

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

In my inaugural year as President, I would like to be able to report a number of senior grade premierships, and clearly if winning premierships is a barometer of a club's success, then the 1991/1992 has been an unremarkable one. To categorise the season in this way, however, would be grossly unfair with there being a number of significant developments both on and off the field which in many ways I believe have laid the groundwork for the Club to be a major force in the Sydney grade competition in the next decade.

The highlight of the playing season was undoubtedly the performance of the A.W. Green Shield team in winning this coveted trophy for the Club for the first time in over 30 years. The team's performance was in no small part due to it's preparation and management, and in this respect, congratulations must go to the management team, Bob Kennedy, Mark Hope and Bob Lind. The team was ably captained by Simon Couch, with every player in the squad of seventeen contributing to the team's overall success. It is a priority of the Club that all players who represented in this team will go on to play grade cricket for the Club.

On the grade scene, the Club was strengthened at the beginning of the season by the return of Phil Marks to the Club, with Phil playing a major part in the team's successes throughout the season. The recruitment of Michael Bevan was also significant, with the Club being very lucky to attract a player of Michael's calibre and potential. I am happy to report that despite limited appearances, Michael has settled in well with the Club, and in the district, and we can hopefully look forward to a long association.

Paul Wilson also joined the Club during the course of the season from the Australian Cricket Academy, and his inclusion has also considerably boosted the Club's playing strength.

With players of this calibre, one may well have expected First Grade to make the semi-finals, but it was only towards the end of the season that the team really played to it's ability, winning the last five games in succession and defeating the eventual premiers, Waverley, in the final round of the season. One can only lament what might have been had the team been able to win one of the earlier games in the season and secure a semi-final position.

From a personal point of view, one of the season's highlights has been the performances of three young players, all local juniors, in their initial First Grade season. Shawn Bradstreet, Miles Corish and Craig Glassock each had outstanding debut seasons, as can be seen from the First Grade report and statistics.

The other grade sides also performed creditably throughout the season, with Second Grade being somewhat unlucky to also miss out on a semi-final position in the last round of the competition. A number of young players, some in their first season with the Club, made significant individual contributions and their continued development should see them progress through the grades.

My personal thanks and that of the Committee goes to all the Captains, Peter King and Greg Hill in First Grade, Tim Blank in Second Grade, Greg Boyer in Third Grade, David Patterson in Fourth Grade and Tom Spencer in Fifth Grade for their efforts throughout the season. I personally know full well the amount of time and commitment as well as responsibility that this position entails.

In his first season as Chairman of Selectors, Sam Mesite proved an outstanding success. Selecting five grade teams each week is no small feat, and Sam's availability and dedication to his job was outstanding.

On the coaching side, the Club was well served by Mark Hope, who worked in the area of skills development, as well as playing a role with the Green Shield and Poidevin Gray teams. Damian Bray was appointed practice coordinator for the season, and guickly became an integral part of the Club's practice sessions.

In summary, from a performance point of view, the Club can be reasonably satisfied with last season's results. However, if this time next year the Club is not able to boast a far greater presence in the finals in all grades, then the season would have to be viewed as a disappointing one.

Off the field, there were a number of significant developments during the course of the season.

At the commencement of the season, it became a priority of the new committee to source outside sponsors for the Club. No amateur sporting club such as ours can these days survive without sponsorship. Directly as a result of this drive, the Club was most successful in securing a number of sponsors, the benefits of this being reflected in the Treasurer's Report. The Club's major sponsor for the season was The Communications Depot, with one of their principals, Craig Martin; being a long time supporter of the Club. I would personally like to extend to the major sponsor and all the other sponsors involved with the Club, our gratitude for their financial support during the season immediately passed. Their contribution can in no way be under estimated, as it is only with sufficient funds that we as a Club are able to upgrade facilities, provide coaches, provide funds for junior development and return benefits to the players. As such, all these sponsors are worthy of our support. Particulars of the Club's sponsors for the season are detailed throughout this report.

