alone. To be critical of a keeper for being overenthusiastic is unusual, but such is the case with Richard. Richard is endowed with magnificent reflexes and agility, but this on occasions coupled with his exhuberance, saw Richard diving for the spectacular catch which could have been left for first slip.

Richard, remember the best keepers are hardly ever noticed. Work on technique, for you have everything else going for you.

The bowling was of a consistently high standard, as evidenced by the statistics.

Special mention must be made of Gavin Fletcher. Selected as a last minute replacement in Second Grade for our first match against Balmain, Gavin took 6/43 off 16 overs, in a performance typical of his season's efforts. Gavin's control and ability to move the ball in the air and off the wicket make him a very difficult customer. No doubting Gavin has a big future in the game. Russell Pierce is another

on the verge of First Grade. After watching Russell's progress since he joined the Club, I was delighted to see Russell earn promotion to Seconds. Russell's development is most apparent, and he is now a very fine new-ball bowler indeed. Couple this with excellent fielding and batting talent, you come up with another player of the future.

Steve Byers bowled brilliantly for us in the first few games before sheer number of wickets earned him promotion to First Grade.

Des Hartman bowled intelligently and consistently, and as always was an aggressive competitor.

Ross Wiblin, Greg Davies and David MacPherson played games throughout the season.

Ross, when he learns to settle down early in his innings and assess the pace and tempo of things should score many runs. He has all the shots in the book, but did not get the chance to use them often enough because he gave his wicket away. It's easy enough to get out Ross, so make the bowlers get you out.

Greg Davies was his usual super-confident self, taunting opening bowlers in his own indominatable style. Similarly Dave MacPherson was his usual super-confident self, and I can only admire Dave's love of the game and competitive spirit. Greg's wife Lyn shared the scoring with John Colby. The Beauty and The Beast! Thank you both for a magnificent job, and likewise to Maureen Johnson, Stephanie Fletcher, and those other ladies who gave generously of their time to maintain the Manly tradition of a hospitable afternoon tea.

The season started with what appeared a well balanced side, with depth in both batting and bowling. Unfortunately the good bowling and fielding performances were not matched by the team's brittle batting.

It was only the individual performances from the likes of Ross Wiblin (74, 49), Steve Johnson (71), Rick de Silva (68), Ken Turner (54, 44, 46) and Gary Flowers (54, 59) that resulted in three wins and some hope of victory in others.

Ross Wiblin started the season with a couple of hard hitting knocks which earned him promotion to Seconds where he spent the rest of the season.

Four other youngsters started the season on promising notes and forced their way up the grades; the big hitting Steve Johnson who sometimes lost his wicket through lack of concentration; the tall Steve Colby who showed sound application with the bat but slowness in the field; Mike Yell extremely cautious in his approach to batting, and the rapidly improving fast bowler Russell Pierce.

The wicket keeping duties were shared by Steve Orchard and Richard Weekes. Both performed adequately and there was little to choose between them. On my departure for overseas, Ron Holmes came down from Second Grade to take over the captaincy and the wicket keeping duties.

Ken Turner was once again the major run getter and played some valuable knocks at the start of an innings. It seemed that whenever Ken went to the crease he seldom failed. There were signs of a big innings from Gary Flowers, a batsman of proven ability in this Grade. "Storkie" had earlier produced a collection of good looking scores but then fell away slightly. It was hoped that Rick de Silva would fulfil the promise which has always been apparent. A pleasant striker of the ball, he has too often fallen victim of his self doubt and impetuosity. Encouragingly, during the final matches, he injected greater discipline into his play and was rewarded with scores of 62 and 50, the former effort enabled us to score an impressive 5 wicket win over Penrith.

Richard Trim was moved up the order to allow him to build an innings. His highest score was only 37 and he has not yet fulfilled his considerable potential with the bat. His tremendous enthusiasm in the field was a valuable quality. And if he could add a little subtlety to his fairly good command of length and line "Trimmie" could mature into a more than useful spinner.

