

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It is with great pleasure that I reflect upon the Club's achievements in 1989/90. Let me immediately congratulate the victorious 2nd grade side and their Captain, Ross Drury, on a marvellous season. We had not won the Albert Cup since 1904/05 and I suspect that not many better and grade teams have won that trophy over the years.

Rain spoilt the chances of 3rd grade, who were again runners up, and 5th grade who finished 3rd. Our Green Shield side also were just pipped in the final to finish 2nd, but they performed magnificently. First grade defended their title to the death, but in the end a couple of close draws and losses left them in 7th position. They will long regret the loss to Fairfield in the last round.

A major disappointment of the season was to lead the Club Championship until the last afternoon and then slip to 2nd position. Whilst the weather wasn't kind, we had enough earlier chances to put the assue beyond doubt. I have the feeling that the level of commitment of some of us was a bit down on last year, and the competition as so tough that we simply cannot afford that.

Nevertheless, we have been 2-1-2 in the Club Championship in the past three years. and are probably the Club that others now most fear claying. I believe that we have the players to remain in this position or years to come, if our discipline and desire are there.

Thilst not wishing to single out players, Dick Fry's great season must be noted. Dick, Warren Evans and one or two others must be close to catching the State selectors' eyes.

There are always many key people who work long and hard to make season as successful as this one. Mark Hope, our new Coach, fitted in well and did a fine job. Each of the team captains did likewise. Trank Turner did an excellent job as Chairman of Selectors.

Everyone in the Club would want me to extend thanks to Jan and Samanth bride, Don Sellin, Jim Evans, John Skiller and all the scorers, and the Club Committee - especially Ian Lamb, Lionel Banbury, Dallas letcher and John Ford. The Social Committee organised some great lights - thanks to Andrew Frazer, Steve Glassock and Tony Scanlon.

We are lucky to have generous sponsors in Unisys, the Manly Pacific and Merlin and I commend these organisations to you. Tooheys also continue to be generous and major sponsors of N.S.W. cricket.

We received excellent support as always from the Manly Council - Wayne Collins, Peter Thyer and Merv and Louise - and from the crew at the Manly Daily. The hard work of the staff of the N.S.W. Cricket Association and the Sydney Cricket Association (especially John Wood) is also appreciated.

It is sad to have to record the passing of a great Manly worker and supporter, Alex Anderson. Alex was Club Secretary for many years and older players will well remember his tireless work, both administratively and at The Room at the Top. Our sympathies go to Joyce and family.

It has been great to see the number of supporters at games and functive will work hard to continue to maintain contact with our former players and friends, who add much to the depth of the Club.

In conclusion let me repeat something that I said last year. I believe that with commitment and common sense planning Manly can have an era of great success. We have now had a premiership in each of the past three years - let's all work toward even greater success at all levels of the Club.

112TH ANNUAL REPORT

To the Members of the Manly Warringah District Cricket Club.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

The Management Committee takes pleasure in submitting for your consideration and adoption the 112th Annual Report together with the Club's Financial Statement for the year ended 30 April 1990.

The Club continued its custom of entering teams in the five grades of the Sydney Cricket Association's Tooheys Grade Cricket Competition as well as the Poidevin-Gray and A W Green Shield Competitions.

Whilst not reaching the heights of the previous year we went "oh so close". A disasterous last round against Fairfield had us lose all the five tosses and accordingly required to bat on the second day on hopelessly rain damaged tracks. We dropped the round four matches to one which was the first time this has happened during the writer's association with the club. As a result our first grade slipped out of semi final contention and enabled Balmain to overtake us in the Club Championship (by default-so to speak) as we were found wanting for a mere nine points after having led that competition since Xmas.

Nonetheless three of our teams made the end of season final series with the second grade proving convincing premiers. They always dominated their competition and were the only team to have played and won a final as the other four grades relied on washouts for their finals.