Prior to the commencement of the season, the "Room at the Top" underwent a rejunevation. This remodelling was done with the help of particular sponsors and the hard work of a number of the committee. The room now boasts various honour boards, trophy cabinets, current and historic photographs, and other Club and cricket memorabilia. During the season, the "Room at the Top" hosted a number of functions including the regular post match post mortems. It was also pleasing to see a number of supporters and past players frequent the venue. On behalf of the committe, I would openly extend to all supporters, past players and members an open invitation to the "Room at the Top" on any Saturday during the season.

This season for the first time in many years the Club hosted an international fixture with the Sri Lankan World Cup team playing a lead up fixture prior to the World Cup against a Manly President's XI. The President's XI consisted of three local players, Phil Marks, Shawn Bradstreet and Greg Hill, as well as being boosted by internationals such as Chris Broad and David Capel, and fringe Sheffield Shield players in Greg Macleay, Brad McNamara, Phil Alley and Geoff Milliken. The day was an outstanding success with a crowd in the order of over 4000 people in attendance. The organising committee for the match did a great job on very short notice, and demonstrated the fact that there is no reason why Manly Oval should not host similar international fixtures in the years to come.

This year the committee put in train a junior development program, with such being overseen by Tony Scanlon, with assistance from Mark Hope and David Patterson. Elsewhere in this report a detailed summary is provided of the program's achievement for the season. Funds for the program were provided by way of a specific development grant from the New South Wales Cricket Association, and the Association is to be commended for this initiative in the promotion and development of cricket throughout the metropolitan area. To Tony Scanlon and the other members of his team, congratulations on this year's effort.

A significant factor in the Club's performance throughout the season both on and off the field has been the contribution of the committee. To Ian Lamb in his capacity as Secretary, Andrew Fraser as his Assistant, Geoff Rodgers as Treasurer and to the members of the committee, Bob Lind, Bill Bradstreet, Tim Blank, Tony Scanlon, Greg Hayes and Andy Stewart (retired), I extend my personal thanks and gratitude for their time and effort throughout the year. In this regard, mention must be made of the contribution of Don "Dollars" Sellin, who week in week out, year after year also makes a major contribution to the running of the Club.

At this point, it would be remiss if comment was not made on the retirement of Greg Hill. Greg, as a player, has had an association with the Club for over 20 seasons, and his contributions as a player are well recorded in the Club's statistics contained in the report. Greg, throughout his career, however, contributed much more than just the statistics and his presence as a playing member of the Club will be sorely missed. The Club wishes Greg every success in his retirement and we have no doubt that Greg will continue his involvement for many years to come.

What of the future? On the immediate horizon, the situation regarding Manly Oval still remains unresolved, with it being likely there will be future negotiations with the Council in the coming months.

As indicated earlier in this report, sponsorship is vital in order to ensure the Club's overall performance level, with the search for suitable sponsors therefore being an ongoing one.

In general, however, I believe that with continued commitment and responsible administration, the Club can look forward to and for that matter should expect a high level of success in forthcoming seasons.

114th ANNUAL REPORT

To the Members of the Manly Warringah District Cricket Club,

Ladies and Gentlemen,

The Management Committee takes pleasure in submitting for your consideration and adoption the 114th Annual Report together with the Club' Financial Statement for the year ended 30 April 1992.

The Club continued its custom of entering teams in the five grades of the Sydney Cricket Association's Tooheys Grade Cricket Competition as well as the Poidevin-Gray and A W Green Shield Competition.

The overall performance of our various teams were satisfactory in that we were able to recover sufficiently from the debacle of the previous season to regain a "top half" position in the club championship. Whilst a top half spot is still well below our achievements for the late 80's it does provide a springboard for the coming year.

Our shining light was the Green Shield team who won their competition in spectacular fashion. The manner in which they won the final could best be described as awesome and the Randwick players must wonder what hit them.

