



Annual Report — Season 1985/86

President's Report

With just one exception (The Poidevin-Gray Competition victory) 1985/86 was a season we should probably prefer to forget. But we should only put it behind us after we have learnt some lessons from it. In bald terms we went from 7th to 17th in the Club Championship. How could that happen? It seems to me a variety of factors were at work. Firstly, our practice, facilities were poor and our efforts at practice were poor, although there were some notable exceptions. One result of this was dreadful catching through every grade. Secondly, too many players were happy to arrive at games too late to warm up. I believe that these things pointed to a lack of discipline and commitment which the Committee is determined to rectify. It is fine to be a good social club, but not at the expense of the factors just mentioned.

There was no hint of a slide at the start of the season. Although sorry to lose Mark O'Neill and Michael Cox we had gained (or regained) Kevin Wright, Graeme Beard, Greg Bush and Mike Pawley to more than compensate. Administratively, Lyn and Tom Spencer, Dallas Fletcher and Sam Mesite stood down from Committee, leaving a large gap in experience. We were fortunate to have Neville Johnston able to take up the onerous job of Secretary. Neville's enthusiasm never flagged and the quality of meat at our barbeques certainly improved!

The highlight of the season was our victory in the Under 21 Poidevin-Gray Competition. The details are given elsewhere in this report, but let me record my congratulations to Peter Wilkins and his side. The final was a thrilling game of cricket.

A second high point was the successful end of season junior tour to New Zealand, organised and managed by Neville Johnston. History will find that Gavin Fletcher's team recorded five wins out of five. Only the boat race series against was drawn. The young players should derive great benefit from the tour.

Socially the Club had several successful functions. These included the Christmas dinner/disco, the Gambling Night and the end of season dinner. Next season we plan to return to the Room at the Top for after game activities and will put some pressure on players and friends to make this venue the successful gathering place it has been in the past.

Many people and organisations contribute to the successful running of the Club. John G. Stephenson & Co (now WTC-Stephenson) were again major sponsors and our thanks go to them. The annual Junior Coaching Day held in conjunction with the Manly Daily and J.G. Stephenson was again a big success. Tooheys Breweries are a major sponsor of New South Wales Cricket and the Club benefits from this sponsorship. Carlton and United Breweries also provided valued support, as did the Parkway Hotel and Australasian Meat Brokers.

The Club continues to sponsor junior competitions in the district and we are grateful to Tom Hart for his work with the Schools competition and to Barry Veitch for his help with matters related to junior competitions. We also had close and happy contact with the Warringah Shire Club in endeavouring to ensure that our younger players gained the best possible cricket experience.

We were sorry at the end of the season to lose Andrew Carver, who has headed to Adelaide to check out the vineyards. Andrew was a great clubman and we will miss his hard work.

The Club again received good press from The Manly Daily and our thanks go to Warren Simm for that coverage. The Club would also like to thank the many supporters and parents who helped with scoring duties, afternoon teas and in numerous other ways during the season. Ron Atherton, particularly, must be thanked for his help with practices through the year.

In conclusion let me say that the ability exists within the Club for us to return to the winning lists next season. It is up to each of us to make the commitment to practice and to the games to see that it happens.

Peter Ryan is a gifted cricketer, brilliant in the field, a stock bowler who could take wickets when batsmen looked well set, and as a batsman finding it difficult to score runs without practicing, and taking time to work on technical faults, particularly on the back foot.

This season Peter went nowhere near realising his full potential.

It would have been better for Tim Blank to spend the season in 2nds, accumulating runs and gaining confidence in his ability. Tim has a future in the game and he and Richard Fry hold the responsibility of forming the engine room of the batting line up in the coming seasons.

Tim, in fact, could become a fine first grade captain.

Peter Wilkins was the other batsman in the first round. We all know that Pete can bat, and how the Club needed players with his potential to be successful.

So therein lies the secret to 2nd grade's demise. Our 6 top batsmen were all playing either first grade or 3rd grade by Christmas. And with them went our best fieldsmen. Instead of dropping the odd catch as in earlier rounds, we held the odd catch in later rounds.

