



### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

A number of players achieved representative honours (Dick Fry, Shawn Bradstreet, Craig Glassock) and are to be congratulated. I would like also to thank all the people who help make the club run — the committee, the captains, the scorers, as well as the many who chip in to do their bit. These include team managers, helpers with afternoon teas and supporters of all types. Be assured that your efforts are noticed and very much appreciated.

Thanks are also due to people and groups external to the Club - our sponsors, Unisys, Harbour Ford and the Tequila Restaurant, the Manly Council and Merv and Louise, and the N.S.W. Cricket Association.

Sadly, I have to record the passing of Len Soman, one of our life members. The club extends its deepest sympathy to Len's wife and family.

In conclusion, let me assure the Club of the Committee's commitment to addressing the factors necessary to return us to the top of the table. The most important factor, however, is the continued efforts of every player to practice, improve and perform to the maximum of his ability. Let's get back up there.

To the Members of the Manly Warringah District Cricket Club.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

The Management Committee takes pleasure in submitting for your consideration and adoption the 113th Annual Report together with the Club's Financial Statement for the year ended 30 April 1991.

After three successful seasons in a row, it came as a bitter pill for us to languish in the bottom half of the Club Championship. Mind you we were not in too bad company with Bankstown and Northern Districts accompanying us in our slide.

It must be conceded our playing strength was not as competitive as in the previous seasons having lost too many good bowlers prior to the season beginning - however - it is the writer's belief that the shake up of our fellow clubs in recent years, with the talk of a promotion, relegation, super comps and the like, that has seen a much more professional attitude of all the clubs in the Sydney grade competition. They all had a look at how Manly and Bankstown had tightened their organisation (with club coaches etc) and gotten their acts together - and - be assured there are going to be fewer easybeats from here on in. This is a good thing for cricket and a serious challenge to our Club.

Only our second grade threatened to make the end of season final series with the Club finishing 15th in the Club Championship, 16th in first grade, 5th in second grade, 15th in third grade, 17th in fourth grade, 15th in fifth grade, 7th in division B of Poidevin Gray and 9th in the Northern Division of the Green Shield.

Whilst it is not the role of this report to offer one person's opinion, the writer would be remiss if as a general overview I didn't state that the loss of discipline that first manifest itself so far back as Christmas 1989, coupled of course with the lack of balance in our teams this season, and a policy decision by Committee before the season started that saw us erroneously move away from toughness (for the wrong reasons) meant we stopped winning the close ones — even had trouble winning the games we should have won — and — the reverse multiplier effect which goes with the psyche of cricket saw us crash out as the other clubs sensed the upperhand and rammed it into us.

The Club needs to regroup - which it will - return to toughness through the proven disciplines at all club levels - which it should - and get on the road again. The talent's still there but it has to be managed much better.

First Grade lost balance when it lost the steadying hand of Kerry Mackay. The team virtually had to learn a new methology on how to win. Towards the end of the season, the right mix of players was starting to emerge. Greg Bush, Richard Fry and Roly Alexander dominated the batting however, the bowling couldn't provide the support. Warren Evans and Stephen Whitfield were always competitive however, the balance in the bowling wasn't there. Maybe the advent of Shawn Bradstreet may be the answer.

The second grade came within a whisker of making the four. They dropped a few matches early in the season for which they paid dearly. The team bats very well and bristles with potential first graders who must soon proceed to first grade.

The third grade had a season in two halves. They didn't win a game till after Christmas then at the end won five games virtually on the trot.

Fourth grade, by design, was a very young side. Amongst these lads are some of the Club's future stars. A change of captain mid season didn't do the young fellows any good and they lost their way towards the end.

The fifth grade was simply never allowed to obtain balance. A finalist the previous two seasons, it must have been frustrating for aptain Tony Scanlon to never have the same team match to match.

Poidevin Gray promised a lot however succumbed to the malaise of indifference that besets this competition. Changes in format for next season hopefully regenerates interest in this competition. Nonetheless, the performances of captain Miles Corish must surely see him in first grade next season.

Green Shield has become a most difficult competition to administer. The Association have seen fit to reduce the number of games here as well for next season. Gordon Currie and Bob Brenner looked after our fellows in exemplary fashion and whilst we didn't have the heady results of the previous year, we do have an excellent platform for next year as it was only lack of experience that saw the boys drop a succession of early games that knocked them over.