The various team results were Firsts 5th, Seconds 5th, Thirds 9th, Fourths 13th, Fifths 12th, PG's 6th (Northern Division) and Green Shield 1st (both Northern and overall).

It was a worry that results fell away somewhat in our lower grades however the causes of this hopefully have been addressed for the coming season.

The year has seen considerable change in the administration of the club. All observers have seen the improvements at the "Room at the Top" and the display of club memorabilia now in place. Well - it would be fair to say - the changes of attitude to sponsorship and money matters, junior development, social activities, clothing and gear, overseas tours and more have all undergone a restructuring program of about equal degree. It will take a season or two for some of these changes to become obvious however be assured they are in place.

One may ask did the need for change reflect on previous committees - the answer is a definite no. When you look at club results for 1987/88, 1988/89 and 1989/90 seasons you can be assured that it could only have happened if the club had its cricket right. However - There has been a big upheaval in Sydney grade cricket. The changes of recent years promoted by the S.C.A. has seen a radical change to the professionalism of all clubs. The days of the traditionally strong clubs and corresponding weaker clubs is virtually over. The strong clubs of the future will be those that work at it the hardest.

This years Committee has responded to the challenge and has put in countless hours of work behind the scenes to prepare the way and the writer can only be full of praise for their efforts and achievements.

Returning to cricket - rather than include in this report a brief resume of the performance by each team, your attention is drawn to the captains report accompanying each teams statistics. In doing this however it would be remiss if a special mention was not made of the A W Green Shield performance.

The team was managed by Bob Kennedy who worked tirelessly through the program of assembling the players, preparing them for competition and then guiding them all the way. Few people are aware of the hours of work and sacrifice this takes and all credit goes to Bob. The team spirit he and his helpers Bob Lind and Mark Hope were able engender amongst an absolute first class bunch of young men was a lesson to all of us who were privileged to witness it. Led by Simon Couch the team has names such as Couch, Nealon, Clemow, Reeves, Cox just to nominate a few that will dominate Manly cricket for years to come. The boys in this team deserve every accolade they have received and it is to be hoped they enjoyed their end of season trip to Brisbane to play the winners of that city's equivalent competition.

On the downside, problems confronting the club are those relating to playing fields. The Sydney Cricket Association continue to pressure us to find a third turf wicket whilst Manly Council still has to overcome the economic constraints of the times that makes the upkeep of Manly Oval and Grahams Reserve a burden to which we are going to have to contribute - and contribute significantly.

Financially the club can report a profit of \$8,450 and your attention is drawn to the Treasurers Report. The most significant increase in revenue comes from sponsorship and it is the financial accounts of the club that reflects in money terms the changes of attitude in administration this year.

Sponsorship represents the additional financial resource that the club needs to generate the cash required to remain viable in these changing times. Accordingly we cannot place too much emphasis on the need for every member and friend of our club to either actively or passively promote all of our sponsors at every possible chance. Tom Hart and his helpers with the schools competition in respect to which a report is included in this book. Our junior development committee are active in this field and hopefully can give Tom a hand with his task.

Our Chairman of Selectors Sam Mesite, our trainer Damien Bray and our skills coach Mark Hope. To these fellows, particularly the Chairman of Selectors, we hand the responsibility of the cricket image of the club. Their input is invaluable.

COACHING VIEWPOINT

Before I launch into comments about the 1991/92 season, I want to thank the Manly Club for the opportunity of coaching last season. The lessons I learned were very insightful.

How can I add value to my cricket career and as a consequence add value to the Manly Club and possibly higher if your're good enough? These are the rhetorical questions every player needs to ask before the season begins. These are some of the practical ways. Your previous season's performance had to be evaluated realistically. Points of performance improvement must be clearly stated. For example, a smoother bowling run up, a straighter back left, too much bottom hand, not watching the ball could be the cause of mediocre performance. The off season is an excellent opportunity to correct faults. Working with your friends and/or a coach would be invaluable. Sometimes your friends are your most effective mirror.