The results for the year show that we have been able to continue our role as one of the top clubs that play with the Sydney Cricket Association — however — if we are to maintain this mantle we must be vigilant in our organisation — now more than ever. The chain that binds a cricket district is very much a people thing and therefor a very, very fragile thing. A successful district is invariably represented by the harnessing of a common urgency that comes from pride of performance. If nurtured properly it is self building and appears so simple — however — it can be broken just so easily. One bad committee, one bad sub committee even one bad captain or a cliche of negative members etc can mortally break the chain that can take years to rejoin, probably because the break is often hard to recognise or too painful to correct.

Our district has been fortunate to have a strong and well admisister hard wicket Association, an excellent Junior Association and a vibrant Shire Club. Our club benefits from this structure — however we don't own it. We only contribute to it and will only continue to draw from it what we put in. This is the people thing referred to above. Some of the names to have disappeared from our district's administration in recent years are: Frank Gray, Lyall Pearce, Alan Hicks, Mark Isaacs and another who must be drowned with work is Peter Moses. The men replacing these fellows are following giants on whom we have rested comfortably for (in some cases) up to twenty years.

It takes at least a ten year span to develop a strong grade club and thats how long the chain is. Fellows like Richard Fry, Peter Wilkins, Tim Blank, the Evans brothers, Miles Corish, Craig Glassock the Parkinson brothers (to name a cross section) don't grow on trees. Depth of strength of our club in the year 2000 is playing in U10's to U12's at the moment and if we want a strong club in that year we have to work with these kids and their administrators.

Returning to matters cricket.

The first grade experienced a year of change which presented Greg Bush with some testing tasks. The team was able to do this without experiencing a losing sequence that so often comes with change — this was no mean feat. The players must still be shellshocked over the last day and how a couple of earlier games got away from them — however that is cricket. They won the O'Reilly Medal as team of the year and represented the Sydney Cricket Association in the Toohey's Cup against the Australian Capital Territory.

The second grade were a strong combination of young talent. They had threatened as winners in the two preceding seasons and this year cut out chance by getting out in front of their competition and stopping there. As said earlier in this report — they were convincing winners and Ross Drury must be well pleased with the response they gave him.

The third grade continue to make the top four while still able to pass on players to the grades above. They do it from lashings of spirit and excellent fielding. In fact the quickest way back to fourth grade is sloppy fielding. Gary Flowers has run this team as "the toughening up team" and the grades above have reaped the benefits in recent years.

ne fourth grade had a quiet year and suffered most from the injury ist to the clubs fast bowlers. This is a tough competition to in as opposing teams can be very strong or lamentably poor and is hard to maintain match toughness and games are lost when east expected. Greg Hayes must be yearning for the return of tephen Bartlett, Craig Vale and their like to give him back his ire power.

he Poidevin Gray team were knocked off balance early in the competiting irstly by rain and then blown off the field by gamesmanship in day they will never forget. Potentially a very strong team however heir fielding was not good which saw them drop two last over games hey would normally have closed out. David Ford always led from the front and must have often felt lady luck had deserted him and is team.

he Green Shield bounced back from the previous year to lose the inal in the closest of matches. A real thriller when the deciding actor was an ounce of luck. They were clear winners in their orthern Division providing four boys in the divisional representative ides. Their representative list reads - a leg spinner - an off pinner - a wicket keeper batsman - and a fast bowler - and - there is a right and a left hand batsman also in the team that are second on none. How can the club wait for them eh!! Take a bow Craig lassock who captained them like a veteran and brother Stephen ho managed the team, a task few realise how demanding it is.

rom the above brief sketches any reader can see the club did well t all levels. For this the Committee pays a great tribute to rank Turner as the chairman of selectors and Mark Hope as the lub coach. These two fellows had the unenviable task of filling he shoes of Ron Holmes and Alan Campbell with the responsibility o get our cricket right. These last mentioned gentlemen will e well pleased to know Frank and Mark did a first class job and ent within a whisker of a club championship. The Committee also as to pay great tribute to our team captains for the cricket and e thank Greg Bush, Ross Drury, Gary Flowers, Greg Hayes, Tony canlon, David Ford and Craig Glassock for a job well done. Further he club captain Andrew Fraser and the practise captain Don Sellin re also thanked as these fellows more than anyone have to keep he club spirit burning.

