PRESIDENT'S REPORT

1986/87 was a very successful season for the Club. We have been able to regain all the ground lost in the preceding season where for reasons largely inexplicable we dropped to 17th in the Club Championship. This year we are back to 7th position, an excellent effort. However, even further improvement is needed to get us to a position in which we can win premierships. It was disappointing that although four of our teams were either fifth or sixth, none of them managed to make the finals. It was particularly unfortunate that Fourth Grade, who had led the competition for much of the year, slipped to fifth position in the last round.

First Grade, under the leadership of Phil Marks, were in contention for the finals right to the last round. It was pleasing to see young players in the Club, particularly Neil Tuckerman, Bruce Minnett and Richard Fry establish themselves as quality players. Neil led the team batting aggregate and is poised for higher honours. The side may have gone even better had David Lawrence and David Milligan not been forced from the side with injury for the first half of the season. Clearly the side needs a good spinner but otherwise is a very strong combination. Ross Drury proved a tremendous asset from North Sydney and Chris Stone and Paul Jarvis were great acquisitions in the latter half of the season. Kerry Mackay, Greg Bush, Gavin Fletcher and Greg Hill all showed again that they are top level grade cricketers.

In contrast to the other sides, Second Grade had a disastrous season. It is difficult to pinpoint reasons for this but does point to a lack of depth at the top of the Club. Sam Mesite's enthusiasm as Captain never flagged, but the results did not come. In the last third of the season Seconds became a chopping block as every other side was in contention for the finals. Despite this poor season, it is to be hoped that youngsters such as Angus Johnston and Lee Pedrola gained valuable experience.

Third Grade also had an excellent year missing the finals by percentages only. They were well led by Gary Flowers and had a major force in Australian junior representative, Warren Evans. In the event, probably their catching rather than batting or bowling let them down.

Fourth Grade were well led by Greg Hayes and as mentioned above only dropped from the four in the last round. It was good to see senior players such as Mark Kroschel and Tim Spencer providing stability to the Club while playing with the younger players in this side.

The Fifth Grade, led by Jim Stewart, did remarkably well considering the age of the side. Five or six juniors were introduced to the Club and as is outlined in the more detailed report all have the potential to become first grade players.

The Club showed a more professional approach to a range of matters off the field. There is no doubt that these factors have an influence on the overall performance of any Club during a season. For the first time in many years we had quality turf practice wickets and Manly Council are to be thanked for maintaining them so well. The wickets at Manly Ovals and Grahams Reserve were constantly of a high standard. Thanks are due to the curators of those grounds for their efforts.

Fifth Grade played many of its home games on Grahams Reserve and this also is an advantage as our younger players are able to play on good turf wickets rather than the synthetic wicket at Balgowlah Oval. Manly Oval had a permanent score board attendant, Arthur Bride, and the Room at the Top was well served by Stan who is likely to become a Manly institution.

Very many people contribute to the successful running of a grade cricket club and I would like to thank everyone who has contributed to the success of the past season. Every member of the Committee has worked long and hard on particular aspects of the Club's administration and it has been a pleasure to work with them. I would particularly like to thank our Secretary, Neville Johnston, who has decided to step down from this demanding task; although remaining on Committee. Neville has been a major factor in the club's professional approach this year and in securing our healthy financial position. Each team has a band of scorers, supporters and friends who assist in many ways and help with afternoon teas. These people are individually thanked in the team reports but I would like to recognise them in this report as well. Ian Lamb gave his time to successfully manage the Green Shield side and

Neville Johnston managed the Poidevin Gray team. The Club held several successful social functions and in addition to the Committee (particularly Dallas Fletcher, John Ford, Neville Johnston and David Patterson), Sam Mesite and Lee Pedrola are to be thanked for their help with these functions.

The Club is also fortunate to have several major sponsors and I would like to thank Air India, Harbour Ford, Tooheys and Carlton & United Brewery for their generous support during the season. The officers and John Wood must be thanked for their efforts.

In conclusion, let me repeat that the Club should be most pleased with its efforts for 1986/87 but considerable effort is required if we are to go further. Several times in the past few years we have reached the level that we are now at but have been unable to progress further. Improved commitment to practice, and a general increase in professional attitude of many players is required if we are to get beyond this stage that we have reached this season. It is up to every one of you.

TREASURER'S REPORT AND FINANCIAL STATEMENT

ACCUMULATION ACCOUNT

The Club finished the 1986/87 season with an excess of income over expenditure of \$1,528. An amount of \$11,892 was held in an investment account and the Club's Trading account stood at \$5,592.