Arriving at pre-season, net practice in sound physical condition is a pre-requisite for a positive season. We don't want anorexics or Billy Bunkers, or guys reaching for the oxygen after half a lap. You still have another month to put in before the season begins. If you're overweight, your performance will be affected and you mightn't reach peak fitness until January/February, what a waste.


My suggestion to the Club is that a simple contract be drawn which all players who want to play sign and adhere to. It's simplicity is based on habit and ritual. The habit part is about laps and stretches they have to complete before practice begins. Their attendance at practice one night per week minimum, unless their captain is notified prior to practice night. Their commitment to a bowling (bowlers only), batting and fielding intensity during practice time. The ritual is about all the guys at practice getting together to sing a song, (the Club song's probably banned), at the end of each practice to create a harmony and bonding amongst the players. Then the cricket can begin. You could appoint a song leader from the ranks of the longer and celebrated voices. The resonance of singing is a powerful way of bringing people together. The spirit of the Club is very important, and singing can help here.

OTHER TIPS

Spend some time visualising your performance - use the breath to relieve any anxiety. It is essential to find the stillness inside you so you become focused. As a bowler or batsman, you're in charge of your environment, take these precious seconds to steady yourself and reassert your authority in the moment. My view is that there's often a paper thin difference between the top hundred players in the country/state. these techniques are basically sound. The difference is the mental attitude players bring to their game. Their ability to handle seconds of distinction and separation point pressure is the Concentration and persistence often outshine charisma and brilliance. Another vital factor is to contrive to work on developing a SOUND TECHNIQUE that doesn't give in to attack. That's another important KEY, and the bases of your self-esteem in the game. Look at how the masters do things. Your learning can begin here.

A NON-CRICKET TIP - You won't be playing cricket forever. You have locked away in that body of yours, a creative soul. It might be in music, writing, singing, art, dancing, woodwork, acting (most of you do that anyway on a cricket field) etc. Finding that creativity is a way of balancing other aspects of your life and very rewarding, so go for it and forget the exclamations of your friends.





I have always been a team club oriented person and as such, I will always remember my time at Manly fondly as you have a wonderful club both in cricket aptitude and as mates.



THIRD GRADE REPORT 1991/92 SEASON

Looking back on the season, one is left pondering on what might have been. The team on paper was very strong every week, and with the right conditions, I believe we could have been holding up the Third Grade Shield. Instead, we missed out on making the semi finals by one win.

Patience is one of the hardest things to control when batting. Anthony was the deserved winner of the batting honours during the season, with an aggregate total of 346 runs at an average of 38.4. Thanks again Ken for your support when the season got tough, it was much appreciated.

Russell "Aren't you Ken Rosewall?" Murray had a very frustrating time in Third's this season. A proven performer, Russell always looked good at the crease, with a score always looming. Unfortunately, Russell was on the way back to the pavilion on a number of occasions with one loose shot. Once these loose shots are controlled, Russell's technique will ensure runs are scored. Russell is a great team man, and a pleasure to have in one's side.

The 1991/92 season has been a great one for Geoff. After starting the season in Fourth's, instant promotion was required after winning the first two player of the round awards. His form continued in Third's, warranting promotion to Second's where Geoff became one of the team's leading players. Congratulations on a great seaon, and may you continue your success and push for First Grade.

Simon "Sofa" Couch had a successful season this year. Simon captained the Green Shield extremely well to its first win since Mike Pawley was leader. Along with this win, Simon also made various representative teams including a State cap. Simon's Third Grade season was a mixture of continued learning, frustration and satisfaction. 