The club continue to carry the burden of a hard wicket for our fifth grade. It causes no end of recruiting problems - however we somehow seem to get by. We understand the Peninsula Anglican Boys School have a ground that can be developed if only they are left alone to do so and we ask all cricket supporters to get behind their efforts to bring their goal to fruition.

We thank Merv and Louise for their tireless work on our grounds. In these days of economic stress they have to do a tremendous amount of work often at difficult times and in difficult conditions. We also thank the Manly Council for their co-operation. Whilst they must often agonise over the economics of some of their responsibilit our club does appreciate their recognition of amateur sport and the difficulties such sports experience.

This season the Prime Ministers XI Vs the National Aborigines XI didn't take place however this was substituted by a most successful Past Vs Present match and we hosted our annual match with the Warrin Shire Club. The Warringah Club didn't have as good a season as the previous year, nonetheless they continue to be an excellent club and very much a part of the natural way of cricket in our District and every junior should be alerted to this progression.

At the start of the season the first grade team travelled to Manuka Oval Canberra and played the Australian Capital Territory team for Tooheys Cup which features the winners of the previous seasons Sydney Grade Competition and the winners of the Tooheys Country Cup. Unfortunately we ran into an in form Gordon Greenidge (not a bad addition to any side and he scored 77) and under the limited over conditions of play he successfully prevented our bowlers from getting into the match. Our fellows performed creditably nonetheles

The 'Manly Daily' again gave us excellent coverage. Adam Lucius always seemed to have an article (may he enjoy his overseas wanderin and Greg Bush's column was also given its weekly feature. Our thanks to Adam, Greg and the Sporting Editor.

There was no end of season trip this year however the club plans a European trip in the May of 1991. It seems these trips will become biannual events.

We also draw you attention to the Treasurers Report. Whilst we had a much better year financially than last it continues to be a struggle. We must raise over \$20,000 a year in addition to registration fees and when this has to be done from a "chook raffle" upwards approach it is a thankless task for those with the worry. Your assistance is respectfully asked for.

The writer joins with President Jim in thanking the other members of the Management Committee for their work throughout the year. Be assured some nights we sit there pondering such things as "just why are we doing this" or "a bit of a circus eh" however — as Committ go it has been a good one. It has been a blend of players and 'old' blokes and its the players performance in the club championship etc that makes it all worthwhile for them. The new members were Lional Banbury, Tony Scanlon and Stephen Glassock and we particularly thank them.

TREASURER'S REPORT AND FINANCIAL STATEMENT

The 1989/90 season was not quite as successful cricket wise for the club as the previous season, but in financial terms it was a gigantic turnaround as the club showed a surplus of \$595.00 for the year as compared with the prior year's deficit of \$6,691.00.

Operating income for the year totalled \$25,317 as compared with \$19,071 for the previous year. The club's success in the Sydney Morning Herald competition contributed \$1,000 to the club coffers while the Green Shield team contributed \$150.00 as a result of their reaching the final of that competition.

Operating expenses for the year totalled \$24,722.00 which was \$1,040.00 or 4% under the previous year's figures. This saving was achieved after writing off bad debts of \$3,500.00 for a 1988/sponsorship which did not materialise and \$378.00 of other debts which proved to be uncollectable.

COACHES REPORT

Ever been to a posh restaurant where you've found the atmosphere to be very engaging and yet after you've left the place you've felt unfulfilled. This is the way I left the Manly Cricket restaurant and I want to tell you why.