From what you have read, it is easy to think the Club was lacking. Cricket wise the results confirm this however, the actual attendance and harmony at practise was always up to expectations. It was simply the toughness that was missing. This is what made it so hard to rectify. Chairman of the Selectors, Frank Turner and Coach Sam Mesite had a most difficult task and the Club thanks them for the hours they put into it.

The Club and the Committee also thank the captains Stephen Whitfield, Tim Blank, Gary Flowers, Greg Hayes/Greg Boyer and Tony Scanlon of the grade teams and Miles Corish of Poidevin Gray and Craig Currie of Green Shield. To captain any side in a grade club is a big task and when there are losing sequences theirs is a lonely task.

We again thank Merv and Louise for their work on the grounds and it was great to see Louise at our Annual Dinner having made a full recovery from her nasty operation. We also thank Manly Council for their co-operation. We recognise times are changing and 1992 could see some dramatic changes in responsibility for playing field costs.

The Sydney Cricket Association continues to bring pressure on us for a third turf wicket which in turn continues to cause worry to Committee. Someday an answer to the problem simply has to be found.

unfortunately had to be abandoned and the Trinity Cup match didn't materialise. A successful Past Vs Present match was staged. Attendances as it were not particularly good, however, the day itself was excellent.

"The Manly Daily" again gave excellent coverage. David Moore always seemed to have a good article and Greg Bush's excellent column was also given its weekly feature. Our sincere thanks to David, Greg and the sporting editor. Greg's is a difficult article to produce week after week without some controversy, and he does an excellent job as his strongest attribute is "he means what he says".

The Club has been able to send a representative team on an end of season tour of Thailand and Europe. At the time of writing, the players have completed the England and Scotland section and are so far undefeated. All of us who stayed at home are now green with envy.

With all the problems we had this year our connections with the Juniors, Schools and the Shires suffered somewhat. Hopefully, this can be rectified next season as the Club revamps itself. We draw your attention to the schools competition report included in this Report and our sincere thanks to Tom Hart, Ted Wilkinson and their helpers that keep these competitions going.

We draw your attention to the Treasurer's Report. The Club slipped back into a loss situation and it continues to be a financial struggle. We must raise over \$20,000 a year in addition to registration fees and is a thankless task for those with the worry. Your assistance is respectfully asked for and we thank Lionel Banbury for his spread sheets that continually alert us to our shortcomings.

The writer joins with President Jim in thanking the other members of the Management Committee for their work throughout the year. The new member was Gavin Fletcher and we particularly thank him. The cloak of poor results found some shortcomings as the vast majority of Committee had no experience at administering a club with problems and all things being equal, they stuck to their task much better than some critics give them credit for.

Our thanks also go to our sponsors. Without sponsorship we go nowhere. Unisys was our principal sponsor with Pacific Ford and Tequila Restaurant helping is lesser roles. Sponsors provide us with the opportunity to play as a Club and we ask all persons reading this report or associated with cricket in the Manly Warringah District to always ask yourself "what can we do for Unisys, Pacific Ford and Tequila Restaurant". Sponsorship is not a one way street and we must be sure to fulfil our obligations on and off the field.

Last but not least, we thank the band of people who help the Committee run the Club. Without these people, we would be totally lacking in the finesse.


### TREASURER'S REPORT AND FINANCIAL STATEMENT

1990/91 was not a successful cricket season for the Club. The financial statements also reflect the lack of success achieved on the cricket field. The Club showed a deficit for the year of \$2,284.00 compared with a surplus of \$595.00 for the previous year.

Total income was down from \$25,310.00 in 1989/90 to \$22,763.00 due to decreases in sponsorship receipts, \$1,500.00, promotions and social function income, \$1,908.00 and prize money, \$1,150.00.

Operating expenses for the year totalled \$25,048.00 which was \$236.00 or 1.3% higher than the previous year. Increased coaching and player incentives \$1,299.00 and sundry expenses \$1,953.00 were offset by the reduction in bad debts \$3,348.00.

### COACHING REPORT

The 1990-91 season, just completed, has ended in disappointment with no Manly side reaching the Semi-Finals and the Club finishing lowly in the Club Championship.

In analysing the Club's performance, the reasons should be broken into the following categories:

- \* Club Coach
- \* Players (Attitude, Commitment)
- \* Facilities
- \* Grade Captains
- \* Playing strength

### Club Coach

As a former player, of only three seasons ago, the majority of current players were with the Club prior to my retirement. As a result, there was obviously a problem with players being too familiar with myself, this leading to a certain amount of complancency and lethargy when instructions were issued. With an outsider (e.g. Alan Campbell) this problem did not occur. I do conced that as a Club Coach, I was responsible for players' attitude and obviously the attitude in some cases were disappointing.