James Black bristled with confidence and aggression. He always looked most impressive even though his figures did not show him up in too good a light. The match winning knock of 65 versus Waverley demonstrated his fighting characteristics. His superlative fielding, like that of Rick de Silva's, remained a feature of the season.

Together with James, Tony Pitcher played his part as a change bowler. A "work horse" with tireless determination, Tony gained vital wickets with his customary tidy bowling and energetic fielding. Frustrated by several low scores with the bat his plucky innings of 39 versus Penrith gave him immense satisfaction. Young Stuart Davies' batting blossomed brightly at times. His lack of mobility and interest (?) while fielding, however, could prejudice a fine future in the game.

Phil Blake toiled vainly for runs in the few innings he played when promoted from the Fourths but his fielding remained enthusiastic.

Neil Tuckerman showed himself a good looking young batsman of immense promise when called upon to open the innings in the final match of the season. The manner in which he accumulated his 74 runs, appearing to caress the ball through gaps in the field, showed a maturity well beyond his 15 years. Dave MacPherson was unable because of injury to shoulder as much bowling as he would have wished. With his presence the bowling appeared lethal enough to win matches. Used in short spells his 5 for 25 played a vital part in the victory against Waverley.

His absence considerably reduced the strength of the side towards the end of the season.

Rob Armstrong spun the ball more than his spinning colleagues. He picked up wickets consistently though at times not at his tightest. One sensed an occasional casualness in his fielding and he failed to realise that one has to be alert and effective in the field at all times, not just when bowling. Jim Orchard produced in and out form with the ball. He made some important contributions with the bat producing innings of character that shored up collapses or set up victories. Whether his 5 for 55 versus Sydney or having taken the most number of catches (eleven) for the side brought him greater pleasure was hard to tell.

Dave Packer was a dangerous bowler when in the mood as his 4 for 66 off 29 overs versus Penrith proved.

With Dave MacPherson reduced to long periods of inactivity because of a troublesome heel, it was left to the energetic and enthusiastic Gary Fetke to lead the attack. Typical of him he responded admirably. Clearly benefitting from the extra responsibility, his control and confidence improved appreciably as he collected a haul of 7 wickets off 40 overs before being struck down with a back injury. On behalf of the team our gratitude must be expressed to the following:

Mrs. Trim and Mrs. Pitcher for so generously giving of their time to provide the afternoon sustenance; the Chairman of Selectors John Hodgson for his lively interest in both the team and individual performances; the Club Coach Tom Purcell for his advice and encouragement to the players; Keith Marks and Bob Tuckerman for ensuring that the players had sufficient practice time in the nets and the fathers, including Dallas Fletcher, who had no direct involvement with the team—for their presence on the boundary.

I have never entered a semi-final more confident that I was part of a Manly side that would win a premiership than when I stepped onto the field against Sydney University on 21st March. sustained effort from all our bowlers and fielders saw the minor premiers bundled out for only 152 just before stumps and there seemed little doubt, with Jim Stewart and Tim Stanley strengthening our batting, that this target was well within our capabilities, and that we would proceed into the final against Petersham, a side we had almost beaten by an innings a month or so previously. This was not to be however. A rain affected wicket that made two fairly average medium pacers virtually unplayable saw us bundled out for next to nothing. On this sour note ended the season for a group of young players who had not only played us into a winning position on the Saturday, but who had performed magnificently under considerable pressure in the three games leading up to the semi.

I do not propose to comment here on the non-provision of covers for this game or on the inability of the Association to enforce its own rules—the Club's feelings in this regard have already been put most forcibly by an executive who did everything possible to right this wrong.

The strength of our side was undoubtedly the bowling, which in the latter half of the season was backed up by some very good fielding. The pace attack was an exceptional one for this grade, and on the rare occasions they didn't get through there were no easy runs from a competent spin attack. Only one side managed 200 against us the entire season.

