



There are many of those young lads who we will be hearing more of very soon.

These results have undoubtedly been contributed to by a large extent from the Club's ongoing policy of junior development and encouragement of our young players.

Again this year, our staunch committeeman Tom Hart has been very active in co-ordinating the Club sponsored school's competitions. These were the all age Manly Cup; the Manly Shield for players 15 years and under; and the newly created Manly Primary Schools' Cup.

They were again very strongly supported and it is to be sincerely hoped that they will enjoy continuing success in the forthcoming season. We are indebted to Tom for his efforts in this vitally important area.

Notwithstanding the ever-increasing costs in running our Club, it will be seen from the Treasurer's Report that we have been able to present a satisfactory financial result for the season. This has been achieved by careful adherence to our budget and to the quite outstanding efforts of the Ladies Committee and our Social Committee. To these committees, so enthusiastically led by Diana Rothwell and Helen Sears and by Ron Holmes respectively, we are sincerely indebted.

I should also express my sincere appreciation to all those Club members who supported our functions and to those non-playing supporters who so kindly gave of their time and facilities so vital to the success of the various functions held.

There were again, during the past season, some fine individual achievements resulting in representative honours. Gavin Fletcher was again selected in the N.S.W. U/19 team and his performances in the Interstate Carnival were such that he was chosen in the Australian U/19 team for the Test Matches against Pakistan.

Jeff Maher, who had a marvellous season for the Club, and Bruce Minnett were both selected in both the Combined Green Shield teams and the N.S.W. U/16 side.

Each of these very talented young players is to be congratulated on their efforts and it is to be hoped that even greater honours will be theirs in the years ahead.

The Club has been fortunate to once again enjoy the support of Puma, who, through David Macpherson, provided player awards during the season. They are awards greatly appreciated by the Club and all its players.

The General Committee had a very busy and onerous schedule during the year. All members were highly conscientious and enthusiastic. Glen Kroschel and Dallas Fletcher were new to the Committee this year and proved to be very valuable acquisitions with their great enthusiasm and initiative.

The great tragedy that befell the Club in the sad loss of Keith Marks, our highly respected and loved Secretary, has been felt not only by all our members, but by cricket administrators and players all over Sydney. I have paid special tribute to Keith elsewhere in this report, but I would add that the loss of Keith is cricket's loss, he was destined, I am sure, to have been one of cricket's outstanding administrators.

Forgetting for the moment our disappointments this past year, let me thank you all for your support and efforts during the year. Let us now accept the challenge in front of us. It is a changing cricket world and we must keep pace with it. You all have a part to play and I can only ask and expect of you to give of your best. Let us be No. 1 in 1982/83.

104TH ANNUAL REPORT

To the Members of the Manly-Warringah District Cricket Club. Ladies and Gentlemen,

The Management Committee has pleasure in submitting for your consideration and adoption the 104th Annual Report and Financial Statement.

The report is tinged with sadness following the loss of our Honorary Secretary and friend Keith Marks. Tributes have been paid to Keith elsewhere in the report. On behalf of the Management Committee could I add to those tributes by saying, "that whilst he was with us for a short time we are all better people for having known him."

As in the previous season the Club entered teams in all five grades and teams in the A.W. Green Shield and Poidevin-Gray competitions. Regrettably it cannot be reported that the season, on the playing field was a success. Our fourteenth position in the Club Championship can only be expressed as disappointing.

The First Grade side lost Barry Rothwell and Graeme Beard, the latter by transfer, the former through retirement from the previous season's team. The team never really came to terms with the competition. Bob Rickey captained the team with great enthusiasm and was deserving of better results for his efforts.

Our Second Grade team captained by Des Hartman had a mixed season, with some brilliant wins including an outright victory over the ultimate premiers, Balmain, and some indifferent performances. It was pleasing to see the development of our young "quicks" under Des' leadership.