### Players

With any amateur sport, where players are paying to play the game, you can not expect compulsory attendance at training and total commitment.

In running a grade sport, the Club can expect players to attend practise and to fully utilize the time and facilities available. This unfortunately was not the case as many players believed that by just attending practise sessions, the attendance was enough. Unfortunately, it was these players who were disruptive to others who were "having a go".

Players by practising bad habits, contributed to poor performances, e.g. fast-bowlers bowling no-balls at training and bowling short on bad tracks. Batsmen getting out some 2 or 3 times in a net session or 10-15 minutes, means that not many runs would have been scored.

### Facilities

Practise wickets on most occasions were acceptable, but more work on the wickets would have had them at a better standard. Problems with Council obviously meant that we are not in a position to complain. From my experience, the practise wickets were as good as at any time in the past. Bad wickets at practise serve as an opportunity to some batsmen to stand and slog and not try to bat the session without getting out. Bowlers by bowling short on bad wickets also get a false sense of their form.

Cricket balls, or rather a shortage of cricket balls, were always a problem. Five grades by 16 rounds should mean about 80 balls. Add say another 10-15 balls for 2nd Innings, and new balls after 85 overs and that should be approximately 100 balls. At the last practise session, we had less than 10 balls to practise with. Obviously more care is to be taken with the match-balls by Captains and all concerned.

A turf wicket for Eifth Grade is urgently required, but the problems involved there are understood.

### Grade Captains

Captains for each of the sides must be made aware of the time required to do a proper job. Captains <u>MUST</u> have the time to attend practise sessions and make sure that players under their control are practising properly. Unfortunately, the Captains of Second Grade, Fourth Grade and towards the end of the season, Fifth Grade, were not in attendance at enough sessions. I again appreciate that these problems will always exist in an Amateur sport but when appointing Captains, the Committee must have certain expectations.

### Playing Strength

The loss of players from First and Second Grades at the beginning of last season obviously affected the depth of the Club's playing strength. Generally, the Club lacked a strike bowler in First Grade but the experience gained by Warren Evans, Shaun Bradstreet and David Gainsford will hold then in good stead for future years.

The Club's batting was adequate with Greg Bush, Richard Fry and Roly Alexander, in First Grade, showing the way. Other batting positions in First Grade must surely be up for grabs next season. The lack of big scores in Second Grade was a major concern. Players like Corish, Blank, Minnett, Johnson and Ford should have been capable of making hundreds and really pushing for First Grade spots.

Depending on the availability of last seasons playing staff, the Club must now pursue new players for next season. Decisions must be made now about the players needed for First Grade must be pursued as I feel that by bolstering First Grade by a few players, the rest of the playing strength will filter through the lower Grades.


The Club this season had players playing in a grade higher than their ability warranted, which affected the Club's performance. In the long term, this will be beneficial as these players will gain from the experience.

Generally, the above problems, and others, contributed to the Club's poor performances, but as Club Coach I feel that lack of effort and preparation more than lack of ability, was a major reason for our poor performance. Of all the players I feel that 60% gave maximum effort with the remainder just going through the motions.


Personally, I am open-minded over next season's appointment as Club Coach, but I would certainly take a different approach into next year's coaching system. I would set up a system of Practise Co-ordinators, each in charge of a specific skill with myself over viewing. Co-ordinators would change say weekly, with all players being utilized. This may be discussed prior to my overseas trip on 27th April 1991, or after my return at the end of July 1991.

Finally, I take this opportunity to thank the Committee for its backing and especially Don Sellin for his great assistance to myself and the Club.



### SECOND GRADE CRICKET REPORT 1990/91

Unfortunately this report concerns second grade's unsuccessful defence of a premiership achieved solely because of a total committment to winning, built around close friendship and importantly, hard work.

Regrettably, these vital ingredients were absent throughout our cricket club during the past season culminating in results far below our potential and well below expectations:

This was of course compounded by the unavailability of several senior players who had previously formed the nucleus of the club's higher grades. However it is my firm belief that all second grade players chosen to defend the premiership this past season were capable of fulfilling that goal.

Here is where my disappointment lies. So often do we talk about that word "potential" and so often does it let us down. Unfortunately "potential" is merely an ideal which in 99 out of 100 cases, is only realised when accompanied with hard work.