The satisfactory result for the year was largely due to solid support from the Club's non-playing members, together with some very generous donations from past and present club members and local businesspersons. The new bar facilities at the Room-at-the-Top also proved to be a financial success and will provide the Club with a sound income base for future seasons.

Income from both sponsorship and social events was down on that of previous seasons. Despite the concerted efforts of Dallas Fletcher and his hard-working social committee in providing social functions of a high standard, last-minute changes of itinerary and inadequate communication saw these excellent events under-patronised. Hopefully, a firm social programme next season will lead to better participation in these vital club activities.

Rising ground fees are proving to be a major expenditure for the Club. Payment to Council for the hire of grounds and amenitities for the past season amounted to \$3,393. Continued support from non-playing members, improved attendance at fund-raising events and continuing sponsorship will be necessary if the Club is to continue to consolidate its financial position.

109TH ANNUAL REPORT

To the Members of the Manly Warringah District Cricket Club.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

The Management Committee has pleasure in submitting for your consideration and adoption the 109th Annual Report and Financial Statement.

As for the previous season, the Club entered teams in all five grades, the Poidevin-Gray and A.W. Green Shield Competitions.

Our playing results showed a marked improvement from the previous season with a jump of ten positions to finish seventh in the Club Championship. With the exception of Second Grade all teams improved their positions. With First Grade improving from seventeenth to sixth - and Third, Fourth and Fifth Grades only just failing to reach the semi-finals.

The First Grade side lost former internationals Wright and Beard from last year's side, newcomers to the team, Ross Drury and Paul Jarvis (after Christmas) proved great assets. Captained by Phil Marks the team was a good blend of youth and experience and it was pleasing to see the emergence of our junior players as established first graders.

Second Grade was captained by Sam Mesite. The team had a most disappointing season - changing personnel in the latter part of the season did not help.

Gary Flowers captained Third Grade. The team had a very successful season & only just missed the Semi Final.

The Fourth Grade side had a heartbreaking end to the season. After leading the competition for twelve rounds and being in second position at the last round missed the series. Greg Hayes captained the side with great credit.

Jim Stewart and Tony Scanlon captained Fifth Grade who finished a creditable sixth and saw the emergence of another group of talented youngsters.

The Poidevin-Gray side could not repeat the previous season's success but performed most creditably. The A.W. Green Shield team had a great season under Ian Lamb's guidance to only just miss a spot in the final. Well done boys, we will watch with interest your progress in the grade ranks.

It was pleasing to be able to, at last, have a decent turf square to practise on - it is hoped that next season players will erect the nets with greater speed and enthusiasm in order that greater use may be made of this excellent facility.

The Club generally received "good press" from the "Manly Daily". It was pleasing to see the reintroduction of a cricket column, in the "Marks Column" which provided an opportunity to cover aspects of cricket in the District other than First Grade; it was a little disappointing that the Junior Association did not provide more information for inclusion in this column. Our thanks are extended to the Daily Sports Editor, Warren Sim, for his support.

The move back to the "Room at the Top" as an after-match venue proved very popular and it is hoped that players and supporters will continue to support this venue. This venue proved most popular for the Club Christmas Party which was well supported. Regretably our Gambling Night was not as successful as previous years - it is hoped that all players and supporters will lend their support to this activity next season. The Six a Side was again a popular event; with all the amateur disc jockeys testing their lungs and the ear drums of surrounding residents. A golf day was held at Palm Beach and whilst not attracting many starters, proved to be a great day.

We would like to again acknowledge the umpires who officiated in our matches throughout the year. Our thanks for job well done.

We were again invited to play a match against the Warringah Cricket Club and as usual they proved wonderful hosts. Our thanks are extended to President Mark Issacs and his club. We would also extend our congratulations to the W.C.C. for their excellent season - Winners of "A" Division Limited Over Competition and semi finalists in both "B" and "D" Divisions. We hope they will encourage their better players to trial for grade next season.

As mentioned earlier, we are grateful to Manly Council for the provision of the turf practice wickets; we must also express our concern at the continued increase in ground fees charged by the Council, who at the same time as increasing fees, continue to reduce services to the grounds. This season the qualified groundsman at Graham's Reserve was replaced by an apprentice, there is now no service provided at Graham's on a Saturday. Members of the Executive have met with the Mayor on these matters - it is hoped to see some alleviation of the fee situation and an assurance that there will be no further reduction in service.