Ron Holmes led our Third Grade side in what must be described as a disappointing season—continually the team lost matches which should have been won. Notwithstanding the disappointing results many of our younger players will benefit immensely from the season.

Our Fourth Grade side was again led by the dedicated Tom Spencer and despite having to use numerous players during the season, the team remained a semi-final contender until the final round of the competition.

Jim Stewart once again took charge of our youthful Fifth Grade side. Despite a poor start to the season the team finished in

a most creditable fifth position. The Club is indebted to Jim for his efforts with these youngsters.

Our Poidevin-Gray team was most disappointing for a team with such immense talents. The A.W. Green Shield team had a good season, winning five of their seven games. The Club is indebted to John Grimble for managing the Green Shield team and it is hoped that his obvious talents in this area will continue to be available to the Club. The teams were captained enthusiastically by Phil Marks and Andrew Brenner.

Individually there were many fine performances, including some wonderful batting displays by Greg Hill and Phil Marks. Ian Howell's fabulous 178 n.o. will be long remembered by those fortunate enough to have seen it. Sixteen year old Jeff Maher secured 61 wickets in his debut season. Dave Rosa and Dave Miligen produced some firey bowling spells and look exciting prospects for future seasons.

TREASURER'S REPORT & FINANCIAL STATEMENT

Financially the 1981/82 season was veyr successful. The Club finished with a nett excess of Income over Expenditure of \$691.

This was brought about by the following:

- a) Preparation of a budget at the beginning of the year to meet requirements of the guidelines set down on our Income and Expenditure.
- b) To the members who supported the various social activities during the year.
- c) The Social Committee for their various functions, one of the most successful nights being the Gambling Night.
- d) The Ladies' Committee who once again worked hard for the Club with their many functions.
- e) Manly Rugby Union Club for their financial assistance.
- f) Donations which were received during the year for which we were most grateful.

This has not been an easy year as regards meeting the problem of rising costs and I thank my fellow committee members for their help in achieving our goal.

I would point out that Manly Council have increased the rental on grounds from \$750 1980/81 season to \$1,800, being 140% in one year. We have also been advised that for future years an allowance of 20% should be made in the budgets. Your committee has taken appropriate action in this regard by meeting officers of the Council and by communication.

We have been able to increase our "Investment Account" by \$500 used to meet our cash flow situation 1980/81 season.

SCHOOL COMPETITIONS

From reports received the future of both competitions is assured

as this provides the only form of regular inter-school cricket for many of the schools involved.

COACHING REPORT

Practice sessions last year were not of a high standard and this was certainly reflected in a lot of individual and team performances on the field.

A different method of organisation of Club practice sessions and player coaching was introduced to last season. Following discussion between players and the Club Committee it was decided that senior players would be responsible for conducting the Wednesday and Thursday practices and for coaching graded and junior players. You are all aware of the finer details of the scheme.

It was felt that this approach would be more successful in melding the player members of the Club into a closer and more motivated Club unit. It was expected that this "unit" would have better Club spirit and result in more aggressive successoriented cricket.

Unfortunately the scheme didn't really get off the ground for a number of reasons—not least of which was probably some poor early organisation. However, it seemed that very few players were interested in trying to make the most of it. There was a general lack of support amongst those who were supposed to be running the practices and those who were practicing.

Experience showed that most players were content to practice in their own unique ways according to their keeness or experience. One might have been led to conclude by watching one of our practices that cricket had little to do with general fitness but

was merely a game played in short bursts by a lot of specialists. The writer lays no claim to being any better than anyone else in this regard.

One rule which it is important to remember is that your level of performance in practice should be as close as possible to that which will be required of you in a match. For example, fast bowlers should come off their full run and should bowl the full 22 yards; bowlers generally should maintain a line and length; and batsmen should concentrate and play shots as they would in the middle.

If everyone can put a bit more effort into this aspect of their game next year, the Club's match results must improve.