Those best of buddies Steve Colby and Steve Johnston rotated through the grades, sometimes threatening to hang up their boots in moments of failure, looking to a brighter future in firsts, when luck was more in their favour. The off season spent in England could well be the catalyst for both to become regular 500 runs a season batsmen. No team can be successful without at least two 500 run batsmen. There is no fun in failure. Come on all you batties, the district needs a giant commitment from you next year.

And so to the bowlers. Zaidi, that likeable Pakistani import from Lancashire County, took 8 wickets in the first match, and kept the fieldsmen busy for most of the remaining games. Zeb was more consistent at No. 7 than any other batsman and was a welcome member of the team.

Jeff Atherton broke down in an early game and had some injury problems during the season. He is big and strong and needs the "killer" instinct. More consistent line and length which can only come with match experience, and a deadly bouncer.

Well, just a little bit more of each of those Jeff and you can become a regular wicket taker.

Mark Peterson was just getting match fit and fiery when he was transferred to Newcastle. Without Mark and Jeff the bowling became pedestrian and we plugged away, wickets were hard to come by, catches rarely taken, and opposition teams were still there at the end of the day's play.

Jeff MacPherson bowled with accuracy and great heart, and his cunning use of seam and swing brought him just rewards. With an enforcer at the other end, Jeff would have been even more successful. He did captain with great skill for two wins from three matches.

Brod Livett captained the last game for a 100% winning rate. His speed at 2nd grade level is deadly; his knowledge of the game highly skillful; his competitiveness and inspiration to all team members. If Brod is known as an also ran, in first grade, he would be better off, and the Club would be better served, by Brod captaining the 2nd grade. He is real leadership material.

Andrew Carver, wicketkeeper and batsman, is a fine competitor who was sadly missed when promoted. His replacement was Grahame Wilks, a gritty and loyal competitor, a good a team member as any captain could hope for. Grahame's glove work improved greatly with each match. His ability to hold an end up would have been better rewarded, if a couple of stroke makers had been there to keep the score board ticking over.

There is a big job to be done to lift Manly back as a force in the grade cricket scene.

Those members of the successful Poidevin Gray team could look back in the Club history to when Paul Stephenson, Phil Allen, Frank Turner, Peter Harvey, Graeme Beard and Alan Fraser all played in a premiership Poidevin Gray team in 1969, and five years later formed the nucleus of the successful first grade team.

You can do it boys. The winning makes the sacrifice and effort worth while.

3rd Grade Report

Well, once again the third grade side failed to make the finals, after promising so much in the early part of the season when we won our first game chasing a score of nearly 300 against North Sydney. I would like to congratulate our victorious Poidevin-Gray Team. This success augers well for the future of the Club. Thanks to "Nifty" Nev Johnston for his assistance throughout the season, as well as the mums and wives (including Noeline Pedrola) for the fabulous afternoon teas. Thanks also to Ronnie Atherton and Ken (Elmafud) Knock for thier work with the score book.

As a club, we lacked something both on and off the field. Bad performances on field can often be attributed to events that occur outside the cricket oval. 4th Grade Report

Another cricket season has come and gone all too quickly I'm afraid and on reflection it has been a most difficult and disappointing one for the Club. The fourth grade side finished in ninth position with 36 points, and it was unfortunate but ninth was the highest position on the ladder for a side from our Club.

We started the season very well and won 18 points from our first 5 games to be right up in the running, but a three game losing streak and only 3 majors from our last 9 games told the story.

Firstly we lost to Sydney University when they had registered 9 for 194 and we succumbed after being 2 for 100. We then got caught on a wet one against Balmain, where we dropped 10 catches, only to lose outright in the last over and then got flogged by Wests, who I considered to be the only team better than us in the competition. Had we won a couple of these games we would have given the premiership a real shake.

The only thing that seems to be lacking is self confidence. We are just as strong as other sides but we just don't believe that we **were** the better team, this led to lapses in concentration and a negative result.