We would again extend our thanks to Merv Paynter for the excellent work he has done at Manly Oval and for his guidance to the apprentice at Graham's Reserve.

Our thanks are extended to all those helpers with whom a Club cannot function - Stan behind the bar, Arthur and family on the

scoreboard, the Vet, our Scorers, ladies who provide the teas, Michael Stockdale and countless others - thank you all. District Cricket today cannot survive without sponsorship support and we wish to acknowledge the support of Tooheys for N.S.W. Cricket and the subsequent grant to our Club through the Sydney Cricket Association. Our own Club has been fortunate to receive support from Air India and Harbour Ford in respect of our sponsored player. It is greatly appreciated and we would hope they may continue to support the club in future seasons. Our thanks are extended to Carlton United for their most generous support, without which fees would have to double - thanks John Ford.

Finally, let me commend to you this year's hard-working Committee: David Patterson, who maintains the Club statistics; Dallas Fletcher, our Social Organiser and stockist of the "Room at the Top"; Ron Holmes, our Chairman of Selectors; Gary Flowers, legal adviser; John Ford, super helper and sponsorship controller; Ron Atherton, a hard-working treasurer if ever I saw one; Paul Stephenson, Deputy President and Controller of the Supporters Club and finally, Neville Johnston, a hard-working official whose fundraising ability is second to none.

Regretably Neville's work commitments no longer allow him to carry out the secretarial duties, which is why I am putting this report together. I know I speak for all Club members when I acknowledge the outstanding job Neville has done during the past three years and express a sincere wish that he will see his way clear to continue to serve on Committee.

At the start of the season we didn't really have a very hard act to follow after the previous year's performance. There were a few new faces all of whom of 1st grade standard. The keeness and attitude of all was evident at preseason training. We had three new faces from England in Lawrence, Bartlett and Franks together with Drury from Norths.

The first game was fairly easily won against Gordon who proved to be one of the weakest sides in the competition. In the second game injury struck Dave Lawrence which plagued him for the rest of the season. Dave Milligan was bowling with good pace and getting wickets which lessened the load but yet again injury struck in the 6th round and ended Dave's season for him. Again the problem was in the lower back and unfortunately Dave didn't have time to recover. Had this not happened he could quite possibly have earned himself a state cap. Let's hope that Dave has a speedy recovery and is able to run on to the field with us next season.

Fortunately for us two replacement opening bowlers were at hand in Chris Stone and Paul Jarvis. Chris arrived from Melbourne and soon proved to be capable of holding down his 1st grade spot. He bowled steadily all season, did a terrific job with the bat when required and just as importantly showed the will to win and aggressiveness which the rest of the side can learn from.

Paul Jarvis arrived in time for the Penrith game and although went wicket less in his first game it was quite evident that he was a class player. He bowled accurately with pace and was a great asset for the last few games. Talks are under way to have him back next season.

Overall in the bowling department, the honours were taken out by Kerry MacKay and Gavin Fletcher. Gavin took most of his wickets in the 1st half of the season and bowled well throughout. He has certainly made a name for himself over the last couple of years and is now well respected by opposition batsmen. Kerry MacKay bowled extremely well all season which saw him end up with 42 wickets for the season and on top of the averages. There is no substitute for experience and Kerry sent many a batsman back to the pavilion who could not really appreciate how they had just been 'thought' out rather than caught or bowled. Kerry also has one of the safest pair of hands going around and is a thorn in the batting for the opposition bowlers. All in all, I believe him to be one of the finest cricketers in Sydney.

Batting tended to be a bit erratic on occasions but there were still some very good performances. At the top of the list Neil Tuckerman and Greg Bush did a fair job in getting the innings started. Bushy struggled for form in the early rounds but got it together again and finished off the season in good form recording two centuries. Tucks proved a huge success with 560 runs for the season. He also scored 2 tons with his 141 against Mosman being the batting hilight of the season. Tucks is a prime example of 'practice makes perfect" and he has certainly benefited from all the work he's put in this season.

Ross Drury had a good consistent season being 2nd to Tucks in the aggregate. He has been a great acquisition to the Club and showed real class on occasions with immaculate timing and running between the wickets. He also showed that he is one of the best fielders going around.

In the middle order we weren't really consistent enough and was one of the main reasons for not getting into the semis. Bruce Minnett did everything asked of him and saw him finish on top of the averages. He has a good technique and temperament and with results in 1st grade now in the book we can expect bigger and better things from him next season. Ten catches together with his batting performances sums up a terrific debut season.