A quick word about practice facilities—they are sub-standard and often dangerous. More centre-wicket practices would be very useful. Practice equipment could be better too. These are matters which quite possibly cannot be significantly improved but they are important in terms of player improvement and morale, and attempts should be made to do so.

Finally, one successful aspect of the coaching was the fielding sessions organised for the Junior Association Rep. Teams. The boys were all very keen and practised hard. There are some fine young athletes coming up through the ranks and judging by performances they are also fine young cricketers.

The past season can be summed up as both disappointing and frustrating. Disappointing in that we only won 4 games and frustrating in that we have some real talent in the team which is not being fully utilised.

It has been dwelt on at length to find the reasons behind the team's limited success this year. I personally believe that it was a combination of reasons. Firstly, the loss of Graeme Beard was a tremendous blow to the team. Secondly, I believe that a real lack of depth within the Club inhibited our ability to draw on players when current first team members were out of form. Thirdly, the state of the wicket at Manly Oval was the worst that I have seen since being associated with the Club.

I offer these not as excuses for poor performances, but as valid reasons which reflected the team's attitude and psychological approach to the game.

Throughout the season we were always struggling to get away to a strong start. This is evidenced by the fact that we used 6 opening batsmen and of the 24 innings played, the opening stand failed to reach double figures 15 times. Also on 7 occasions the third wicket had fallen with the score less than 20.

Greg Hill and Phil Marks were the only two batsmen to strike form all year. Greg's brilliant centuries against Uni. of NSW and Mosman were masterpieces and it was fitting that he finished with top billing in the averages. Phil Marks also finished with plus 500 runs and it was a tribute to his determination that he was able to score a century against Balmain on a bad Manly wicket less than a week after the tragic loss of his father.

Sam Mesite, John Grimble, Graeme Wilks, Murray McKeough and Chris Hynes will all be disappointed with their performances this year.

Ian Howell, after several impressive performances in 2nd Grade was promoted, but could never recapture his form in the top grade. However, Ian's vast experience and constructive comments were always warmly accepted by the team.

Mark Kroschel proved himself to be a middle order batsman of quality with 337 runs whilst playing some vital innings during the season.

The bowling attack was again our strength this year, with some very impressive performances. In Gavin Fletcher, we have a talented medium pacer. Gavin is now firmly entrenched in the 1st Grade team, and he richly deserved the honour of playing for his country in the recent Under 19 Test Series against Pakistan.

The Club is blessed with such up and coming young bowlers as David Rosa, David Miligen and Richard Booth who will be better for the experience gained this year.

Mark Kroschel bowled well at times but failed to keep the pressure on batsmen sufficiently on other occasions. Steve Byers bowled better than his figures indicate and I'm sure he will want to rectify that position next year.

Last and not least to Tom Purcell who had another fine year behind the stumps. Tom perhaps didn't score as many runs as he would have liked, but he is a most vital member of the team.

Thanks go to Don Sellin for his scoring efforts and John Mesite for his support.

Also and most importantly, to the ladies for the afternoon teas and their valued assistance throughout the year.

The season could not have ended sooner for the disappointing 3rd Grade side. Three chief factors militated against the success of the team. The third reason was the absence of a bowler of Rosa's pace to unsettle the early opposition batsmen and to polish off the tail.

Fortune was not kind either. Matches in which we were favourably placed were abandoned by rain. More often than not the batsmen were forced to bat on wickets which encouraged the bowlers. Injuries to opening bowlers—Livett in the early season and Fettke later—proved a handicap.

Meanwhile the sound displays of the young openers Tuckermann and Knock, the all round effort of the ever reliable Stanley and the emergence of a genuine quickie in Rosa partly compensated for the disappointing results. In the field generally, the side performed well except for one or two off days when catches were not held.

Resume of Players

Tim Stanley produced some useful performances with bat and ball. He certainly played some hard hitting innings' and averted more than one threatened breakdown in the batting. He was utilised both as a stock bowler and leader of the attack and responded magnificently. As a senior player, his advice and encouragement was always appreciated.

