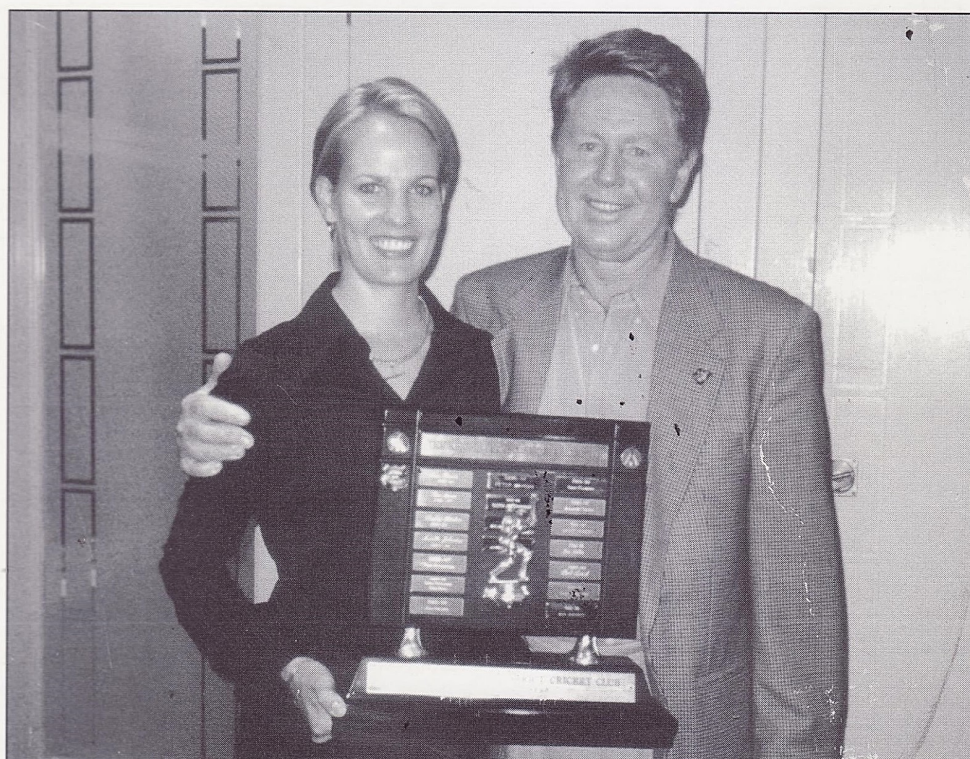

124TH ANNUAL REPORT

To the members of Manly-Warringah District Cricket Club Inc:

Ladies and Gentlemen

The Management Committee has pleasure in submitting for your consideration the 124th Annual Report and Financial Statement.

The Club entered teams in the five Sydney Cricket Association Grade competitions, as well as the Limited Overs Competition, the Poidevin Gray and Green Shield competitions.

With teams appearing in four of the eight competition semi finals and three teams being competition runners up, the club had an excellent year with promise of a gleaming future.

It was a wonderful, rewarding welcome home for club legend, life member, and newly installed director of coaching, Mike Pawley. Mike has made a huge, positive impact on the cricketing lives and the personal outlooks of our players in just a few months, so we look forward to his stewardship in the coming, progressive era. All of this was endowed in an honorary capacity, in fact he has become a major benefactor of the club. No other Sydney club enjoyed the same high levels of training and coaching equipment. His two day high performance conference for our players was the first undertaken by a grade club and it was hailed as an extremely valuable innovation in the development of cricketers. He has enhanced the good things happening in junior development in our area by incorporating additional clinics for players and further fostering excellent relations between the many groups advancing cricket in our area. His selfless devotion and his embodiment of the true spirit of our great club was recognised by the award of Clubman of the Year.

While 1st Grade had a less glorious year in terms of points, they had some brilliant moments and a very positive spirit fostered by Captain, Matthew Phelps. We are very fortunate to have senior players of the immense quality of Matthew and Shawn Bradstreet to coach, encourage and assist in the development of a stable of promising young talent. There are active portents for a return to greater success.