It was good to see some old faces "donning the creams" again and it was a pity we didn't have a full season with the likes of Steve Taylor who due to work commitments couldn't see the season out. His 6 for 64 was our best individual bowling effort for the season. "Frantic" Frank Turner returned to the Club and was rewarded with immediate promotion after the first round when he caned North Sydney around for 73 in quick time. Greg Hayes returned after a long absence and regained his old form as if he had never been away from the game. Mark Kroschell showed late in the season, when his work allowed, what an excellent athlete his is.

Against Randwick Kroey bowled a massive 44 overs to capture 2 for 82 and to watch him field in the gully and 'in close' was an education.

The most successful of our batsmen was David "Cess" Knock by far. He scored two hard hitting centuries in the fourths to finish with the highest fourth grade aggregate of 306 at an average of 51. Knocky was rewarded with a visit to the higher grades where he had even more success and ended up the Club's second highest run getter.

Some of the young players showed they are destined to play in the higher grades. David Ford's best scores of 67 and 55 showed the fight and character that a few other players can learn from. David has a good assortment of shots and some of his cover drives stand out as season highlights. Russell Murray will only improve as time goes by. He has a good technique and only needs a little extra concentration with the bat before he realises he is a lot better player than his position in fourth grade indicates. David Morris proved a find. He joined us in round 7 but still ended up taking more wickets than any other fourth grade bowler. His 20 wickets at an average of 16.95 was good reward after 128 overs of very tight controlled bowling. David is quicker off the wicket than it appears and this had most opponents in all sorts of trouble. David holds the dubious record of being the only player to knock himself out during the season. After driving for a catch his head hit the ground and there he stayed until 'Patto', after chasing the ball and returning it, proceeded to try and revive David by kicking him on the foot and saying 'C'mon get up'. After a while David did and proceeded to bowl the rest of the day out. 'Patto' was of great assistance during the season. His dogged technique and 'air borne' square cuts proved to be a thorn in the side to most opponents. Although his figures show he scored 180 runs at a handy average of 20, Patto's contribution on the field and off the field proved very valuable to the Club. An amazing one handed catch in close had to be seen to be believed. Craig Vale is another keen youngster who will play in the higher grades before too long. Craig has a lovely approach to the wicket and with a bit more experience will be taking wickets for Manly for a long time. John Borzi also has a good future ahead of him. Although he didn't play many games with us John's raw aggression earmarks him for a bright future. Against Sutherland, one of the competition's strongest teams, was his brightest effort, where in only 8 overs had 2 for 15 and had the batsmen ducking for cover. Kirk Yates played some excellent cricket before returning to Bathurst. After a successful tour to England in the off season it seemed Kirk would have a big year. He played in five innings for a total of 170 runs at an average of 34.00 with his highest score being a sound 75 against Balmain. With the ball also Kirk made his presence felt and captured 8 wickets after bowling in only 3 matches. Steve Glassock was a major contributor throughout the season. A creditable average of 30.33 told the story of Steve's batting. After some solid starts Steve got himself out. In my opinion no fourth grade bowler should be able to get Steve out and with a bit of work in the concentration and confidence area, Steve's technique should take him a lot further. I feel I should have made more use of Steve's bowling ability during the season as when given the chance he was a model of consistency and steadiness. Tony Scanlon had an up and down season. After being graded for one game in fifths Tony turned up at the fourth grade ground but found himself playing the day at Sutherland in third grade, where he made 17 n.o. and took a couple of wickets only to find he was back in fives for the next game. Tony's slip fielding was excellent at all times and he snared some great catches along the way. Other highlights were Greg Pierce's 102 n.o. against University of N.S.W., Steve Edwards' swashbuckling 58 in the last game, Wilksey's technically perfect 66 and Patto actually bowling one over of very deft offies. We had four wicket keepers during the season. Brian Bilton, Bret Meredith, Murray Pitt and Russell Murray. All kept very well and proved their all round ability with some good batting performances. Murray Pitt was unlucky, for after being man of the match against Sydeny Uni. with 3 stumpings 1 caught and 2 run outs, found himself playing at Balgowlah in the next game. Unfortunately that was the way in fourths with such a constant flow of players.