In the second half of the season Greg Hill and Richard Fry were brought into the side and both had success. Hilly showing that he possesses real class and Dick, that he could tame any attack with the bat, and , with a bit of dedication and practice, could be anything. He also filled the keeping role more than adequately, taking the most catches.

That sums up most of the major highlights of the season but there were others that deserve mentioning. The guys that didn't play a lot of games but the ones they played in, their contributions were very important and much appreciated. Nick Johnson played in three games, bowled very well as his figures show and scored the winning runs against Sydney University, handling the pressure like a seasoned pro. Guy Franks, our Keeper for nine games, was solid behind the stumps even though he was carrying a knee injury and although not required with the bat too often, batted well when needed. Angus Johnston and Malcolm Dunn each played one game both scoring runs and contributing to victories. Angus has a ton of ability and has a bright future ahead of him providing he works hard in the nets. Ricky Bartlett had a disappointing season but is another player with plenty of talent. Playing in Australia would have done him the world of good and I doubt that he'll have another season like it. We all wish him the best of luck with Somerset.

The fielding in general was of a high standard and I think a lack of concentration at times led to silly mis-fields. The catching was good with some excellent catches taken and not too many went begging. Ross Drury and Greg Bush saving the single did a fine job with Greg Getting 4 run outs thru' sheer pressure. Behind the stumps a few went down but Bruce Minnett and Kerry Mackay caught well all season.

Looking at the season in retrospect, things might have turned out better had we been a bit more aggressive, fought for our wickets a bit more and maybe fielded properly from ball one rather than after lunch. Nevertheless, I feel that we've all learned a lot, and having got so close to the semis, now realise that we are a good enough side to go on from here.

I've certainly enjoyed captaining the side and thank everyone for their efforts and support thru'out the season. Let's have a better one next year.

In closing I'd like to thank all of those 'behind the scenes players'. "The Vet" Alan Waters for his help in the dressing room before, during and after games, everyone involved with lunches and teas, the scoreboard operators and also Stan and John, the scorers, who made my job in compiling the averages so much easier. Apologies to those not mentioned in person. All the best for winter and see you all again next season.

2ND GRADE REPORT

The greatly improved training facilities at Graham's Reserve enabled the Club to commence the season with its best preparation since my involvement with it.

Consequently, in writing the 2nd Grade Report on the 1986-87 season, it is with great concern that this side finished bottom of the competition with only two (2) wins from 14 games.

Reasons for this performance are wide and varied but getting down to basics our batsmen were not prepared to spend enough time in the middle before playing aggressive shots and the number of players to get out this way was alarming. The aim of a batting side is to occupy the crease for at least six hours and as a result of our rashness we were only able to bat out the six hours on four occasions.

The side's bowling was very inconsistent and we were never able to put pressure on batsmen for long enough periods. Opposing batsmen were too often served up with loose deliveries which meant that they were able to score runs freely without having to earn their runs.

Other reasons were as follows:

- * The loss of 1st Grade bowlers Russell McCool, before the season even started; David Milligan and David Lawrence, both injured, meant that the 2nd Grade bowling attack was much depleted, without a main strike bowler for the majority of the season.
- After Christmas, the Club did not pick its best 2nd Grade side due to the 3rd and 4th grade sides being semi-final contenders. Players such as Warren Evans, Jeff Atherton, David Ford, Ken Pitcher, Brian Bilton and Mark Kroshell would all have strengthened the side considerably, particularly after players in the side lost form. To make things worse both the 3rd and 4th grade sides unfortunately missed the semi-finals.

The most pleasing aspect of the season was the emergence of opener and wicket keeper Richard Fry as a 1st grade cricketer. Richard showed with his 122 VS Petersham and 45 VS Hawkesbury on a really wet wicket, that he has the technique and temperament to succeed in the higher grade. Following his departure to 1st Grade, the seconds really struggled to find effective opening batsman. Richard's opening partners included David Knock who unfortunately had one of those years.

Graham Wilks and Richard Fry were our most successful opening pair and it was their contributions which enabled the side to bat so well in the middle of the season. It was inevitable that one of the two would be still batting at lunch which enabled us to have wickets in hand to score runs quickly in the last session. Wilksey also worked very hard at his keeping and he improved considerably until his early departure to see what he could catch in the Swiss Alps.