Every player in this club has been given a unique gift called talent Whether you play 1st or 5th grade at that particular level you can express your gift. What's happened during the year for many of you is at particular moments you've squandered that special talent. If you aggregate all the talent, you have a club. The Manly Club richly deserved the Club Championship. At the moment of absolute pressure the club (including the Coach) blew it. That's where the unfulfilled part comes in. What can we learn from the experience?

Firstly, there's a need to focus on each challenge before you. Even though the results may belie this, there is still a soft Manly under belly which is still resistant to working hard to win. What I saw during the year was a lack of application when times on the field become tough. You always worked to win EASILY. You didn't want to GRAFT, claw back. The club still has to sharpen the competitive edge so there is always a flexibility in your approach. If you need to thrash, thrash, if you need to graft, graft, if you need to bowl tightly, bowl tightly, if you need to challenge the opposition make quick runs, challenge them. Flexibility is the key. Think about that in relation to your own game.

Secondly, before next season really clarify the extent of your cricketing ambition, then go for it. If its to play fifths for the rest of your life them make that work for you. If its to represent the State, then you'll have to move your skill level; fitness, knowledge, application and general approach to your cricke life to higher ground. More dedication will be required.

Thirdly, and I come back to flexibility I found some of the approact to the game rather austere. I believe Manly will only grow as a club when it learns how to attack in all aspects of the game. For example, bowlers seemed to be sequenced. You bowl all the quicks then you bring on the spinner, one over before lunch or tea. I believe there's some reason to believe there's a fast/medium bowler phobia to the detriment of the spinners. Take a risk and you'll learn something from the experience. For me, there's only disappoint when you don't risk, for you there's discovery jumping on the risk band-wagon. Good luck!

Fourthly, general levels of fitness and approach to practice still have a long way to go. This general lack of application at practic was certainly reflected on the field. Fairfield being a classic and important example when attendances and general interest in practice slumped markedly on the two Thursdays prior to the game. You played how you practiced, inefficiently.

For me, there was a huge upside learning about you, me, the sensitivities of a club and how to harness the unique gift of talent you've all been give. Enhancement is the key. Squandering your gift is an absolute waste. What I'd like you to do for yourself during the off season is to reflect upon how your talent can be enhanced and what it would take to enhance it. Once you've sorted that out, you've unlocked the door to improved and satisfying (not smug) performance. That will be beneficial to you and the club.

Thank you all for supporting me in my role as Coach. It's been a rewading experience to work with you all. You've all challenged me in important ways and I've discovered important areas in my own life to work on including a vision that Manly will win the 1990/91 Club Championship and have every grade team in the finals. What's your vision?

1st GRADE REPORT

Despite playing cricket at a consistently high standard throughout the season Manly's bid to successfully defend last season's first grade premiership ultimately failed as a result of a series of missed opportunities.

The side needed only a first innings win in the last match against lowly Fairfield, but a batting collapse left the side four runs short of victory. Including that match a total of eleven runs and two wickets cost Manly 31 competition points during the season. The full list of near misses occurred in the following games:

1 wicket required for 1st innings University of New South Wales win - 6 points

2 runs for 1st innings victory Parramatta - 6 points

Sydney University 1 run to convert a tie to 1st innings win - 3 points

Penrith l wicket required for outright victory - 4 points

beaten by 3 runs on count back St George - 6 points

beaten by 3 runs - 6 points Fairfield

Only one of those results needed to go in Manly's favour for the team to qualify for the semi-finals. More importantly the team finished only 15 points adrift of minor premiers Gordon who clinched the premiership without a ball being bowled in the final.

Manly's consistent performance enabled the team to win the Sydney Morning Herald O'Reilly Medal Team of the Year Award after leading that competition throughout the season.

Two other notable achievements were recorded: (1) stretching from December 1988 the Manly side was undefeated for twenty-two competition games; (2) until the Fairlfield game in the last round the team had been unbeaten at Manly Oval since 3rd January 1988.