Coming out of retirement, Richard Fry, brilliantly captained the seconds to penultimate success and brought great credit to the club through his implementation of a non-sledging policy which was recognised and applauded in the national media. The team's effort in their second innings of the final was acclaimed as one of the most stirring fight backs in the history of grade cricket. Among a string of superb season performances in the team, Craig Glasscock returned from a horrible illness and gave some truly heroic batting displays resulting in records that will stand for a long time.

Before going into retirement, Andrew Fraser captained the fourths to within a whisker of adding another premiership to his belt. His zealous leadership was indicative of his passionate dedication to the club over a near quarter of a century. Coming to the club as the award winning district junior player, he set great examples of persistence to accumulate 6544 runs across the grades at 34 average, to become the tenth highest run getter in the history of the club including 34 fifties and four centuries.

He was Clubman of the Year (90/91) and was later awarded Life Membership in recognition of his club leadership, playing contribution and his invaluable service in a range of official club positions, including serving as Deputy President, fundraiser and organiser of club overseas tours. We are extremely fortunate that Andrew will continue in his club official service role at a time when his exciting business career is so demanding and his family responsibilities expand. Congratulations on the end of a superb Manly playing career Andrew. You have made your positive, indelible mark on the club and many of your witticisms will live on in the legends of the club. We send best wishes also to Andrew's family, Mandy and Jake, Kirk and Chloe.

Thirds came home with a great drive under the captaincy of Warren Evans and were unlucky to be edged out in the semi. Warren has given great service to the club and notched up his 422nd wicket and is the twelfth highest ranking wicket taker in the history of the club. He and brother, Glen have taken between them 807 splendid wickets for the club.

David Morris came to us following success at Warringah Shires and gave excellent service in captaining fifths to variable success and superbly coached our Green Shield side. He helped in the development of some very promising young players. We also thank Tony Sullivan for managing the Green Shield side in his usual meticulous and caring manner. Many thanks to Tim Cruikshank for captaining the PGs, with some assistance from Ryan Bonner and also to Elliot Bullock for captaining the Green Shield team that performed with a great deal of distinction. Special thanks go to Mark McInnes for excellent service as Club Captain. We appreciated Graham Cruikshank's dedicated service in carrying out the difficult Chairman of Selectors job and ensuring that the best teams were there for each match.

I refer you to the Coach's and Captains' reports for detailed analysis and comment on individual and team performances. But wasn't it great to note eight new club record performances!

Congratulations to Michael Bevan on his one day Australian successes and for his fifth year in a row award as NSW batsman of the year, following his eclipse of Alan Kippax's long time record of 8005 runs for NSW. Congratulations to Michael, Shawn Bradstreet and Matthew Phelps for their parts in the successful ING Cup final. Jamie Heath was honoured also with games for NSW. Congratulations to all of our players featured on our Representative Page.

We will be without the excellent dedicated services of Jamie Pipe next season as he has completed his three season stint with us and has returned to forge his county career with Worcestershire. Rob Regent has moved to Canada, so we thank him for great service and send him best wishes in his new adventure and life overseas. Best wishes to Craig Mueller on his transfer back to Perth, just as he was proving his qualities in the finals. Simon Waddington has retired to devote more time to his and Kate's expanding family. Thanks for some special cricket moments Waddo. Brian Clemow retired prematurely and we sorely missed his friendship, expertise and skill. Hopefully, we might be able to see Clem sign up again if rumours are correct.

The inaugural Mal Hall Memorial Cup match was played between our 4ths and Gordon. A short, dignified ceremony was held prior to the match when the Gordon Captain's death, during a Manly V Gordon match and his service to cricket was remembered. Gordon took the cup home.