All-rounder, Angus Johnston, in his 2nd grade debut, showed his class by scoring a match winning 97 N.O. in chasing Campbelltown's 6 Dec. for 307. His 76 N.O. VS Sydney University was his only other big score for the year and even though Gus played 1st grade VS Fairfield, his temptation to play square of the wicket too early in his innings, often brought about his downfall. Minor adjustments to his technique could see Gus play permanent 1st grade circket, particularly as he is an excellent fieldsman and although he only bowled 61 overs, he also has tremendous potential with the ball.

Lee Pedrola would have been very disappointed with his season, particularly after getting a sniff of 1st grade in 1985/86. The disappointing aspect of Lee's game was his batting where on nine occasions he was dismissed before reaching double figures. Lee must spend his first hour at the crease in not trying to force the pace as on too many occasions he was out playing shots before he had adjusted to the wicket. Lethal's bowling improved tremendously as the season went on and in the last few games he was the side's best bowler.

Jeff MacPherson was the side's most consistent player. He took most wickets with 28 and averaged over 20 with the bat. Killer's

bowling, although lacking the fire of his earlier days, was a great example to the younger players in the side. He always maintained pressure on opposing batsmen and with a little luck he could have finished with a lot more wickets. His batting was also very sensible and he always played within his limitations and never gave his wicket away easily. His 69 N.O. VS Fairfield was a real crowd pleaser.

Scott Barclay, after his great form in last year's Poidevin-Gray winning side, was looked at as a very exciting prospect. Unfortunately, as an opening bowler Scottie struggled with his accuracy and often failed to bowl at the stumps. This enabled sides to get off to solid starts, which in turn put our side under pressure. Because of University commitments, etc., Scott was unable to bowl enough at the nets and this was the place for him to sort out his problems. It was good to see Scott drop his pace a little in the last couple of games and as a result he was a lot more Consistent. Once he achieves this accuracy his aim should be once more to work up to top pace.

Nick Johnson, after starting the season in 3rd grade, made his 1st grade debut. When in 2nds Johno bowled with plenty of confidence particularly after his spell in 1st grade. Johno, now approaching veteran status, brought in more variation to this bowling this year and this will help his bowling in the future. Nick also worked hard at his batting and his fielding was always 1st class. It is hoped that he recovers from his recent illness as Fosters has complained of a drastic cut in profits.

Brod Livett, after playing the 1st round in 2nd Grade, played 1st Grade until joining us again in Round 7. Brod took 16 wickets for 2nd grade before his disappointing finish to the season VS Wests in Round 12. No-one in the Club puts in as much effort as Brod, on and off the park, but for him to enjoy the game he must channel all his efforts into his own game and not worry about the inadequacy or attitude of his team mates. This is his captain's concern. It would be hoped that the younger fast bowlers in the Club watched Brod's routine at training where he stretched, bowled (as if in match conditions), fielded and then bowled again. To bowl at the nets should be as in match conditions and it is hoped that Brod's example in this is followed.

Warren Redmond after several years out to stud, started the season in 2nds but was not able to recapture his old form and went back to stud after Christmas.

Greg Hill after a late start to the season showed in his five games in 2nd grade that he is still one of the best strokemakers in grade cricket. In every innings in 2nds Hilly got off to a start but never really went on with it until his 61 N.O. VS Petersham saw him promoted to 1sts.

Our English contingent of Malcolm Dunn, Richard Bartlett, Guy Franks, John Glendenen and David Lawrence all contributed to the side sefforts this season. All except for John, played in the 1st side and the club should only encourage imports that are capable of playing 1st grade in positions where we do not have depth.

Of the other players that played in 2nds a special mention must be made of Jeff Atherton, whose bowling effort in taking 10 wickets for the match VS Fairfield was full of fire and pace. For reasons explained earlier in this report, Jeff completed the season in thirds, but it is hoped that with a big effort next year he will be pushing for 1st grade. Special mention must also go to Steve Johnson and Frank Turner for helping the Club out in the last round. Johno took more catches than made runs in this game whereas Frantic dropped more catches than he made runs but their contribution was appreciated.

My thanks to all players for their efforts this season and it is hoped that this year's disappointments motivate all players to give a much bigger commitment next season.

Also, the thanks of all the players goes to Arthur and his family on the score board, Marcia McPherson, Noeline Pedrola, Rosalind Mesite and any others that helped with the afternoon tea.

In summation, I would especially like to thank Nifty Nev - without his sideline screams and pep talks we would have been lost. No - really thanks Nev! Thanks to Ron Atherton and Donny Dollars for the scoring duties and also thanks to all the ladies who helped with the tea, etc.