Too often in second grade we were guilty of abusing the necessity to practise and thus we fell well short of full "potential" when competing at weekends. A close look at our team statistics will reveal a distinct lack of discipline, obtainable merely through training and practising properly.

Firstly, I refer to our batting which on numerous occasions let us down:-

- not one of our batsmen managed to score in excess of 500 runs for the season.
- apart from a century from Greg Hill in the first round, we managed only 4 individual scores over 70.

To be a force in the premiership, a team must consist of batsmen capable of, and willing to contribute big scores. Thirty, forty, fifty and even seventy are not good enough, and every one of our batsmen is guilty here. With greater emphasis put on training and better application to your job as a team member, these scores will grow.

Secondly, I refer to our fielding. Never have I experienced such frustrating times on the cricket field as I did this past year — and I don't even bowl! During our few years of success under the guidance of Allan Campbell (if you can remember) fielding became of paramount importance when at practise, and thus rarely did we let our bowlers down in a match.

Nobody means to drop a catch or misfield. However with genuine committment to practise fielding, these basic skills, so desperately required to ensure success, will become habit.

I can only gather from this team's unwillingness to practise properly that each one of us believes it unnecessary. If that is the case then we are all guilty of vastly over-rating ourselves. If we were half as good as we think, Tim Blank would not be writing this report but Allan Border, or we would all bare black skin. Merely attending practise is useless unless that time is used to your benefit.

I only hope that in future, we, as individuals will be more aware of the necessity to practise properly. Those who argue that it's "only a game" or "we've got to have fun" seem to forget that winning becomes fun, and hard work becomes winning.

Having sifted through the woes of our season there are promising factors that I wish to mention.

Firstly I found my first season as Manly second grade captain immensely challenging and I would be happy to repeat the honour in the future. However I cannot hide my disappointment in our lack of discipline which caused our downfall, and I must accept responsibility for this.

I believe that every player who played second grade is technically capable of advancing to higher levels, however notwithstanding my previous comments, one must maximise their talents when seeking promotion.

In Miles Cornish, Manly has a potential (there's that word again) run machine. With the proper application and dedication Miles will be a key member of future Manly teams.

I would also like to make mention of the improvement in several players who were chosen in second grade.

Andrew Fraser showed throughout the season that second grade was not out of his depth and he eventually became a permanent and important member of our team. His 86 against Randwick under difficult circumstances was the knock of the season. Andrew's batting improved through his determination to succeed at this higher level. His noted "jet watching" all but disappeared and a continuation of this more responsible approach will see his continued success at Manly.

Glen Evans also displayed the improvement that we all know him capable of and in the latter half of the season showed form to suggest that he is ready to make that step into first grade.

After several outstanding performances in second grade it was an inevitable progression for Shawn Bradstreet and Lee Pedrola to be selected in the top grade. Shawn showed tremendous potential throughout the year and primarily through the addition of hard work, he is currently realising this. However Shawn must focus his attention solely on cricket rather than the unnecessary chat which accompanies it.

Lee Pedrola finally achieved first grade status, four years after his top grade debut. A captain cannot speak highly enough of Lee's contribution to his team. Lee's competitive nature ensures his total committment to the team, and his all round skills become invaluable to a captain. Lee will frequently produce that little bit extra which has a great effect on his team mates. Thanks Lethal.

Lawrence Cronin also deserves mention. Lawrence began the season in second grade showing tremendous pace, however his lack of control and no-ball problems resulted in his relegation. To his credit, Lawrence produced whole hearted efforts for third grade and eventually succeeded in regaining his best form. With continued enthusiasm he is quite

I would also like to commend Craig Glassock, David Price and Sean Parkinson for their contribution to second grade. Although relatively minor this year, all three players performed superbly and showed the ability to succeed at this level next year.

I must also make mention of the contribution made to second grade by Gavin Flatcher. Too often were we, as fieldsmen, guilty of dropping catches, more often than not, from Fletch's bowling. I would personally like to thank Fletch for his assistance throughout the year which made my job as captain a lot easier. Both the team and the captain benefitted from his vast experience and will do in future seasons.

Thanks to Mark Williams who frequently lent his hand and gave valuable advice throughout the year. His wicket keeping never wavered from it's usual high standards.

Thanks to Kylie McPhee, our scorer who was unfortunately unavailable for the majority of the games. We all wish for her outstanding services to accompany second grade next year.