Next season we will enjoy the magnificent \$1.7m refurbishment of the pavilion and grandstand at Manly Oval. We thank Manly Council and our Patrons, Mayor Jean Hay and David Barr MP for their support over the years as members of the Manly Oval Trust and as councillors to bring about the magnificently improved facilities. Without the facilities this year, it has been very difficult and we have acknowledged the willing support of Diggers On The Park, Manly Rugby Club and Manly Lawn Tennis Club for our use of their facilities to make do throughout the year. We thank Steve and Debbie Gazmelski for their assistance throughout the season, the wicket being rated 4th and we acknowledge the co-operation of the SCA and clubs that played at Manly Oval in making do during the inconveniences. I thank all members who worked so hard to conduct all games in the best possible standard of presentation. We also thank Jim Cameron and his team for their great work at Grahams Reserve

Importantly, I refer you to our Supporters and Sponsors page where we acknowledge those who help to sustain our cricketing success. Harbord Diggers continued to be our principal supporter and we acknowledge the importance of our alliance. Ken had close ties to our club but his wonderful cricket career was with the Mosman Club and New South Wales.

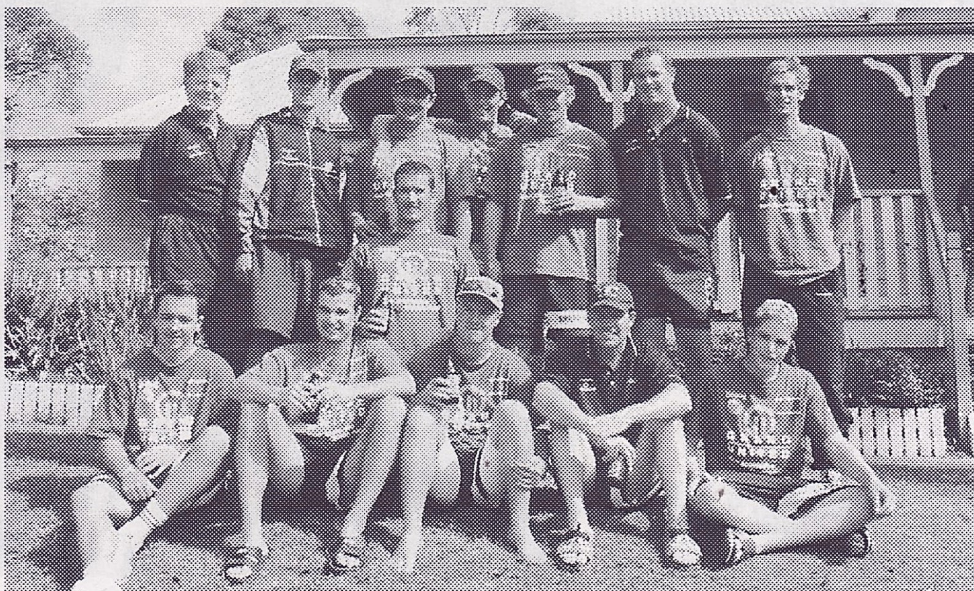

Glasscock rewrites record books

FOUR months ago Craig Glasscock couldn't eat breakfast without collapsing through exhaustion.

On Saturday the former NSW wicket-keeper spent more than nine hours at the crease breaking more records than a clumsy DJ as Manly's second grade cricket side moved into next weekend's grand final.

Glasscock's epic 262 was just short of Brian Clemow's club record highest-score of 287 and marked the 28-year-old's full recovery from a depressing bout of Chronic Fatigue Syndrome.

His dig enabled the Seasideers to score a mammoth 478 and completely shut Sutherland out of the game.

Glasscock smacked 19 fours and six sixes.

Along the way he racked up the following milestones:

- Highest personal score
- Highest score in second grade, beating Frank Ridge's 252 not out in the 1897/98 season
- Record third wicket stand (195) with Paul Brenner (89), eclipsing the 192 set by A. Little and C. Searle in 1929/30
- Record sixth wicket partnership (223) with Richard Fry (86), topping the mark set by Paul Stabback and Reg Hunt in 1965/66
- Manly's highest individual score of the past 10 years (156), recorded by Brenner and Simon Couch
- Highest individual score by a Manly player at Manly Oval

"The best part of the whole thing is it shows I am completely over my illness," Glasscock said yesterday.

"Back in November I was sleeping 11 or 12 hours, getting up, having breakfast and going back to bed."