FOURTH GRADE REPORT 1991/92 SEASON

After a promising start, winning 2 of the first 3 matches, the Fourth Graders experienced a disappointing season, finishing in 13th position. A reflection on the season reveals that we only bowled out 4 teams and this was where the main problem lied. Our bowlers toiled honestly all season, but we just lacked enought penetration to pressure the top teams. The support of our bowlers in the catching department also left something to be desired, and this is an area which all players (this writer included) need to work on.

However, to reflect on our disappointments for too long, would be to overlook a number of fine individual performances and player developments throughout the season.

Geoff Tucker started on fire, with an unbeaten century against Randwick followed by an outstanding bowling performance of 14-46 to lead us to outright victory against Balmain. When Geoff deservedly won promotion, the bowling attack was led admirably by Rudi Burattini with 33 wickets including 6-59 vs Uni of NSW. Rudi was clearly our best bowler all year, a fact reflected in his winning of the Fourth Grade bowling award. Rudi shared the new ball with a number of players, Darren Bradstreet, Michael Osbourne, Morgan Youell and Pat Kelly, all of whom won promotion following good performances in Fifth Grade.

Darren Bradstreet was developing well, getting better with each match. He bowled genuinely quick against Mosman. Unfortunately, a back injury sustained in this match brought his season to a premature end. Pat Kelly joined us late in the season, bowling very well without luck, his natural leg cutter consistently beating the edge. Pat's batting added great depth to the team, displaying some big hitting against North Sydney. "Sticks" Osbourne was one who suffered more than most from our catching lapses, but he along with Morgan Youell never gave less than 100%. They were also two of the best trainers in the Club.

The spin bowling cupboard of the Fourth's was bare for a large part of the season. Mark Taylor and Darren Benson contributed well, "Tails" taking 6 wickets off 33 consecutive overs at Mosman and Darren 4-30 against minor premiers Waverley (he should wear those Bulldogs socks every week), but they both spent much of the season in higher grades.

One of the highlights of the season for me was the development of the Central Coast duo, Brain Clemow and Andrew Nealon. Brian started tentatively, but gradually gained confidence as he adjusted to the difference between junior and grade cricket. After Christmas, he was almost unstoppable, a string of good scores seeing him promoted to Third's, where he promptly reeled off scores of 60 and 81. Brian justifiably won the Fourth Grade batting award. Andrew was our wicket keeper throughout the season and he, like Brian improved with each match. Andrew's size (or lack of it) was often an amusement to the opposition, but he quickly won their respect with his skill and determination. He batting at No 7 and 8 pulled us out of trouble on a number of occasions, and I am sure he will be looking to move up the order in the future.

Craig Currie and Greg Pierce were the other mainstays of our batting. Both performed consistently without cracking it for a really big score. Craig finished second in the averages, the highlight of his season being an excellent 60 against Mosman. He also shared an excellent partnership with Greg (who made 77) against a Gordon attack which was the best we faced this season. Greg's reliability in the slip cordon was a bonus for his captain.

Neil Gray and Darren Reeves both joined up after Christmas, Neill following a succession of high scores in Fifth's and Darren after a successful Green Shield campaign. Both acquitted themselves well, Neil with a fine half century against Campbelltown and Darren with 48 against North Sydney coming in at 4-18.

Russell Murray and Andy Stewart both made positive contributions to the team during their appearances. Russell made a fine unbeaten 64 against Uni of NSW, whilst Andy made a quickfire 46 against Fairfield. I am sure I speak on behalf of everyone at Manly in wishing the "Big Fella" all the best with his new career in Perth.

The Fourth Grade report would not be complete without me making mention of Greg Hayes. The "Malta" was a fine team man with bat and ball and a great help to me as captain. Week in and week out his literary contribution was a constant source of inspiration to the team. His innings of 86 against Petersham was one of the highlights of the season. Hayesy was also team "treasurer", and his diligent collection of the fines incurred by all players ensured the end of season dinner was well sponsored.