Graeme Hicks and Mark Petersen did most of the fast bowling work early, along with Gary Fetke, and their figures speak for themselves. "Stats" enjoyed by far his best season for the Club and 5/22 against University in Round 12 highlighted his season. He was a great example to our younger players in everything he did, particularly his fearless fielding at short leg. Mark was very much the spearhead of the attack at the season's start, consistently getting the first three or four wickets, but his form faded after Christmas with a string of injuries. It was pleasing to see him bounce back and bowl so well in the semi final, but there is still some work to do on his run-up and with learning to do more with the ball if he is to progress rapidly through the grades. The enthusiastic Gary Fetke, whose presence in the team always simplified my task in allocating the No. 11 batting spot, like Mark, improved considerably on last year's figures, ending with 17 wickets at 18 apiece in Fourths and doing well in Thirds also.

Brad Livett forced his way into the team late in the season and thereafter made every post a winner, with figures of 6/12, 2/15, 5/26 and 3/30 in the last four rounds. He is big, strong and bowled really fast in the last two matches to probably end up the most improved player in the Club. It would not surprise to see him in Second Grade next year if he continues to work sensibly at the nets.

A pretty rusty Tim Stanley also joined us in Round 13, not having played for a month or two, but this fine all-rounder made some significant contributions with bat and ball in all the games he played to become perhaps our key player by season's end. His last spell of outswing bowling in the semi-final was really superb and saw him deservedly finish with 6/52 off 26 overs.

Spinner Nick Johnson is not a very good curry eater, but he bowled his slow left armers well all season to end up our leading wicket taker with 34 victims at 15 runs apiece, continually beating batsmen with deliveries that cut back into them. Over the past 4 seasons Nick has notched up 116 wickets at 16 runs apiece without even a single game

in Poidevin Gray as a reward for his consistency, and I believe now is the time for the selectors to compare his figures with some of those of the spinners in higher grades and for Nick to be given the promotion he deserves. Added to his bowling Nick always fought hard with the bat, and was an excellent team man throughout the year.

Our batting results were far below the capabilities of the players concerned, and it was not until the advent of the experienced Jim Stewart (who scored a fine 69 not out against Sydney) and Tim Stanley that we had any real depth to our batting. Too many good starts were wasted through lack of application and discipline by the younger batsmen, who without exception seemed to feel that they had done their job if they

scored 20 or so.

Jim Stewart apart, David Heath always looked the best of the batsmen, having plenty of time to play his shots, and being able to adapt his game to a variety of wickets. His two innings against Wests on a poor pitch were excellent efforts and it is a mystery to me why David has stagnated in Thirds and Fourths. He must fully commit himself to some specific targets next year and should be looking at scoring 500 runs and finishing the season in Second Grade. It won't happen unless he makes a conscious effort and works harder at practice than he did this year.

Greg Pierce and Phillip Blake had mixed seasons. Greg played fine innings' against Petersham, Waverley and Sutherland, but was one of the prime offenders in throwing away good starts with silly shots. I know Greg has the ability to discipline himself and overcome this problem and hopefully next season will be a good one for him. Phillip played a couple of spectacular innings' against Randwick and Waverley and was our leading run getter, but he can do so much better still and will do so if he can just tighten his defence up and play a little straighter early in an innings. Both he and Greg numbered among the better fieldsmen in the side.

The batting averages were topped by 15 year old David Batty, who impressed us all with his natural sense of timing and even temperament. He just seems to lean on the ball and suddenly it's four. David should be very happy with his initial season, and I would like tomake special mention of his fielding, which was outstanding both in the gully and in the deep. He has a great future.

Steve Orchard's keeping remained of a very high standard and his taking of the slow bowlers was very impressive. His superb leg side stumping off Nick Johnson at Penrith to me was the highlight of his 32 dismissals for the season. Steve's batting was not as consistent as last year, but he had a lot of pressure on him during the season and no doubt will bounce back. I feel that he may well end up as a fighting number 6 or 7 batsman rather than as an opener, for he did well for us down the list on a couple of occasions.