In all 35 people played in fourth grade each one had their own highlights during the season and for this they are to be congratulated. Thanks must also go to our band of supporters, the Mums and Dads who help with scoring, and afternoon teas, with special thanks to my mum for her help with teas, etc., and dad who helped me put out the covers before every home game.

I hope everyone enjoyed their cricket last year and I look forward to 86-87 season enthusiastically. See you then,

Fifth Grade Report 1985-86

Fifth Grade had what could only be described as an average season in 1985/86 with 4 wins, 4 draws and 6 losses. The side was always competitive but rarely batted to its full potential.

At the start of the season an arrangement was reached with the Warringah Shire Club which was designed to enable free transfer of young players between the Shire Club and the Fifth Grade. The scheme did not fulfil its potential partly because the draws of the competitions did not coincide. Also some promising young players decided to stay with the Shire Club where they could play on turf wickets rather than the synthetic wickets at Balgowlah. This is a matter which the Committee must consider carefully in future years. However, many promising youngsters were introduced to grade cricket.

Russell Murray, David Patterson and Tony Scanlon started the season in Fifth grade but very soon showed that they were too good for this level and moved to Fourth Grade. The mainstays of the batting then became Murray Pitt, Geoff Maher, Richard Marks and captain Ross Wiblan. Whilst all these players had reasonable seasons I am sure that they would feel that they were not consistent enough in their performances. Ross Webb joined the side mid-way through the year from Fourth Grade and apart from one good century would feel disappointed with his results. Jim Stewart also intermittently played and again apart from one century did not perform as he would have liked. Adam Wheeler is a youngster who played consistently and although great results did not come this year he displayed good technique and as he develops will become a good batsman. David Gainsford joined the side after Christmas and proved a real find for the Club. Both his batting and leg-spin bowling were of a high standard and he soon found promotion to Fourth Grade.

Early in the season the bowling was carried by Greg Hayes, Craig Vale and David Morris. However all performed sufficiently well to move to higher levels and were not seen again in Fifth grade. The bulk of the bowling then fell to John Borzi and Cameron Bryant in pace, with John Saunders providing spin. All these players performed well and showed considerable potential to improve as they develop. Richard Marks, Geoff Maher, Andrew Brown, Pat Fisher also bowled well on occasions.

In summary the season was not as successful as the side would have hoped. Next year the Club needs to determine its attitude to this side, in particular whether it views it as a nursery for young players entering grade cricket. If so, then the structure of the team needs careful consideration.

The keen support of parents and friends providing afternoon tea and general support was much appreciated.

Players of the Match


Bruce Minnet and Tim Blank produced the best partnership of the competition. Bruce making (61) and Tim (72) setting up a big total for Fairfield to chase.

A.W. Green Shield Report

Although not experiencing the same success as the Poidevin-Gray Shield side, the Green Shield has a reasonable season, winning 2, drawing 1 and losing 2 of their 5 games. Batting proved to be the major downfall of the side, for only once in the 4 completed matches did we bat out our 60 overs.

Many fine individual performances were handed in, led by player of the series, Warren Evans. Warren captured 13 wickets consistently troubling all the bastmen who faced him. Warren is faster than he appears and has that unique ability to move the ball both ways in the air and off the wicket. Additionally, Warren's hard and often big hitting (2 sixes on the railway line at Chatswood Oval) at the top of order was exciting to watch.

The best batting performance came from left handed opener Ben Lamb. Ben consistently got the side off to a good start, and was rewarded with a fine century against North Sydney in the final game.

Michael Wilson scored consistently without ever compiling that big score which he is capable of. He must concentrate hard when he reaches the 20's and 30's to those starts into big scores. Michael's bowling improved greatly to the extent where he has developed into a handy off-spinner. His attitude at all times was tremendously enthusiastic, a factor which rubbed off on many of his teamates.