Sixteen year old <u>Neil Tuckermann</u>, dependable and full of concentration is a player to whom the Club can look to in the future. As the season progressed, he learnt to build on an impressively sound technique. He must continue to improve his fielding and sharpness between wickets, vital ingredients, especially in the limited over games.

The unflappable <u>David Knock</u> was usually content to graft for his runs. He lent <u>Tuckermann</u> sound support and these two youngsters could become the Club's openers in the not too distant future. An unfortunate run out deprived him of a well earned century versus Randwick. "Knockie" showed tremendous drive and spirit and possesses the courage and reflexes to emulate "Wilksey" in the hip pocket fielding position.

With the team needing to concentrate on scoring runs, rather than the manner in which they scored them, <u>Ken Turner's</u> experience was invaluable.

<u>David Heath</u>, a conscientious batsman who thinks about the game, gained in confidence with some sound early knocks, and was eventually promoted.

That willing worker <u>Dave Rosa</u> generated a great deal of pace and was never found wanting, even on pitches which afforded very little help. He obtained as much delight in obtaining wickets as he does in getting the 190 Express to its destination before the appointed time. In only his first season of grade, Dave's tremendous determination and exuberance found him rocketted to 1st Grade where I feel he will soon become a permanent fixture.

On occasions when he found his pace and fire, <u>Brad Livett</u> looked as fast as any grade bowler. Unfortunately, he struggled to come to terms with himself and the opposition. His ability to live with the aches and pains of a fast bowler's life still remains a question mark. His batting on the other hand improved and when the side were in difficulty, he responded with some hard hitting or defiant innings' as the situation required.

Ken Pitcher proved something of an enigma. This season his form completely deserted him. Yet his spirit never sagged and his athleticism helped to lift our fielding.

Gary Fettke relied on length and line rather than pace and proved a steady bowler. He enjoys the game as much as he does loud rock music. A fine team man who always did his damnedest.

Nick Gaywood came from England and after adjusting to our quicker wickets and colder beer, struck the ball with elegance and authority and ended the season as our leading batsman. Settled in well and will be missed next season. Involved in two fine century partnerships with Knock and Tuckerman respectively.

A little disappointment was felt that Rick de Silva's batting results did not match his potential. Acknowledged as an uncertain starter, Rick would overcome his early problems, only to get out when looking well set. His extremely smart work in the covers always remained a feature in a team whose fielding generally reached a pleasing standard.

Robbie Armstrong's wickets were rather more expensive than one expected from a bowler of his quality. Unless he shows the application to match his ability, Rob will not develop into the

leg spinner the Club needs. He took some splendid catches in the deep.

Nick Johnson displayed a more purposeful approach this season. He shouldered the spin bowling and had his moments of success.

Manly finished a modest eighth in a closely contested 4th Grade competition yet were a chance of a semi-final position right up to the last Saturday of the competition, when an outright win against St. George would have put us in fourth position. However, two good wins in the re-draws saw us end a season where due to rain we played one less competition match than the other grades with 62 points. Only Petersham (worthy premiers) and Mosman bettered this tally in 4th Grade if we look at the overall results including the re-draws.

The side finished the year strongly winning five of the last six rounds easily, including two outright victories. This strong finish coincided with Ken Turner joining the team and with a return to form from Mark Petersen, who had started the season poorly.

Ken's ability to get the side off to a solid start on all occasions was something we had been lacking for a long time and Peter Wilkins, Lee Pedrola, Jim Orchard and Ken Pitcher in particular should take note of how dearly he sold his wicket, regardless of how good or bad the pitch was. Ken was a constant source of quiet sensible advice to youngsters who batted with him during the year, as well as to me personally on field placings, bowling changes and the like. His overall contribution was much appreciated.