James Black and Stuart Davies played a number of games with us and ended up in Third Grade. James in particular was an asset to the team and was a busy cricketer with his excellent running between the wickets, tight bowling, and good close catching. Stuart looked a very sound opener on most occasions, but must start working on his fielding skills and attitude right now if he is to remain on speaking terms with his captains and bowlers in the years to come. Youngsters Peter Wilkins, Bret MacPherson and Lee Pedrola did not enjoy the success we had hoped in their limited opportunities, however no doubt they will benefit from the games they played. I felt particularly sorry for Peter who really looked the goods against Cumberland, the only innings he played for us where he was not on a sub-standard pitch or the subject of a doubtful decision. He will overcome this unlucky start, as will Bret who showed a lot of courage in his innings against Waverley on a green top. 1980/81 was a successful and happy season for Fourth Grade and my thanks go to my wife Lynne for the tremendous amount of work whe did during the season both with the camera and with the afternoon teas, to our trusty scorer Ron Heath, to Sue Andrews for the assistance she gave Lynne throughout, and of course to all the players for their co-operation and work during the season.

Andrew Brenner joined our ranks towards the middle of the season and also displayed an excellent temperament for opening the innings. His innings of 65 against Mosman 'A' was outstanding. Attention to running between wickets will see even more runs in the future.

Peter Wilkins showed considerable ability with the bat, without achieving worthwhile results in the score book. Sometimes this happens, and next year will certainly be better.

Peter bowled some fine overs of off-spin and is a most talented gully fieldsman.

Robert Nelson was another player whose batting showed much promise but the scores did not come—they will next season. His off-spin bowling was very good and fielding of a very high standard anywhere on the paddock.

Andrew Fraser apart from a hard hitting innings of 70 against University of NSW 'B' had a disappointing season with the bat. Many promising innings' ended with the temptation to "have a hit". Towards the end of the season he showed signs of mastering this habit.

Fielding continued to be of a high standard and it was pleasing to see an improved attitude towards practice at the end of the season.

Andrew captained the side ably in the last two games.

Brett MacPherson batted very soundly in the middle order.

His 77 n.o. against the strong Waverley 'A' team was an excellent knock.

Brett also bowled some very useful spells of medium pace bowling.

Richard Marks is a player with a "ton of natural ability"

his driving of the ball was a delight to see.

As a medium pace bowler Richard bowled some very useful spells. He turned in a particularly fine effort as an opening bowler against Randwick.

David Patterson secured a permanent place in the team with some gutsy performances both with the bat and in the field.

David's performances in the field were outstanding and he was an example to the rest of the team in his unceasing quest to save runs.

Lee Pedrola a tremendously hard hitting middle order bat who on occasions "murdered attacks". Northern Districts 'B' were the victims of one such innings which ended with 22 runs off the last over to score his initial Grade century. Lee bowled some useful medium pace overs, particularly towards the end of the season. His fielding was outstanding but spasmodic, a little more cencentration will make Lee a "complete" fieldsman.

John Gavagna was a truly quick opening bowler and despite the difficulty of bowling at Balgowlah Oval turned in some excellent spells.

A tremendously enthusiastic player whose wholehearted contribution to each game was a fine example to all and in particular the younger players.

Brad's promotion to 4ths late in the season was a just reward

for a fine player.

Steve Wilson Steve was a quiet but effective keeper. Steve's keeping will improve as he gains more confidence in his own abilities and is prepared to spend more time working at practice sessions on his keeping.

Ian Gately joined us towards the end of the season and showed

promise as both a medium pacer and useful bat.

He must be prepared to work hard on his game and put in a far greater effort at practice, if this occurs he will realise

his great potential.

I would like to say a special thanks to all those parents who supported us, particularly those who gave of their time to organise the delicious afternoon teas, so good they made teams want to play us at home. I would mention Noeleen Pedrola, Maureen Wilson, Wendy Stewart, Helen Tuckerman, Meryl Wilkins and Terry Gavagna in this regard. Also to those who played and are notmentioned in the body of this report; thank you. Finally I would like to thank Bob Tuckerman for his help in many things (including a couple of very useful, if unorthodox, thirties). It was in all a most enjoyable season.