A club and its teams cannot function without a lot of behind the scenes support. In this respect I must thank the Nealons, Clemows, Curries, Reeves', Bradstreets and my father "Banjo" for their support at matches, Sam Mesite for his help as Chairman of Selectors and Gary Flowers and the Committee for placing their faith in me.

Finally, I offer my congratulations to Simon Couch and the Green Shield team for bringing the Shield to Manly for the first time since 1959-60.

Looking forward to seeing you all for the 1992-93 season.

FIFTH GRADE REPORT 1991/92 SEASON

He took a bit of stick in later games but always looked to be a potential wicket-taker. A tremendously enthusiastic team man, Andrew made a valuable contribution to us last year and deservedly took out the bowling average.

Keeping duties were shared around. Andy Stewart, Scanners and Mat Phillips all did a pretty good job.

I was lucky to be in charge of a very pleasant group of young players during the season. I can't recall a single unpleasant incident on or off the field and I thank everyone who played with us for their efforts. Special thanks too to Sam Mesite for the great efforts he constantly put in to help find players to fill the gaps left by the inevitable last minute drop-outs we experienced.

1991/92 saw an extremely determined and enthusiastic Manly Green Shield Squad take the field. This was to be the most successful Manly team since Mike Pawley's 1959/60 side were Premiers. A great amount of time and effort was spent in selecting a well balanced squad of 17 players.

After being undefeated in 3 trial games, the side went into its first match against a highly rated Penrith team. After some tight bowling from Colin Beashel and Hamish McDonald, Penrith were restricted to a total of 8-222. Manly scored the required runs with ease, with Brian Clemow, Murray Cox and Darren Reeves being the main contributors.

Our second match saw us take on Gosford at Manly. Mith good bowling performances from Steven Riches and Simon Couch, Gosford were dismissed for 147. Manly passed Gosford's total 6 wickets down with Matthew Cranney, Darren Reeves and Steve Riches performing well with the bat.

We played North Sydney in our third game and scored a convincing win. Manly compiled 236 with Brian Clemow and Andrew Nealon the main contributors. North Sydney were routed for a mere 56 with Ben Keens, Simon Couch and Colin Beashel the destroyers for Manly.

We then met undefeated Gordon at Chatswood Oval and performed extremely well. Batting first we managed 6 for 300 from 60 overs with Murray Cox scoring a century and good contributions from Reeves, Contractor and Couch. After a steady start, Gordon collapsed after some tight bowling from Riches, Betteridge and Couch. Manly still undefeated and going strong!

In our next game against Northern Districts, Manly's top order failed for the first time leaving us in disarray at 4 for 20. Our middle order saved the day with Couch, Keens and Nealon setting up a certain victory with a total of 8-225. The bowlers one again performed very well dismissing N.D.'s for 150.

Our final preliminary round saw us defeat a keen Mosman side at Manly Oval. Batting first, Manly compiled 7-234 with strong performances from Keens, Reeves and Nealon setting op the good total. Mosman were restricted to 134 with the Couch/Nealon combination creating havoc. Ben Keens also bowled well.

After a rain interrupted semi-final against Petersham, Manly progressed to the final to meet Randwick at Bankstown Oval. Simon Couch won his sixth toss and decided to bat. MANLY PRESIDENT'S XI -v- SRI LANKA

February 16th 1992 was the date and Manly Oval was the scene, for the World Cup warm up match between the touring Sri Lankans and an elite Manly President's XI. After many months of negotiations between our Club, the Australian Cricket Board and the Sri Lankan Cricket Board, the all clear was given only three weeks before the scheduled match date. Sri Lankan born businessman, Dilip Kumar from Peninsula Holden instigated initial talks with the Sri Lankan Board and the Club thanks him for his assistance in staging the match. Dilip's company, Peninsula Holden, was also the match day sponsor, with contributions also from The Communications Depot, Air Lanka and A Taste of India.