Miles Corish was very impressive in his technique and looks to have a big future in the game. He must however develop a more aggressive outlook to his batting, something he did to great effect in the final match against North Sydney in an innings which I regarded as the best of the series.

Of the other batsmen, Tim Grosser from Gunnedah looked impressive but he suffered the all too familiar syndrome of losing his wicket in the 20's after doing all the hard work. Adam Wheeler struggled to find form, but he will learn from the experience and is eligible to play next season.

Our pace bowlers throughout the series struggled to take wickets on 1st grade tracks which were in favour of the batsman (our home ground, Graham's Reserve being one of the best in Sydney). However, they never shirked their task and gave 100% at all times.

Cameron Bryant bowled with genuine pace, but lacked the necessary control to be consistently successful. However, he is only fourteen and with practice this control will come. His best effort (in either grade or Green Shield) was undoubtedly against Mosman where he won us the game with an unchanged spell of 20 overs taking 3-40.

Craig Vale struggled throughout the series, experiencing run-up and hence no ball problems.

However, despite his own loss of form, his captancy of the side was excellent, both in terms of his on field decisions and off field attitude.

Wicket keeper Drew Dalziel astounded us all with his incredible agility and flexibility behind the stumps! However, his batting was somewhat disappointing despite the incentive (which can't be mentioned here) provided by his father should he score 30 runs.

Andrew Noble, Jeff Tucker, Ron Bridges and John Peterson also played during the series and I would like to thank them for their efforts.

Congratulations should be extended at this point to the representative honours achieved by a number of players in the team. Warren Evans and Michael Wilson were both members of the victorious N.S.W. U/16 team at the Australian Championships in Perth. Warren's efforts in that carnival saw him subsequently selected in the Australian U/16 Squad. Moreover, Miles Corish. Cameron Bryant and Adam Wheeler were members of N.S.W. U/15 Squad. Hopefully, these names will soon become well known within the Manly Grade Ranks.

Finally, this report would not be complete without my thanks to my co-manager. Tony Scanlon, and especially to Mr and Mrs Vale and Mr and Mrs Wilson for opening up their homes to look after Tim Grosser from Gunnedah.

Junior Development

As a Grade Club, one of our greatest worries has been the loss to other sports, of young talented cricketers, after they have finished playing in the U/15 years Saturday morning competition.

Regretably our district has no U/16 years games programme, with the result that only a few dedicated players after reaching the age of 15, try out for Shires or the Saturday afternoon competition. Living in such an idyllic area that boasts a great variety of sports, also makes it easy for those "other" talented youngsters to put cricket in the background.

One of our main Junior Development Schemes this year, has been to establish a conduit between the Junior, Shire and grade ranks. Pre-season consultation between the Junior Association, Warringah Shires and Manly Club, saw the establishment of a Colt side that played in the Shires competition. The prime purpose of this side, was to give those over 15 years players direction, and at the same time create a "nursery" from which to draw aspiring grade cricketers.

This first trial year has been encouraging, with two players, Cameron Bryant and Adam Wheeler being called into 5th Grade for the majority of the season. The success of this concept could not have been achieved without the great efforts of their Team Manager, Mr. lan Lamb.

Moving up the age ladder a little, the most prestigeous Sydney Junior competition would be the U/21 Poidevan-Gray Shield. Ending a seven year drought on Jan. 1st 1986, Manly caputured this prized trophy in a nail-biting final at Nth. Sydney Oval.

Throughout the series the Manly team showed tremendous determination, and coupling spirit with that most important ingredient, namely the "positive" desire to win, this youthful team under the captaincy of talented Peter Wilkins, brought the shield back to Manly.

With major sponsors firmly in place, selected Junior cricketers will also have the opportunity to improve their skills, through travel overseas every two years, to nearby cricketing nations. Our first such tour was undertaken to New Zealand this year, and proved an outstanding success (both in the playing and social sense). The team won all five matches, and I'm sure that the experience gained by those players who toured, will be evident during the 1986/87 season.