Mark Petersen started the year slowly and seemed to have lost a lot of the pace and penetration that stamped him as a promising bowler last year, but took 28 cheap wickets in his last five games with us to end the season with a round 50 wickets in all grades— a great season as Graham's reserve was far from a fast bowler's paradise this year. Highlights of his performance were nine wickets in the match against Sydney University and a devastating 9/25 on a wet wicket against Cumberland in there-draw. I am also pleased to report a tremendous improvement in Mark's fielding (which was not up to standard last year) and in his work at practice.

The other batsmen fall into two categories. On the one hand, the relatively experienced Steve Johnson, Ken Pitcher, Richard Trim and James Black played a few games only and all are far better players than 4th Grade, as their averages indicate. Steve and Ken were with us because luck had not gone their way in higher grades. Richard and James started low because of late starts to the season. All of these played more than one fine innings

for us, the highlight being Steve Johnson's disciplined 129 against Macquarie University where he only lofted half a dozen balls in a four hour innings, and all of these went out of the ground. Ken Pitcher played a number of brilliant but all too short innings', but happily was developing a more determined attitude to his batting in the last few games. He is simply too good a cricketer—batting, bowling and fielding—to languish in 4th Grade any longer.

The other batsmen were almost exclusively youngsters a year or two out of Green Shield. There were some encouraging performances from this group. Greg Pierce, whilst still not fully realising his potential, topped the aggregate and played a couple of really good innings' under pressure early in the season as well as developing into an above average fielder. Andrew Fraser and Peter Wilkins both improved dramatically on last year's results and turned in creditable performances. I had begun to wonder if Andrew was going to be able to succeed in grade cricket but a superb innings of 39 not out against University made me hastily change my thoughts in this regard and he was looking a pretty fair player by the end of the season, although his fielding has slipped a little from previous high standards. Peter played a string of impressive knocks opening the innings, and always had a lot of time to play his shots. Too often though he was out after getting a start, usually through lapses of concentration rather than anything the bowler did. Better concentration and some work on countering balls around off stump are the two things Peter must work on next year. If he can solve these problems he has the potential to be a very good player indeed.

Lee Pedrola was another improver and was unrecognisable from last year. He played at least three valuable innings' for us during the season, hitting the ball really hard on occasions. I believe he will do well at this level next year, both with bat and ball, for he also bowled well in the limited opportunities he had. David Batty disappointed early but played two nice innings' at the season's end which hopefully will encourage him to keep working at his game. He is young enough to improve his footwork and remains a superb fielder.

David Knock played a couple of nice innings' before winning promotion, and of the others, Brett Macpherson batted well against Southern Districts and Uni. of NSW, hitting the ball very cleanly. Brett is a very nervous starter and I'm sure will do better when he has a few more runs behind him and feels more confident of his position in the team.

Robert Armstrong improved his batting dramatically to the extent that he could almost lay claim to the all-rounder tag on his 4th Grade results. His batting certainly did not lack confidence—quite the opposite in fact—and he scored an excellent maiden 50 in grade against Uni of NSW in better than even time. Rob also bowled fairly well for us getting three or four wickets on virtually every occasion I gave him the ball. However he can do far better than even this sort of result if he decides to really concentrate at the nets.

Our other all-rounder was Jim Orchard whose contribution to the team was far greater than his figures suggest. Jim was never really left to settle down to one spot in the order but was always happy to shift around the order from match to match as our team composition continually changed. 'His best innings came when we needed him most and his sense of humour was also valuable in developing team spirit. With the exception of his award-winning over in Round 1, Jim bowled well without luck and could have had much better figures.

Of the other bowlers, Gary Fettke, Ken Pitcher and Nick Johnson all performed up to their normal reliable standards with the ball but played the majority of their cricket in 3rd Grade. Finally, young Jeff Maher made two late season appearances that confirmed the outstanding promise he showed all season in 5th Grade. His flight and control of length and line are immaculate and he has a very bright future ahead.