"Back then I never thought

something like this might be possible."

A tired but delighted Glasscock is now just one step away from achieving what he couldn't in more than a decade in first grade - a premierships win.

"They are a great bunch of blokes and play cricket the right way and it would be the perfect way to finish the year," he said.

"I never won a first grade competition but this would be just as good."

Manly's hopes of a hat-trick of titles came to an end on Sunday when third grade went down to Mosman by five wickets at Rawson Oval.

But the fourths kept the double dream alive by dispatching Hawkesbury at Graham's Reserve.

The Seasideers, minus inspirational skipper Andrew Fraser, were in all sorts of trouble at 5-100 before in-form Adam Parkinson (141) and Craig Mueller (127) performed CPR on the innings. The pair put on 264 for the sixth wicket to beat the old record of 199 set by Craig Currie and Tony Pitcher in 1995/96.

Seconds will play Northern District at Hurstville Oval in the three-day grand final starting Friday, while fourths meet Sutherland at Caringbah Oval from Saturday.

The quiet achievers

AUSTRALIA'S first anti-sledding cricket side will continue its vow of silence in the hope of delivering Manly its first second grade premierships in 12 years this weekend.

The Seasideers, who meet Northern District at Hurstville Oval in a three-day final starting this morning, are aiming to become part of a title double with the club's fourth grade outfit.

Skipper Richard Fry, who invoked a no-sledding edict at the start of the season, says there is no way his side will be drawn into a war of words despite the intensity associated with a grand final.

"It's worked well for us all season so there is no reason to change now," he said.

"We can't believe it's (the anti-sledding policy) attracted so much attention because it's no big deal."

"It's never really been about the opposition, it's

more about us concentrating on what we're doing out there."

Thirty-five-year-old Fry ended a two year retirement to take on the second grade job this summer, inheriting a side that finished near the bottom of the heap in the 2000/01 season. He immediately set about changing the culture of the team, injecting fresh enthusiasm and a hunger to succeed.

added a further dimension to the side. Glasscock compiled 262 in the preliminary final against Sutherland, breaking six records along the way.

He will be a key figure this weekend as Manly looks to capture only its third second grade premierships in more than 100 years.

"It would be a great way to end the season but if it doesn't happen the sun will come up the next day and life will go on," the laidback Fry said.

"We're not about to put any extra pressure on ourselves because it's a grand final."

"They don't come along all that often so you've got

to try and relax and enjoy it."

Fry was a member of the 1988/89 premierships-winning first grade side but has not tasted success since.

"I remember (RM 89 teammate) Mark Williams saying to enjoy it because you don't get to win grand finals that often," he said.

MWDCC 3RD GRADE REPORT 2001/02 SEASON

An interesting year for 3rd Grade. We were placed anywhere from 1 to 10 during the season and finished 3rd. At certain points, we were lucky to be in the top eight, at other times unlucky not to win the competition.

Placed 1st at 1-134 in the semi final, we should have made the final but as it turned out, some excellent cricket from Mosman got them to the final where Gordon finished premiers.

A strong start saw the team well placed approaching the Christmas break, but three losses on the trot meant a top 10 finish was not a certainty. A mixed bag followed – a big win against Fairfield meant little to some following the extent of our loss in the following game v Sutherland. An influx of quality players helped us to two good wins at season end. This with the bye saw the team finish 4th at the end of the rounds, a whisker away from 3rd.

The perfect all round game was displayed in the QF v Hawkesbury at Benson's. Batting first we got through the first session at 2-72 on a drying pitch, but quick wickets after lunch changed the complexion. A big partnership between Fitzsimmons and Cohen put us on track. This combined with the tail enjoying a true hard pitch, led to a 9 dec 320 total. Hawkesbury started strongly, easily seeing off our opening punch but some superb accurate bowling from Lindsay meant a similar score line at lunch. The pressure was maintained on the batting side, despite a superb pitch and warm sun. An important wicket was prised out after lunch and following this was a great display from all bowlers to go through the middle and late order for a comfortable 130 run win.