Finally congratulations guys on a job well done. It was a pleasure to be the captain of such a talented and enthusiastic bunch. We only just missed out this year. I'm sure you will keep the shield on the north side, by winning the series next year.

For our small band of supporters the series had everything.

Early disappointments - Mosman (with its Manly expatriates) batting on into our time - the part washout with Northern Districts-the unfortunate match against Randwick.

The build up arrived with the thrillers against Balmain and Waverley as we made hard work of chasing small scores - a topsy turvey game with Gordon where we just missed with a KO punch and ended up in a hair-raising rear guard draw.

A big finish with two resounding wins over Petersham and North Sydney. The latter a particularly meritorious effort as we had to bat first on a damp wicket in very humid conditions.

In years to come the writer is sure the members of this team, their manager and their supporters will indulge in many replays and find a great friendship binder from the experience - and isn't that what sport is all about.

An overview of the squad is that we had thirteen very good crickers consisting of eight seniors and five juniors and, mind you, some of the more memorable passages of play came from the juniors.

Team efforts reflected in the fact that we dismissed the opposition (all ten wickets) on five out of seven occasions with the five being the last five rounds while we were totally dismissed only once out of eight innings.

Further the averages of completed batting partnerships of batsmen one to five averaged 16.84 (697 runs from 39 innings) while partnerships six to ten averaged 15.43 (324 from 21). In short it was our ability to get the opposition out and for our lower order batsman to hold things together that gave us the foundation and the confidence to play winning cricket.

All of our bowlers could work the ball (the quicks and the slows). Not a celebrity amongst them but all very very good. They were supported by fielding that was probably more keen than brilliant, good wicket keeping, good captaincy and above all, fieldsmen that held a very high proportion of catches given.

Rather than a few words about the batsmen and the bowlers, the writer would rather remember the cricketers (its alphabetical).

Peter Banbury, slow left arm bowler. Efforts at Drummoyne and Waverley (Grahams is a slowies grave yard, Peter) started the team's build-up and he took some ripper catches - a junior.

Joshua Barnes opening bat and wicket keeper. His 30 at Waverley set up the win, some top catches behind the stumps.

Shawn Bradstreet medium swing bowler. Wickets at Drummoyne and North Sydney and he is handier with the bat than a lot of people think as he showed against Randwick - a junior.

Garth Hackshall joint captain and the number three batsman. A great wet wicket innings against Northern Districts and astute captaining in some close games.

Paul Mulvaney wicketkeeper batsman. Will eventually keep wickets for Manly first grade. No stylist as a batsman but one cool customer. His inning against Balmain in particular and other innings against Waverley, Gordon and North Sydney are clearly etched on the coach's brow - a junior.

Robert Parkinson right arm inswing. The big improver who gained yards through the series. He crushed North Sydney in the final round and who could forget his fine innings against Balmain.

Sean Parkinson the allrounder. Winner of our player of the series award. A true cricketer. Rarely failed as an opening bat and his accurate outswingers gave him the bowling award. His innings against Randwick and Gordon come to mind as does his bowling against Gordon. Ask the Gordon coach what he thinks of Sean.

David Price righthand batsman. Winner of the batting award who unfortunately missed three games with the best shiner you will ever see. Top innings against Mosman and Northern Districts come to mind but nothing to equal his knock at North Sydney.

Adam Tranter righthand batsman. When given his chance he really showed his skill with a gem of an innings against Petersham and his grit on a wet North Sydney wicket. An early order batsman with skill and grit. He must go a long way - a junior.

Adam Wheeler joint captain and the number four batsman. An inning at North Sydney turned the game around. Some astute captaining always meant we chased low scores. A great knowledge of the game.

Michael Woolley righthand fast bowler. His own man as good as he wants to be when he decides to be. Ripped Waverley apart in one spell. Collectively the boys were a close knit cheerful bunch not given to sledging and bad sportsmanship that manifests itself with some of the Green Shield teams. Mind you they were not given to turning the other cheek and invariably settled their scores on the field though we have an unfinished job to do with Northern Districts.

We had some most appreciative supporters who the writer is sure thoroughly enjoyed the series - they watched thirteen goers give it their best shot - would you have it any other way - and all of this without any politics.

Thank you John Mulvaney for the scorebook and thank you parents for your support. Our team was one of the best balanced the writer has been associated with and much more skilful than a lot of people realise. it will be interesting to watch their progress through senior cricket.