We need less than 3 runs per over yet again our top order batsmen didn't perform up to expectations and we were struggling at 7/90 after being 4/90. Richard Weekes taught the entire side a lesson playing his natural game and picking the right ball to hit. We were all out for 161 runs, 7 runs short of victory. Three of our batsmen were run out and 4 were bowled proving that in a sense, we lost the game ourselves. It was however a very tight game and could have gone either way. As it turned out N.D's were victorious.

Mosman were our next opponents and another side that we wanted to thrash. We had lost to them in the trial game and we weren't going to lose again. They won the toss and elected to bat. North Sydney were in trouble at 3/25, but this didn't matter as 125 runs was not a very big total to chase. Things looked a lot brighter when we had them 7/76, but unfortunately were unable to dismiss their remaining batsmen and they passed our total with 8 wickets down. We lost the game but put up a very strong fight and almost turned the game our way.

I don't think that we should feel dispondent about the season, we played the game in the right spirit, but unfortunately we didn't perform well enough on the days that we lost. The fielding was of its usual top quality which very few teams could match, but our batting and bowling lacked, in one word, 'maturity'. I can't honestly say that the sides we lost to were better than us, they just read the game deeper, perhaps. I enjoyed captaining the side and thank all members for their co-operation and support. To Dave MacPherson our Manager, who was always advising us, giving us encouragement and almost a team member, thanks for a terrific job. To Ron Heath, our scorer and Alan Waters, our vet, who were there whenever needed and for doing a job that none could better, thanks very much. To the parents and friends who supported us and provided the teas, thank you for a job well done.

We didn't win this year, but next year we have just as strong a side and hopefully we can forget the past and go in fighting.

The Manly Green Shield team performed extremely creditably this season, winning four of the first five games before going down to two very strong sides in the last two matches. They finished third in their Division.

The side was well led by John Gavagna, who had a tremendous series with the ball, taking 31 wickets at an average of only 11.42 runs each, and deservedly winning selection in the Combined A.W. Green Shield team. He was simply too good and too fast for the majority of opposition batsmen, and left in his wake a trail of shattered wickets and bruises. On four separate occasions John took five or more wickets in an innings, and it was only on the slower damp tracks that he was not a real force.

We had problems all year deciding on a suitable opening partner for John. Rod Strykowski, Ian Gately and David Morris all bowled steadily but they never really threatened to run through a team. Nevertheless Rod's 2/9 against Mosman, Ian's 3/30 against Gordon, and David's 3/33 against Balmain were all valuable efforts, and in addition all three fought hard with the bat on a number of occasions.

Off-spinners Robert Nelson and Peter Wilkins bowled well in their limited opportunities to finish with five wickets apiece. Robert's 2/5 off 8 overs against the Balmain side was a very fine effort indeed, and he was helped here by two fine stimpings from Steve Wilson, who tried hard at all times and overall gave a very tidy performance to end up with ll dismissals.

The side batted attractively throughout. David Batty topped the averages in the four games he was available, and played some superb shots. His even-time 78 against Cumberland was a real gem, and had he been available for the full series the side may have done even better.

Openers Peter Wilkins and Neil Tuckerman usually got the side off to a sound start, thus making the job far easier for the following players. Both Neil and Peter have good techniques and temperaments, and will be valuable Club members for years to come. Peter batted right through our innings of 35 on a wet wicket at Waitara to score 19 not out—an effort he can be really proud of. Club records suggest that this may be the first occasion a Manly player has performed this feat in the Green Shield competition.

Lee Pedrola scored most runs (183) and hit the ball really hard on a number of occasions. His 78 in 64 minutes in the first round (2 sixes and 12 fours) was a great dig, as was his 53 against Mosman. Lee and Mike Rogan were the two outstanding fieldsmen in the side, and made a real contribution to our successes by the example they set here. Mike batted consistently during the series, and his 60 against a good Balmain attack on a seaming pitch at Manly was perhaps the best innings of the series.

Bruce Minnett, a year younger than the other boys, had a mixed year, but showed in the last round what he is capable of with a powerful innings of 45. He will do very well next year, as should the much improved Andrew Brenner, but needs to work on his fielding.