This strong performance and some stronger training efforts gave the team confidence going into the Mosman game, but we ended up being outplayed which was somewhat inevitable following our collapse from 1-134 to 7-156.

The final statistics show a much higher degree of consistency compared to previous seasons. Unfortunately just three players got over the SCA 250 run mark, however most players can lay claim to important contributions at various stages with the bat.

Third grades top twenty for the year

Elliot Bullock: An early inclusion to the team. Contributed to an early successful opening partnership with Paul Brenner. Young bloke with promise.

Simon Couch: I doubt I have seen harder hitting than his 148 v Petersham. His only weakness, once set, was boredom. He made some vital contributions and it was no coincidence that our mid-season slump was synchronised with Simon's departure from our side.

Ben King: Ben experienced a disruptive start to the season with the HSC. Cricket was not a priority for the first part of the year, but some good performances resulted in selection in 2nd Grade towards the end of the season. A clean hitter of the ball who unfortunately finds ways of getting out. If he ever gets over his mental commotion whilst at the crease he will score loads of runs.

Cameron Lawes: Played a magnificent innings in the first game of the year. Campbelltown could not set a field to him and he blasted 83 in very quick time. Followed up with a careful 30 v Wests. A shoulder injury prevented him from gaining permanency although you have the feeling Cameron could become a consistent #7 in most grades.

Tim Kensall: Tim showed promise as an off spinning all rounder but did not have the confidence to turn potential into actuals. Batted superbly v Nth Districts and bowled a great spell v Mosman, however consistency was a factor.

Shane Cleary: Had a great first season. Has the ability to bowl with some pace, but needs to work on strength. He can succeed on flat decks against good opposition as he showed in the 2nd Grade final, but just needs to start thinking about doing a bit of extra work. Batted explosively at times. A big hitting 91 v Sutherland and other useful contributions during the season gave Shane the all rounder stamp which he should be able to carry with him as he progresses.

Scott Fitzsimmons: Fitzzy was the brains trust of 3rd Grade for the second half of the season. Fitzzy scored some great runs for us with his century in the quarter-final the highlight. Is definitely better than the numbers suggest. When he bats with the same intensity he displays as a fieldsman, he scores a lot of runs easily at this level.

Todd Sekulich: I've played a lot with Todd over the past four seasons and this was yet another season that did not quite click for him. He continues to show potential at all aspects of the game - an off spinner who can bowl with great flight, a batsman who can keep the scoreboard ticking over with creative aggression, a fieldsman who has good hands and somebody who has a very good cricketing mind. However, lapses in concentration prevent Todd from getting the results you think should be happening for him.

Ben Cohen: Moved quickly from 5th Grade to 2nd Grade. When the club was at full strength with 12 qualifiers for 2nd Grade quarter-final, Ben played 3rd Grade in the finals. Great contributions in these games was no surprise after his performances in 3rd's during the season. If everybody shows Ben's fighting qualities, then MWDCC will add to their premiership bag.

Luke Cameron: Luke showed some good touches for 3rd Grade this season in his few appearances. A fighting 30 got us back in the game against Mosman and a solid 30 v Bankstown consolidated the middle order in an important win.

Justin Cox: An up and down season for Justin. A nasty cut to the head at training did not help his cause, but prior to this showed some glimpses of a very fine player. Peeled off 52 v Balmain and went noticed in a couple of other innings. A partnership breaking bowler who could get more bowling in the future.

Nigel Hicks: Hicksy was exactly what 3rd Grade needed during the season. Without him we would not have made the finals. Bowled with great discipline and was easy to set a field to. Probably the club's best trainer.

Jimmy Castrisos: Jimmy was unlucky to be dropped from 2nd Grade towards the end of the season. He made some useful contributions for 3rd's. Earlier in the season he knocked up a great 90 v Balmain. Rarely gets out early, but needs to convert his starts.

Craig Mueller: An attacking player who should have played more in 3rd Grade.