Even though our Club is blessed with talented youngsters, youth in itself is not enough. However, in combination with the experience and guidance of our fine Senior players, surely this must keep Manly-Warringah District Cricket Club on the upward path to success.

Manly U-16 Colts 1985/86 Playing as D Grade Shires

A pre-season conference between Kevin Norris (Warringah Cricket Club President), Neville Johnston (Manly Cricket Club, Junior Development) and the writer nurtured the concept of the Manly Warringah Colts.

No effort is made in this report to amplify the needs and benefits of such a move which should be apparent to any thoughtful person.

Requiring a considerable amount of goodwill and resolve the Warringah Club formed the team basically from 15 and 14 year olds under the guidance of a senior captain. Team members had to win and hold their position strictly on merit and attitude. Warringah positioned them in D Grade Shires and alloted them the Frank Gray wicket, arguably the best turf wicket on the peninsula as their home ground. Futhermore, Alan Hicks forewent his cricketers desire for stimulating verbosisty on Saturday afternoons to captain the team. In hindsight this virtually ensured success. He helped the boys through the early psychological adjustments needed for senior cricket which is no mean feat. From November the team did not lose a game and fairly thumped the competition winners in late season overcoming the setback of having to bat first on a rain affected Epping Park pitch already beset with its hump and against the competition winning fast bowling trio one of whom was nicknamed "Animal".

Mind you, prior to November they had only dropped two games, one by 30 runs purely on psyche, and the other by one wicket under most questionable circumstances, which unfortunate as it had to be, formed part of their learning cycle.

Returning to the captaincy, Alan may have been lonely at times however he obtained great satisfaction from the progress that was made. When work took him to Canberra he handed a confident side to Mark Isaacs who kept the momentum going. Mark had a little trouble accepting that he was the "old guy" however thoroughly enjoyed his association with the boys.

With representative teams it was also pleasing that the members of this team performed creditably in Green Shield and formed the backbone of the winning (but losing — that's another story) Watson Sheild Side.

This report deals in essence with the D Grade team however the Colts squad was larger than just its regular members. Passing through the team to Manly's 5th Grade were Cameron Bryant and Adam Wheeler, the talented trio of Warren Evans, Michael Wilson and Miles Corish played in Warringah's A and B Grade teams while Stephen Bartlett had to remain a casual member due to his school rules.

During the season the team played 14 games losing only two. This record you would have thought would have ensured a semi final birth but it didn't. A couple of coastal washouts against weaker teams, the large and heavily grassed outfield at Frank Gray and a split competition worked against us. The writer still thinks someone cooked the books but it's no use complaining as all coastal clubs suffer the same problems of weather and slow grounds.

Ben Lamb took out the batting award scoring 373 runs at an average of 27.2 from the opening bat position. He also topped the batting aggregates in Manly's Green and Watson representative sides from the openers spot. This speaks volumes for his grit and technique.

Richard Jones was the big improver. Richard had a wretched start through trying too hard however once he worked it all out he played some absolutely brilliant innings. He topped the batting averages with 235 runs at an average of 39.2.

Drew Dalziel the elder statesman amongst the boys, contributed greatly to the team's results with his consistent wicketkeeping, forceful batting and team psyche. Allrounder Andrew McLennon consistently held the side together with bat and ball. He featured in a number of the team recoveries. It's the good cricketers that can turn games around.

The writer enthuses most over the four youngest in the team. It may be because they are the babies or may be it's their skill. Batsmen Garth Hackshall and Robert McLoughlin (totally different in style) will go as far as they want to in cricket. Garth is a stylist while Robert thumps the ball. Both are top athletes, can bowl and field. Mark them down. Damon Emtage can do anything — bat, bowl, keep wickets and catch while medium fast bowler Michael Woolley is as good a bowler as Craig Vale, Warren Evans and Clifton Fletcher were at the equivalent age — and the writer doesn't say that loosely. Both Michael and Damon are also top sportsmen. How can this four miss?