The season opened with two frustrating draws against University of New South Wales and Hawkesbury on dead wickets. Two excellent victories then ensued against premiers Gordon and full-strength Western Suburbs. Golden opportunities were then squandered against Parramatta and Sydney University due principally to the side's inability to chase moderate totals in one day games. The team was then pounded by the Northern Districts batsmen in the next round but salvaged a draw on the second day despite a livelier pitch and heavier outfield.

By this stage a number of team changes had been made and four excellent victories were recorded in succession against Randwick, Campbelltown, Penrith and Waverley.

Round thirteen resulted in the side's first defeat at the hands of St George but only after being forced to bowl in wet conditions and ultimately losing by the slimmest of margins on a countback. Victory against Mosman after a thrilling run chase in the second last round set up a chance for the semi-finals which was ultimately blown in the last round debacle against Fairfield.

Ultimately the following crucial factors contributed to the team failing to emulate last season's success:

1 Missed opportunities in the field particularly in the slips cordon.

- Vulnerability of the middle and lower order batting particular in the second half of the season.
- Inability to build totals in one day games due particularly to a lack of middle order batsmen who could accelerate the scoreing and break up the field. Only one victory was recorded in four one day games this season as opposed to a six from six record last season.
- The absence of Kerry Mackay for four matches including three of the games involving the near misses. The team sorely missed Kerry's steady bowling and backbone to the lower order batting.

The outstanding individual performance of the season was recorded by Richard Fry who amassed seven hundred and thirty-one runs, the second highest in the first grade competition.

Richard was promoted to his favourite opening position for the first time in his first grade career after two rounds and his batting in this demanding role was of the highest quality all season.

Richard's excellent technique and temperament was the foundation of the team's batting throughout the season and the development of Fry's onside play as a complement to his offside driving should earn inclusion in the next season's State squad. It was a privilege to be associated with Richard in the club record-breaking opening partnership of 207 against Mosman.

Steve Colby began the season in tremendous form including a first up century against Univeristy of New South Wales. After a mid-season slump the solidity to Steve's batting returned but unfortunately he was unable to convert promising starts into big scores. Steve is his own harshest critic and puts unnecessary pressure upon himself when the runs are not flowing. A degree of patience and willingness to listen to advice would undoubtedly improve his cause. Colby is an excellent team man whose enthusiasm in the field was rewarded with eleven catches, the most by a fieldsman in the team.

Rowley Alexander had a disappointing season due to a series of unfortunate run-outs in the first part of the season and lack of opportunities in the second half. Rowley is probably the class batsman in the side and played a gem of an innings against Western Surburbs where he methodically hit spinners Greg Matthews and Russell McCool out of the attack to steer Manly to victory.

After the disappointment of missing the semi-finals last season Peter Wilkins responded in tremendous fashion scoring 236 runs at an average of 78 in the first six rounds including a maiden first grade century against premiers Gordon. Peter's season was curtailed by the trip to England for his wedding but Peter should re-establish himself in the first grade side next season.

Upon Wilko's departure, Englishman Jon Robinson took up the cudgels scoring 240 runs in his first four innings. Robbo proved a very popular team member, a hard-hitting left hander with a sound technique and a handy medium pace bowler.

Greg Hill made a welcome return to first grade in round three and filled the number six position to which he is well suited. Hilly made some excellent contributions particularly his half centuries against Northern Districts and St George when the team was in trouble. However on other crucial occasions Hilly was guilty of surrendering his wicket too easily and indeed it is difficult to recollect an innings where he was dismissed as a result of being beaten by the bowler. It is still not too late in Greg's career for him to develop greater mental toughness.