Steve Wilson went in last most of the year, so it is probably appropriate that I mention him last in this report. In my opinion, Steve should be very satisfied with his season. He kept consistently well to a varied attack and missed very little over the season. His leg-side work generally and some of his stumpings were brilliant and the main area for his future improvement is in covering a little more ground on the off-side. I would rate Steve probably the most improved member in the side this year and provided he continues to increase the amount of glove-work he does at practice I look forward to this improvement continuing.

Finally thanks again to Lynne for her all-round support and involvement, and to all the other ladies who assisted in the preparation and serving of some excellent afternoon teas.

The 5th Grade side had a very successful season, finishing just out of the finals in 5th position, with 68 points. This was an outstanding result for such a young side, particularly as the season started with four losses. It is to the team's credit that they showed the character to overcome this start. In fact we lost just one further match, when the weather intervened against us. In retrospect it was unfortunate that we struck all our toughest opposition right at the start of the year.

A major reason for having a fifth side is to introduce promising young players to open age grade competition, and in this regard it was gratifying to see virtually all of last year's young players hold their own in 4th Grade or better this season. The names of Tuckermann (3rds), Fraser, Pedrola, Wilkins, Macpherson, Wilson and Batty especially come to mind. The Club is forming a very sound base for future years.

5th Grade performed even better this year than last because we had a better attack. The key person in this attack (but it was by no means a one-man band) was Jeff Maher. Jeff had a marvellous season (55 wickets at 13.2 each) was chosen in the NSW Under 16 side which played in the Australian Carnival in Adelaide. He bowls his left arm orthodox with lovely flight and tight control, and he spins! He is one of the Club's most outstanding prospects.

Geoff McDermott was another fine acquisition this year. A left arm opening bowler, Geoff has good pace and control, and he will do well in the higher grades. His batting never quite fulfilled its promise, but he is an excellent outfielder. Mark Bury handled the task of opening the attack into the wind with energy and determination, and had a good season as a result. Mark's mobility in the field was a constant source of amazement to us all! Brad Ewing had restricted opportunities to bowl his off spinners due to Jeff Maher's ability to bowl tightly for long periods. Brad bore this cheerfully, and bowled much better than his figures show. The first change bowlers were Lee Pedrola and Ian Gately, and both bowled tightly and well. Lee swings the ball a surprising amount, and must continue to take his bowling seriously. Ian was especially useful on a wet track, where his accuracy made him difficult to handle. We were lucky, too, to have Bob Greening for four rounds. His pace and lift made him very difficult to handle at this level.

The batting order was less stable than the bowling, as the inevitable changes due to injuries and unavailability in higher grades varied the composition of the side. Two players showed substantial improvement over last year. Lee Pedrola had a marvellous season, highlighted by 141 on a soft track at Balmoral. His defence has improved and his ability to score runs very quickly makes him a most exciting player. Ian Gately also showed real potential this year; he has a sound defence and hits the bad ball very hard.

As mentioned above, it was pleasing to see last year's group of young batsmen progress to 4th Grade. Andrew Fraser, especially, reaped well earned rewards for working hard to curb his desire to "have a go" when tied down. The lesson is that concentration and patience as well as strokes are needed to make it in higher grades.

Andrew Brenner did a Greg Chappell, starting with three successive ducks, but then usually provided us with a solid start. His wicket keeping was always sound and he stumped well off Maher. David Patterson was as solid and gritty as ever, though he had an interrupted year. Greg Alsopp had a learning year, being a little young for grade, but showed enough for this writer to believe that he will be a good player in the future.

We also saw something of several other young batsmen who showed tremendous promise. Bruce Minnett played during the school break, and looks a fine strokeplayer. He also represented NSW in the Under 16 Championships. Brett Meredith, Richard Fry, John Saunders and Bob Neville all looked good players in the making in their brief appearances.

This side's fielding was sound and keen, and we generally played aggressive and attacking cricket. The Club's administrators are to be thanked for their efforts in so vastly improving Balgowlah's playing surface.