Andrew Lindsay: Frase did well to keep Andrew for more than a game or two. Andrew dominated 3rd Grade bowling in the last few games of the year. Can work up good pace and when bowling with rhythm, combines pace with accuracy, which is a rarity at 3rd Grade level. Took a wicket every 21 balls, but at times looked like taking a wicket every ball. If he maintained interest in this sport he has a future.

Matt Cranney: Another player who was warmly welcomed to 3rd Grade. Was always thinking of the game and made some great on-field contributions to tactics. After breaking his hand, Matt was forced to come back via 3rd Grade. His inclusion was one of the turning points in 3rd's turnaround – an opener who got a few runs on the board. Didn't bat with the fluency he is capable of but scored runs when it mattered.

Richie Butterworth: Richie was our #11 this year but is a more than capable batsman. Scored a good 50 v NDs and this showed that he should be averaging 25 at this level. Didn't treat each ball on its merits though, therefore often got out just as he was starting to look set. His keeping was solid. Being tall, at times I got the impression Richie struggled with the ball low to his left so that is something he could work on. A great on-field motivator who along with some other key members of the team, made captaincy easy.

Jay Trevaskis: Jay is a key club man. Wherever he plays he plays wholeheartedly. Apparently bowled without luck in 2nd's and this was also the case in 3rd's. Bowled beautifully at times and with a bit of luck could have pushed A Lindsay for the award. A top notch mid to lower order batsman who is one of the few guys in the club who truly values his wicket.

Rob Regent: Rob provided a huge amount of tact to 3rd Grade upon his return from retirement. A classy batsman who you know could rattle off a century most games. Was the difference in a few games – after a scratchy first game back he became rock solid and held together the top order on difficult backing decks v Parra, Hawksbury and Mosman.

All in all a successful year that could have been better.

The support was more evident this season – Bob Somerville and Langdon Gould did a great job helping at training, as did Mal Elliot. Mal gave up a lot of time for MWDCC and his efforts with 3rd Grade was greatly appreciated.

An obvious thanks goes to Donny. Donny again did a sterling job managing and scoring for 3rd's this year and his knowledge of MWDCC is second to none.

Other thanks goes to Jim Evans and others who helped out at tea times and drink breaks. Arman and Bob Brenner also expelled a lot of energy in ensuring 3rd Grade's season went smoothly.

As for Graham Reserve – we are seeing signs of a true cricket wicket for the first time in my 16 years, therefore Jim Cameron and his offsider Rob deserve a mention for their toil.

As for Mick Pawley – there were no half measures with Mick. He is creative in his approach and shows generosity beyond the call. Mick gave MWDCC a lot this season and if he is around next season then MWDCC will have an even better year, now that we have had some exposure to his successful methods. It was probably him alone that generated the enthusiasm around the club and this rubbed off on a lot of players, especially blokes who have been around for years, who all seem to be in agreement that this was one of their more enjoyable seasons.

Our experienced players demonstrated to them how to play the game hard, but fair and also taught them how to enjoy winning. I am sure all of this will stand them all in good stead in the future as they journey down the path towards Manly's First XI.

On that note, I want to pay tribute to my wife, Mandie, who has just been an amazing support for me since we met way back in 1983, when ironically, Mike Pawley introduced us. Without her encouragement and patience (as she watched me devote thousands and thousands of hours to Manly Cricket Club), I would never have been able to play for as long as I have. In fact, it is Mandie who wants me to continue playing!

But you guys will not get rid of me this easily. I will certainly be there to share a beer after the matches whenever possible and it is my intention to play a role in the Club for many years to come.

Thanks again to all my team for a brilliant season - it has been an amazing ride.

MWDCC 5TH GRADE REPORT 2001/02 SEASON

It's time to review our past season and consider the future for both the team and individuals. Elliot Bullock (after Christmas) played some good cricket and I think the captaincy and the success of the Green Shield really gave him confidence in his game. Luke Campbell worked hard to get in the team and when there showed what a tough competitor he is. Michael Ashton contributed heavily with both bat and ball during the season - a very gifted athlete. All you guys have potential, but it will only get you so far. If you want to play higher Grades you must work hard, both technically and mentally, turning the potential into performances.