The mantle of leading wicket taker was claimed by Warren Evans who was promoted to round three and immediately destroyed Gordon's batting line-up with a five wicket haul on a dead track. Warren bowled with clever variation throughout the season and his thiry-five wickets placed him among the leaders in the competition. Still only aged twenty Warren has an enormous future but must continue to work on his strength and stamina and eliminating no balls. The representative's selectors will also be looking for improvement in Warren's batting and enthusiasm in the field.

David Gainsford graduated to the team as an openig bowler in round five and made an immediate impact with his deceptively quick deliveries. Gains has made amazing progress since first being given the opportunity to bowl fast in the third grade game in round three last season. David is an excellent athlete who must now consolidate by improving his stamina and his temperament with both bat and ball.

Spinner Steve Whitfield had a disappointing season in terms of wicket haul by his standards but still bowled consistently well. Steve grappled all season with the disappointment of being confined to the grade ranks despite being involved with the State squad from June. "Whit" also suffered from a series of missed opportunities principally behind the stumps and from batsmen simply shutting up shop and not prepared to play shots against his bowling.

Gavin Fletcher bowled with his usual consistency in the early rounds until he suffered a serious ankle injury while Scott Grace failed to recapture his previous year's form on the unresponsive early season wickets. The two combined in the second half of the season to form the opening attack in the successful second grade side and will no doubt press to reclaim their first grade spots next season.

The wicket keeping duties were shared between Mark Williams and Anthony Dignan who between them claimed 41 dismissals. A couple of lapses particularly against the spinner by Mark William saw Dignan given his opportunity. "Digs" grabbed that opportunit with both gloves and turned in several outstanding displays particularly in the match against Campbelltown where he claimed seven catches.

Mark recaptured his best form with gloves and the bat at the' end of the season in the second grade and will again be pressing for first grade selection. Digs for his part needs to work hard on his undoubted batting talent.

Bruce Minnett earned promotion to first grade after displaying brilliant batting form in second grade. Bruce did not make the most of his opportunities with the bat hat demonstrated his talent with the ball. Bruce is another who must develop mental toughness to perform no matter what difficult circumstance confront him without making excuses. He must also continue to practice hard to achieve consistent line and length with his bowling.

The above summary highlights the fact that a number of exciting young players were introduced into the team during the season. Indeed only five of last year's premiership side played in the final two rounds. Almost without exception the young players performed capably. However each needs to improve their attitude, discipline and temperament.

The perfect role model for those young players is Kerry Mackay who at the age of 40 was still the linchpin and steadying influence in the bowling attack and demonstrated in his limited opportunities the proper approach to batting in a variety of situations. Kerry's strengths are the ability to bowl line and length six balls an over every over and to work on the batsmen's weaknesses. It is a tribute to Kerry that his value is appreciated by his team mates during the games in which he is unavailable. Kerry's fighting qualities were highlighted in the last game for which he was available against St George. Kerry shared a partnership of 111 with Greg Hill after the team was 6 for 38, scoring 43 himself and them claimed 3 for 24 off 12 overs to almost snatch victory.

Kerry has taken an amazing 218 wickets in only six seasons with the club and this from a man who successfully represented New South Wales as a specialist batsman in his early twenties. It is uncertain at this stage whether Kerry will hang up his boots but even at the age of forty that would be a premature end to a magnificent career.

In conclusion I would like to thank the team for its co-operation throughout the season. The side was the happiest first grade team with which I have ever been associated due to an excellent team spirit, loyalty and the composition of great team men and characters.

Thanks are also extended to our scorer John Skiller, the Manly Oval scoreboard attendants Samantha and Jan Bride, our highly paid manager late in the season Gary Holmes and our various afternoon tea assistants.





3RD GRADE REPORT

Finalists for the third year in succession and runners-up for the second year in a row, the Third Grade team in 1989/90 maintained the high standards set in previous years. Despite not winning as many games as in previous years, I am confident that but for the prevailing weather conditions, this team would have been successful in the final and brought home a premiership.