A special match committee was formed, led by Club President, Gary Flowers, and amazing feats were performed in what minimal time there was left to convene the match, the most prominent being the side Gary had assembled which consisted of nine players with first class experience including three ex-Test players in Chris Broad, David Capel and Greg Dyer. The side was captained by Manly's Phil Marks and included state squad players Geoff Milliken, Brad Macnamara, Greg McLay, Phil Alley, Andrew Jones as well as our own local stars Greg Hill and Shawn Bradstreet.

They were up against a very talented and enthusiastic Sri Lankan side led by Aravinda de Silva, who were keen to make an early impression in their quest for the prestigious World Cup.

Not since Manly played host to the Aboriginal XI -v- Prime Minister's XI game in January 1988, had a sporting fixture of such prominence come to Manly. The local newspapers, The Manly Daily and The Northern Beaches Weekender, gave us tremendous assistance toward the promotion of the match and a bumper crowd was expected.

After a week of rain, match day arrived and it was a great sense of relief to be greeted with blue skies and plenty of sunshine. By the time Phil Marks tossed the coin with the Sri Lankan captain, Aravinda de Silva, over 3500 people enthusiasts had packed themselves into the Village Green, many of them being vocal Sri Lankans who had come to cheer their idols.

Unfortunately, the President's XI lost the toss and were invited to have first use of a moist wicket which was to provide more movement than an earthquake. Only a gutsy partnership between Greg Dyer and Shawn Bradstreet saved the President's XI from total disaster, eventally reaching 130 at the completion of their allotted 50 overs. The highlight was the brilliant fielding performance of the Sri Lankans who held some remarkable catches.

The Sri Lankans, certainly enjoying the better of the conditions, needed only 29 overs to amass the required runs for victory losing only two wickets in the process. Aravinda played a gem of a little innings displaying much of his undoubted class, with poor Shawn Bradstreet being the recipient of his aggression which included a huge six into the tennis courts.




Greg Hill - Manly vs Sri Lanka 1992

MANLY WARRINGAH DISTRICT CRICKET CLUB

COACHING & DEVELOPMENT REPORT

TO THE N.S.W.C.A.

In accordance with the guidelines set out by the N.S.W.C.A. we submit the following as a summary of the Manly Warringah District Cricket Glub's Coaching & Development Programme Activities that have been undertaken for the 1991/92 season.

1. Junior Club Promotional Visits & Coaching Clinics

This year 18 players spread across all the grades participated in 22 promotional visits and skill development coaching clinics for Junior Clubs in the District.

All sessions were based upon skill development activities for batting, bowling and fielding according to the ages and ability of those that attended. In total about 1000 Junior cricketers ranging from Kangas to U/16's participated.

In addition to this, teams were invited to have tea with the First XI at home games. This enabled the boys to place faces with names they had read about in the Manly Daily, and to encourage them to set their sights on one day playing for Manly.

The player of the round for that team was presented with a miniature cricket bat with the players signatures during the interval.

By the season's end no fewer than 80 cricketers had tea with the First XI.

2. Manly Warringah Junior Cricket Association Representative Teams Development Camp, 15-17 November 1991

In association with the M.W.J.C.A. Representative Team Committee, M.W.D.C.C. players assisted in conducting specialist coaching activities during the live-in camp that was held at NSW Academy of Sport, Narrabeen. In total 80 players attended the camp.

Each of the Junior players were presented with their representative caps and shirts by M.W.D.C.C. player Greg Hill at a capping ceremony held at the camp.

3. Kanga - Cricket Demonstration

On Sunday 16th February 1992 80 Kanga Cricketers played a series of demonstration games during the luncheon interval at the Sri Lanka v Presidents XI Match at Manly Oval. This display attracted a crowd of approximately 2000 and was well received by the public and players.

4. Community Visits

On December 4th & 5th a Juggler, Nick Fury and Club Coach, Mark Hope visited Stewart House and The Royal Far West Home to promote ball skills and stimulate an interest in cricket at those schools. This excited and entertained 100 children from underprivileged families of the NSW outback.