Thanks to Dallas Fletcher, Sue Fletcher, the Corish's, John Ford, the Bradstreet's, and in particular, Jim Evans. Without this outside support and help, grade cricket with Manly would not be the same, and the players wish to extend their sincere thanks.

May I take this opportunity to wish Jim Evans a fast and safe recovery for his illness. We all hope to see Jim back at Manly Oval next year, where his two sons will play a vital role.

I would like to conclude by saying that it is a credit to the "potential" of all players who represented second grade that we managed to finish as high as we did. Just goes to show you that with a little hard work we may have successfully defended the premiership. I look forward to next season and anticipate renewed enthusiasm and a more committed approach by all players.

### THIRD GRADE CRICKET REPORT 1990/91

After being either premiers or runners-up in the last three seasons, one would be forgiven for thinking that the 1990-91 season for the Third Grade side was a failure, finishing fifteenth in the competition with only 32 points. Certainly, at the half-way mark with no wins and no points, I would certainly have agreed. However, from this point on, the team's performance improved remarkably and there was a number of positive features to come out of the season.

The season began with the team being made up of a number of new personnel, a lot of whom were inexperienced at this level of grade cricket. The lack of experience and the knowledge of how to win games was clearly evident earlier in the season. In almost all of these early games, the team had been in a winning position but was able to "snatch defeat from the jaws of victory". In previous years, the opposite had been the case.

As mentioned above, Laurence Cronin's presence in the team was of great benefit. Each time he played, he was always able to put pressure on the opposition's batting line-up, as a result of which all our bowlers benefitted. In particular, the younger bowlers gained from his experience. Laurence is a valuable acquisition to our club and we look forward to his continuing next year.

All in all, a positive finish to the season as a result of which I believe there is cause for optimism in next season's performance.

I would like to thank all players in the side throughout the season for their efforts at practice and their assistance in making the season, if not an entirely successful one, at least an enjoyable one. I would also like to thank the many parents and girlfriends who assisted throughout the season for without their support, we would not have been able to function.

Last but by no means least, my thanks goes to my manager, Don Sellin, who once again demonstrated what an invaluable asset he is to the administration of any side. I look forward to him being back on deck next year.

In all we had 29 players line up for the fighting fourths all of whom contributed to the team's performance. Our thanks go out to them all.



### FIFTH GRADE REPORT 1990/90

It is with pleasure that I write the Fifth Grade report for 1990/91.

The "Fighting Fifths" ended the season mid-table, not the elevated heights that the side has been accustomed, but a creditable position given the high player turnover that we experienced.

Some points need to be made that will qualify the predicament that Fifth Grade, and the Club, was in at the start of the season.

This was evident in matches, where instead of having to take ten wickets in an innings, we would invariably need to take sixteen, as consistently catches were grassed.

The moral to us as a Club is that "you only get out what you put in". Each player should strive to make their weaknesses strengths and develop their cricketing skills to the fullness of their potential. This can only be accomplished by determined self disciplined practice and the will to improve.

Two players that exemplified this attitude were Craig "Suitcase" Ferguson and Morgan "Gallop Poll" Youell. Neither missed one practice session which resulted in tremendous improvement in their performances by the end of the season.

The season produced some meritorious performances.

With the bat David Price scored a fabulous 100 against Mosman, demonstrating that he has class stamped all over him. Todd Bartlett belted North Sydney around the ground when he scored 138. To look at Todd's stance, a bowler would always think he was a chance, however, his great eye and range of shots soon dispells this misconception. He

Anthony "Mr Bubbles" Pitt won the batting average this year with some gutsy and classy knocks. His first "digs" in Grade were ordinary (he would agree, I am not unkind here), but to his credit he fought back. Matthew "Virgil" Tood showed glimpses of his punishing batting. I expect next season to see him get some big scores. As a gully fieldsman, he is unparalleled by anyone in the Club. "Virgil" also proved to be a very good leg spinner who deserves more opportunities. Andy Mason also deserves recognition for his solid batting performances.

With the ball, Scott "The Phantom" Shelton once again took a swag of wickets and won the bowling average. He is a class bowler with a terrible attitude to training. How someone with so much talent can let it go to waste is beyond my comprehension.

Dave "Sheik" Fennell contributed with some youthful performances. After struggling to find his line, length and some luck, the oldest 26 year old in the world, bowled exceptionally well and made his way up to the higher Grades. Sheik is also a more than handy middle order bat who scored plenty of runs this season with limited opportunities.