Throughout the season, 27 players appears in the Third Grade side, a marked increase in the numbers over previous seasons. However, 10 of these players played in three games or less, leaving a nucleus of 17 players that participated in the side throughout the season.

In general, except for a couple major exceptions, the side maintained a high standard of commitment throughout the season. As in previous years, major contributing factors to the team's performance and success were the level of team spirit and the quality of fielding. On the couple of occasions when the team performed poorly, it was usually a reflection of the team's effort in the field.

However, in the last few games of the season including the semi-final and the final there was a clear commitment from everybody in the side and this was evidenced by the results achieved. In particular, the semi-final win against Mosman was an outstanding team effort and reflected the team spirit for which this side has become known over the last three years. In this particular game, there was a final wicket partnership between Scott Barclay and Bert Pearce of approximately 50 runs, which allowed the team to build a total of 183. On the second day of the semi-final, fortunes waxed and waned however, the final Mosman wicket fell some few runs short of the total due to an outstanding team effort in the field and from all bowlers.

The final was a somewhat different story with play being kimited to less than two hours. Notwithstanding this limited time, the opposition were put under intense pressure losing five wickets for 20 odd runs chasing a declared total of 45. Throughout the season, there were a number of outstanding efforts from individual players. On the batting side, both David Ford and Miles Corish started the season in Third Grade, but after some outstanding efforts with the bat earned promotion to the Second Grade team, subsequently appearing in the final for this team.

Miles Corish rejoined the club after a couple of years at North Sydney and after a hesitant beginning showed that he is player of real promise, scoring 288 runs at an average of 41, before earning promotion. Miles is clearly a player of the future and his return will be a great asset to the club.

David Ford scored 464 runs at an average of 51, and was the back-bone of the batting throughout the season. David has been and is a fierce competitor and it was especially pleasing to see him string together a number of high scores, eventually leading to promotion to Second Grade. David's innings of 101 not out against Randwick, was the best innings of the season, with his runs being obtained in a pressure situation with a win finally being achieved with two overs to spare. David through his consistency and temperament, demonstrated that he is capable of achieving success in the game at a high level.

The other outstanding performer throughout the season was Shawn Bradstreet, who took 43 wickets at an average of 11.6. After a slow start, Shawn gained confidence in every match in which

he bowled to the extent that by the end of the season he was the team's most attacking bowler and a major contributor to the team's success. Shawn proved he is capable of troubling any batsmen to whom he bowled, and is certainly a player of the future. As well as his bowling, Shawn batted well on a number of occasions establishing himself as a true all-rounder. Shawn's year was highlighted by his winning the Player's Player of the Year, an award which he thoroughly deserved. Shawn was perhaps the club's most committed trainer throughout the season, and with this continu keenness is certainly a player of the future.

In general, the team's batting was a little vulnerable once David Ford and Miles Corish were promoted to Second Grade. However, good support came from Andrew Fraser who scored two half-centuries before coming down with glandular fever before the finals. Andrew has been and is a keen member of the Third Grade team, being a major contributor to the overall team spirit and it is unfortunate that he was not able to participate in these major end of season games. Andrew clearly has the ability to play higher grades and should aim to achieve this in the next season. He is always an asset in any team in which he plays.

Craig Glassock came into the side after the first couple of rounds, and was also a contributor with the bat. Craig was also the team's wicket keeper and gave outstanding performances in the semi-final and final. At the tender age of 16 years, Craig is ear-marked for a big future and should set himself high goals for next season, both in his batting and wicket keeping.

Richard Weekes by his own standards, had only an average year with the bat, however, "the office worker" was part of the nucleus of the side and was a major contributor to the team's overall success. Next season Richard will have to turn his starts into larger scores.

Ben Lamb and David Patterson also made contributions in the batting Early in the season Ben top scored with an innings of 61, and demonstrated that he has the ability to succeed. Once Ben learns to have more confidence in his own ability, I am sure we will see him scoring a lot more runs. David Patterson came into the side towards the end of the season, and scored a valuable 22 runs in the semi-final against Mosman. David's efforts in the field

in these finals games were outstanding and contributed greatly towards the team's performance.