Finally, it is a pleasure to thank the mums and dads who supported the team and myself so well during the year. Our afternoon teas always drew favourable comment from the opposition.

Played 7, won 5, lost 2—a reasonably good result. Reasonably good in view of how much the boys wanted to win. Having assessed the ability of the sides they played, they would have gone away disappointed in not having made the final despite the impressive scoreboard.

A feature of the Manly side was the enthusiastic leadership and at times extremely good 'feel' for the state of play displayed by Andrew Brenner the Captain. Andrew averaged well with 31.16 made more valuable in view of his opening role. However as an opener, he must not only vaguely understand, but must approach each innings with absolute dedication to getting 50, and then 100. This is essential in ensuring that his team performs well. This approach combined with what is a very sound opening technique will mean regular large scores. The above applies generally to the batting order.

Richard Fry the other opener and outstanding cover fielder is possessed of all the fundamentals and at times, notably his first three innings' made batting look easy. Richard, time after time, took the pressure off himself by mature running between wickets—an asset anywhere especially in Green Shield.

A combination of bad luck and loss of confidence stopped Richard from having an enormous series.

Brett Meredith the Vice Captain and keeper, Bruce Minnett, State representative, Martin Richards with the more than healthy average of 125, Greg Alsopp and Ian Gately proved to be very similar in their collective approach to batting—'the three dents policy'— one in the ball, one in the pickets and one in the bowler's pride. It is a great way of batting, extremely useful in the middle order and definitely to be encouraged—but with a view to next season's grade fixtures this approach must be supplemented with a lot of intelligent net practice. You have to hate getting out, éven in the nets; blast the ball, just pick the right one. Bruce, Martin, Greg and Ian fielded strongly throughout—Ian finding his niche at the silly-bordering on suicidal short leg position—that lad knows how to absorb punishment.

Dave Tebbutt and Steve Glassock are upper order players who have another year in Green Shield and Manly must look to them to assume the role of major rungetters. Their dedication is apparent but both need the encouragement which lots of runs provide. Steve is an outstanding gully-slip fielder and promising bowler, who with more height and increased strength could be an extremely proficient all-rounder. David in hindsight deserved more opportunities, his batting against North Sydney, the best attack I feel we faced, was extremely solid.

The quicks were Ian Gately, Ryan Donelly, Gary Holmes and Greg Radovanovich. Each had moments when he bowled very well, but generally the quicks failed to capitalise on their pace and ability to move the ball by rarely bowling more than three balls out of six on the stumps. Each of the quicks, with hard work has real ability. Manly will be looking to 'Sikander' and 'Rado' next series to really get down to the job and knock opposition sides over.

Jeff Maher, John Saunders and James Bush provided the spin attack. Jeff, an orthodox left armer who gained Junior State representation and John a right arm leg spinner who has another year to go, were our bowling mainstays—they took 38 of the 64 wickets attributable to bowlers (Bill O'Reilly would be moved to tears of joy!) Each lad merited every over he bowled. However Jeff and John would be well advised to work hard on their batting. Each can bat and in the event that they seek higher selection, another string to the bow is essential. Despite orthodox notions about spinners who turn the ball the same way the two boys often bowled in tandem

and were more effective as such. John at this early stage has a very free action, and given lots of work his progress will be very interesting. James got one match in which he turned the ball very sharply from the off. He took two wickets, deserved more and produced the fielding of the season at shortish midwicket which a certain North Sydney batsman can reasonably expect not to happen again.

Looking back on a thoroughly enjoyable series, I would like to thank Bob Tuckermann who co-ordinated trainings and generally performed administrative tasks with a minimum of bother, Bob Brenner, John Fry, Ron Holmes, Mrs. Meredith (for the drinks) and the other dads and mums who in a variety of ways made things easier. Manly Green Shield and Co., it was a pleasure to be associated with you.