5. Intra District Primary & Secondary School Competition

For the 12th season in succession M.W.D.C.C. conducted a successful Intra District Primary & Secondary School Cricket competition. These competitions have been keenly contested by more than 20 schools in the district.

6. Level O (Orientation) Coaching Course

On Wednesday, December 11 M.W.D.C.C. Coaching & Development Panel members, David Patterson, Mark Hope and Tony Scanlon conducted a Level O Coaching Course for interested players in the Club. 10 players attended the course and consequently have been used as coaches for the clinics that we have conducted.

7. Skills Coaching

Club Coach, Mark Hope attended all M.W.D.C.C. training sessions and dealt specifically with individual skills development on all facets of the game. His expertise and tuition contributed greatly to the improved standings and performances of the Manly Club this season. Mark also assisted the Green Shield team at their practices and matches. Their success in winning the competition is due in part to his efforts.

8. Specialist Coaching

Former NSW Sheffield Cricketer and Manly First XI Captain, Mick Pawley attended a M.W.D.C.C. practice session and provided specialist coaching to all the spinners in the Club. His knowledge of the games is unquestionable and all of the players benefited greatly from his assistance.

9. Training & Fitness Co-Ordinator

Conscious of the need for a high level of physical fitness and structured well organised practice sessions, M.W.D.C.C. appointed Damien Bray as "Training & Fitness Co-Ordinator". Damien had immense experience as a fitness instructor and a background as a former Sydney Swan player.

Damien conducted fitness training during the pre-season and with the assistance of David Patterson developed a tabloid which encompassed both skill development drills and fitness. This gave players who were not batting or bowling in the nets purposeful and intense training activities in the field.

10. Green Shield

This season Manly embarked on a highly structured campaign aimed at winning the competition. Pre-season selection trials commenced in October and from an initial squad of 40 players, 17 were selected.

The practice sessions were conducted with the assistance of Mark Hope and Sheffield Shield player Michael Bevan. There was strong emphasis placed in skills development during all of these sessions.

At the season's end 12 players from the squad were flown to Queensland to play a match against Brisbane Cricket Association's equivalent U/16 competition premiers Wynnum Manly.

11. Off Season Development Programme

An off season development programme will be initiated by the M.W.D.C.C.

OBJECTIVES

- 1. To develop First Grade cricketers for M.W.D.C.C.
- 2. To develop First Class cricketers from M.W.D.C.C.
- To assist individuals in increasing their cricket skills to a higher level.

RATIONALE *

A 5th placing in both 1st and 2nd Grade, together with a 7th placing in 3rd Grade and a Green Shield Premiership demonstrated a significant improvement on 1990-91 and the potential for even greater success next season.

The club believes that an Off Season Development Programme, if successfully implemented, is a pro-active initiative that can lead to an improvement in our performnaces in all Grades next season.

PROGRAMME DETAILS

- 2. The programme will be of twelve weeks duration, continuing until the trials begin in late August.
- 3. The programme is open to all current M.W.D.C.C. players.

PROGRAMME PERSONEL

- 1. M.W.D.C.C. Coaching Panel members.
- 2. Two Level 3 coaches will attend each session. The emphasis will be on "one on one " coaching with skills development.
- 3. Guest coaches will be invited to attend some sessions who are specialsts in their field.

EQUIPMENT

It is proposed to purchase the following equipment to ensure the success of the programme.

- 1. Balls, stumps and witches hats.
- 2. Bowling machine. Either purchase or hire from club members who possess one.
- 3. Video Equipment. A video camera, play back machine (Sony slv x50as) and television monitor. Each player is expected to provide their own VHS video cassettes.
- 4. Testing Equipment. Basic equipment for fitness testing such as stopwatches, measuring tapes, callipers and measuring wheel.