"Butch" Boyer played with the side in the final two games, scoring a valuable 33 runs against Mosman in the semi-final. This was Butch's first season with the club and throughout the year demonstrated that he was a great club man, and a real asset. In particular, his attitude and spirit in the final two games was outstanding given the circumstances in which he came into the side.

Other contributions to the batting were made throughout the season by Angus Johnston, Brad Pamp and Peter Ryan. It is hoped that Angus Johnston will return to the fold next season, as he is clearly a player of ability. Angus made 73 not out against Western Suburbs in a limited over game, this innings being one of the best seen all year.

The team's leading all-rounder was Peter Banbury, who scored a century early in the season and averaged 21 with the bat. Peter also took 20 wickets at an average of 20. His bowling figures in fact, would have been much better but for the fact that he seemed to suffer the fate of having a number of catches dropped off his bowling. Peter is clearly a fine all-round cricketer and should look to setting himself higher goals next season.

In the bowling department, apart from Shawn Bradstreet, the team was well-served throughout the season by Rudi Burrantini, Geoff Tucker, and Burt Pearce.

In Rudi Burratini's first season with the club, he took 18 wickets at an average of 20 in the Third Grade. Rudi with a little more consistency, and an improved ability to make the early breakthrough, will prove a valuable acquisition for the club.

Geoff Tucker came into the team after strong early season performance in Fourth Grade. In his first game in Third Grade, Geoff took five wickets and was instrumental in the team's victory against Gordon. Once Geoff does some work on his run-up, he has the potential to be a fine bowler as he has a genuine pace. Geoff unfortunately, only had limited opportunities with the bat, however, on a couple occasions showed that he has the ability and hopefully next season will have more opportunities.

Bert Pearce by his own standards, would probably be somewhat disappointed with his season taking only 18 wickets at an average of 26. However, Bert bowled a lot better than his figures indicate and on occasions bowled very tightly with other bowlers benefiting from this. Bert has the potential to play higher grades and I believe that next season should set his goal towards achieving this. As indicated, Bert made a major contribution in the semifinal combining in a match winning partnership with Scott Barclay, this partnership being instrumental in the victory that was achieve Bert was always a great team man throughout the season. Bert also bowled superbly in the final and with more time could well have ensured a victory.

Scott Barclay played the final three games with the team after returning from injury. After finding his feet, he gradually return to the form which made him Second Grade's leading bowler in the previous season. It was evident against Mosman in the semi-final that he played a major part in the team winning the game and reachithe final.

Tony Pitcher also came into the team for the final game of the season, and despite limited opportunities bowled very tightly as the situation demanded. Tony was always a great team contributo and despite his limited opportunities was an asset to the side.

Ken Donellan played only two games for the team, but took eight wickets at an average of 13.5 and can clearly consider himself unlucky not to have been a permanent member of the side. I am confident that with the talent available and the continued commitment, we will be able to shed the bridesmaid's tag of the last two seasons and take the No.1 spot in 1990/91.

Finally, it would have been inexcusable not to mention Kenný Donellan and his valuable contribution towards the team's performance Who can ever forget that extraordinary "six" over mid-on on the last ball of the day to tie the match against Sydney University. Even though Kenny had some good moments with the bat it was his bowling that mesmerized the opposition and it was interesting to see many opposition batsmen having mid-wicket conferences to discuss how to pick the "wrong'un".

Finally, I would like to thank all those people who not only supported the team during the season but also the club. Special mention to Mr & Mrs Mulvaney, Mr & Mrs Glassock and "Banjo" Patterso who contributed so much. Few people realise that cricket also extends to areas off the field and to all those people who provided valuable assistance, I thank you. Special thanks again to my wife Cathy for working on Saturdays.
